### Parkland High School student wants to thank Doug Underhill

Esc. Co. Commissioner calls student protesters "little monsters"

When asked how she would respond to Escambia County Commissioner Doug Underhill's facebook comments describing student activists from Parkland High School as "little monsters" and "pathetic" for marching in support of gun law reform, Adam Alhanti, an incoming senior at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School, told the Pensacola News Journal (PNJ.com) he would thank the politician.

"I'd like to line all of them up, shake all of their hands and thank them for motivating me even further," said Alhanti, an incoming

senior at the school.

Underhill also labeled the students as miscreants and insurgents on his facebook page. He told the News Journal the feedback from his district has been overwhelming positive.

The Parkland students were speaking in Pensacola as part of a recent "Road to Change" statewide tour to get young people educated, registered and motivated to vote before the mid-term elections in local communities, according to the News Journal report.

On February 14, 2018, a gunman opened fire at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School, killing seventeen students and staff members and injuring seventeen others.

District 2, which Underhill represents, includes the southwest part of Escambia County from Perdido Key to West Pensacola.

### Candidates in Aug. 28 Commissioner race differ on beach use

More beach mouse habitat (Underhill) or more public beach (McMillan)

According to a Pensacola News Journal report, incumbent Commissioner Doug Underhill wants a 4-acre Perdido Key beachfront lot owned by Escambia County to remain off limits to the public for the benefit of the endangered and federally protected Perdido Key Beach Mouse while his primary opponent in the Aug. 28 Republican Primary, Alan McMillan, is backing a plan to build a public walkover above the beach mouse habitat so that people can reach the Gulf. McMillan also wants to add public parking to the lot by paving over an existing concrete slab. By keeping the lot closed, the county is furthering economic development by allowing new development elsewhere on the island, Underhill said.

Commissioner Jeff Bergosh, who represents a wide swath of western Escambia County, said he is pushing to open the lot because it is an issue of fairness to the public. Bergosh said he has long been concerned about limited public access to the beaches along Perdido Key, according to the News-Journal.

So far, the interests of surrounding condominium owners have been placed above that of the general public, Bergosh told the News Journal. "I think it is selfish to have let that property sit there unused for five years while private property owners have used our Gulf-front property for their own purposes," Bergosh stated to PNJ reporter Melissa Nelson Gabriel.

The lot is located just east of the Crab Trap across the street from the Sundown Condominium complex, which Underhill told the News Journal "is literally in the middle of nowhere."

"That land should absolutely be opened to the public and that will be priority of mine if I am elected," McMillan stated to the News Journal."That strikes me as commonsense and I am not sure why it hasn't been done already."

McMillan said an elevated boardwalk will separate people from the dunes, sea oats and brush where beach mice live and a concrete slab from a building that was destroyed by Hurricane Ivan can be use for parking.

The News Journal reported that Bergosh said a 2013 county document describing the plan to buy the property stated that the land would also be used to provide local public access to

### Sassy Bass starts Gofundme page for family of Josie Jones



At just 20 years of age, Josie's life was just beginning. She was a Gulf Shores High School graduate and worked tirelessly in the local hospitality industry. An excited mother-to-be, her mother, sisters, loved ones, friends, and Alize now struggle to cope with her loss.

To help her family in this time of profound sorrow, donations to cover expenses including the med flight, hospital and funeral will be greatly appreciated. "We recognize there is little any of us can do to make these circumstances better or easier to bear," Sassy Bass owners Mark an Robin Frohlich wrote on the gofundme page. "All we can do is love and remember Josie for the genuine and amazing person she was."

Alize Marshall, 21, of Foley, and Josie Jones, 20, of Orange Beach were expecting a baby girl when Jones was killed in a suspected DUI crash on August 5. According to the Foley Police report, 57-year-old Debra Estep hit Marshall's car while driving the wrong way on the Foley Beach Express just south of County Road 20 at approximately 9:45 p.m. Police said Estep's Mercury Villager, traveling westbound on County Road 20, turned left into the northbound lanes, driving into oncoming traffic. The two vehicles collided head-on in the northbound lane. Josie was airlifted to Sacred Heart Hospital, where she and her unborn daughter both died.

Foley Police believe Estep was driving drunk, but investigators are waiting on toxicology reports. Marshall told police he saw the headlights and attempted to swerve out of the way, but Estep's van still hit them head-on.



### Coastal Alabama Acoustic Monitoring Program tracks redfish & speckled trout

"A lot of the red drum really didn't move that much from where they were actually tagged."

While the fanfare surrounding the Alabama Deep Sea Fishing Rodeo (ADSFR) proceeded nearby, Reid Nelson deftly made a series of surgeon's knots to sew up an incision on the belly of a redfish that was a part of the live weigh-in category at the rodeo.

Nelson, a graduate student in the University of South Alabama's Marine Sciences Department, inserted an acoustic tag in the redfish, red drum if you're a purist or marine scientist, as part of the Coastal Alabama Acoustic Monitoring Program

(CAAMP).

CAAMP monitors 55 receiver stations strategically placed in Alabama coastal waters to catch pings, which happen once a minute during the one-year lifespan of the acoustic tags in the fish.

Nelson said 100 red drum were tagged in 2015. In 2016, another 100 red drum were tagged. Also in 2016, all tagging that didn't occur at the ADSFR was transferred to Dog River and Fowl River on the western shore of Mobile Bay

Nelson said the goal of CAAMP is to study fishing mortality, natural mortality and fish movement in response to water temperature and salinity levels.

Last year, the team added speckled trout to the tagging program and will continue to work with trout this year. As expected, redfish is a hardy species that handles catch-and-release very well. Speckled trout are not quite as resilient but still survive well enough to just for the line release of fort.

to justify the live-release effort.

"With the popularity of the live weigh-in at the rodeo, we looked at it as a nice opportunity to tag live fish from different places," Nelson said. "You can actually look at how successful live weigh-ins are. What we have seen from fish tagged at the rodeo, about 98 percent of the red drum have lived. About 78 percent of the speckled trout that we tagged at the rodeo have lived.

"Overall, mortality is pretty low, which I think is amazing. Some of the red drum were brought from all over, as far away as Mississippi and Louisiana."

Nelson said 20 red drum and 15 speckled trout were fitted with the acoustic tags, which cost about \$300 each, and released during the 2018 ADSFR. CAAMP is funded through the Alabama Marine Resources Division with a grant from the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation.

"What was really interesting about the rodeo is the map where the fish came from that were released at the rodeo," he said. "One of the main concerns about a live weigh-in program is the fish won't leave that area once they are released. Unlike the fish we tagged in the rivers, the fish we tagged at the rodeo leave Dauphin Island pretty readily. We've detected those

fish as far away as Raft River in the Mobile Delta. We've detected them in Fowl River. We've detected them off the Gulf State Park Pier. They have even been detected by receiver arrays that other groups have out. It's really remarkable how quickly and widespread these fish disperse.

<sup>2</sup>It's interesting to do science with a part of the tournament. That's really never been done. Another interesting thing is fishermen have been really good about telling us where they caught the fish. What we have seen is about 25 percent of the fish have gone back to where they were caught. With red drum that were caught in the rivers and brought to the rodeo, about 70 percent of those fish will disperse and end up returning to one of our local rivers. That's been an amazing aspect of the study. We have no idea how those fish find their way back. It could be olfaction or chemoreceptors. It's probably a combination of many navigation senses."

Natural mortality with the red drum tagged in the first year of the study has been surprisingly low, according to Nelson. Out of the 100 fish tagged, only three died of natural causes. Fishing mortality took 10 out of the population in Fowl River from 2016-2017, and nine redfish were lost to fishing mortality in Dog River during the same time span.

"One of the other interesting things we saw is the seasonal peaks in the rivers," Nelson said. "We saw more fishing mortality in the fall and spring."

An eye-opening aspect of the CAAMP data when speckled trout were added to the study is the significant disparity in movement between species in response to weather and salinity changes.

"One of the most interesting things we've seen is a lot of the red drum really didn't move that much from where they were actually tagged," Nelson said. "Out of Fowl River, we had 13 fish leave the river over the course of the year, which is not very many in the grand scheme of things. Only five left Dog River during that year. For the year we have data, they were pretty much resident fish. Some of them would use different parts of the river. But for the most part, they tended to remain in the area where they were originally tagged.

"In fact, we had a family call in a fish a few months ago that had been tagged about a year ago. They literally caught that fish where we tagged it at Delta Port in Fowl River. That was amazing."

Nelson said the most movement observed during the study came in December of 2016 when the water temperature was cooler than normal and the salinity was very high because of a lack of rain in the fall.

"The big conclusion so far on redfish is the majority of the slot fish tend to be resident," he said. "It looks like they are pretty resilient to changes in temperature and salinity. We've seen big fluctuations in those two factors, and the fish didn't leave the rivers when the salinity and temperature varied quite a bit. I thought that was really interesting."

Now, throw speckled trout into the study, and the movement patterns are vastly different.

"During the first year of the big study with speckled trout, it was almost the complete opposite story," Nelson said. "The trout were tagged last November and December. They were resident in the deep holes in the rivers until about February. When it was really cold,

they were staying in the rivers. Once it started to warm up, we saw a push of fish leaving the rivers pretty quickly, moving down to Mississippi Sound and Dauphin Island. That is what you would expect.

"We had a couple of fish that moved from Dog River to the Mobile River. One of those fish actually came in at the rodeo. Instead of staying in the river, they

pushed out relatively quickly."

Nelson is also working with another program to study fish movement. The TAG Alabama program is sponsored by the Coastal Conservation Association of Alabama and relies on local anglers to insert dart tags in red drum and speckled trout caught in Alabama coastal waters.

"What we're seeing with TAG Alabama is that many of those redfish are coming back right close to where they were tagged as well," he said. "With TAG Alabama, we get a much larger spread of tagging locations instead of just the rivers."

Anglers participating in TAG Alabama go to the website at tags.usouthal.edu/ to log tagging and recapture efforts for trout and redfish as well as red

snapper, tripletails and sharks.

"We've had 743 red drum and speckled trout tagged so far," Nelson said. "Considering we launched the program in April this year, that's a lot. We've had 65 of those fish recaptured.

"I'm excited about this. CCA Alabama is providing the funding for this. I'm hoping we can keep this

going."


Another tagging effort that occurred partially during this year's ADSFR involved tarpon, known as the silver king.

With the help of local tarpon enthusiasts during the ADSFR, researchers from Dauphin Island Sea Lab and Mississippi State University managed to attach eight satellite tags. Two more tarpon were caught and tagged the Saturday after the rodeo.

Of the eight fish tagged during the rodeo, all but one high-tailed it toward Louisiana, one traveling as far as the southern tip of Louisiana near South Pass. One fish, however, decided to explore Mobile Bay and made a huge loop inside the bay before heading west.

# Orange Beach summer season ends in a flurry of activity

A busy summer is winding downin Orange Beach and even this week the stranglehold of traffic has started to abate.

"I want to thank all of our employees that have sort of guided all of the various jobs," City Administrator Ken Grimes said. "It's been a very challenging summer but for the most part, we've had a very strong and good summer. As you can tell by this week and today just driving to work there's a lot less people in

lar council meeting and work session in Orange Beach on Aug. 7. Also, during the meeting, the council talked about changing clinics serving city employees and dependents and saw the promotion of firefighter Lt. Bruce Nelson to Battalion chief.

The long, hot and busy summer didn't go out with a whimper, however, Grimes said. City resources were stretched right up to the last minute with first responders maxed out with recoveries and rescues on the beach.

"This past week was very challenging on the beach for police and fire and

many, many others," Grimes said. "We did have a loss of life with a drowning which is an issue." A 53-yearold Jasper man, Richard L. Coleman, drowned near Perdido Pass.

Grimes said the city will now enter its annual postsummer review session.

"When you get to the end of the season you look back and try to see figure out what could be better," Grimes said. "We're always striving to do better and I'm just proud of everybody that has gotten us to this point as we kind of take a breath. A lot of things have been happening and overall, it's been a very good summer."

Mayor Tony Kennon was gauging another factor to

judge the summer season.

"We are waiting on the most accurate of all indicators, the sewer flows," Kennon said. "Judging by how many people were here this summer the preliminary numbers are it was a record summer and a record number of people here."

**Employee Clinic** 

Currently, city employees and dependents can be treated at the Symbol Clinic at the city's medical building just north of city hall on State Route 161. That contract ends Dec. 31 and Grimes said the city is now in talks with Southern Rapid Care to take over

much more hours, doctors fulltime, seven days a week for our employees.'

Kennon said the change is not a reflection on the work done by Symbol but Southern offers expanded services Symbol cannot.

"It was nothing in any way, form or fashion to do with Symbol," Kennon said. "I have nothing but good things to say and I told them I'd be glad to write a reference. The employees were great and I thought everybody did a good job.

"But there's no way they can compete with an entity that's already here seven days a week, have doctors on site. They are giving up margin to help us as a city, we're helping them subsidize costs in the offseason to keep them afloat. It is a win-win situation for our community to see them prosper and grow. This was a blessing falling into our lap.

Fire Chief Justin Pearce announced the promotion for Nelson and his wife pinned the new badge on him during the meeting. In his 19 years with Orange Beach Nelson started the department's dive team and worked with the marine program and hazardous materials response team.

"He's been leading the way on a lot of projects," Pearce said. "I feel like this is going to be an easy, natural transition for him and I'm proud of him."

Kennon and other council members thanked Nelson for his service.

# Controversial apartments going back before planning commission

Even if residents won a reprieve on an apartment complex they don't want in their neighborhood, they still left a recent Gulf Shores City Council meeting with questions.

Mayor Robert Craft has asked the city's planning commission to revisit the application for Regency

Place it approved in June.

"The mayor has just asked that the planning commission clarify why they gave their approval and to clarify how we meet the ordinance and meet the local laws," architect Stuart Povall said. "It's not a reappli-

cation. This is a by-right development so we are doing everything that ordinance tells us to do and we are not asking for anything outside of the ordinance."

Residents filled the hall to standing-room only and were pleased at the delay and a second look by the planning commission. They still left city hall chambers with questions.

"How are you going to fix the street so we don't get all the traffic?" Ron Glaus asked. "It's mindboggling. Every place around there is full. And then you're going to put another 500 cars in there?"

Glaus' questions came after Povall, representing

Chartre Consulting and owner Clarence Chapman, made a presentation he hoped would calm some of the fears residents have over the 206-unit complex that will be on 10 acres in the center of Gulf Shores. It's surrounded on all sides by condo developments and neighborhoods containing nearly 300 units or homes.

"I wanted to clear up some misconceptions about what this development will be," Povall said. "I don't expect to win any hearts and minds I just want to hit some bullet points on what the development is going to be. I think it's important what this owner's actually bringing to this community and is representing."

Concerns were raised earlier in the process about the possibility of short-term vacation rentals allowed by the multi-family zoning in the complex. Or that it would be a transient population of interchanging residents and lots of turnover. Some of Chartre's developments have subsidized government rent programs. Povall said Regency Place will not be one of those.

"This development, at every turn, is a high-end, luxury apartment development," Povall said. "This is not low income, it's not subsidized, it's not even middle of the road. This is a high-end, class A apartment community. All of our leases are one- and two-year leases."

The luxuries will include plush interiors with quality materials, Povall said.

"The interior of these units are stainless steel, granite countertops, wood floors, ceramic tile," Povall said. "All the things any of us would walk into a for sale home and say 'this is nice.' All apartments are accessed by interior air-conditioned corridors with eleva-

tors to all floors. It'll have a 5,000-square-foot clubhouse, club room, amenities, fireplace, kitchen, luxury pool of more than 2,000 square feet, two hot tubs and

Povall said the 10-acre parcel was initially planned as phase 2 of The Enclave condominiums directly to the south of the Regency Place site.

"It has the same density that has always been planned there," he said. "It's a density that's consistent with the zoning."

Residents against the project, including many from The Enclave, asked Craft to see if there is anything they can do to curtail the number of units and address other concerns they have.

On Aug. 6 Craft gave a detailed response saying the city can ask the commission to revisit the application using a section of the zoning ordinance that calls for several questions to be asked before it can be ap-

"On the advice of the city attorney, I have by letter requested the chairman of the planning commission to have the planning commission revisit this application at its earliest convenience and adopt a resolution satisfying the requirements of Section 3-3.E," part of Craft's statement to the crowd said.

Planning Director Andy Bauer said following that portion of the zoning ordinance will cause the planning commission to take a closer look at the applica-

"The planning commission can approve with conditions or deny a site plan based on the following findings of facts," Bauer said. "There are about 10 items in there that they must concur they have looked at and agree that the site plan meets all of those. The planning commission always adopts the resolution and typically our staff report covers those items. The city attorney said the resolution specifically must state that a site plan meets those items. The resolution did not read specifically how that site plan meets those items."

Bauer was unsure if the reapplication will be heard at the next planning commission meeting on Aug. 28. Also, during the session, the council:

 Heard a request from the developers of Seagrass Village Assisted Living to amend its original conditional use permit to include 120 units and eight independent cottages. The original application in March misstated that there would be 109 units and 11 cot-

• Heard a request to rezone 162 acres on the north side of County Road 8 or the recently renamed Coastal Gateway Boulevard, from agricultural to single-family residential. The Raley Farms developers want to subdivide the land into 486 lots near the Stonegate Subdivision.

• Heard a request from Brooks Delaney for a conditional use permit to construction two storage buildings for boats and RVs at 16961 Fort Morgan Road.

• Heard a request from Team Magic for a public assembly permit for the Brett Robinson Alabama Coastal Triathlon for Sept. 8 at the Hangout.

• Heard a request from the city for a public assembly permit for the Halloween 5K run and ride on Oct. 19 at Gulf Place.

• Heard a request from the Gulf Shores Kiwanis Club for a public assembly permit on Jan. 1 for the annual Polar Bear Dip at Gulf Place.

• Heard a request authorizing Mayor and City Clerk to execute FAA Grant Agreement for a grant of almost \$129,000 confirming the Authority's application, acceptance and execution of FAA grant agreement.

 Received requests for liquor licenses for Wacked Out Weiner in Pelican Place Shopping Center and Gourmet World at 3800 Gulf Shores Parkway. And a request from the Gulf Shores Lions Club for a special event liquor license for Dinner in the Dark on Sept. 14 at the Erie Meyer Civic Center.

 Received a request to accept a land donation of a quarter acre from Mr. and Mrs. John Jay on Third Street West near the intersection of Windmill Road on the south side of Third. It is a waterfront canal leading to Little Lagoon. The Jays are asking for a written valuation of \$2,500 to them for tax purposes.

• Heard a recommendation that Brooke Taylor finish the term of Jim Bauer on the Beautification Board after he resigned his position. It also included recommendations for the reappointment of Margaret Griffin and Rodney Powell to the board.

### Mayor's Regency Place Statement

Mayor Robert Craft read the following statement on the city's call for Regency Place Apartments to reap-

ply for site plan approval for a 206-unit complex on Regency Road.

• On the advice of the City Attorney, I have by letter requested the Chairman of the Planning Commission to have the Planning Commission revisit this application at its earliest convenience and adopt a resolution satisfying the requirements of Section 3-3.E. I have also noted that, while under the Zoning Ordinance a public hearing is not required during the Site Plan Review process, given the active public discussion of this project a public hearing by the Planning Commission would very probably be beneficial.

• Without expressing any view that the approval given by the Planning Commission was or was not in error, the City Attorney has observed that the written Planning Commission approval resolution failed to set out the express findings and conclusions on the suitability of the project as specifically required by Section 3-3.E. of the Zoning Ordinance.

• There is nothing before the City Council for its consideration relating to the Regency Place Site Plan.

- · Under the Zoning Ordinance, Site Plan approval requires both consideration of the proposed project's conformity with the Zoning Ordinance's area and dimensional requirements and consideration of the project's consistency with the purpose and intent of the City's overall zoning plan and the impact of its design on all external relationships.
- Citizens have strongly expressed their concern that the Planning Commission did not properly evaluate the external impact of the project in the process of giving its approval.

• Pending receipt of a Planning Commission Resolution satisfying Section 3-3.E., the City will be unable to issue any building or land disturbance permits to the Applicant.

Dillon has written songs for country stars including George Jones, Brooks & Dunn, Kenny Chesney, Lee Ann Womack and many more. But his association with George Strait over the years has made him an icon in the world of country music. Dillon has composed or co-written 63 songs for Strait, including 19 singles, 11 of which went to number one. In 2002, he was in-

ducted into the Nashville Songwriters Hall of Fame, along with Bob Dylan and Shel Silverstein.

Brice Long's songs have reached the top of the charts three times. Gary Allan's "Nothing On But the Radio" reached number one and was one of the most performed country songs of 2005. He topped the charts again with Randy Houser's "Like A Cowboy," which was nominated for CMA Song of the Year, and his number one single with John Pardi, "Heartache On The Dance Floor," was one of the most played country songs of 2017.

Phillip White is an Alabama native who has written songs for George Strait, Luke Bryan, Chris Ledoux, Vince Gill, Darius Rucker, Wynonna, Reba, Blake Shelton, Rascal Flatts and others. Among his titles are the 2003 ACM Song of the Year "I'm Movin" On," the theme song for Reba's self-titled hit television show and

Blake Shelton's "Nobody But Me."

Pensacola native Larry Butler was the first Nashville producer to win a Grammy Award for Producer of the Year, in 1979. He experienced his greatest successes as Kenny Rogers' producer, a collaboration that produced hits like "Lucille," "She Believes In Me," "The Gambler," and "Coward of the County." Earlier in his career, he landed recording session work and played piano on hits including Conway Twitty's "Hello Darlin" and Bobby Goldsboro's "Honey." He won a Song of the Year Grammy for "(Hey Won't You Play) Another Somebody Done Somebody Wrong Song," a song he co-wrote with Chips Morgan that B.J. Thomas took to number one in 1975. Butler died in 2012 at the age of 69.

### Birmingham Audubon saves terns after volleyball playing beachgoers destroy hundreds of eggs on Sand Island

Although the colony of some 600 Least Tern nests took a serious hit, the birds managed to fledge 83 chicks this year

On July 10, Emma Rhodes and Andrew Haffenden from Birmingham Audubon's Coastal Programs puttered out to Sand Island off the coast of Alabama to check for breeding activity. They were astounded by what they saw: a huge Least Tern colony of nearly 600 nests on the two-acre sandy stretch offshore of Dauphin Island in Mobile Bay.

Elation quickly turned to concern, however, when closer inspection revealed that tragedy had struck hundreds of eggs in the newly discovered colony—spurring the team to move quickly to safeguard the remaining nests and ensure the surviving eggs had a chance to hatch.

Some of the eggs piled together showed signs of pipping, or cracks in the shell made by a chick, and were likely close to hatching before they were moved.

Rhodes and Haffenden found abandoned plastic tent poles, an erected volleyball net, and about 30 Least Tern eggs stacked in small piles and arranged decoratively around wide mounds of sand. Human hands must have plucked the eggs out of their simple sand nests, likely to clear the beach for a volleyball game, says Katie Barnes, coastal senior biologist for Birmingham Audubon. "It's really hard to imagine how someone could do that to a little egg," she

Around the makeshift volleyball court, Rhodes and Haffenden counted at least 100 abandoned nests—likely an underestimate, as they didn't want to disturb the colony to get a more pre-

cise count. Each nest held one to three dead eggs that had cooked on the sand when the human disturbance forced the parents, whose bodies shield their unhatched young from the hot sun, to flee, Barnes said.

Even just a few hours of exposure to the heat is enough to kill the chicks growing inside eggs, said Roger Clay, a wildlife biologist with the Alabama Department of Conservation and Natural Resources. Some of the eggs Haffenden and Rhodes saw piled together showed signs of pipping, or cracks in the shell made by a chick, and were likely close to hatching before they were moved.

"What was really sad," Barnes said, "[is] there was a bird that was still trying to incubate her egg in that pile."

Birmingham Audubon lost no time in protecting the remaining nests. Barnes notified the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service because Least Terns are federally protected under the Migratory Bird Treaty Act; the agency has since opened an investigation, led by the Department of Justice. She also called the state conservation agency, which added the speck of land to its patrol route to keep an eye on the terns and protect against future human interference.

And the following day, she and her team returned to the colony to erect signs (including federal warning signs provided by USFWS) and fence off the colony with neon yellow rope and metal posts. When they left on July 11, the sandbar was still home to some 1,200 actively nesting Least Terns and a handful of Black Skimmers.

So far, there have been no signs of human activity on the island after they installed the fencing and signs, Barnes says.

Barnes and her team are part of a year-old initiative by Birmingham Audubon to monitor and protect the state's coastal birds, called the Alabama Coastal Bird Stewardship Program. This year, the program has focused on gathering detailed data about where these birds nest and their success. It has been a "tremendous help," Clay said, as the state has limited resources to monitor and protect shorebirds.

The data Birmingham Audubon collected this year show that Least Terns are in a tight spot in the state. While the birds return to mainland beaches year after year to breed, many of their eggs and chicks are eaten by mammalian predators like coyotes and foxes. Even on Dauphin Island, a Globally Important Bird Area connected to the mainland by a three-mile bridge, foxes are getting to the terns, says Barnes.

The sandbar where volleyball players disrupted the tern colony, however, is completely disconnected from the mainland and is free of land predators; the birds have to contend only with avian predators like Laughing Gulls. That might be one reason this spot was so popular, Barnes said, drawing some 1,200 adult terns. The birds are still exposed to serious risks, though. Since Birmingham Audubon started monitoring the beach, the shorebirds have been protected from human disturbance, but storm surges and high tides have wiped out an estimated 30 to 40 nests.

When Barnes visited the colony soon after her team discovered it, she was surprised to see many birds still

The ALCBSP program provides critical protection and monitoring of Alabama's sensitive beach nesting birds in Mobile and Baldwin counties. The Program focuses on the Audubon Coastal Bird Survey and continued breeding and overwintering success of 11 focal species of concern and compliments the work of similar National Audubon Society initiatives in the Gulf of Mexico including Florida, Mississippi, Louisiana and Texas.

The ALCBSP will help the declining populations of shorebirds and water birds by training volunteers to steward and monitor these targeted species and their habitats at key nesting sites along the coast. During the nesting season, volunteers are also needed to maintain the health and safety of nesting colonies through public outreach and the installation of symbolic fencing at colony locations.

sitting on eggs rather than raising chicks. They were behind schedule, given that Least Terns typically nest in May and June and start raising and fledging chicks in July. She suspects some of the birds nesting on this island initially tried elsewhere on Alabama's coast; after their first nest failed, they found their way to this colony. Some of these birds may have even started over after volleyball players wrecked their initial nests.

Despite the birds' efforts, they failed to make up for the losses from the volleyball incident and other stressors. Just 83 birds fledged out of 600 nests this season, as late as August 2. Even fewer may have survived without the extra surveillance and fencing, Barnes said. The Least Terns have since departed the island.

If this little strip of sand is still there next summer a big if in the hurricane-prone Gulf of Mexico—Barnes said she's planning on pre-fencing the whole area to head off another beach-day tragedy. Ultimately, she hopes this devastating event will help raise awareness about beach-nesting birds and how to respect their boundaries.

In the first day after Ben Raines first reported about the colony for AL.com, six new volunteers signed up to help Birmingham Audubon monitor beaches for nesting shorebirds. Audubon has guides, including Sharing the Shore and the Coastal Bird Stewardship Toolkit, to help other aspiring shorebird stewards.

"The take-home message is our protection helps birds, education helps birds," Barnes said.

Audubon is a nonprofit dedicated to saving birds and the places they need.

### Baldwin seniors offered free memory & balance tests

The South Baldwin County based Memory Screening/Balance Testing Group has adopted a name and will not be known as Testing 1, 2, 3. But just as in the past, the group will continue to offer free memory screening and balance testing to local seniors on selected days in Fairhope, Orange Beach, Foley, Daphne and Gulf Shores (see sidebar below).

Part of the National Memory Screening Program administered through the Alzheimer's Foundation of America, Testing 1, 2, 3 has also partnered with Walgreens to offer free flu shots (bring insurance/medicaid cards). Walk ins are welcome and no appointment is necessary. The tests can be performed in 20 minutes or less. Unlike memory loss, seniors do not have to suffer a loss in their balance. Come for the test learn how to improve your balance – simple, at home exercise. Walkins are welcome and no appointments are needed. Testing does not diagnose illness or replace the need to see a qualified medical professional.

"Our volunteers stand ready to provide Memory Screenings and Balance Testing at any event held in Baldwin County where a relatively large number of seniors will be in attendance," program coodinator Sam Strite said.

"It only takes about 15 minutes of the participant's time and it is totally free and confidential. Our only requirement is a place where we can conduct our screenings, which must be reasonably quiet and private. We bring all of the necessary materials to conduct the event." ### Background & Info on Baldwin County Memory Screening/Balance Testing

For a number of years, the Alzheimer's Foundation of America (a non profit based in NYC, which primarily raises money in support of Alzheimer's care givers and support groups, as opposed to the Alzheimer's Association, which raises money for Alzheimer's medical research), has supported and run a National Memory Screening Program. I have been receiving the AFA newsletter for over 15 years and in 2014 I saw a map they published that showed the locations across the USA where one could go for a free memory screening. I checked Alabama and saw that Huntsville was the only location in Alabama where one could go. I contacted AFA and started one for South Baldwin County. We went 'live' in November 2014 and have been holding screenings each year since — one in October/November, primarily for local people, and one in February, primarily for Snowbirds. We now have over 70 volunteers who support our screening efforts. Balance Testing was added to our program in the fall of 2016 and we can show you how to improve your sense of balance, regardless of your age.

Since we need 'medical professionals' to conduct our memory screenings, we rely on many retired nurses, dental technicians, pharmacists, care givers, etc. Those who are not medical professionals serve as our Greeters and Balance Testers. We have a number of volunteers who are Snowbirds and volunteer to help us after they arrive in the winter. Our events run about 4 hours and with roughly 9 events a year, that is only 36 hours of active screening/testing. During that time we historically screen over 225 people, with the numbers growing each year. We feel that the biggest contribution we make is 92% of the people who come for a screening have never had one before and they do not know whether their memory loss is 'normal' or not. ALL seniors suffer memory loss, particularly short term memory loss. To come and be screened, and then be told that their memory loss is normal, age related memory loss, is a very comforting thing for those who come. For those who fail our test, we tell them that the test is not a diagnostic tool but an indicator of severe memory loss. We give them several forms to take to their doctor for further evaluation. Since memory loss can be caused by a number of factors (other than Dementia), it is important for a person to have a more complete evaluation. Memory loss can be caused by thyroid problems, medicine/drugs, dehydration (common in seniors), chemotherapy and radiation can also cause it. Only a doctor can determine the cause.

We call ourselves TESTING 1, 2, 3. We are not a non-profit nor an organization, just a group of volunteers. We do not charge money for our screenings nor accept donations. GlenLakes Golf Course sponsors our events by giving us cards to hand out to participants allowing them to play GlenLakes at any time for a reduced rate. The Alzheimer's Foundation of America provides us with literature and our testing material. Here are some facts about Alzheimer's:

• It is the 6th leading cause of death in the US and is the only one of the top 10 that is not curable, preventable nor able to be put in remission.

• Over 6 million people in the US now suffer from Alzheimer's, 2/3 of whom are women. It is estimated that there will be 25 million suffering from the disease in 2025, if there are no medical breakthroughs.

• Until 7 years ago, Alzheimer's was not diagnosable as the cause of death without an autopsy. Today, the condition can be diagnosed with a brain scan.

• Dementia is a general term that describes a group of symptoms such as memory loss and judgement/language impairment. It is a permanent and progressive disease. It is very common among the elderly. Alzheimer's is the most common form of Dementia. It is progressive, irreversible and leads to death.

- The cycle of Alzheimer's is roughly 12 years, depending on when it is diagnosed. 12 years would be an early diagnosis and most diagnoses come about the 8th year. The cycle is the length of time from diagnosis to death. It is now possible to diagnose Alzheimer's even earlier than 12 years but a diagnosis would seldom be requested because the symptoms at that point are relatively mild and are similar to normal age related memory loss. Early onset Alzheimer's, which might occur in a person's 50's, generally moves 'faster' than later cases.
- The odds of a healthy woman at age 65 developing Alzheimer's is 1 in 6. For a man, it is 1 in 11. The risk of Dementia doubles every 5 years between 65 and 95 years of age. Alzheimer's in women progresses at a faster rate than in men.
- Early detection of Alzheimer's is thought to be possible by measuring a person's sense of smell and/or through a vision test. Both are still in the study phase.
- Chronic Traumatic Encephalopathy (CTE) is getting a lot of press these days because of the number of football players in the NFL who have suffered from the disease. Over 95% of those who died "early" and had their brain donated to research, suffered from CTE. The symptoms of CTE are almost identical to those of someone with Alzheimer's and many people with CTE are diagnosed with Alzheimer's. Both are diseases where Beta Amyloid Plaque builds up in the brain and eventually 'short circuits' the wiring of the brain. Today, CTE can only be determined by an autopsy since a brain scan cannot differentiate it from Alzheimer's. CTE is caused by repetitive hits to the head. They do not have to be severe blows but it is the multiple blows over years that cause the condition.


### Pirates Cove, 'Bama listed among nation's top 21 beach bars

### Bulls on the Beach back at Flora-Bama Sept. 7-8





# Gulf State Park earns Attraction of the Year honors

Three miles of white sand beaches siren call to vacationers from around the world

Gulf State Park in Gulf Shores was honored Monday night by the Alabama Tourism Department as the 2018 Attraction of the Year. The three miles of white sand beaches at Gulf State Park act as a siren call to vacationers from around the world, but it is because park staff and volunteers provide so much more through their hospitality, educational opportunities and recreational offerings that the park earned this award.



Recent Gulf State Park improvements include restored and expanded sand dunes, new Interpretive Center and a Learning Campus that will be enjoyed by thousands of visitors each year. The approximately 6,500-acre park is made up of nine ecosystems and features 28 miles of walking and biking trails.

The Lodge at Gulf State Park, set to open in November, is a model of resilient, environmentally friendly coastal development where connectivity to the outdoors is a central focus. Designed to meet LEED Gold and SITES Platinum Certifications, the lodge will have 350 rooms and

40,000 square feet of indoor and outdoor event space. The Lodge at Gulf State Park also features the largest beach view ballroom on the Gulf Coast, accommodating groups of up to 1,000, a Gulffront pool and Gulf-front restaurant with house-prepared and locally sourced regional specialties.

The naturalists based at the Lodge and Gulf State Park Campground will be available to share information on coastal environments with guests, helping to fulfill the Alabama State Parks System educational goals.

The Alabama Tourism Department lauded Gulf State Park, saying, "The park sets a benchmark of economic and environmental sustainability by demonstrating best practices for outdoor recreation, education and accommodations."

Alabama Department of Conservation and Natural Resources Commissioner Chris Blankenship praised Gulf State's staff and many volunteers for being the reason for the honor. "Our employees and dedicated volunteers work incredibly hard to make Gulf State Park the best it can be," he said. "This park is one of the jewels of our entire system and we're honored to receive the award from the Alabama Tourism Department for 2018 and we expect the next year to be even better with the opening of the new Lodge and Conference Center this November."

Alabama State Parks Director Greg Lein, in accepting the honor, pointed out other accolades Gulf State Park received in 2018. "In recent years, Gulf State Park has been recognized by its cus-

tomers for its excellent service through certificates awarded by TripAdvisor.com," Lein said. "This year Gulf State Park received three of these awards and was inducted into TripAdvisor's Hall of Fame for receiving such awards over five consecutive years.

"These achievements by staff and volunteers, coupled with the investments in new amenities such as trails, education facilities and the rebuilding of our Lodge at Gulf State Park, have made the park an attractive setting for the recruitment of new business partners like Valor Hospitality and Hilton Hotels and Re-



# Shark fishing days continue Aug 19, 21, 26 & 28 at GSP Pier

The Alabama Department of Conservation and Natural Resources has added August dates for managed shark fishing at the Gulf State Park Saltwater Fishing Pier in Gulf Shores. Shark fishing will be allowed on the south end of the pier - called the octagon – from 7 p.m. until 7 a.m. on August 12, 14, 19, 21, 26 and  $\hat{2}8$ . The s the next morning on the selected Sundays and Tuesdays.

The octagon will close to routine use 30 minutes prior to these events, and reopen to routine use 30 minutes following them. During the events, the octagon area of the pier will be designated for the exclusive use of participating anglers and their designated assistants. The remainder of the pier will be open to anglers and other pier guests as normal.

The August managed shark-fishing events will allow for 15 anglers per occasion, with no more than one rod and reel per angler in use. Each angler may have one additional assistant, and anglers are encouraged to assist one another while fishing. This allows for a maximum of 30 individuals on the octagon area during each event. Angler gear shall allow for larger reel sizes, but otherwise remain the same as provided for under existing pier rules, and anglers are required to provide their own

Registration for the shark-fishing events is ongoing and anglers will continue to be selected in the order in which applications are received. To register for participation, visit www.alapark.com/shark-fishing. Applicants will need to provide contact information for notification of selection and will be notified a week or more in advance of the date for which they have been selected. # Billy Walker was a larger than life legend from a family of proud fishermen

I have heard many a Billy Walker story during my 29 years putting together the local rag every two weeks. But I never could get Billy to agree to be interviewed for a story, although about five years back he gave me hope that he would consider it and get back to me. It was always going to be a longshot. But it would have been interesting.

The only time I sat down with Billy, who passed away on Aug. 11, was at the Loose Moose (now the Undertow) one weekday afternoon - maybe 20 years ago. Billy was sitting with our mutual friend, Earl Callaway and they invited me to join them. I later told Earl I felt like we were in the presence of the pope or Vito Corleone, as locals among the patrons, one after another, came over to pay respects to a man who was easily the sharpest dresser in the joint.

"In a sense, he was like The Godfather of Orange Beach," said Ken Lambert, the first musician hired to play guitar at the Flora-Bama. A good friend of Billy's since 1978, Lambert prayed with and for Billy and his family 30 minutes before he passed away.

"By the time I got back home, Lois Gale (Billy's wife) had called to say he passed away," Lambert said. "I know that when he went home, he did know Christ as his savior, and that is a comforting thing."

Lambert said Billy and his crew were among the Flora-Bama's first regulars. And he also spent many hours drinking with Billy at Walker Marina.

"I will probably be part of the service and I'm thinking of all the things I don't want to say," Lambert said. "There are so many Billy stories out there about what an outlaw he was, and I know that's all true.

"But in those days, we were all pretty wild. And there were times when we were not welcome drinking guests, even in our own homes. But what I remember most is that he was a big man with a big heart. You did not want him for an enemy. But if he liked you, you could always count on him to be a good friend. I will miss him." Joe Gilchrist, who bought the Flora-Bama from the Tampary family in 1978 and is still part owner of the famous roadhouse (with John McInnis, Cam Price and Pat McLellan) recalls Billy as "one of the great characters of all time." That's high praise, since Gilchrist firmly believes that the characters who frequent the Bama are the heart and soul of that unique bistro.

He said he met Billy's mom the first week after he bought the Flora-Bama and she told him she was going to tell Billy to be nice to him.

"Then I meet this very imposing man, and the first thing he asks me is if I have insurance. I said, 'sure I have insurance on the place,' and he said he meant insurance for broken legs. We became great friends. He was a wonderful pal to have on your side."

Gilchrist said he once asked Billy to back him up while he tried to calm down a group of rowdies at the 'Bama if his first plan - buying them all a drink - did not work. He said Billy left and came back wearing a trench coat into which he sewed pockets that held a knife, a pistol and a sawed off shotgun.

"I was standing behind him and just saw him open the coat," Gilchrist said. "End of problem. I know this. It was always good to have Billy as your sponsor."

Billy Walker was the toughest man on an island that was full of them in the 1970's. But I have never heard him referred to as a bully and I've heard numerous stories about him standing up for his friends and fellow Islanders who were not as big and tough.

"If he befriended you, he was warm and kind," said Callaway, a player on Pleasure Island's first youth football team

"There was talk on the school bus about forming a football team on the island, but you had to be 70 lbs. to play," Callaway said. "All the other kids on the bus were teasing me about only being 49 lbs. When I got home, I was all bummed out, and daddy (Ray) asked me what was wrong. I told him about the football team, and daddy said to just call Billy up. I didn't even think to do that. But I did call, and Billy was just as sweet as he could be. He said I could play for him anytime. He didn't care how much I weighed."

Callaway, who eventually would own Billy's boat, The Sea Duster, said even after he joined the Orange Beach charter fleet, Billy looked out for him.

"The captains used to pull into the Gulf Gate Lodge between trips and grab lunch. This was during my rock 'n roll years, and I had long hair," Callaway said. "The other captains were kidding me about my long hair and asking me where my dress was when Billy said that every SOB in the place that doesn't like Earl's hair should put their hands up. Well, of course, none of them would do it."

Margaret Childress Long, Orange Beach's official historian, used to take the school bus from Orange Beach to Foley with Billy. "I was in the first grade, and Eleanor Lauder was the school bus driver. We had a small bus. Did not have enough students for a big bus until "59. Some of the Walker cousins got into a fight in the back of the bus and started hitting each other and I heard someone say, 'I am going to jerk your arm off and beat you with the bloody end of it.' I got off the bus crying and ran up the hill to Brownie and Neil Lauder's home. Brownie called some of the Walker boys' mothers. Years later, I asked Billy if he was the one who said that. He said, 'Well, it probably was me because that was one of my favorite statements.'

"We moved here in '49," Long added. "My brother Foster Childress and James Huff always talked about how helpful Billy was with fishing tips. Billy was a great fisherman and nice to everyone. Just don't make him mad."

Gulf Shores native Joey Ward said on his facebook page that Billy was also his youth football coach, and he often fished with him on The Sea Duster.

"Over the years on the back of that old boat, I heard stories of great men and wild tales. They were stories of Gods. Bear Bryant, Kenny Stabler, Bobby Walker, Butch Frith, Mike Miceli, Niki Nguyen, the Callaways, Jerry Lowe - Coastal Outlaws in their time, bigger than life itself," he stated. "I even got to fish with members of the Alabama football team."

Billy was recruited to Alabama to play football, and like his great friend Kenny Stabler, who graduated from Foley High eight years later, he was a lifelong Tide fan. "He would reach around and hug you and make you feel like everything was going to be alright," said Zana Price, Billy's niece. "I can still picture the Thelma Ann or The Sea Duster coming into the marina - their motors purring. The smell of diesel fuel and fish being cleaned and the salt air. It puts you right back in time." As Zana notes (right), Billy was born into a fishing family. His father, Rufus, died when he slipped and broke his neck while trying to surf a wave through Perdido Pass on the Sea Duster, a classic black cyprus boat, commissioned in 1935 for Rufus, and built by Daniel Callaway on land near where Orange Beach Baptist Church parishioners now worship.

A historical marker at Perdido Pass states that the Callaways and the Walkers were among the island's first settlers. Lemuel Walker Sr. arrived around 1865, and his son, Lemuel Jr., moved here to take care of his aging father in the 1890's. The Walkers and the Call aways worked together to develop the region's first community center and established both mail service and the charter fishing industry on the island. Roland Walker Sr. was one of the first fisherman to experiment with artificial reefs and was instrumental in gaining state support for artificial reef construction. Callaways and Walkers dug a ditch through dunes connecting Terry Cove and the Gulf that blew open and created Perdido Pass after the hurricane of September 27, 1906. Maybe a year ago, I was shopping in the Gulf Shores Winn-Dixie when a lady asked me where she could find one of the "In Mullet We Trust" shirts I was wearing, as her husband loved to mullet fish.

The lady introduced herself as Lois Gale Walker, and I told her it was a pleasure to finally meet the main character in my all-time favorite Flora-Bama story. Lois Gale said when she learned the story I referenced was in Kenny Stabler's early 1970's autobiography, she ran around Baldwin County trying to buy up all the copies. Gilchrist even has a name for the story: The Battle at the 'Bama.

As Gilchrist tells it, Billy and Lois Gale were at the Flora-Bama back in the early 1970's when a group of men made comments that Billy found inappropriate. A fight ensued, with all five of the men piling on top of Billy. Seeing her husband in peril, Lois Gale jumped on one man's back. The man's thumb ended up near Billy's mouth, and the commotion that followed allowed Billy to free himself and whip all five of his opponents. Because he won the fight and there was a severed extremity to be accounted for, Billy ended up in court. The judge called Lois Gale to the witness stand to ask her if she saw Billy bite the man's thumb off. "No Sir, but I did see him spit it out," she answered.

## Rest In Peace Capt. Billy Walker

Billy and Lois Gale were high school sweethearts, he a Foley High star football player and she a cheerleader. They were truly soul mates.

Billy contributed much to the local color of Pleasure Island over the years. Billy Walker's roots ran deep as a third generation Walker fishermen. He was intrical in the development of the Charter Fishing industry development and had a reputation as being the best.

His parents Rufus E. and Emma Willis Walker and brother Rufus "Bo" Walker preceded him in death. Lois Gale and Billy have two children Guy Rufus Walker and Billy Gene. Their grandchildren and great grandchildren both biological and through marriage are numerous. Billy was considered to be a father or grandfather influence to many over the years.

He was larger than life. When he walked into a room, his booming voice and magnetic personality filled that room. Billy was always willing to offer a helping hand to anyone in need. He had a generous heart to go with his big stature. When he gave you a hug or a handshake you knew it was genuine. He is to be cremated and his ashes spread into the Gulf of Mexico. There will be a memorial at a later date to be announced.

Editor's Note: Lois Gayle Walker is Zana Price's daddy's younger sister. Billy Walker walked the aisle with Zana when she married in 1970.













Perdido Key — The 166 active listings come in all sizes, shapes and amenities and range in price from \$145K-3.495M. A wide variety of views and locations are available such as gulf-front condominiums and Intra-coastal waterfront homes. Townhome/duplex inventory is extremely limited! The Meridian luxury gulf-front condominiums are expected to break ground in the first quarter of 2019. The 3, 4 and 5BR units will include fitness spaces, covered parking, multiple pools and private elevator lobbies. Pre-construction pricing from \$850K-2.65M is available and roughly one-third of the 81 units are already reserved.

Orange Beach — Out of 479 active listings, 344 are condominiums with direct gulf-front and non-waterfront options ranging in price from \$159K-3.299M. 



# GULF SHORES SWIM TEAM 2ND AT GCAAL CHAMPIONSHIP

The Gulf Shores Swim Team hosted the end of the season Gulf Coast Area Aquatic League (GCAAL) Championship Swim Meet at the Bodenhamer Center on July 27-28. The 307 swimmers represented eight area teams and competed in 136 events over the two-day meet.

The Gulf Shores Dolphins placed second in the First Division of the league. The final scores in the First Division were 4,098.5 for the Fairhope Area Swim Team, 2,979.5 for the Gulf Shores Dolphins and 2,057 for the Eastern Shores Piranhas. The Foley Sea Lions won the Second Division and Brewton Local Area Swim Team won the Third Division.

Gulf Shores had 67 swimmers compete in the meet with 20 swimmers winning recognition for high point achievements in their age group. High point winners for the Dolphins were: Murray Reed, Nolan Matthews, Ryland Elam, Jack Biggs, Ruby Rosnagle, Joseph Zaurzar and Macy Manni. Gulf Shores had five high point first runner ups. These were: Serah Smith, Liam Silva, Cooper Hopkins, Liam Bickham, and Kimberly Lee. Dolphins winning the second runner-up award include: Bradley Bledsoe, Layne Reid, Emma Lloyd, Nora Malone, Mae Margaret Reed, Gabe Schroeder, Callie Hopkins and Beck Fitzgibbons.

Ten-year-old Murray Reed was named Male Swimmer of the Year at the conclusion of the swim meet. He won all five of his individual events and set new league meet records in four of his races. One record broken of special note was the 100-yard Individual Medley record that had stood since 1980. Murray received plaques for each of his record-setting swims, and his name will be listed as the record holder of the event in the meet programs going forward.

Nine-year-old Jack Biggs set new league records in the 25-yard Breaststroke and the 25 Butterfly. He also won all five of his races. During the meet, Biggs and Reed teamed up with Cooper Hopkins and Henry Brereton to win the 200-yard Freestyle relay and finish second in the 100 Medley relay for the 9-10 boys age group.

The relay events were a great source of points for Gulf Shores at the meet. Of the 22 relay events that were contested, the Dolphins had entries in 21 of the races. Gulf Shores won six relay events and finished in second place in another nine relay events. For the entire meet, Gulf Shores won 44 of the 136 events.

The swim team is taking their end-of-summer break at this time and will resume practice on Sept. 4. That date will begin the fall "swimester" for the team and run through the Christmas break.


