


TOI Ball is Jan. 20 at Event Center

Gulf Shores moving Mardi Gras Parade to Beach Road

The city of Gulf Shores is moving this year's Feb. 13 Mardi Gras parade to the beach road in a move officials say will have less of an impact on traffic for the annual event. The parade rolls at 10 a.m. on Fat Tuesday, Feb. 13 and the Orange Beach parade starts at 2 p.m. the same day.

"Looking at the traffic impacts to Highway 59, if we don't need to shut down the foot of the bridge at 20th Avenue and detour people east and west, the traffic overflowing from Fort Morgan Road across Highway 59 can continue to flow," Grant Brown said. "Highway 59 and all the businesses along the route can continue to operate like normal all the way until it gets to First Avenue."

During its Jan. 8 work session, the council also heard plans for a new pizza place in the beach district in the former Blonde John's store and plans for a 163-lot active adult subdivision on County Road 8.

Another parade concern, Mayor Robert Craft said, is the bridge widening project on Alabama

59 just north of Windmill Ridge. "The first year is a good consideration because of the construction on the bridge and potentially it could still be a one-lane situation through there," Craft said. "It gives us an opportunity to see if it works then we'll know

after that if we want to continue or not."

Brown, the city's director of Recreation and Cultural Affairs, said the success of the reversal of the 2017 Christmas parade help officials decide to try a route change.

"Because of the construction on the beach and the roadways, we reversed the parade route," Brown said. "It allowed us to form the parade and stage the parade in the West Gulf Place area on the main highway and it went flawlessly. It was very effective for the participants. It created very little or no traffic disruptions. It was just a very good way to stage the parade."

When officials from the recreation, public works and police departments got together after the Christmas parade, the idea of a beach-road Mardi Gras parade was discussed.

"During the recap meeting from the Christmas parade our events people concluded that it would be in the best interest of public safety and the public in general for the parade to run the parade from Highway 59 to the east of Highway 135 near the state park," Brown said. From there, Brown said, floats not participating in the afternoon Orange Beach parade can take Alabama 135 north. And, those in the Orange Beach event have permission from the state park to stage in the pier parking lot.

"With the new sidewalks we have we feel like this is a much safer route and a good way for people who will be coming to view the parade to find appropriate parking and find a good place to watch the parade," Brown said.

Big Blue Pizza

Craft said the city is concentrating on development on the east side of Alabama 59 in the beach district and Big Blue Pizza and a new Surf Style with condominiums on top at Gulf Place are the types of new businesses officials want to see. Off-site parking will have to play a big role if the area is to grow, Craft said.

"When you look at redevelopment on the east side of town, if we require all the parking to be onsite on all of the lots that are there then we're not going to get much development," Craft said. "I think that this concept has got to be something we look at favorably if we want to be able to develop that area in a way that is best for that area."

Hangout owner Shaul Zislin is developing the projects and was seeking a variance in the zoning law so he could use off-site parking for both. He plans to build a 132-space parking lot at the corner of beach road and East First Street, easy walking distance from the restaurant and proposed condos. There will be eight to 10 spaces on the street by the pizza restaurant including handicap spaces.

"The zoning ordinance says that all parking spaces be located on the same lot as the principal use unless a conditional use permit is granted by the city council," City Planner Andy Bauer said. Both projects combined require 99 parking spaces and the lot will have 132. The planning commission gave the proposal a favorable recommendation at its Dec. 19 meeting.

If the area is to continue development drainage issues will have to be addressed there as well. With that in mind, Bauer said the city is planning to apply for a \$60,000 Gulf of Mexico Climate and Resilience Community Practice grant to develop a plan for handling water in the area.

"In order for Gulf Shores to achieve its goal of creating a compact, walkable neighborhood downtown district we can't have onsite retention ponds on every individual site," Bauer said. "We need to look at this as an area-wide study and plan and that's exactly what this grant application will allow us to do. If we are able to get it we'll be able we can take the whole beach area and develop a master storm drain plan so in the future each project can tie into this and won't need onsite drainage."

In other business, the council: • Heard a request to rezone 58 acres rezone



from general business to residential immediately west of Craft Farms North Phase II on County Road 8 for an active adult subdivision, or age-restricted neighborhood for ages 50 or 55 and older. Dewberry Preble-Rish made the request. • Hired Dr. Suzanne Freeman for \$35,000 to serve as education consultant as the Gulf Shores School Board negotiates a separation agreement with the Baldwin County Board of Education.

• Heard a request from Kevin Corcoran for a conditional use permit to build a mini storage facility with 439 units near the east end of County Road 8 on the north side of the road. Councilman Jason Dyken expressed concerns about having a "warehouse district" because planned improvements to the road will make the road a new entrance to the city. The Planning Commission gave it an 8-0 favorable recommendation on Nov. 28.

• Opened a bid of more than \$44,000 to buy aluminum trash and recycle bins for the Gulf Place Project. A grant from the Alabama Department of Environmental Management will cover the cost.

• Discussed spending more than \$133,000 to repaint city annex buildings on Clubhouse Drive across from City Hall and the police department.

Mardi Gras Parade road closures The City of Gulf Shores would like to make all residents and visitors aware of the following traffic flow modifications related to the Mardi Gras Parade:

6 a.m.: West Gulf Place will be closed. Parking will only be available for parade participants and float setup.

8 a.m.: Access to Highway 182 via West First and West Second Street will be closed. Traffic headed west or north will detour via West Third Street onto West First Ave.

9:45 a.m.: Access to Highway 182 via Highway 59 will be closed. Access to Highway 182 via East First, East Second and East Fourth Street will be closed. Traffic headed westbound on Highway 182 near the Gulf State Park Pier will be diverted to Highway 135 for access to Highway 59. **11 a.m.:** All normal traffic conditions should resume.



Guests enter the building on a red carpet complete with a warm welcome from a friendly crowd and paparazzi. Once inside, guests enjoy a catered dinner, prom favors for each honored guest, all leading up to the moment when each guest is crowned king or queen of the prom.

"Best of all, each honored guest is crowned a king or queen of the prom," said Erik Dellenback, executive director of the Tim Tebow Foundation. "We continue to be amazed by how God has grown this event into a worldwide movement, celebrating people with special needs."

As sponsor of Night to Shine, the Tim Tebow Foundation has committed over \$3.5 million in financial support and manpower to hundreds of churches needing assistance in hosting the event.

When Night to Shine launched in 2015, 44 host churches and 15,000 volunteers worked together to honor more than 7,000 kings and queens of the prom. 





- Pecan halves or melted semisweet chocolate, opt.

Assessment of Lagoon fisheries topic of Jan. 18 open meeting

Craig Newton, a biologist with Alabama Department of Conservation, will present an assessment of the Little Lagoon Fisheries at the Little Lagoon Preservation Society meeting on Thursday, Jan. 18 at 5:30 p.m. Gulf Shores Activity Center, located at 260 Clubhouse Dr. The first half hour of the meeting provides an opportunity to meet, mingle and enjoy refreshments. The program begins at 6 p.m., and will include a question-andanswer period

LLPS members and guests are invited to learn the lastest assessment of shrimp, fish, and crab populations and trends in Little Lagoon.

During the past several years, anglers have reported lower catches of popular species such as blue crab and flounder compared to prior years in Little Lagoon. Anglers have attributed the lower catches to everything from poor maintenance of Lagoon Pass, overfishing, and a weir between Lake Shelby and Little Lagoon.

Fishery-independent and fishery-dependent data collected in Little Lagoon were analyzed to evaluate trends in Catch Per Unit Effort, distribution of sizes, and patterns in abundance. Review of the data indicates a steady reduction in blue crab abundance beginning in the late 1980s and a reduction in the CPUE of flounder. Numerous factors are likely attributed to the observed declines, but identifying the most significant source of the declining fisheries is problematic.



Folk duo Hungrytown plays free Feb. 6 at Foley Library

The Foley Public Library is most for-tunate to have folk musicians, Rebecca Hall and Ken Anderson otherwise known as the folk due Hungrytown - back for a free concert on Tuesday, February 6 at 6 p.m. in the upstairs meeting room.

Hall and Anderson (pictured) have been travelling the world over the past two years performing in North America, Europe, and New Zealand. Their music has received extensive radio airplay worldwide and has appeared on several television shows, including the Independent Film Channel's hit series, Portlandia. Hungrytown has

earned a reputation for the quality and authenticity of their songwriting: "It's great to hear an act eschew sentimentality in favor of honesty and to prove that you don't have to go raiding the memory of others to find the stuff that really good songs are made of," writes Jedd Beaudoin of Popmatters

Lyricist Hall is credited with compositions "that sound as timeless as any traditional songs" (Northern Sky, UK) while producer/multi-instrumentalist/husband Ken Anderson is lauded for his remarkable affinity for instrumental embellishment and for crafting Hungrytown's gorgeous vocal harmonies

Hall and Anderson met in New York City, where they had already been performing regularly--Hall as a jazz singer, and Anderson as a drummer for a variety of garage bands. Their introduction to folk music came later, when a close friend--who died young due to a tragic misdiagnosis--entrusted to them her collection of 1960s folk albums and her guitar (which has since been featured on all of their albums). Inspired by the grit and trueto-life experiences she heard in these traditional ballads, Hall was inspired to write the lyrics that later became her first songs, aided by Anderson's flair for musical arrangement. In the winter of 2003, the duo quit their boring desk jobs, moved to the green hills of Vermont, and decided to pursue a full-time career as touring musicians.

People and wildlife interact every day in our country, and our area is no exception. The interactions can be both positive and negative for those involved. Taking a look at how we influence and impact these events as well sharing the stories of our local wildlife and explore both the good and bad about wildlife and people.

Throughout this coming year, we hope you will all get something positive from each article or story and we look forward to your feedback along the way.

In the conservation of natural resources systems, wildlife rescue, rehabilitation

(rehab), and conflict stories are considered especially interesting. In the City of Orange Beach, the dedicated staff who handle these critical tasks are members of an elite squad known as the Coastal Resources Department. These are their stories. Dun Dun! 

WHAT'S BITING By David Rainer

Keep a close watch on rod guides

When you're fighting a nice fish, sometimes the fish wins and gets away. If the hook pulls, you can lament that maybe you didn't get a good hookset, but sometimes it just happens.

Sometimes the fish puts more stress on your fishing line than it can handle and the line breaks, or the fish pulls you into barnacle-encrusted structure and cuts you off.

Those are the situations that usually disappear from memory after a short time. Losing a big fish to flawed equipment, how-

ever, tends to never be forgotten.



Like the time I hooked a huge tarpon. The silver king made several grand jumps to try to dislodge the hook to no avail. After becoming too tired to jump, the fish headed to the bottom to continue the fight.

That usually means the angler's odds of landing the fish have increased greatly. However, as every angler knows, the fish isn't caught unless it's in the boat or alongside the om the fish's mouth

boat to retrieve the hook from the fish's mouth.

About a half-hour into the fight against the big tarpon, my arms began to ache, but that was not my main concern. I noticed the line appeared to be frayed just a bit as I pumped the rod to gain an advantage on the fish.

Then the worst scenario for a fisherman happened. The rod tip went straight as the line went slack. Although the fish had almost given up the fight, the frayed line couldn't handle the pressure. The big tarpon was gone and I was exhausted and extremely disappointed.

When I told the boat captain to check the line, he discovered that one of the ceramic line guides had developed a crack, and it was nicking the line each time it touched the crack. Finally, the damage to the line was too severe. That rod was taken out of service, but we never got another big bite that day. That incident is why I check my line regularly for fraying and my rod guides for cracks or chips.

One of the best ways to check for flaws in the rod guides is to use some kind of fine material that will snag on the imperfections when run through the guides.

Ask your wife or significant other for a pair of old pantyhose and cut off one leg. Take that hose and run it through the line guides. If there are any imperfections, the hose material will snag.

For the guide tip, you will probably have to cut a smaller piece of the hose to get it through the guide, but that guide tip is the one that gets damaged the most often.

If you find a flaw, take that rod out of service until you can repair it yourself or take it to one of the numerous bait shop/tackle stores on the Alabama Gulf Coast to get it repaired professionally.

Trust me, you won't be sorry you have perfect rod guides the next time you have a big fish on the end of the line.



How to crack an Alabama Blue Crab

Fresh Alabama Blue Crab is a delicacy on the Gulf Coast. And like anything worth doing, they require a bit of work. It can be a bit of a challenge, but if you've got plenty of time and you're good with your hands, a crab feast can be both a fun and delicious experience. What You'll Need: A mallet for easy cracking and several pages of newspaper for easy clean up.

• Step One: Once you've steamed plenty of crabs (one or two is never enough), make sure you cover your spot at the table with newspaper, because it's about to get messy. Use an outdoor picnic table if you have access to one. • Step Two: Start by pulling off the legs and claws. You can find some meat in the legs if you crack them in half, but generally there's


not much to be found in there.


• Step Three: The claws, however, contain some of the most prized meat. Just grab both sides of the claw, pull them apart like a wishbone and dig in. Remember to explore both sides of the claw for some yet undiscovered meat.

• Step Four: Now begins the hard part of undressing the crab. Some folks use a wooden mallet for this part of the process, but it's really up to you. Start by removing the "apron" along the center of the belly and keep working your way around to the shell on top. Then flip the crab over so it's belly side down and remove the grey, spongy gills.

• Step Five: Now that your crab body is ready, simply break it in two and take out the meat. And if you're feeling a little adventurous, you can eat that yellow stuff, too-something that crab lovers simply call "mustard." Once you've cleaned out the shell, brush your scraps aside with your seasoning-coated, crabby hands and find your next victim. (Courtesy of Al. Dept. of Conservation & Natural Resources)

Qualified historians will provide historical insights on various periods of Fort Morgan's History as part of a tour scheduled every Tuesday afternoon from 2-3 p.m. at the fort, located at the west end of Ft. Morgan Rd. in Gulf Shores. Tour dates are Jan. 2, 9, 16, 23, and 30, and Feb. 6, 13, 20 and 27. The tour is weather permitting. Tour topics include Fort Bowyer, Early Civil War, Battle of Mobile Bay, Siege of Fort Morgan and Overview of the Civil War at Mobile Point. Preceded by another fort, Fort Bowyer during the War of 1812, Fort Morgan is a Third System masonry fort built between 1819 and 1833. Used intermittently through the Spanish American War, World War I and World War II, the site showcases the evolution of seacoast fortifications and adaptations made by the U.S. Army for the defense of the country.

More than just history, the site also has nature areas, and a boat launch for the outdoorsman to enjoy.

outdoorsman to enjoy. The fort is most famous for its role in the Civil War Battle of Mobile Bay. Union Admiral David Farragut damned the torpedoes and went full speed ahead to win the battle. The massive fort contains more than 40 million bricks and pays tribute to the skilled masons, many of whom were enslaved African Americans.

Jeff Friend Trail at Bon Secour Wildlife Refuge now open

The Bon Secour National Wildlife Refuge's Jeff Friend Trail celebrated a recent grand re-opening. The trail, located off State Highway 180 in Gulf Shores, was closed for renovations in September of 2017 to improve its accessibility for those with mobility impairments. The trail improvement project received its initial funding when it was chosen as a Phase VI Early Restoration Project through the Deepwater Horizon Natural Resource Damage Assessment process. That funding was later combined with U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service Deferred Maintenance Funds, bringing the overall project cost to just over \$890,000. The combination of these two funding sources was the first of its kind, and allowed for additional improvements to the trail.

The Jeff Friend Trail now features new composite material boardwalks, several new viewing platforms, easier to navigate trail materials as well as a new ADA parking area. "We are pleased to once again, open this one-mile loop trail to the public for their enjoyment," said Brittany Petersen, Assistant Refuge Manager.
