

The Poarch Band of Creek Indians will be dressed in traditional ceremonial regalia, and perform their original tribal dance at 11AM and 4PM. Bring the kids and watch them ride the trackless train through the festival and get creative with family friendly art projects. Come enjoy activities and local seafood, art demonstrations, and Live music! Celebrate life, art, and culture all in one place at 116 East 24th Ave., Gulf Shores! Admission is free to the festival and shuttle transportation will be available the day of Ballyhoo.

Children's Activities: Children are free to enjoy the Ballyhoo trackless train and ride it around the festival grounds. Look for the three pink tents featuring kid friendly arts and crafts will be available for all to enjoy! Children will be able to create Indian necklaces, make a sailboat and paint our ocean shells. Leave the festival with your own piece of artwork created by your little one.

Parking & Shuttles: Parking and shuttles will be available at Gulf Shores First Presbyterian Church, First Baptist church, Gulf Shores Church of Christ and the Waterway Village City parking lot.

Ballyhoo Entertainment: Enjoy performances by the Indie-Folk act Jubal, Knoxville, Tn and local favorites, The Band Rex, and Elaine Petty and Mac Walter.

Poarch Creek Indians: The Poarch Creek Indi-

ans will perform original tribal dance in Pow Wow regalia at 11 a.m. and 4 p.m. The Poarch Band of Creek Indians are descendants of a segment of the original Creek Nation, which once covered almost all of Alabama and Georgia. Unlike many southeastern Indian tribes, the Poarch Creeks were not removed from their tribal lands, and have lived together for over 150 years. In 1984, the United States Government acknowledged that the Poarch Band of Creek Indians exists as an "Indian Tribe" and 172 acres were declared a Reservation. The Tribe is the only federally recognized Tribe in the State of Alabama. Ballyhoo is honored to offer cultural exchange with the Poarch Creek Indians. Adults and children are encouraged to learn the meaning of each tribal dance and the symbols of the ceremonial

More than 50 artists on display: The Ballyhoo Fine Arts Festival will include over 50 artists from Alabama and surrounding states and feature their one of a kind art work. Artists such as Leeds potter, Larry Allen; Magnolia Springs potter, Anne Webb; and Homewood artist Michael Davis are just a few that will have their work on display and available to purchase.

While any day is a good day to go to the beach, the Coastal Arts Center of Orange Beach is offering a great excuse to visit Pleasure Island in March — the 44th annual Orange Beach Festival of Art is set for March 10-11. The festival will feature 100 booths of local and regional fine art, plus exciting acts on the performing arts and music stages. Festival goers may also enjoy live visual arts demonstrations including hot glass and clay. Savory gourmet offerings will be presented in the Culinary Arts area and children can dive into fun hands-on experiences in the Kids Art Alley.

The reputation of this show continues to grow with its selection by Sunshine Artist Magazine, a national arts an

crafts industry publication, as one of the "Top Contender" events in the U.S. The Festival of Art was one of 11 in the nation selected as a "must-see event" in 2018.

The festival is a fine arts, juried event held every second weekend in March on the joint grounds of the Coastal Arts Center of Orange Beach and Waterfront Park on Canal Road. Festival hours are Saturday from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. and Sunday 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. The festival is completely free with public parking located at the Orange Beach Sportsplex. Shuttle service is provided by Baldwin Regional Area Transit System (BRATS) with an all-day pass for \$5. Bike riders can park at the Bicycle Village on the Arts Center

The Patron of the Arts program, offered through the local Friends of the Arts (501c3) group, is now in its second year and provides committed art-purchasing dollars that lets the participating fine artists know they have solid support from the community. Bronze, Silver and Gold levels are available for purchase through March 1, 2018.

With more than 100 artists working in a dazzling variety of mediums, festivalgoers always have plenty to see, hear, touch, taste and smell. Fine artists, culinary vendors, musical performers and live demonstrations always deliver a multitude of sensory experiences.

The 2018 music line-up will include Roman Street, Three Bean Soup, Strickly Isbell, The All Star Band, and more. Performing artists in multiple genres will be featured on the Performing Arts Stage with acts including Coastal Ballet Academy, Wheeles Karate, David Jones Jazz, Miss Alabama Outstanding Teen Lauren Bradford, and music from Four A Change.

Culinary selections featured at the festival offer gourmet flair, while still providing plenty of child-friendly options. Feast your eyes on beautifully presented culinary pieces while savoring the rich flavors of the Alabama Gulf Coast. Featured restaurants will include Bleus Burgers, Cosmo's and Cobalt restaurants, Villaggio Grille, and Fin & Fork.

In addition to the Culinary Arts section, the Specialty Foods Area will include The Meat Mart of Orange Beach, Two Sisters Olive and Grape, Willow Farms and BuzzCatz Coffee & Sweets, among others.

Kids' Art Alley offers young festival goers plenty of hands-on fun. Children can dig their fingers into clay and bright paint, enjoy games, watch live demonstrations and take home their own works of art. #### Fest named 'Must-Attend' show by Sunshine Artist magazine

The 44th Annual Orange Beach Festival of Art was named by Sunshine Artist Magazine as one of "11 Must-Attend Shows for Artists and Craftspeople" in the magazine's January 2018 issue. Explaining "Why It's Worth a Look," writer Stephanie Hintz said, "The variety and size of the event is perfect for attracting buyers to this small city (population 5,682)."

According to a Sunshine Artist "FastAudit" of artists who participated in the

2017 festival, respondents gave the show "an average sales score of 7.3 (on a 10-point scale), and they praised the attention to detail and the remarkable level of attention doled out by the management team."

Desiree Blackwell, director of the Coastal Arts Center of Orange Beach, said those selected are generally shows that did not make Sunshine Artist's 'Top 200 Best' list in 2017, but are still worthy of atten-

"Eleven shows were chosen and we are the only one for Alabama. We may not ever make the Top 200 because we are a small show and artist revenues carries weight in determining the list," Blackwell said.

"Every bit of this praise is due to the efforts of many people from years past and the dedicated work from the 15-person steering committee that continues to bring the show to fruition each year," Blackwell added. "What makes our job easier is that we are blessed with resources from a city

whose leadership truly appreciates the arts."

Orange Beach City Administrator Ken Grimes Jr. said attention to detail, the incredible waterfront venue and the on-site glass and clay studios make for key components of the Orange Beach Festival of Art each spring. "As we have fine tuned and continue to improve the site, we know that this festival kicks off the season and most fine artists usually have the best works and products from a long winter of creating art," Grimes said.



The tourney's local history started when seven Birmingham golfing buddies traveled to Gulf Shores for a weekend of golf, staying in a two bedroom/one bath vacation home near the Intracoastal Waterway owned by the Bratton brothers' (Bobby, Charles, Joe and Richard) parents. The original cast members were Bob Bratton, Joe Bratton, Roy Dillon, Jim Lynch (deceased), Butch Mitchell, Waldrop and Waymond Whitten. Bobby

They played at Gulf Shores Country Club (the only course in the area) for \$5 a day plus cart and played 36 holes on Saturday and 18 holes on Sunday. There were very few restaurants in Gulf Shores and the men ate all their meals at the Friendship House (now the Diner) in Gulf Shores and Meme's Restaurant (damaged by hurricane Frederic in September of 1979 and never reopened) in Bon Secour.

As participants invited more friends, the golf weekend grew into the current BBI, which has been held at 20 plus different

golf courses in Alabama and Florida.

**Tourney notes:** There have been 581 golfers from 14 different states and Canada attending at least one tourney. In 1999, the tourney peaked with 156 golfers. Six players have aced holes during the tourney, including two hole-in-ones the same year -Norman Glass and Timothy Honeycutt (2009); Keith Howell (2015); Charles Martin (1980); William "Sleepy" Phillips (1999); and Waldrop (1972). The oldest winner is Dick Majors (known as Major Dick), who won the tournament at 86 years young. In 2009, the tourney was ambushed by Golf Digest's Matt Ginella, who presented players with beverage tickets and filmed festivities at the Peninsula Golf and Racquet Club. There is one sad note - 49 BBI Brothers have passed away. They are truly missed. (More info at BBI.net)

#### Decisions expected in April to allow 47-day Snapper Season in Alabama

#### The two-fish bag limit with a 16-inch minimum total length will remain in effect

If the plan works out, Alabama
red snapper anglers will have access to the prized reef fish for
more days than last year's extended season. The plan entails exempted fishing permits (EFPs)
that allow the five Gulf states to
set seasons that will keep the
snapper harvest within the overall

quota for the recreational fishery in the Gulf.

If approved, the EFPs will be used until the Gulf of Mexico Fishery Management Council has time to go through the process to approve state management

plans for the

Gulf states.

Commissioner Chris Blankenship of the Alabama Department of Conservation and Natural Resources said approval for the state management plans would likely not happen before 2020, and the EFPs would be in place during the 2018 and 2019 seasons.

"We were working with (Alabama) Sen. (Richard) Shelby and talking with him last year about the possibility of Marine Resources managing the red snapper fishery in the artificial reef zones off Alabama," Blankenship said. "We have more than 1,000 square miles of permitted reef zones, the largest in the country, and we wanted to be able to manage the fishery inside there."

Sen. Shelby added language in the 2016 appropriations bill that allowed NOAA (National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration) to establish a pilot program for state management in designated artificial reef zones.

"That was the genesis of the exempted fishing permits," Blankenship said. "Alabama submitted our proposal to NOAA. They were concerned if only one state did it, it wouldn't be fair and the states wouldn't have the same opportunity. That's where the idea for exempted fishing permits came from. NOAA suggested that instead of a pilot program we do exempted fishing permits for state management in each of the five Gulf

"Last week at the Gulf of Mexico Fishery Management Council meeting, the Council voted to approve exempted fishing permits for the five Gulf states. Although Council approval wasn't required, the states and NOAA wanted the Council's blessing before proceeding. The exempted fishing permits can be issued by NOAA, but the federal people and the Gulf states felt it would be best to go to the Gulf Council so they could review the permits, ask questions and make comments."

Alabama Congressman Bradley Byrne, who has been at the fore-

front of the effort to improve access to the red snapper fishery, thanked the Gulf Council for supporting the EFP program.

"As I have always said, this issue is about so much

more than just our fishermen," Byrne said. "A full red snapper season is good news for the hotels, restaurants, gas stations, and other small businesses in our coastal communities. I also want to thank Senator Richard Shelby, Alabama Department of Conservation and Natural Resources Commissioner Chris Blankenship, and our other Gulf Coast colleagues for working together to ensure our fishermen and coastal communities have a full and adequate red snapper season."

After a 30-day public comment period, NOAA will consider comments and take one of three routes – issue the permits, not issue the permits or make changes to the permits before they are issued to ensure the states don't go over the quotas. A decision is expected in mid-April. Blankenship said the five Gulf states worked together to come up with a plan to divide the overall quota to try to minimize the chances the states would exceed the recreational fishing quota for the year.

"Alabama's portion of the quota would give us a season very similar to what we had last year," Blankenship said. "We thought that was a good result last year. The people really enjoyed it, and we wanted to make sure we had something at least that good this year and in 2019.

"I feel confident from the Gulf Council reaction that the plan was prudent and had a lot of support. More important, in a letter from Chris Oliver, head of the National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS), in response to a letter of support from Congressman Byrne, Oliver stated he and NOAA were very supportive of the in-state management of the red snapper fishery. The leadership at NOAA is supportive, the Gulf Council is supportive and the states are supportive; we feel it was a well-reasoned plan for these exempted fishing permits for the next two years."

Alabama Governor Kay Ivey also applauded the support shown by the Gulf Council.

"Alabama and the other four Gulf states worked diligently to put forth comprehensive proposals that correspond to the geography and red snapper populations off their states," Governor Ivey said. "I am confident that this EFP will demonstrate Alabama's ability to effectively manage recreational red snapper fishing in waters adjacent to our state."

Based on the effort shown through the Red Snapper Reporting Program, otherwise known as Snapper Check, from last year's extended season of 42 days, Marine Resources Division Director Scott Bannon said the proposed 2018 season would be 47 days long. The snapper season would be on each Friday, Saturday and Sunday starting on June 1 and ending on the Monday of Labor Day and including the full week of the Fourth of July.

Alabama's charter-for-hire sector is not included this year in the EFP. The charter industry voted and opted to stay with the federal charter season this year.

"For the recreational anglers, we used a population method for the Alabama reef zone," Bannon said. "The initial request from Senator Shelby's office in the appropriations bill was to create a plan for the reef zone. Since we have some very specific science from our coordination with the University of South Alabama and Dr. Sean Powers' work, we utilized their research and population estimates to come up with the plan.

"Based on the participation effort and harvest recorded through Snapper Check, we can assure that we don't exceed our allocation. We could potentially close early, or we could add days in October if we don't meet the quota. We have that flexibility."

The two-fish bag limit with a 16-inch minimum total length will remain in effect.

Bannon said the reason Alabama decided to go with a predominantly weekend season was because the format received favorable feedback from the anglers who participated in last year's extended season.

"We are trying to maximize the benefit for the most anglers, and we felt like that was the best plan," he said. "We realize there are still some limitations to the state-licensed party boats because they are still held to the 9-mile (state waters) limit. And we know during the tourist season, the change-over is on the weekend. It does make it a little difficult for them, but for the largest number of people, this is the greatest access we could provide.

"What we've seen is that, when you spread the season out, you don't have the intense efforts you have with a short season. People can pick their weather days, which is better. People can pick days that work better for their families and their schedules. Hopefully it will reduce the stress at the boat ramps, and I think it helps the economy when you spread it out and have people coming throughout the summer. Plus, we have the flexibility in 2019, if this goes well, that we could go to a different format that would better accommodate the anglers."

Bannon said all those plans and

permits are predicated on anglers' participation in Snapper Check.

"That's a vital component in making this a successful program," he said of Snapper Check. "Some people feel that not reporting works to their advantage, and that is not true. It's better to have real numbers entered into the system. There is an algorithm we use that calculates the compliance rate. Then it calculates the season, harvest and participation. If compliance is high, it's closer to the real number and not an estimation.

"And remember, this a short-term effort. We're still working on a long-term solution through the Council or potential legislation in Congress."

Marine Resources plans to hold town hall meetings the last week of April and first week of May, two in Mobile County, two in Baldwin County and one in Birmingham. A Facebook Live session is also planned.

#### O.B. again looks at request for PUD modification at Amber Isle

For a quiet strip of land on beach road surrounded by a verdant state park and steps away from the turquoise waters of the Gulf, the Amber Isle planned unit development sure has made some noise over the years.

"I'm sorry to have to come before you again," resident Linda Bradley told the Orange Beach City Council on Feb. 20. "This project has been going on for 10 years. The previous approval and what is currently there was all in agreements with Mr. Goldstein at the time and it included no outdoor dining, no outdoor music."

There was a first reading of the ordinance and public hearing on the request to allow both outdoor activities at Big Wave Dave's in Amber Isle.

"We just could not compete at all without an area to sit outside. People want to sit outside and we have a gorgeous state park next to us and the Gulf of Mexico in front of us." It will have a second reading and a vote on March 6 unless deferred by the applicant.

Big Wave Dave's is the fourth attempt to establish a restaurant on the property and wants to add about 2,220 square feet of covered decking on the west side of the restaurant for outdoor dining. Jason Barje, one of the managers at the restaurant,

said the decking is vital to the eatery's success.

"It's just not a viable space without outdoor seating," Barje said. "We just could not compete at all without an area to sit outside. People want to sit outside and we have a gorgeous state park next to us and the Gulf of Mexico in front of us.

"I understand the neighbor's concerns and we don't want to make waves."

Bradley has seen plan after plan come before the city for projects on the piece of property just northwest of her beachfront home. At one time a 14-story, 110-unit condo project was approved for the parcel.

But year after year the plans changed directions until it finally came to fruition with the current project owned by Mark Goldstein. It has Big Wave Dave's on the west, a Ron Jon's Surf Shop in the middle and a 60-plus room Indigo Hotel on the east. The Southern Grind Coffee Shop is in the Indigo lobby and a real estate office is on the far east corner of the building. There is empty space between Ron Jon's and Indigo that is already approved for a 36-room hotel that in the past was called White Sands.

At one point, a Bob Marley-themed restaurant with an outdoor stage was proposed but eventually withdrawn because of neighbor's concern over noise.

With the deck addition, the owners also asked to modify the PUD to allow for the deck for outdoor eating and music under the city's new permitting for outdoor venues.

"We can have this outdoor venue permit application come before you and you can place certain conditions on that permit," Community Development Director Kit Alexander told the council. "If they violate the police can then come back before you and ask you to pull their permit. We can just shut it down whereas before we didn't really have the ability to shut it down because there was no permit required."

Councilman Jerry Johnson said he didn't want the onus for keeping quiet at the site to fall on the city

the city.

"The thing that bothered me was they wanted the music prohibition removed and they would adhere to the sound ordinance of the city," Johnson said. "I am very much opposed to this. That puts all the enforcement on the city and that's not going to happen."

Barje said the restaurant doesn't want live music outside and would even nix ambient music for the right to build the deck and outdoor seating. Architect Forrest Daniell said the roof over the deck would keep in any noise from people eat-

ing outside.

Councilman Jeff Boyd lent a sympathetic ear to the restaurant's plight, but the precedent of the battles already waged over this PUD would sway his decision.

"This project, since day one, has been a thorn in that area's side," Boyd said. "And there's been hearing after hearing. The problem I have here is this PUD was approved with a big fight and a lot of work to get where it was. This is not about you this is about the history of the project. I'm having trouble changing the PUD knowing the history of what we fought over in this room."

During the regular the council:

- Voted 5-1 for the planned unit development Hammock Dunes on the Gulf on the west side of town. There will be a total of 11 houses on the parcel when work is complete. Councilwoman Annette Mitchell cast the lone dissenting vote.
- Voted to spend \$15,000 for the summer program at the Sea, Sand and Stars museum at Orange Beach Elementary. This is the third year the city has helped fund the museum's summer program.

During the work session the council also discussed:

- Setting a public hearing date for an ordinance amending business licenses to include a vacation rental category for residential homes. The ordinance would also limit further vacation rentals in areas zoned residential. March 20 was the recommended date.
- Setting a public hearing date for an ordinance amending the PUD for Orange Beach Villas Vacation Rentals. March 20 was the recommended
- A resolution to have Harbor Communications connect fiber to the Orange Beach Wastewater Treatment Plant for \$25,001.
- A resolution awarding the bid for pest control services for the city.

#### O.B.'s Education Initiative will focus on athletic & academic excellence

With a solid school plan now in place and Baldwin County planning a seventh-through-12th-grade school on Canal Road near the Sportsplex, Orange Beach City Administrator Ken GrimesGrimes said the city can now start studying plans for improvements.

"Once that got clarified and the Baldwin County school board said they were going to build a middle school in Orange and that evolved into a middle school-high school once Gulf Shores announced their city system, it gave us the go-ahead because it wasn't going to be on this campus," Grimes said.

And a cornerstone of those efforts will be an education initiative led by Mayor Tony Kennon's Expect Excellence

Afterschool Program to be headquartered at the recreation campus with classes on academics, arts and athletics with an eye toward excellence. There's even a "General Manners of Respectful Behavior and Class" to be attended by gentlemen and belles.

Orange Beach Mayor Tony Kennon.

"I don't believe you get excellence unless you expect it," Kennon said. "We all believe excellence is an attitude. It's just not something that grows on a tree or shows up at your front door. We're going to have expected excellence in academics, arts and athletics."

Jonathan Langston will be the program director, Laura Davis will be the recreation sports director and Sunshine Smith will continue to be the Camp Sunshine director. Coordinators will include Kelly Cleere in academics, Ron Roberts and Caleb Pittman in the arts and Kennon will be the athletics coordinator.

It will be a growing program, Kennon said, adding different classes or art mediums or sports as they are needed or requested.

"We'll have tutoring, study groups, essay workshops, resume building, interviewing workshops and computer skills workshops, a young entrepreneur group with business training and personal finance, and clubs for math, history, science, robotics, chess and debate."

Grimes said the cost of the program is unknown as well, but city leaders are studying it closely. Paying teachers to come in to help students in the programs and hiring additional staff could cost as much as \$200,000 a year, he said. Among specialized classes officials plan to offer are theater, vocal, arts, ballet and dance, visual arts, culinary arts and creative writing.

Grimes said the city is also looking to hire a consultant to decide the best ways to utilize the land at the recreation/community center campus with an eye to adding new buildings and possibly upgrading or rebuilding both the aquatic center and tennis center. Another indoor practice and training facility with astroturf is also something the city would like to build at the campus, Grimes said.

"Those things we are looking to get plans in place by the end of the year and maybe start construction by the end of the year," he said. "It will be defined by the footprint of what we can build on because we don't have much going toward the Community Center.

"Having an additional gym, having a turf room, have room for Sunshine's group to grow, all those are things that are just part of our growing pains. If you took those three buildings alone it could range from \$2 million to \$2.5 million."

#### Justin Pearce officially appointed O.B. Fire Chief

From a Mardi Gras ride on a fire truck sparking an interest in firefighting to being named fire chief in Orange Beach, it's been a homegrown journey for Justin Pearce.

After a year of serving as interim Orange Beach fire chief, Pearce was officially appointed to the post by the City Council on Tuesday, Feb. 20.

A career firefighter in Orange Beach, Chief Pearce started as a cadet for the department in 1995 after a chance ride in the city's Mardi Gras parade.

"There was a volunteer, Donnie Morgan, and he invited my dad and I to ride on the old ladder truck in the Mardi Gras parade," Chief Pearce recalled. "That's kind of what started it all. I said, "There's something special about this. I want to do this."

So at age 15, he got onboard as a cadet in the department and then became full time in 1997. From there he went into fire prevention then was promoted to lieutenant, followed by captain and battalion chief. After the resignation of Chief Shane Phillips in January 2017, Pearce agreed to serve as interim chief.

"We are pleased to officially appoint Chief Justin Pearce as Fire Chief," City Administrator Ken Grimes said. "Chief Pearce has served the City of Orange Beach for over 20 years in various roles and has led the Fire Department well over the past year as Chief. His commitment to the citizens and guests of our area and to overall public safety for everyone is strong."


Chief Pearce said it's been amazing see the department as well as the city grow over the last two decades. As a cadet, he said the department only had two firefighters, a chief and one fire station.

Today, there are four fire stations, the fire administration building and roughly 70 personnel, including full-time and part-time firefighters, administration staff, and resident firefighters that are part of the department-run rookie school. The department handled 2,860 calls in 2017.

"It's a huge honor to be able to go from a cadet all the way up to the chief and be a part of the growth of the department as well as seeing how we have grown technically," Chief Pearce said. "One of those two people in the early days was a paramedic and now we have at least five paramedics on duty every day. We also have four of those who can fly on helicopters because they are critical-care paramedics, the highest trained paramedics you can have in the state of Alabama. We've just come such a long way and it's awesome to be a part of that."

Chief Pearce doesn't plan on slowing things down either. "I want to continue to focus our efforts on training our personnel for the safety of the community and also each other," he said. "So one of the high-priority areas is keeping up with trends and technologies so we're staying ahead of the curve.

## Gulf Shores buys Sacred Heart building with eye towards expanding medical services

#### Hwy. 59 Bridge near Bayou Village expected to be finished in three weeks; Hurricane Nate beach damage will be assessed

The City of Gulf Shores paid \$2.9 million for a building formerly owned by the Sacred Heart hospital system with an ambitious eye toward increasing medical services.

"The building was originally built by Sacred Heart and a developer of theirs back in 2007," Economic Development Coordinator Blake Phelps said. "It's sat vacant for a few years now. It is about a 42,000 square foot facility and about half of that is built out into a medical office building and general practice suites. The other half of it is graved in."

Sacred Heart had the facility at a cost of \$15 million. It is located behind the Microtel Inn near Jack Edwards National Airport. City officials say they hope to attract doctor's offices as well as expanding healthcare options

for the south Baldwin area.

"What we've learned is our offseason is not an offseason. The traffic when we've normally done repairs this time of the year has not worked." Also, during the council work session of Feb. 20, the council considered a \$4 million beach restoration to fix damage left by Hurricane Nate in October and heard a report from Public Works Director Mark Acreman on ongoing and upcoming road projects around the city.

"We've spent a lot of time trying to decide how we can improve medical facilities in our city," Mayor Robert Craft said. "We've concluded buying that facility for that amount of money and then negotiating with health care providers to

try and make the best fit for our community is the right thing for us to do. We're going to move this forward rather than sit back and wait and hope for something else to happen."

Councilman Jason Dyken, who also sits on the city's Finance Committee, said that group has put a lot of study into the building including time searching for

healthcare providers to occupy the facility.

"I want everybody to know this expenditure of funds seems like a great deal but it is not something we have taken lightly," Dyken said. "This isn't just a blind writing the check for the building and hoping something happens. We have had legitimate conversations with legitimate providers to really improve health care in the community."

Phelps said Sacred Heart had big plans for the building but failed to win approval from the state to add

higher level care at the facility.

"Sacred Heart did operate several physician suites in the building for several years with family practice, general practice and other specialties that did not require approval of a Certificate of Need," Phelps said. "The remaining portions of the facility were designed to be an Urgent Care, Diagnostic Center and Ambulatory Surgery Center. The surgery center required Sacred Heart to apply for a Certificate of Need which was ultimately depied." The building ultimately went into foreclosure. It was first offered for sale at \$6.5 million but taken off the market. Recently it went back on the market with a \$3.5 million asking price.

Craft said talks continue with several medical providers to hopefully expand into this building with

new services

"We can't fix the roads that'll improve access to healthcare providers in Foley, so we're working to bring more healthcare here," Craft said. "We've been in deep conversations with the South Baldwin Healthcare Authority, which is the owner of the beds and the facility in Foley. They're under contract with Community Health Systems, a hospital operator we've also been talking to along with some others that are interested in potentially helping us with that site.

"We believe we've got a good path forward with this building to dramatically improve the healthcare options

for our community."

#### Beach restoration

The first order of business will be for the city to hire Olsen and Associates for \$43,000 to survey the beaches to determine how much of them were swept away in Hurricane Nate.

"The city fared really well but one of the areas where we did take substantial damage was some substantial loss of our engineered beach system," Acreman said. "The preliminary damage assessment was about \$4 million."

The city will have to initially put up the money for the survey and restoration but would be reimbursed for 87.5 percent of those costs from FEMA and AEMA, the federal and state emergency management agencies, Acreman said.

Normally the city does an annual survey of the engineered beach each May prior to hurricane season and Acreman said there is already \$50,000 budgeted for that project

"We feel like we can use the money already budgeted for the survey work that would have occurred in May and do it now," Acreman said. "We can supply that information to FEMA and it will actually document our beaches prior to hurricane season."

Acreman said the survey will be done sometime in March but the actual restoration probably won't start until 2019 due to the lengthy permitting process.

#### Road work

Acreman said the growth of the offseason on Pleasure Island is making it harder and harder to complete road projects during the daytime.

"What we've learned is our offseason is not an offseason," Craft said. "The traffic when we've normally done repairs this time of the year has not worked."

Several traffic-signal projects are already scheduled or underway for night work and others are going to likely be done overnight as well.

"I don't see us ever being able to do any a major work on a state highway during the day anymore no matter what time of year it is," Acreman said. "I think all work on state highways henceforth will have to be at night time."

One of those areas is the intersection of County Road 6 and Alabama 59 where several improvements have been made. All that's left, Acreman said, is the final striping and new traffic signals. Those signals will go

in in early June and be installed at night.

Also, work at night will continue on beach road traffic signals through September. The median work continues there and is moving to the east side of Alabama 182. Acreman said the last part left on the west side of beach road is near the Alvin's Island and some reworking of that area is expected in the next few weeks.

"Landscape crews are there now working and we'll finish all the heavy construction by May 1," Acreman said.

The western side of the bridge near Bayou Village on Alabama 59 is expected to be finished in three weeks, Acreman said. This project has caused several daily backups on Alabama 59 especially for southbound traffic.

"The deck panels which we'll install next week are all prefab," Acreman said. "Everything from this point is going to be prefab so it's going to go really quick."

The widening of Alabama 59 to allow for more left-turn space into Waterville is expected to begin about March 15, Acreman said, and is expected to be done by May 1.

After spring break, Acreman said, the decking on the Windmill Ridge bridge will be replaced it what is expected to take about three days.

A complete overlay of pavement of the Alabama 182 four-lane in Gulf Shores will start after Labor Day. The portion from West Lagoon Avenue to Laguna Key will start in two weeks and take about three weeks to complete, Acreman said.

#### The council also discussed:

- An ordinance requiring guidelines for construction of piers and pier structures. There are currently no requirements or regulations on those in Gulf Shores.

OK'd liquor licenses for Picnic Beach which is moving to the old Ribs and Reds building, the Fraternal Order of Eagles Aerie at 3859 Alabama 59 and for the Night on the Wild Side fundraiser for the Alabama Gulf Coast Zoo at the airport on March 3.

#### Full build out of new Alabama Gulf Coast Zoo may commence this month

The story of "The Little Zoo That Could" was perfectly documented in a still popular Animal Planet reality series about the Alabama Gulf Coast Zoo. The series - in 13 episodes - told the story about the Noah's Ark type evacuation from downtown Gulf Shores to property owned by zoo director Patty Hall in Elberta before Hurricane Ivan took a direct hit on Hwy. 59 back in September of 2004. With no other option, Hall and her staff of 39 moved 275 exotic animals to her family farm in Elberta. It was the first U.S. zoo to conduct a full-scale evacuation during a natural disaster. The hit series led to boom in visitors and media attention. (The zoo's 12 ft. alligator, Chucky, escaped during Ivan's storm surge, which was also a national news story). Since then, the zoo has experienced a record-breaking number of visitors (175,000 in 2017) every year since it reopened.

Although the evacuation earned Hall a well deserved CBS Person of the Week award, it also laid bare the fact that the zoo's 500 mostly exotic animals needed a home on higher ground.

Although the money was not in the bank as of Feb. 27, it is now almost certain that the "Little Zoo That Could" will finally become the "The Little Zoo That Grew."

A private investment firm is about to purchase \$26.26 million in tax exempt bonds that will fund the zoo's expansion to it new facility on 25 acres off County Road 6 East on land 4.3 miles north of the current location on land donated by the Weir family back in 2006. The bond money will also be used to purchase 71 acres adjacent to the current property. A Monkey Island exhibit has already been built on the new property, and Aquascape Pond Squad has

created a showcase water feature near the new zoo's entrance.

The bond buy is expected to be made public at the zoo's inaugural A Night on the Wild Side fundraiser on March 3 (see sidebar).

The zoo has also secured a \$1 million grant from the City of Gulf Shores payable upon completion of construction, which could come as soon as June of 2019. The grant from Gulf Shores will help with the zoo's operational expenses while it moves. That process could take as long as five months and would not occur during the summer tourist season when the zoo's parking lot is always full.

"When the zoo first opens, there is going to be lag time for revenues. This will give the zoo operating reserves to fall back before it is running on its own," said Steve Jones, chairman of the board of the zoo foundation.

"We hope to start moving dirt again in March and our goal is a 12 month construction time," said Jones. "It's a 60 to 90 day process to get the animals moved and acclimated, and we don't want to shut down the zoo in the summer. That's when it takes in most of its money."

Jones added that the additional 71 acres can be used for parking and even to build other attractions. "We've discussed different ways to use the property for revenue opportunities once we get the new site ready and before we are ready to move the animal population," Jones said.

"Holy mackerel. It's been a long time coming," he added. "This did not happen over night and none of it would have been possible without Patty (Zoo Director Patty Hall). We've all been running just to try to keep up with patty and her dream. I am so glad that we were able to make this happen."

"Less than a mile from the new zoo to an emergency care center for the animals," said Steve Jones, chairman of the board of the zoo foundation. "I think the proximity of the Auburn teaching hospital to the zoo is part of the reason Auburn is in that location."

Jones added that the Alabama Gulf Coast Zoo and Auburn have always had a close working relationship. He said the 56 acres the zoo is adding will be perfect for Auburn to use as a rehab center, and especially helpful for the zoo's larger and more exotic animals in emergency situations.

"We've always had a good relationship and have been able to take animals up there," Jones said. "I'm excited that we will be able to bring giraffes back in. The are delicate and would be hard to care for without that level of expertise right to make the staff's job easier."

The new 24,000-square-foot building will be located at the corner of the Beach Express and County Road 8 and will also be a training center for students studying agriculture, horticulture, aviation(drone research), marine fisheries and research and economic development. The will also include the Alabama Cooperative Extension.

The new Gulf Shores High School, Coastal Community College are also going to be aprt of the 200-acre parcel the city is developing as an education complex.

Proposed as the Coastal Alabama Center for Education Excellence, the 200 acre parcel at the Foley Beach Express and County Road 8 will also include Gulf Shore High School

Construction on Auburn's Gulf Coast Veterinary Hospital is expected to be completed by the end of 2018. It will offer specialty veterinary services and continuing education for veterinarians. Auburn's strategic plan for its 20 acre parcel is to enhance its student engagement in veterinary clinical education and laboratory training in disciplines unique to Alabama's Gulf Coast, such as marine mammal medicine, aquatic animal pathology, zoological and wildlife medicine and emergency response.

Born in The Bronx, N.Y., McCollough grew up in Dothan and graduated from the University of Alabama with a degree in speech and art. She works out of The Susan N. Mc-Collough Gallery/Studio in Gulf Shores next to The McCollough Institute, her husband Gaylon's plastic surgery practice.

"The painting 'Gulf Ever-Changing' has special meaning for me," McCollough said. "For as a child growing up close to the Gulf of Mexico, I came to love the sounds and movements of the Gulf. I always and still am mesmerized by the strength and ever-changing shifts in the Gulf. It represents the serene, calm, tumultuous expression of the waves," McCollough said. "It's a combination of science and art, and I feel very fortu-

nate to have been able to present this painting to the Dauphin Island Sea Lab." McCollough paints primarily on large canvases, sometimes working on three or four paintings at once. This is the sixth painting she has donated to various organizations. Her vast collection of abstract, expressionistic art displays worldwide. In 2017, she was named artist of the year by Art Tour International and honored at a show and ceremony in Florence, Italy. She was commissioned by the University of Alabama to create a painting in honor of her late professor and lifelong mentor, Al Sella. The 4-foot-by-5-foot impressionist portrait of the iconic artist and his emblematic bicycle hangs in Clark Hall in the College of Arts and Sciences.

There are nearly forty restaurants, bars, delis and cafes in downtown Mobile, and we've also compiled a suggested list of activities you can do in two, four and six hours in Mobile:





Cruise Terminal (yes, we counted!) is the one-ofa-kind GulfQuest National Maritime Museum. GulfQuest is the first and only museum dedicated to the Gulf Coast's rich maritime traditions from its discovery in the 1500s to the present day and one of the only interactive maritime museums in the country. So before you head out into the Gulf, learn all about the Gulf. It'll make your cruise that much more interesting, believe us!

Alabama is full of rich history, culture and economic importance to the region. This bustling port welcomes ships from all over the world along with tug boats and barges that roam the many rivers of North America. See them all up close from a USCG Certified passenger vessel with Wild Native Tours. The city skyline, maritime museum, Austal shipyards, cruise terminal and cruise ship are also seen on this tour. Courteous and knowledgeable guides will educate and entertain as you cruise these local waters. After your port tour, be sure to visit the Fort of Colonial Mobile, an immersive, interactive exhibit about the people who colonized early Mobile.



Wistory Lovers: Take an historic city tour, starting at the Visit Mobile Welcome Center, by car, van, trolley or duck boat. These usually last an hour to an hour and a half, which leaves plenty of time to explore historic downtown Mobile on foot, including the History Museum of Mobile and the Mobile Carnival Museum or hop across the Mobile River to board an authentic World War II battleship, the USS ALABAMA.


