

#### PATRIOT DAY SPECIAL TRIBUTE SEPT. 9

Gulf Shores American Legion Post 44 will observe Patriot Day and National Day of Service and Remembrance with a special tribute on Sunday, September 9 at 4 p.m. All veterans, first responders, their families and the community are invited to this special tribute. The service will begin with a fire service tradition that dates to the mid-1800s. Long before radios, pagers or fire alarms, daily announcements were sent from headquarters to firehouses by a system of bell commands and telegraph. When a firefighter died in the line of duty, headquarters would transmit five bell strikes, repeated in four series. This custom has continued through the years to this day. It is a form of rendering final honors to departed comrades. In the fire service this is known as

On Sept. 11, 2001, more than 3,000 innocent men, women and children lost their lives that day, when four hijacked airliners were used as weapons of mass destruction.

You Are Not Forgotten—that's the central phrase behind POW/MIA Recognition Day, a day to honor the sacrifices made by America's prisoners of war, those who are still missing in action and their families. The point of POW/MIA Recognition Day is to ensure that Americans remember to stand behind those who serve and to make sure we do everything we can to account for those who have never returned. According to the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency (DPAA), 82,368 Americans are still considered missing, including 72,934 from World War II; 7,704 from the Korean War; 1,598 from Vietnam; 126 from the Cold War; and six from the Gulf Wars and other conflicts.

"This program serves as our dedication to keep this cause in the forefront of the minds of all Americans," said Donna K. Stacey, Past State commander of The American Legion and member of Post 44. "Although forensic science has improved significantly over the recent decades, time and the mortality of battle-site witnesses and surviving relatives add to the challenge to ensure we have a full accounting and repatriation of remains of our fallen U.S. service members lost in war."

# Gulf State Park Lodge projected opening is Nov. 1

# Living campus, interpretive center, new trails will be a game-changer for 6,125-acre park

Gary Ellis was adjusting to retirement when a call from the Alabama Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (ADCNR) promptly changed his plans. Instead of a life of leisure, Ellis soon found himself embarking on one of the most fascinating challenges of his career. "I'm flattered to be asked to lend my talents on what I believe will be a historic project for the state of Alabama," Ellis said.

Gulf State Park will be an international benchmark for environmental and economic sustainability demonstrating best practices for outdoor recreation, education, and hospitable accommodations.

Ellis, who retired in 2016 from Compass Media, a company he founded 1986. was hired as the Director of Community Relations and Administration at Gulf State Park. His challenge is to support the implementation of the Gulf State Park mission statement:~Gulf State Park will be an international benchmark for environmental and economic sustainability demonstrating best practices for outdoor recreation, education, and hospitable accommodations.~

This nearly 5-year vision is nearing completion with an extensive revival of a new lodge and state-of-the-art facilities that are scheduled to open later this year. "This is not just a pre-

mium hotel on the beach,"

Ellis said. "The entire entity of Gulf State Park – including The Lodge, Living Campus, the Interpretive Center, the new trails and improvements – will be a gamechanger for the state. We all can recall the reputation enhancements that occurred when the Robert Trent Jones Golf Trail was built. That was a game-changer. It changed a lot of perceptions about Alabamians and what we're about. Mercedes was another game-changer in what people believed and expected about our state.

"I believe Gulf State Park will rank in those categories as enhancing the image of Alabama and further communicating what wonderful resources we have. I'm excited to see that. The new lodge should draw not only from Alabama but all over the United States. We'll also be appealing to international visitation. The work and strategic thinking that have gone into this will put us in a different playing field other than just a resort hotel on the beach. This is much bigger when you bundle all of this together and you think about the magnitude of the experiences available."

The official name of the hotel and conference center is The Lodge at Gulf State Park, a Hilton Hotel. Obviously, Hilton will handle The Lodge booking. Valor Hospitality was hired to open the hotel and manage the new park enhancements, the Interpretive Center and Learning Campus. Ellis' role is connecting the surrounding communities and Gulf State Park together with the new lodge and enhancements as well as managing the other facets of the 6,125-acre park.

"I just had lunch with the general manager and regional director for Valor Hospitality," Ellis said. "They are moving along quite rapidly. It's a full-court press right now. We are projecting an opening for November 1. "We've been getting a lot of interest and a lot of good feedback that people are excited to replace the old lodge and bring on the fresh new opportunity for leisure travelers as well as the meeting and convention travelers."

When Hurricane Ivan destroyed the old lodge and convention center in 2004, the Alabama Gulf Coast was left lacking facilities large enough to host any sizeable conventions or conferences. Ellis said Alabama soon should get a great deal of that business back.

"During the time we didn't have a lodge, we had the campground, cabins and cottages," he said. "Those were our only accommodations. What we were missing out on was that conference and convention business that had gone elsewhere. And it was not elsewhere in Alabama. We lost a tremendous amount of business to northwest Florida, places like Sandestin and that area."

"I don't think anybody was comfortable with Alabama state associations meeting out of state, so this gives them an opportunity to keep their money at home and invest it in our own neighborhoods. A lot of the state associations rotate locations around the state. We just didn't have the accommodations for the scale and size of those meetings, but now we will."

The Lodge will accommodate up to 1,000 people for conferences and conventions with a 350-room hotel that includes 20 suites. The beach-view ballroom is 12,160 square feet with an adjacent 7,500-square-foot outdoor terrace, and several other smaller meeting and conference rooms are available. A Gulf-front pool will have a pool bar and grill, while a Gulf-front restaurant will have terrace seating and a private dining room that will serve house-prepared dishes sourced from regional suppliers, including fresh Alabama Gulf Seafood.

Obviously, a 350-room hotel is not large enough to house a 1,000-person convention, but Ellis said that was by design so that the hotels and condominiums in the surrounding communities would benefit from the overflow.

The Lodge, Interpretive Center and Learning Campus are being constructed under LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) protocols. The Interpretive Center is pursuing certification under the Living Building Challenge, a designation currently afforded to only 16 buildings in the world.

"The thing so unique about Gulf State Park is it's being built on a smaller footprint than previously existed," Ellis said. "They are using every environmental standard possible from design and construction work but also from the operation perspective, such as some of the principles they are using for recycling water.

"One thing I found intriguing is the day I went by the construction site where they were busting sheetrock,

grinding it up to be trucked to farms in middle Baldwin County to be used as lime supplement. This practice not only minimizes waste, but also makes use of reclaimed materials. Not only is it following LEED principles, it's also doing something the Alabama Gulf Coast has never seen before."

Ellis said the new facilities will benefit the Alabama Gulf Coast economy during the traditional so-called "shoulder seasons" that fall outside the normal summertime peak usage.

"This will help us with our seasonality challenges," he said. "For about 75 days out of the year, we're doing really well; everybody's happy. But that leaves a lot of other months that we need to balance out our seasonality and build towards a year-round economy. We should appeal to the niche environmental groups that travel, young couples and individual travelers. A lot of them like to travel in the spring and fall.

"The new and improved Gulf State Park and all its entities will hopefully help smooth out those ebbs and flows in business."

Ellis said The Lodge is designed to meet the needs of families on vacation, corporate travelers and convention delegates, with a soft opening planned for sometime in November. Hilton will start accepting reservations "on or after" January 1, 2019. Visit mygulfstatepark.com for more information about other opportunities at the park.

With its 3 miles of sugar-sand beaches, Gulf State Park was recently recognized as the 2018 Attraction of the Year by the Alabama Tourism Department.

"Gulf State Park is one of the jewels of our entire Parks system," said Conservation Commissioner Chris Blankenship. "We're honored to receive the award from Alabama Tourism, and we expect next year will be even better with the opening of the The Lodge at Gulf State Park."

"When you consider the Space and Rocket Center, Bellingrath Gardens and the USS Alabama Battleship, The Civil Rights Institute, we are thrilled to be recognized, and the timing is great," Ellis added.

State Parks Director Greg Lein pointed out that Gulf State Park was inducted into the TripAdvisor Hall of Fame for receiving such awards for five consecutive years."

With the new facilities coming online soon, Ellis finds it difficult to subdue his excitement.

"There's nothing but a bright future ahead of us with many wonderful things coming," he said. "It's a great honor for the staff here. Bundled together, we have some incredible experiences that we can deliver – from nature, hiking and biking and great beaches all the way to luxury lodging, honeymoons and weddings as well as regional and national conferences.

"This is something Alabama will be very, very proud of." **Pictured**: The Gulf State Park's new conference center offers a spectacular view of the Gulf of Mexico. 

# O.B.'s burgeoning population is taxing city resources

It's a fact of life that Orange Beach is growing in leaps and bounds with new homes sprouting in formerly empty lots all over East Orange Beach. Combine that with several subdivisions building houses or permitted for houses, two townhouse developments underway and two condo towers under construction and two more approved it is beginning to stretch city services.

"It's grown and we're busting out at the seams," Councilman Jeff Silvers said

"We'll have to build two new fire stations, expand the police station. We have a very long list of improvements."

One of the places it's most evident is the recreation center and the adjoining tennis and aquatic centers. "We have had numerous workshops about our recre-

ation center complex," Silvers said. "We have met with some architects and different firms and we're going to use a couple of those firms to come up with a comprehensive plan for that whole rec center, swim center. We'll have some exciting plans to show people real soon."

But that's not the only area where the burgeoning population is taxing city resources, Mayor Tony Kennon said.

"With our growth, we've outgrown our city services to a great degree and we've got to get caught up," Kennon said. "We'll have to build two new fire stations, expand the police station. We have a very long list of improvements."

With recreation center complex, City Administrator Ken Grimes said the pressing needs there are another gym and larger play areas for children particularly those in Camp Sunshine.

"The top priority is an additional gymnasium with a full-size court," Grimes said. "And Camp Sunshine is in a building that is not near big enough because we've been renting a portable for a few years."

He said the city has been looking at changes there for years and the new Orange Beach middle and high school plans had a big impact on starting a new recreation plan.

"Now that the school board is obviously moving forward with seventh and eighth grade and on the high school at a different location that freed us up to say what do we want the rec complex to be," Grimes said. "Once we got the school project underway, we started talking about the recreation complex."

Grimes said the city is going to study having a splash pad on the campus as well as a walking path around the perimeter, among other amenities.

The first step, Grimes said, is finding the right design team. There are about three candidates currently working on presentations. Those plans could include a total redo or just some refurbishing of current facilities or even relocation.

"Anything is subject to relocated, renovated or expanded and the reason is we want to keep all those activities close together," Grimes said. "But we don't know if we have enough property to make that happen without something going away."

Orange Beach started out with nine teams and has narrowed it down to three, Lathan and Associates from Hoover, David Architects in Birmingham and Sted McCollough in Orange Beach. Grimes said local contractors would likely end up getting sub-contracts on parts of the project.

On the new fire stations, Grimes said the city would like to replace the modular buildings at The Wharf that housed the former sales office. Station 1 behind City Hall would be expanded to house the resident firefighters and build bays to allow drive-through access for trucks. Orange Beach is also looking at remodeling or rebuilding the fire administration building to the south of Station 1. Grimes said it was the former police department and is not a good set up for fire administration.

On the police side, Grimes said the police department part of the Justice Center is inadequate to house the number of officers the city now employs. The city plans to study how to expand it or build annex buildings on surrounding property the city owns.

Plans are in the works to move the Coastal Resources office to a new facility at the old Walker Marina site east of Sportsman Marina.

In January, the council announced two firms would be hired to design and get the permitting settled to improve the boat basin with some covered slips, seawall, boat ramp and an office and storage building. The cost of this initial project at the property will be about \$1.5 million, Coastal Resources Director Phillip West said.

Orange Beach is also studying plans to have a research center on the property for universities to use for marine studies. To that end, West said, Auburn is going through the RESTORE Act process trying to secure about \$9 million to build a 20,000- to 25,000-square foot research facility on the property.

During the regular session the council: • Gave final approval of a planned unit development by Brett Robinson to build Phoenix Gulf Towers on the Gulf at the west end of town. It'll contain 192 units combined in two 26-story towers.

• Approved a pair of special events retail liquor license application for Event Concessions, Inc., for "The Wharf Uncorked Wine and Culinary Event" for events on Sept. 13 and Sept. 15.

• Passed a resolution authorizing land transfer and easements with the Alabama Department of Conservation and Natural Resources. When the city's new wastewater treatment was built it was accidentally built on a Gulf State Park parcel next to a city parcel. The city and the park basically swapped the parcels.

• Passed a resolution authorizing the removal of a sailboat stuck on the beach

in the western part of the city. It was actually removed on Aug. 20 after having been stranded on the beach for about a month.

During the work session the council also discussed:

• A resolution awarding the bid for equipment and installation of a Fire Break Force Main. Bids will be opened on Aug. 30

• A resolution awarding the bid for a new sign for the Coastal Arts Center at Orange Beach. Bids will be opened on Aug. 30

• A resolution awarding the bid for Sportsplex fencing. Bids will be opened on Aug. 30

• A resolution to correct a scrivener's error in an agreement with the Alabama Department of Transportation for the State to transfer a portion of Highway 180 (Canal Road) to the city.

• A resolution declaring city property surplus and to be sold on govdeals.com. Included are three cars, a pickup truck, two jet skis and a variety of other items including two refrigerators.

• Setting a public hearing for the Gulf Stream planned unit development. The developer seeks to change the exterior to vinyl veneer.



#### OBPD promotes Cpl. Brian Kincaid, Sgt. Jeremy Mote and Sgt. Bryan Johnson

Orange Beach Police Chief Joe Fierro announced promotions for Cpl. Brian Kincaid, Sgt. Jeremy Mote and Sgt. Bryan Johnson during the City Council meeting on Tuesday, Aug. 21. Chief Fierro said **Cpl. Kincaid** served with the U.S. Marine Corps for six years, earned a bachelor of science degree from Auburn University, worked for two years as a corrections officer in Tuscaloosa County before working for 10 years at the Northport Police Department. At Northport PD, Cpl. Kincaid served as a firearms instructor, investigator and patrol officer.

"He relocated down here to Orange Beach in 2016 with his wife Emily and his daughter, and now they have two daughters," Chief Fierro said. "He was promoted to corporal in July of this year and as you can see he brings a lot of experience with him. He is part of our leadership team."

**Sgt.** Mote began his career in Georgia as a dispatcher and then a corrections officer with the Rockdale County Sheriff's Office in Conyers, Georgia for four years, Chief Fierro said.

"He received his police certification in Georgia and for 11 years he served as a deputy," Chief Fierro said. "He is now a sergeant with us, a training coordinator for the department and he has done some instructing for us. He relocated here permanently after we hired him in November 2016. He is now on our SWAT team, and he's a defensive tactics instructor."

**Sgt. Bryan Johnson** began his career in 1996 in Dickson, Tennessee, Chief Fierro said. "He was a canine handler there, a detective, shift patrol officer and he served two years as the chief," Fierro said. "He moved here in 2011."

Sgt. Johnson worked at the Gulf Shores Police Department before moving over to Orange Beach PD in 2014.

"He earned the rank of corporal in 2017 and we just promoted him to sergeant," Chief Fierro said. "He is our canine coordinator as well."

# City working on habitat plan for 836 acres near Oyster Bay

#### Planning Commission will then have a special-called regular session meeting to deal with Regency Place

Two properties near Oyster Bay, a total of 836 acres, in Gulf Shores will someday have amenities to allow the public to explore the natural beauty of these wetlands.

"Our plan is for it to come sort of a nature preserve and to provide some public access for passive recreation," Environmental/Grants Coordinator Dan Bond told the city council in its Aug. 20 meeting. "Ulti-

But first things first. The council agreed on Aug. 27 to pay Volkert \$191,000 to develop a Habitat Management plan for the land. There is a 466-acre tract north of the Intracoastal Waterway and south of the Bon Secour River and a 370-acre tract is south of the waterway and borders

Oyster Bay. Also, during the meeting, the council talked about setting dates for public hearings on the controversial Regency Place Apartments and extending eight-foot sidewalks and

four-foot bicycle paths westward on beach road from West Sixth Street to West Lagoon Avenue.

Bond said the preliminary work on the two preserves is still underway and the public access will come later.

"It's about a yearlong process," Bond said. "It will involve a lot of field work and there will be public input sessions and community outreach. This plan that we're working on right now is about the habitat and restoration and management of the natural resources. It will determine endangered species and how we want to best manage the resources that are there. It's comprehensive management for the properties."

Bond said the grant is part of the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation Gulf Benefit Fund the city received in 2016. The acquisitions cost \$7.6 million, with about \$700,000 for environmental assessments and planning. An additional \$775,000 is available to conduct the restoration work once the management plan is complete.

"It's mostly wetland and it ranges from pine savannah-type wetlands to intertidal marshes or brackish marshes," Bond said. "There's a lot of diversity in the habitat."

Some of the boots-on-the-ground work has already been done, Bond said with some more still to be completed. The goal of all the work is getting the plan on paper to guide the next phases.

"A few months back we've already conducted wetland delineation and some of the wildlife surveys and things," Bond said. "We've already started going a lot of the work. This is the actual creation of the document that we use to guide the management of this property."

Over the south side of Little Lagoon, a similar project and a fishing pier are still in preliminary stages. One is to take over a 53-acre parcel at the west end of the lagoon and is to include a boardwalk, fishing pier, bathhouse and restrooms, parking and a kayak launch.

The state is supposed to buy the parcel from the Erie Meyer Foundation and turn it over to the city to manage construction of the amenities.

"That's still going on between the state and property owners," Bond said. "They still haven't worked that out yet. We're still interested in having a part to it and look forward to protecting that property as well."

A city plan to put a fishing pier at Little Lagoon park east of the pass is on hold waiting for final permitting to come through before the work can begin, Bond said.

#### **REGENCY PLACE APARTMENTS**

The city is planning on having two meetings specifically dealing with the controversial apartments project. One, Planning Director Andy Bauer said, will be a work session where Bauer and staff will make a presentation on their findings.

"Specific to the work session the city staff will prepare and present written recommendations as to the findings and conclusions as required under section 3-3 of the zoning ordinance," Bauer said. "The work session will include an opportunity on comment on the recommended findings and conclusions by the applicant and the public. No formal action by the Planning Commission will be considered at the work session."

The Planning Commission will then have a specialcalled regular session meeting to deal specifically with Regency Place.

"At this point city staff is still working with the Planning Commission to schedule these meetings," Bauer said. "We will be happy to provide notice to all the property owners that we can. We have an email list of about 20 residents and anyone who hasn't signed up previously please sign up.

"The city will not issue any building permit and land disturbance permit on this application until the Planning Commission has taken action on Regency Place."

#### NEW BEACH ROAD SIDEWALKS

When the work on beach road sidewalks for Alabama 182, or beach road, the plan included going from Gulf State Park to West Lagoon Avenue, Public Works Director Mark Acreman said. But the westernmost part, West Sixth Street to West Lagoon, was removed.

"This particular phase would have been included however we were able to get a TAP grant from the DOT that will pay up to \$500,000 toward the sidewalk improvements," Acreman said.

To take advantage of the grant money the western part of the project was held up to get the Transportation Alternatives Project money. The council awarded a bid on the project for \$409,000 to McElhenney Construction. Acreman said the 2018 city budget provided for \$500,000 for this part of the project but it will now be 80 percent funded by the grant.

Gulf Shores will provide a 20 percent match to receive the grant.

#### COASTAL CLEANUP

The council approved an assembly permit for the 31st annual Coastal Cleanup. Gulf Shores will have collection sites at the west end of Gulf Place near the public safety building and at Moe's Landing on the north side of Little Lagoon. The cleanup is from 8 a.m.-noon and volunteers will be served refreshments including hot dogs at the Gulf Shores locations.

Other South Baldwin collection stations include Boggy Point boat launch and Cotton Bayou Beach Access and Ono Island in Orange Beach, on the Bon Secour River, the Flora-Bama, Pirate's Cove, Wolf Bay, Weeks Bay and Perdido Beach.

According to the People Against a Littered State website more than 87,000 people have volunteered to help with the cleanup since it began in 1987 and more than 1.6 million pounds have been removed. For more information visit alabamacoastalcleanup.com/.

# O.B. group hopes to expand cat neuter program to include 20 acre shelter for abandoned felines

The new cat effort of trap, neuter and release has been wildly successful through the Orange Beach Animal Care and Control Program. More than 200 cats have been through the program, neutered and released again. Most those are feral cats who live basically in the wild.

"Since Orange Beach has had so much success with the TNR program – we've altered 215 cats so far," Orange Beach Animal Control Officer Tom

"We need to get a grassroots group to just sit down and say are we really looking at the right thing, what can we do, how can this happen? And what do we need to do to make it happen if it is the right thing?"

Conerly said. "There's six in waiting on Canal Road right now so we'll be above 220 just since September."

But the groups' members have a much bigger vision than just a successful TNR program. Board members Conerly, Stephanie Christie, Connie Brown, Denice Beicker, Catherine McInnis, Marcella Jones and others get together often to discuss the next step for animal control not only in Orange Beach but in the south part of Baldwin County, a shelter capable of taking in cats.

"We need about 20

acres or at least 20 acres," Conerly said. "To me, it's ridiculous for this community to be where we don't have a place for cats go. The county shelter won't take cats."

Conerly says five kittens were abandoned at a beachfront condo and the maintenance man didn't know what to do with them. And, the OBACCP had nowhere to shelter them until adoptions could be arranged.

"All of our fosters are full, Canal Road is full already and Magnolia is loaded up as well," Conerly said. "Why are we in that kind of situation in Orange Beach being the kind of community we are in Orange Beach and Gulf Shores? Why are we in that position? We should not be in that position here.'

The group is busy getting together a plan to form a nonprofit, hoping to secure that 20 acres and exploring relationships with like-minded animal lovers in south Baldwin County.

"We're trying to get enough people starting a 501(c)3 and try to get enough people down here to say there's enough interest, wealth, resources and band them together and we ought to be able to do something other than just killing them or poison them or whatever," Jones said. "And not just cats but dogs and everything. How do we bring in the right people and what resources and what do they bring to the table."

Many questions remain unanswered as the group searches for a way to make it happen.

"What are we looking for, where do we want it, where's the land for a shelter and that sort of thing," Jones said.

The OBACCP is already helping Gulf Shores start its own TNR effort and looking for partners there to help with the shelter effort.

"We've been helping Gulf Shores start a TNR program," Conerly said. "As part of that we've started the idea of this area shelter/sanctuary or retirement home for pets. There's a lot of excitement over there for the same thing."

They are also excited about the possibilities the Auburn campus will bring with its veterinarian program at County Road 8 and the Foley Beach Express.

"We have a call with the dean of veterinarian medicine for Auburn to talk about their involvement," Conerly said. "Not only with the TNR part, which is a win-win for them because they are unowned cats, basically, if we can get organized and have a Sunday a month like Operation Catnip in Florida. One Sunday a month they say they're going to have a spay-neuter day they will do 200 or 300 in a day."

And it gives the University of Florida veterinary students practical experience. Conerly hopes a similar relationship can develop with the Auburn campus here.

"We will have the same resources here," Conerly said. "We'll have the vet referral center here by Auburn going in and it should be operational very soon. They'll have an internal medicine guy that's going to come down to staff it full time. Vet students will come down and rotate on two-week rotations."

Conerly has also been in touch with Dr. Forester over the vet tech program at Coastal Alabama Community College to get that school included and involved in the program.

"All of them could be involved in this shelter/sanctuary that we're talking about as part of their rotation getting their shelter medicine experience which is different that clinic medicine," Conerly said.

Conerly wants to build the "gold standard" of a sanctuary shelter with several components.

"You might have to have to relocate them to a place where they can live out their lives and you have the sanctuary part for that," he said. "You have the shelter for all animals, dogs and cats with full intake, guarantine intake, adoptions. There's a trend out there for retirement homes for pets for people who have to change living spaces or in an end-of-life situation. The pets can be transferred there and either adopted out or live out the rest of it's life in a cage-free environment."

But first things first and bringing people interested in furthering this goal together is the first step.

"We need to get a grassroots group to just sit down and say are we really looking at the right thing, what can we do, how can this happen?" Conerly said. "And what do we need to do to make it happen if it is the right thing?"

Before September 2017, officials in Orange Beach, Alabama, didn't have a procedure in place for addressing people's concerns about outdoor cats. Today, thanks to one man with a great idea and lots of grit, the city has a thriving Trap-Neuter-Return (TNR) program. The Orange Beach Animal Care and Control Program (OBACCP) has spayed or neutered more than 220 cats and kittens and adopted out many more in the past 11 months, and the amazing turnaround is due to the hard work of Tom Conerly, Orange Beach's newest animal control officer. Conerly, a former military colonel, began his work with TNR in January 2017 — after he and his wife spotted three kittens in their driveway. Three kittens became five, and then nine. MARINE SCIENCE ADVENTURES - FIELD TRIP OF A LIFETIME: Students from Alabama, Georgia and Mississippi, with from 40 - 80 participants at a time(students, teachers and parents), have partice ipated in Marine Science Adventures, a Gulf Shores based hands-on field trip where students observe, discuss and collect specimens in eight different marine ecosystems. Developed by Dr. John Simpson, the adventure includes a tour of historic Fort Morgan with a tour guide giving students an account of Fort Morgan history and a soldier's life during those times. Next stop is the salt water marshes and tidal pools, where the students learn that smelly, dead and decaying plants and animals called detritus are necessary for a healthy marine ecosystem. "What believe this than walk them through rather than point or the marshes," said Simpson. Students learn the importance of estuaries and why they are called nurseries of the sea. "Students are amazed at the small planktonic specimens we collect," said Simpson." The students stayed at the Gulf Shores Beach Retreat and participate in a beach environmental scavenger hunt and beach sculpture contest after dinner there. From the onset of the trip, student teams compete with each other during field trip and beach activities, and prizes are awarded. Student workbooks and specimen collections are given to the group to take back to the classroom. The students tour alligator Alley before they head back home. "There is no doubt in my mind that after this trip students have a better understanding and appreciation of the marine ecosystems and how important and vital each is to the survival of our oceans," said Simpson. 
