







24th Annual Flora-Bama Chili Cook-Off Feb. 3

Let the chopping begin. The 24th Annual Flora-Bama Super Bowl Chili Cook-Off is set for Feb. 3, Super Bowl Saturday. Teams of three can register to work their chili wizardry to win with their version of the best chili and win cash prizes in several divisions. If you don't want to cook, come by, sample the wide variety of dishes and help raise funds for The American Cancer Society and Relay for Life. Cooking begins at 10 a.m., and tasting tickets (\$2 per sample or \$10 for six samples) will be sold beginning at noon.

Participants must cook at least 4 gallons of chili and supply all cooking utensils, pots, burners, and ingredients. Teams must be willing to eat your own chili, be over 21 and pay the \$45 entry fee - a deal considering the goodie bags include event t-shirts and party favors and draft beer is free for cooks. The winner will earn a perpetual trophy and \$100. People's Choice winner earns a perpetual trophy and \$99. There are also cash prizes for second (\$75) and third place (\$50) finishers.

The cook-off usually attracts around 20 teams and raises north of \$5,000 for the designated charities. The venue is, of course, located on the Gulf of Mexico at the Florida-Alabama state line. Visit florabama.com or facebook for more info.

Orange Beach will build marina east of Sportsman

City hires McCollough Architecture to design the first building

The first move may seem like baby steps, but Coastal Resources Director Phillip West envisions big things for city-owned property on Terry Cove.

At the Jan. 16 city council work session, the city of Orange Beach discussed initial moves it is planning to bring development to the former Walker Marina property east of Sportsman Marina. The city bought the waterfront parcel in 2005 and uses it now for a disc golf course and a dog park.

Two firms will be hired to design and get the permitting settled to improve the boat basin with some covered slips, seawall, boat ramp and an office and storage building. The cost of this initial project at the property will be about \$1.5 million, West said.

"We need to find a place to house our marine operations, initially our Coastal Resources operations, and the new historic vessel, the Sea Duster," West said. "We want to go ahead and permit out the marina because we expect that Auburn and Alabama will be bringing some level of presence. Initially, pretty light and eventually we anticipate that whole property being built out as a research campus."

To that end, West said, Auburn is going through the RESTORE Act process trying to secure about \$9 million to build a 20,000- to a 25,000-square foot research facility on the property.

"The Auburn-led research project has gone through the first round of RESTORE and is in the second round of evaluations," West said. "That would be a \$9 million project that would follow this one. But that's best case, a couple of years down the road.

But for now, the focus will be on the boat basin improvements and the city's building. "We, initially, need a place for our three vessels and the Sea Duster as well as offices for Coastal Resources staff," West said. "And, offices for the immediate needs of the universities and whoever else might want to have that type of access

"We'll go ahead and permit 10 slips, but right now we're going to build four, three with boat lifts, all covered slips. And get the office building which will have storage space, lab space, meeting space. All that built in. That's our short-term need."

To start that process, the city will sign a personal services contract with McCollough Architecture to design the first building for the site. West said he anticipates immediate interest from universities so the size of the building isn't set.

"We gave them a range because over the next few weeks we're going to know if we have immediate tenants or not," West said. "Basically, a minimum of 2,500 square feet up to 4,500 square feet. If the universities can immediately have offices and lab space then that's just going to facilitate all the projects we work on together. And plan to work on. Some of those being considered are under RESTORE and NRDA as well."

Work on the marina and other infrastructure will be done through TTL, a firm the city keeps on retainer to help with projects.

"We gave them a task order to do the design and permitting of the seawall, boardwalk, piers, slips and lifts," West said. "We're going to install a boat launch for us there and they'll handle that as well."

West said he hopes the work can be completed before the end of the year and would like to get started by as earlier as April. The city bought the five-acre parcel after Hurricane Ivan in 2004.

"I don't know if we'll be able to occupy it in 2018 but we've got to get going," he said.

The property was first bought under Mayor Steve Russo from Astrata Land Company for \$7.5 million cash, \$2.1 million land swap for lots in the Callaway subdivision on Canal Road for a total value of \$9.6 million, City Administrator Ken Grimes said.

Foley


The Foley Mardi Gras Parade rolls through city streets on the Saturday before Fat Tuesday, and this year that date is Feb. 10. The parade starts at 11 a.m. at Roosevelt and Alston streets, going north on Alston, then turns west on U.S. 98 and moving south on Oak Street.

Unlike the Mobile parades, each of which is hosted by a specific mystic society, the Foley parade is open to everyone in the area who wants to participate. Floats, trucks, antique cars, walking groups, bands. More than 25 units typically participate, and organizers stress that it's a family-friendly event.

Pirates Cove

The Krewe of the Royal Riff Raff will parade in the neighborhood surrounding Pirates Cove in Josephine on Sunday, February 11. Mardi Gras 2018

Fat Tuesday is also anniversary celebration at Lulu's

The Annual LuLu's Anniversary and Mardi Gras Fat Tuesday Celebration will again feature New Orleans themed live music beginning at 11 a.m. on Feb. 13, an hour after doors open at the annual event. The fun continues with the arrival of the Mardi Gras Boat Parade from The Wharf at around 5 p.m.

Located at Homeport Marina (200 East 25th Ave., Gulf Shores) directly under the Hwy. 59 bridge, LuLu's opened for business on Fat Tuesday 18 years back and quickly established itself as the meeting place among those with a taste for New Orleans music on Mardi Gras day.



Grand Marshall Earl Callaway will lead O.B. parade

Although the Orange Beach based group is now defunct, the Krewe of the Mystic Isle was responsible for Orange Beach's first Fat Tuesday Mardi Gras Parade back in (he thinks) 1993, said Earl Callaway, who will serve as grand marshall of this year's parade.

As he remembers it, krewe members built and designed a flatbed float to transport the group from The Keg to an Orange Beach Sports Assn. sponsored Fat Tuesday fish-fry under the Perdido Pass Bridge.

"We had so much fun going over there on that float that we decided to try to have a parade," the Orange Beach native said. "I asked the city for \$10,000 and they unanimously voted to give us \$7,500."

Callaway, widely considered to be Orange Beach's first rock 'n roll musician, said he spent most of the stipend on marching bands.

"I tried to line up all these small school marching bands that would come play for a few hundred dollars," he said. "The rest I spent on putting local pickers on flatbed trucks."

Although he knows he is leaving out some local characters, Callaway said Dean and Sylvia Howland (who owned The Keg at the time), Robert Herrin, Billy Ray, Marlin Rogers, Virgie Stewart, Howard Bain and Larry Bratton were among the core who worked to make the first paarade happen. Dorance "Montana" Hanson designed and built the Mystic Isle floats used in those early parades.

The parade was an immediate hit, but very time consuming for its organizer. After a few years, Callaway went to the city's mayor and asked that the city either take over the parade or pay him a reasonable fee for his time.

"He told me there were two things he absolutely was not going to do. The first was pay me and the second was take it over. I said 'fine' and started telling people who called about it to call City Hall and ask for the Mayor," Callaway said

Orange Beach City Council, aware of the economic impact the parade was already generating, did take over the parade and has since added Friday and Saturday evening parades to its roster.

Pine Beach Trail on Alabama Top 10 winter hike list

Bon Secour Refuge trails are just a few miles west of Hwy. 59 Jones Branch and Lawson Branch

Pine Beach Trail through Bon Secour National Wildlife Refuge has been named of Alabama's top 10 winter hikes.

Located just a few miles west of Hwy. 59 on Ft. Morgan Rd., Pine Beach Trail weaves through a series of impressive sand dunes before arriving at the snowy white beaches of the

Gulf at one of the most pristine and secluded beaches on the coast.

This is an easy 4-mile out-and-back that begins in a maritime wetland and

forest. Farther on, it weaves through a series of impressive sand dunes bedecked with waving sea oats before arriving at the snowy white beaches of the

Be sure to pack a lunch, and about a mile into the hike stop at a two-story platform to view birds and other wildlife. And don't forget, the dunes play host to many species of wildlife and help protect the mainland from devastating storms. Because of this they are federally protected, meaning you should stay on the marked trail.

Across Alabama you'll find plenty of amazing trails that are perfect for winter hikes, whether your wish to wind through calm woods or seek a stunning mountain view, the soothing sounds of a cascading waterfall, or just a quiet spot

Here are nine other top winter hikes in Alabama The Beautiful.

beside a placid lake

Shoal Creek Preserve

If you're in Florence in northwest Alabama and you need a holiday break, head to the trails of the Shoal Creek Preserve, where two magnificent trails interconnect and allow you to do loop hikes. If you want to walk for just an hour or so, try the 2.4-mile lollipop loop hike on the Lawson Branch Trail, or a 2.5-mile walk on the Jones Branch Trail. For a longer jaunt, combine the two for

a great 4.3-mile double loop. No matter how you hike the preserve, you're in for a treat, as the

are home to babbling cascades and other tranquil water features.

Cane Creek Nature Preserve

A lot has been written about Cane Creek Nature Preserve and for good reason—the combination of geology, wildflowers, and rushing streams makes this a remarkable site to hike no matter what the season.

Be sure to pack a lunch,

Located in Tuscumbia, the preserve has more than 15 miles of trails that intertwine, giving you almost unlimited hiking possibilities.

Of course, you won't see a

lot of wildflowers during the holiday season, but the landscape more than makes up for it. Take in a panoramic view of the canyon and surrounding hills from "The Point," as hawks and eagles soar around you. Then, make your way into the canyon to several rock shelters, many of which are adorned with tumbling waterfalls.

Monte Sano State Park

Ringing the top of Monte Sano Mountain, the North and South Plateau trails make a double loop hike to beautiful overlooks. Joe

Circling the top of Huntsville's Monte Sano Mountain, the Plateau Loop runs through Monte Sano State Park and provides nice views during winter. Traversing relatively easy and level terrain, this 5.4-mile double loop is comprised of the 1.9-mile North Plateau Trail and the 3.5-mile South Plateau Trail.

The South Plateau leads you to some nice overlooks, the best being the rock outcropping known as O'Shaugnessy Point, which is located about halfway through

The North Plateau takes you to another overlook and a short side trail near the park's picnic area. If you follow the side trail, you'll reach a nice waterfall where you can sit and contemplate all of those amazing hiking gifts you'll see under the tree this year.

DeSoto Falls Loop

DeSoto State Park is a beautiful park in and of itself, but add a dusting of snow—as is often the

case during the holidays-and it becomes magical.

A favorite of hikers this time of year is the Falls Loop, which actually includes three of the park's trails—Laurel Falls, Lost Falls, and Azalea Cascade—to form a 3.1-mile loop. As their names imply, each is a beautiful waterfall tumbling down the sandstone rocks, offering hikers the sound of a soft, soothing cascade as a holiday gift.

Sipsey Wilderness

Around just about every corner you'll pass towering sandstone canyon walls with cascading waterfalls. Chuck Clark Pick a route, any route through the Sipsey Wilderness, and you're guaranteed an amazing winter hike. Around just about every corner you'll pass towering sandstone canyon walls with cascading waterfalls. Plus, you can stroll beside the beautiful, clear waters of the Sipsey River. With 45 miles of trails, the wilderness holds a wide variety of hiking options, from easy walks to lengthy, challenging treks.

Cahaba River Trail

A holiday celebration wouldn't be complete without a walk through the pines. At the Cahaba River National Wildlife Refuge, you can stroll down an impressive aisle of longleaf and loblolly pines on the Piper Interpretive Trail.

This 2.3-mile out-and-back hike not only leads you through impressive stands of pine trees, but it also visits high rocky bluffs

Cahaba River.

To complete a loop, you can return on an old road, but be aware that the road is covered with gravel stones that measure 2 to 3 inches and make walking diffi-

Flagg Mountain Loop

Hikers sometimes say that Flagg is "so tall it generates its own weather." Joe Cuhaj Flagg Mountain is recognized as the

last mountain more than 1,000feet tall in the southern Appalachians. Hikers sometimes say that Flagg is "so tall it generates its own weather." Of course, that's a joke, since the mountain is only 1,152 feet tall. But, it does snow on Flagg, and when it happens the 1.8-mile Flagg Mountain Loop Trail is simply beautiful.

The loop is created by joining two trails, the Yellow and White Trails. If you go, be sure to add the extra 0.6-mile out-and-back from where the two trails join together to view the 1930s craftsmanship of the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC). Along this stretch you'll see cabins made of logs that were hand hewn for a proposed state park that never

Conecuh Forest Pond Loop

The Conecuh National Forest in Andalusia has several great trails for backpacking and day hiking. In winter during the holiday season, many of the trails are shared with hunters, but you can still

safely enjoy this beautiful longleaf pine forest along the Pond Loop Trail.

This loop is actually a collection of several different segments of the white-blazed Conecuh Trail, and they stretch approximately 2.2 miles when joined together. To

begin the hike, start with a loop around the Open Pond Recreation Area's namesake, Open Pond. Then, head off to circle the dark, placid waters of

Ditch, Buck, and Alligator Ponds, where you might see wood ducks and wild turkeys, as well as Bobwhite Quail darting in and out of

If you need to extend your holiday respite, the Open Pond Rec Area has a 5-star campground that's the perfect for a good old fashioned family winter campout.

Perdido River Trail

If you have plans to visit the Alabama Gulf Coast this holiday season and want to get away from the normal tourist trappings, take a hike along the Perdido River Trail. Located in Robertsdale, the trail is now almost 20 miles long, but the first segment from the south trailhead makes a wonderful 4-mile winter out-and-back

The trail follows the banks of its namesake river, which runs along the border of Alabama and Florida. As you walk, you'll be treated to beautiful sandbars and an Atlantic cedar swamp. Plus, there's a good chance you'll see bald eagles soaring overhead.

Gulf Shores seeks RESTORE Act funds for youth environmental camp; turning lane at Waterville may be delayed 'til after the summer season

By John Mullen

The city is hoping to land a RESTORE Act grant to start an environmental camp to teach youth about natural resources and how to protect them.

Mayor Robert Craft revealed the effort at the end of a recent council meeting. At Monday's meeting, the council also agreed to take over a state effort to widen Alabama 59 to extend the southbound left turn lane into Waterville by about 190 feet to accommodate more cars. And, the council OK'd an effort by the fire department to secure grant money to replace 65 self-contained breathing equipment packs for the city's firefighters.

Craft said the project scored well compared to others submitted for RESTORE Act funding. Widely used engineering consultant Volkert was hired to study each of the

submissions presented to the council.

"This one came out very high on the list," Craft said. "I'm not overconfident but I'm hopeful that we will get this assigned to us and we will get started on that. Ideally, it would be open for camp in 2020. I'm hopeful that at our RESTORE council meet-

ing and we're going to be selecting projects to move forward."

Earlier in January, the city played host to a group known for its environmental work worldwide to help Gulf Shores move forward.

"We had the Cousteau group that runs environmental camps, Ambassadors to the Environment and Ocean Future Society," Craft said. "Jean-Michel Cousteau, was in town this weekend. The reason we had Cousteau here was to make sure we had a final understanding with them that everything is aligned. We rented bikes and rode almost every inch of the trail looking at the different

elements of the environment, the different opportunities to expose our youth to the proper way to take care of the environment.'

The Space and Rocket Center in Huntsville has had great success with its camp for many years and it attracts not only Alabama kids but campers from around the country and the world.

"A mirror of Space Camp to bring kids in from around the state to live in the environment and understand the human interaction with the environment and how we project it," Craft said. "And the consequences if we don't. I think it's an important opportunity for us to be able to teach the next generation to do a better job than we've done in protecting the environment."

Craft said while the final details are still being worked out, the campus will likely

be on city-owned property adjacent to Gulf State Park.

According to Baldwin County tax records the city owns two large parcels on the south side of 22nd Avenue East between East Sixth Street and East 10th Street with park land on the south side and Alabama Department of Revenue land on the east side. The city also owns two parcels with road frontage on Fort Morgan Road in front of Wal-Mart that abut state park property on the east, according to the records.

ROAD WORK On the Alabama 59 widening, Public Works Director Mark Acreman said the state's initial plan was to complete the project before starting the resurfacing of the roadway from the beach to the Intracoastal Waterway bridge. The goal is to increase the turn lane capacity from one car to 11 or 12 queuing up to turn into Waterville.

"Unfortunately, they were not able to get their plans ready by that time," Acreman said. "They said they were going to let this project later in the year and intend to start sometime in June or July. Obviously, something we would not be excited about

doing."

Craft said this project would be one of many going on in the city that needs to be completed by May 1 ahead of the busy summer season. Among those are work at the County Road 6 and Alabama 59 intersection, the bridge on Alabama 59 north of Windmill Ridge, adding sidewalks on beach road and phase two of the Gulf Place Revitalization Project.

"We are already stopping traffic southbound twice," Craft said. "County Road 6 and at the bridge. That's untenable and we can't allow that. To do three at the same time is just absolutely not possible."

To minimize another tie up along the city's main thoroughfare, Acreman said the work near Waterville would be bid as a night-time project.

Acreman said the state agreed to let the city take over the widening project but ALDOT will still foot the bill of about \$300,000 for construction, engineering, testing and inspection.

"We approached ALDOT and asked would allow the city to take the lead on the project so we can expedite the procurement process, get a contractor selected and also to

oversee and implement the construction work," he said. "The city has received a set of plans from DOT that is about 95 percent complete. We want to submit it and get the permitting as soon as possible.

If the state is slow to get permitting for the job, Acreman said, it may not be possi-

ble to get the project completed by the May 1 target date.

"If ALDOT does not turn that permit around in a timely manner and we cannot proceed and have it done before summertime, our goal will be to start it immediately after the summer so we don't have any impact on Highway 59 in the middle of the summer season," Acreman said. "If we cannot finish this project by May 1 it would be my recommendation not to start it until after Labor Day."

Curbs will be moved two feet wider on each side of the road for the room to make the turn lane longer. Acreman said the lanes would be slightly narrower but still

meet state standards.

"We're focused on getting this place ready for the summer, NCAA volleyball championship, the first part of May and here we go from there," Craft said. "You see a lot of stuff going on but it'll all come together."

FIREFIGHTER GRANT

Deputy Fire Chief Keith Martin told the council the fire department would soon have to replace all of the self-contained breathing units at a cost of \$450,000. But he hopes a grant covering 95 percent of that cost can be secured.

"It's available through Homeland Security known as an Assistance to Firefighters grant," Martin said. "This year the top priority is the replacement of the equipment we're using, the packs and air packs we wear on our backs when we go into dangerous situations where the atmosphere could be detrimental to the firefighter. We set these up to start replacing them with the 2019 budget."

Martin said the fire department planned to request \$150,000 a year in 2019 through 2021 to buy the new equipment. But wanted to start the grant process now to hope-

fully defray most of those costs.

"We thought this is going to be a great opportunity for us to apply for this because if we get it, we'll wind up only having an output of \$21,000 versus an outlay of \$450,000," he said. "These are items that are going to have to be replaced. They are at the end of their lifecycle. It's going to be something we're going to have to do but our hope is that by one of these grants we'll get that money."





TNR is the only proven effective method of controlling the otherwise exponential growth in stray and feral cat colonies. Mayor Kennon and the Orange Beach City Council endorsed this proactive, progressive and humane effort. The city's dedication as committed partners will make Orange Beach a better place to live for our citizens and our cats.

TNR also ensures the cats' health and welfare. Once these cats are sterilized and vaccinated, they can live healthy, happy lives in their communities, where caring residents look out for them.



Orange Beach Police Dept. adds new officers to force

Three new Orange Beach police officers were introduced at the Orange Beach City Council meeting on Tuesday, Jan. 16, 2018 and sworn in by Municipal Judge Julian "Buddy" Brackin. Police Chief Joe Fierro introduced Kenneth Hempfleng, Nicholas Gaskin and Dillen Malone.

Hempfleng, a veteran in law enforcement, will join the department as a part-time officer. Chief Fierro said Hempfleng was certified in 1987 by Alabama Peace Officers' Standards and Training Commission (APOST).

"He began in Prichard," Chief Fierro said, "and then in 1988 he joined the Daphne Police Department. He's currently a lieutenant over patrol and their support services and he should be retiring at some point in the not too distant future. But he'll join us as a part-time officer. I should also note that he graduated from the FBI National Academy in 2016. So he's a great addition to the police department. He has a lot of experience we'll be able to capitalize on."

Officer Gaskin hails from Gadsden and is currently a patrol sergeant with Rainbow City. "Prior to that he served in Etowah County," Chief Fierro said. "He's been an officer for over 11 years. He was APOST certified in 2004. Once again, a vast amount of experience is coming here to Orange Beach and a great addition to the police department."

Malone is a graduate of Spanish Fort High School, where he earn all-state honors as an outside linebacker in 2011, according to Chief Fierro. "He's attended both the Coastal Community College and Huntingdon (College) where he has received his bachelor's degree in Criminal Justice," Chief Fierro said. "He's also a veteran of the U.S. Air Force and is currently a reservist." Malone will be attending the APOST Academy in Selma, beginning on Jan. 22.



The first time I ever saw Tugboat Willy Lipe was almost 30 years ago. He was throwing a kicking and screaming woman named Lillian into Roberts Bayou from off the bow of his schooner, The Shawnee.

I'd come down to Pirates Cove to go sailing with some friends that day, and little did I know, the next two years of my life would be the beginning of my musical roots, fertilized by Tugboat Willy Lipe, Jerry Trapp, Luther Wamble and a young Guthrie Trapp with a new

That first summer Willy baptized me in the songs of Guy Člark, Mickey Newbury, Robert Johnson, Jimmy Louis, Billy Stone, Hank Williams and so many more. I was immersed in the sight and sounds of Guthrie Trapp and Luther Wamble playing face to face, while watching Luther, Tugboat and Jerry become each a piece of the foundation of the guitar player that Guthrie would become.

There's so much to remember, too much to ever forget about Willy...The summer that he plotted a course for the very first Wooden Boat Show at Pirates Cove. The summer of a packed out deck during the day and moonlight sails all night. The sight of Willy headed to the boat yard in his colorful knitted hats, flip-flops and hawaiian shirts flapping in the wind, singing a new song along the way.

Willy could tell a story and make you see it clear as day, played out right in front of your minds eye. It was all about the song, about the sound, about the words and the story that came straight from Tugboats heart when he sang it.

Some of the very best memories of my life come from knowing Willy Lipe, and I will miss him 'til the very end of mine. Rest in Peace my friend. Fair winds and a safe voyage to the other side Tugboat.





Coyotes play vital role in keeping rodent populations down

Often, you will hear a nocturnal animal howling in the night, to announce its presence and to deter other males. This is also an invitation to any nearby females to join him. This species is an opportunistic hunter and preys mostly on small mammals such as rabbits, squirrels, and rats. They also have the ability to form a pack, to take down larger prey such as deer. They are assumed to be meat eaters by most, but they have actually been observed eating grass, fruit, and other vegetation as well, making them omnivores. Their eyesight, hearing, and sense of smell are highly developed and, coupled with their resourceful diet, allows them to be an extremely adaptable species. What is this Alabama apex predator I am referring to? Coyotes!

They play a vital role in our environment, controlling the rodent and small mammal populations. Diseases carried and transmitted by rodents are minimized



when rodent populations are regulated. As one of nature's scavengers, they also aid in keeping the community they inhabit free of decaying animals, as roadkill is a coyote favorite. However they have also become known as one the biggest nuisance species in the US - and right here on the Island. In 2017, there were two incidents involving small dogs in Orange Beach: one dog was presumed deceased and the other dog survived the attack. Over the years we have seen several of these unfortunate incidents, but they almost always share some common characteristics. Small pets are allowed to go outside, after dark, often unattended, off leash and in an unfenced yard. Coyotes are discreet and quick (reaching top speeds of 40 mph), mak-

ing them the perfect ambush predator when so inclined. Not all coyotes prey on pets. In fact, the vast majority go about their business never causing us a prob-

As a part of the fortunate few who can call this beautiful area home, we need to remember we aren't the only residents. The coyotes, along with many other beautiful species of animals, live here as well, making this a shared environment. In nearly all instances of human/wildlife conflict people are at fault or at least responsible for the behavior that leads to conflict. Avoiding some simple mistakes and changing our daily bad habits will resolve most problems, Some basic but vitally important tactics are: not allowing pet food to remain outdoors, securing your trashcans, walking your dog on a leash (especially at night), motion-sensor lights and sprinklers, and making an uncomfortable environment in general for the coyote otherwise known as negative reinforcement. You can make loud noises, wave your arms, and act like a crazy person, and you will likely scare off most coyotes, but you might concern your neighbors as well!

Occasionally, even when all the correct measures are taken, you still have an animal that continually approaches your house, pets, and your comfort space. There are such circumstances in our area, most recently on Ono Island, in which this is the case. This is why the limited trapping and removal of certain individual animals that have lost their fear of humans or appear to be diseased has started. It is about the safety of the residents and their pets as well as the health of the coyote population. Coyotes suffer from several common diseases and ailments including mange which in advanced stages leaves the animal looking like the mythical "chupacabra"!


The Orange Beach nuisance control program is done in conjunction with the USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) division. Efforts are typically spread out instead of concentrated in one location because coyotes form family groups, and when a few are removed from one family group, it can affect the entire community of animals. Coyotes have a physiological reaction that is triggered when they feel their population is threatened, and it has helped their populations remain resilient across the country: when they feel vulnerable, they have the ability to reproduce at an earlier stage and birth more pups at a time, increasing their litter size and survival rate, making it almost impossible to eradicate them all together.

If outside of city limits, please call 844-303-WILD (844-303-9453). Please remember that simply seeing a coyote is not always a cause for concern.

We are privileged to have such diverse wildlife living in our own backyard. The most valuable thing we can do is learn to coexist. It is their home as much as ours and it is important to keep that balance within the ecosystem we call home.
