





Fish will fly from the Bama April 26-28 (full schedule on pages 32-33)

Flora-Bama's April 26-28 Mullet Toss weekend - officially The Interstate Mullet Toss & Gulf Coast's Greatest Beach Party - starts with the sold out Mullet Swing Golf Classic at Perdido Bay Golf Club on April 24 and continues through the weekend.

The Mullet Toss kick-off party is Thursday with a special engagement by "Big Earl" and a BBQ at the Yacht Club (across from the Flora-Bama on Ole River) from 5-9 pm.

Adult fish tossing on the 'Bama beach is from noon to 4 p.m. Friday through Sunday, with the kids' toss at 10 a.m. each day. Finals start each

day at 4 p.m. The \$15 per toss fee includes a t-shirt. Proceeds go to local char-

ities.
Cover charge to Flora-Bama begins at 9 a.m. each day from Friday through Sunday. Entry is \$10 per day for 21 and up and \$15 for 13-20 year olds, with 12 & under admitted free. The party is open to all ages until 6 p.m., at which point the vent is for those 21 and up.

Membership cards are good for entry to Flora-Bama for Mullet Toss. Cards are available online or at the door for \$45 and are good for the entire event. The bar will be cash only for bar sales on Thursday, Friday and Saturday, with plenty of ATM's available.

Tens of thousands of folks from throughout the nation & all walks of life will descend upon the crystal white

sands of the iconic roadhouse for the three day frenzy of food, fun and frivolity.

Originally conceived as an absurd and fun way to attract tourism dollars during the shoulder season, the 3k-day event is now one of the busiest weekends of the year, contributing over \$10 million to the local economy while raising funds for local youth charities, including

school education and prevention programs from the Community Drug & Alcohol Council. Each year, the event contributes over \$30,000 to local charities, especially youth organizations on both sides of the state line.

The main event consists of folks throwing a mullet, a mystical fish possessing a gizzard & one of the more plentiful and popular local fish, out of a 10-foot circle, from Perdido Key, Florida towards Orange Beach, Alabama.

The Miss Mullet bikini contest will be held under the Tent Stage at 3 p.m. on Friday and Saturday and offer over \$2,000 in cash and prizes each day. The top three finalists both days will qualify for the Grand Miss Flora-Bama Contest and a chance to win \$5,000 Labor Day weekend.

A male hot body contest will be held just prior to the bikini contest each day at 1 p.m.

Since this is the Flora-Bama, patrons will not have to venture far to hear music. More than 50 acts will share five stages.

Performers booked for the weekend include Electric Dawg, Jerry Jacobs Band, Magic Johnsons, Red Clay Strays, Oliver's Twist, Lucky Doggs, Hung Jury, River Dan Band, Whiskey River Band, Ben Jernigan Duo, Albert Simpson & John Kulinich, Perdido Brothers, Bruce Smelley, Jo Jo Pres, Wes Loper, the Famous Nameless and Dueling Pianos (See full music schedule on pages 32-33).

The four Flora-Bama eateries on campus - the Flora-Bama Yacht Club, the Flora-Bama Ole River Grill, The Tipsy Taco and the original Flora-Bama Lounge and Oyster Bar - will feature oysters, shrimp, oysters and Bama Burgers. The guys from the Mudbug Mafia will be serving crawfish all weekend.

Flora-Bama parking lots will be manned by local charities and youth sport groups. Due to heavy congestion, it is recommended that patrons take shuttles, which will be running at \$5 per head non-stop starting 7 a.m. Friday through Sunday. Pick up spots are the Publix parking lot in Orange Beach and the Winn-Dixie lot in Perdido Key. You can also call a taxi or Uber or Lyft.

There actually are rules for flinging mullets. Contestants must select a mullet from the water bucket themselves. No gloves, no sand coating and no loading up a mullet with ballast before flinging allowed.

All competitors must retrieve their own fish and return it to the water bucket. Stepping out of the circle before tossing or tossing the fish out of bounds are other nonos. Tossers have only one chance to qualify for the finals each day. Those who can manage to throw more than 100 ft. have a good chance of placing.

Tossing techniques are as varied as the contestants themselves. For most, the best strategy is to fold the fish and pretend like you are trying to gun down a runner at the plate from center field.

Longtime competitor Wes Durham said at a past Toss that he likes to give his fish a pre-flight sip of beer. "Food for flight," he called it.

Many Mullet Toss patrons will make condo and hotel reservations for 2020 while in town this year.

"They could come here on July 4th or Memorial Day or Labor Day. But they decide that something we created was going to be their weekend to have a party, and they come back every year," said Flora-Bama co-owner Pat McClellan.

"It's a tradition for a lot of people, and they respect that tradition and respect each other.

"We have less problems with crowds at the Mullet Toss than during the major holiday weekends," he added.

The Interstate Mullet Toss has been written up in the Wall Street Journal and hundreds of other major newspapers around the country. The event was also featured in Sports Illustrated.



Annual commemoration for Private Rosamond Johnson May 4 Honoring the first Escambia County resident killed in action during the Korean War

The annual commemoration and wreath laying ceremony for Private Rosamond Johnson will take place on Saturday, May 4 at 10 a.m. at Johnson Beach, the Perdido Key area of the Gulf Islands National Seashore named in honor of the Korean War hero.

Private Johnson was the first Escambia County resident killed in action during the Korean War. The event is open to the public and all are encourage to attend.

Dan Brown, Gulf Islands National Seashore Superintendent will be the keynote speaker. Brown will be joined by members of Private Johnson's family. The sponsoring Perdido Key Chamber has secured the NATTC Color Guard, vocal group, and bugler for the event.

The ceremony, co-sponsored by the Johnson Beach Society and the Florida Black Chamber of Commerce, will conclude with a wreath lying ceremony at the Johnson monument. There is an entrance fee waiver in place for this day for several locations in Private Rosamond Johnson's honor.

Rosamond Johnson enlisted in the U.S. Army at 15, and died in combat two years later on the Korean Peninsula.

While engaged with the enemy, on July 26, 1950, Private Johnson carried two wounded soldiers to safety. He was fatally wounded while attempting to save a third wounded man.

On August 21, 1950, Rosamond was posthumously awarded the Purple Heart for the wounds he sustained while saving his fellow soldiers.

When Private Johnson died in 1950, Pensacola beaches were racially segregated, with areas of Perdido Key regulated for African-Americans. The Sunset Riding Club, which leased the land, declared the beach Rosamond Johnson Beach.

The area became protected as part of Gulf Islands National Seashore in 1971. The name was eventually retained and a monument and wayside honor to Private Johnson and his service to the United States of America was placed near the Johnson Beach Pavilion.

Johnson Beach is located within the Perdido Key Area of Gulf Islands National Seashore. It is open daily from dawn 'til dusk. There is normally an entrance fee for this area.



Stabler's friends included Flora-Bama owners Joe Gilchrist and John McInnis, and he was a regular at the Lounge on the Line before, during and after his NFL career. He often mentioned in interviews that the iconic bar was the "best watering hole in the country.'

Stabler was the first celebrity to ever participate in the Mullet Toss and the man who first brought Jimmy Buffett into the Flora-Bama.

Never one to ask for \emph{VIP} treatment, Stabler loved people and he appreciated

rather than shied away from attention.

"He tended to sit in the intersection of where most people were. He certainly didn't make an effort to get away from people," Gilchrist said.

"He did so many things to help our community." He used his celebrity to get the Mullet Toss started. He was willing to come out and throw the fish and be a person to help achieve some newsworthiness.'

Stabler's daughter Alexa, who grew up on Pleasure Island, told Bamainsider.com that she did not realize the impact that her dad had on people until he passed.

"When he passed, the number of letters the family received was staggering," she said. "I didn't realize his impact on people and how far-reaching he was until he was gone. People came out from all corners of the world, all demographics: men, women, young, old. They all reached out to us and it was

A national champion at Alabama, Stabler also quarterbacked the Raiders to victory in the 11th Super Bowl. He was the 1974 NFL Most Valuable Player and was named quarterback for the NFL 1970s All-Decade Team. Stabler was posthumously elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2016.

But for all of his success on the gridiron, maybe his greatest achievement was giving back through children's charities - specifically the Ronald Mc-Donald House.

Thanks to his efforts while serving as chairman of the XOXO Stabler Foundation, \$600,000 was raised for The Ronald McDonald House of Mobile. "Foley was blessed to have had him as part of our

community," said Foley Mayor John Koniar.

Stabler himself put it perfectly: "I think it's just all about children, anything that will benefit children," he said. "You think about a child who is sick and has to be in the hospital. He's not from the area and has to come, and the whole family has to come. They can't afford to stay in hotels and eat restaurant food and that sort of thing. It's just a great service. And again, it's all about children.'



"PIVC Beach Elite has been very successful in prior years with helping players reach the next level with athletes playing at Mercer University beach program and Spring Hill College beach program," Weaver said. 





"It is a signature event for showing off who we are and what we do." Full coverage from all five courts will be aired live by ESPN's family of networks. The championship match

will air on the main ESPN network Sunday, May 5.

Between matches, fans can enjoy activities such as autograph sessions with all eight participating teams and a championship fan zone with official championship merchandise, a social media tent, and courts for cornhole and giant jenga. An area near court #3 has been designated the games area, complete with buckets and shovels available for building sand castles.

Lodging tax hike to help city improve West Lagoon Ave.

Public Works Director Mark Acreman says its been a goal of Gulf Shores to make considerable improvements to West Lagoon Avenue, a road that branches off of State Route 182 just west of the Pier 33 Grocery.

"Unfortunately, we've just never had the capital funding to be able to undertake a project of this size as it relates to transportation as it would have utilized our entire multiple years' worth of resurfacing money," Acre-

But the approximately \$1.5 million project has finally been set in motion with the city council's approval April 22 of about \$130,000 to Fabre Engineering & Surveying to provide surveying, design and inspection services for massive upgrades to road. All thanks to the 2 percent added to the city lodging tax and earmarked for trans-

portation improvements.

"This is an over two-mile roadway and something we've had a lot of interest in over years from the citizens to undertake," Acreman said. "Because of the 2 percent lodging tax, which will be the funding source, we are able to undertake this project."

The roadway there is now pretty narrow but the city has a 100-foot right of way to widen it and provide five-foot bike lanes as well as an eight-foot multi-use trail on the south side of West Lagoon Avenue.

"This will be improving West Lagoon Avenue and connecting those improvements to our recently completed Little Lagoon parking lot, pier and multi-use trail including resurfacing the entire West Lagoon roadway," Acreman said.

As part of Faber's project, the company will see if a roundabout at the intersection of State Route 182 and West Lagoon Avenue would help traffic in that area.

"This would be something to kind of slow down the traffic and make the transition from a five-lane highway to a two-lane beach road as well as bring West Lagoon Avenue into that intersection," Acreman said. "It's a little cumbersome today. We've improved it with our sidewalk work but it still could be improved further."

Nearby utilities and the possibility of having to move them may be detriments to having a roundabout at the intersection.

"We're going to see if taking on this type of project is feasible and if we can do it because of utility conflicts, costs and the ability of the DOT to allow this work to move forward," Acreman said. "It's a very unique situation. I can't think of another location in the city where we have two roads coming together at this angle."

In other business, the council also:

• Accepted proposal from Week's Bay Foundation for the creation of two distinct conservation easements on the

Leary and Erie Hall Meyer properties acquired by the City in 2017 as part of the NFWF-funded Bon Secour/Oyster Bay Wetland Acquisition Project. The total cost for this work is \$74,950 and will be 100 percent reimbursed through the NFWF Grant.

• Received a copy of the Gulf Shores Police Department's annual report from Chief Ed Delmore. The report is also available on the city's website.

• Granted a franchise license to the new owners of Modern Limousine which plans to operate one vehicle with one driver.

• Accepted the annexation of three properties on County Road 6 who are interested in being a part of the city because of the formation of the city school system, city documents said. The parcels are at 16800 Nelson Lane owned by James and Mary Nelson, 4518 County Road 6 owned by Nelson Holdings and 4211 Alton Street listed as being owned by Rebecca Semone.

Canal Rd. widening project proceeding on schedule

State officials say about half of the work moving utilities to make way for a fifth lane on Canal Road is completed and they are hoping to let the project out for

"We're plugging along with the utility relocation out there on Canal," Assistant Southwest Region Engineer Brian Aaron said. "I'd say we're roughly 50 percent complete on that so we're going to continue to work through that over the next few months.'

Aaron said the Alabama Department of Transportation expects to have a bid letting on the widening project ready by June and looks to start construction as soon as the busy summer season subsides. He estimates it will take a year to complete the project.

"That's kind of by design because we really didn't want to hop out there in the busy summer season," Aaron said. "What we anticipate is we would start construction basically right after summer."

oAt first relocating power poles along the route was thought to be a big problem – and expense - but Aaron says the widening project will work around those.

"Most of the electricity is actually staying," Aaron said. "There's only a couple of large transmission poles that have to be moved out of the way. Each one of those poles are like \$200,000 apiece to move. It was going to be \$20 million to move all those poles. We actually went and got a design waiver so the poles are staying except for just a few of them."

Most of the utility relocation that is occurring is gas or fiber. The relocation of sewer and waterlines will be part of the road construction project, Aaron said.

A major change in the plans was caused by the coming reality of a Wolf Bay Bridge which will connect on the north side of the Canal Road and Alabama 161 intersection. How that intersection will be designed and developed is a separate project from the simple adding of a fifth lane.

"There's two projects down there and two phases and phase one is the actual five lane," Aaron said. "Phase two is improvement to that intersection."

"When we looked at that about three years ago Wolf Bay Bridge (rendering pictured) was on again, off again," Aaron said. "We just had to kind of make a decision based on the fact that Wolf Bay wasn't moving forward."

Part of that design included doing away with the Tom Thumb and other stores in the corner strip mall. Two southbound, free-flowing turn lanes were going to take out the businesses. The inevitability of the new bridge's impact on the intersection saved the stores there.

"Over the last month or month and a half, we've had discussions with the city," Aaron said. "They are moving forward on Wolf Bay with permitting. They are committed to moving forward on that job.

"What it forced us to do was really step back and say once Wolf Bay connects about five years from now, what does that do to this intersection with what we've planned with the Tom Thumb? And it doesn't work so we've stepped back and said we don't need to buy this right of way and we need to stop this acquisition.

State officials don't have a plan yet for intersection but one option on the table is a southern bypass along a right of way from the front of Big Mike's Steakhouse on Canal Road to south of McDonald's on Alabama 161.

"We're going to have to look at several alternatives," Aaron said. "We're basically going to have to start from scratch as regards to the NEPA process. We're going to have to evaluate alternatives which could include that bypass to the south.

NEPA is the National Environmental Policy Act and there is some potential wetland encroachment along that bypass route that could slow up the project.

There are so much wetlands it would delay us finishing by years," Orange Beach Mayor Tony Kennon said in July. "It could be as much as seven years to get that

Whatever the outcome, Aaron said, the intersection will be a big improvement over what's in place now.

"I think it's going to be better for traffic and to try and

get rid of that nasty intersection that's always a bottleneck or a problem," Aaron said. "We'll get two lanes free flowing south onto 161 down to the beach road and help facilitate that movement of traffic."

Brook's Center.

Gulf Shores Bridge Aaron says he believes the southern half of the project which includes the proposed Gulf Shores bridge over the Intracoastal Waterway (just west of The Wharf) will also go out for bid in June.

"We're on target to let that one in June as well," Aaron said. "The Corps permit as well as the Coast Guard permit, we're just waiting on those permits. Hopefully those will get issued in that time frame."

The second part of the project from the Foley Beach Express to Cotton Creek Drive is being held up by a redesign of the intersection of the express and the new

"It will be two lettings," Aaron said. "The first project that will be letting in June will be from Cotton Creek Drive or County Road 4 south and that includes the bridge over the canal. The next project we're probably looking at a September letting and it would be between the Beach Express and Cotton Creek Drive. We still have the latest change from the public meeting where we made the decision to go with the roundabout option. There were some additional right-of-way parcels we had to go acquire. We're currently in a right-of-way phase for that northern section."





A controversial figure of the Old West, Dr. John Henry Holliday - better known as "Doc Holliday - began his life in Georgia in 1851. He trained as a dentist before heading to the West. He suffered personally and professionally because of tuberculosis, and often supported himself as a gambler and dealer at card tables before the disease claimed his life.


Holliday is perhaps best remembered for a brief moment that made history. He was one of the gunmen at the O.K. Corral shootout in Tombstone, Arizona, on October 26, 1881. The gunfight lasted less than a minute but it's still remembered and frequently re-enacted more than 130 years later.

The managed shark-fishing events will allow for 15 anglers per occasion, with no more than one rod and reel per angler in use. Each angler may have one assistant. This allows for a maximum of 30 individuals on the octagon area during each event. Anglers are encouraged to assist one another while fishing.









Escambia Co. tweaks ordinance for no tresspassing signs to protect turtles

Escambia County released a sea turtle proteccion report about restrictions and guidance for the upcoming sea turtle nesting season that now include specific restrictions for no tresspassing

Through the Leave No Trace ordinance, it is illegal to leave personal property on any portion of the sandy gulf beach daily from sunset until sunrise. Additionally, any lawful "No Trespassing" signs on private property must meet regulations outlined in the Florida Statues and Escambia Ordinances by Wednesday, May 15.

Unlike Pensacola Beach, Perdido Key has privately owned beach areas that end at the mean tide line or the "wet sand" area, which is public property. Landowners of gulf front property on Perdido Key may lawfully post no trespassing signs. However, they must meet the provisions outlined in the Escambia Code of Ordinances.

- No trespassing signs are required to be placed not more than 500 feet apart along, and at each corner of the boundaries of the land.

- Private landowners may install up to 3 singlepost signs located at the base of the dune, midpoint of the beach, and at the southern corners of the property.

- Neighboring properties both intent to post their property, then a single-post with back-to-back signs should be utilized

Violations of the Leave No Trace ordinances

for Peredido Key and Pensacola Beach can be reported through the MyEscambia.com or by calling 850-595-1144.

The "leave no trace" ordinance also reminds beachfront residents to turn out lights this spring and summer. May is the beginning of sea turtle nesting season in Florida, with thousands of endangered turtles laying their eggs on Gulf Coast and Atlantic beaches until the season ends Octo-

Light pollution has a negative effect on sea turtles, causing hatchlings to become disoriented and head away from the Gulf of Mexico when they emerge from their nest. It is important not to disturb nesting females or hatchlings by using flashlights, flash photography or lanterns at night. Also close blinds and curtains in beachfront homes when interior lights are on at night.

After a day at the beach, fill any holes in the sand and knock down sand sculptures to remove obstacles blocking sea turtles' nesting activities. ** Remain at a distance from nesting sea turtles

and properly dispose of trash and discarded fishing gear. Sea turtles can become entangled in old fishing nets and lines or ingest plastic bags and wrappers, mistaking them for jellyfish.

Of course, remove personal belongings from the beach at the end of each day. Items such as Items such as umbrellas, tents, beach toys and chairs can not be left unattended overnight.

OPTIMIST CLUB OF PERDIDO BAY PRESENTS LAW ENFORCEMENT AWARDS: The Optimist Club of Perdido Bay has awarded the "Deputy Scott Ward Memorial Law Enforcement of the Year Award" to two Baldwin County officers, Orange Beach Sergeant Jeremy Mote and Corporal Andrew Ashton, a member of the Sheriff's Office Criminal Investigations Division. Sergeant Jeremy Mote was nominated for Courage and Heroism in the Line of Duty. He observed two swimmers in distress at Perdido Pass and swam with a rescue tube to them. He performed CPR on the rescue boat until more help arrived. Police Chief Joseph F. Fierro said Mote's quick action in assisting the two swimmers is "a credit not only to himself but all law enforcement." Although one of the swimmers later passed away some months later, "Officer Mote's actions provided the family with an opportunity to spend some valuable time with their family member prior to his untimely death," says Chief Fierro.

Corporal Andrew Ashton "has the unique ability to be an absolute advocate for victims, no matter the crime and he always puts their best interest ahead of anything else," says Sergeant Matt Morrison of the Baldwin County Sheriff's Office Criminal Investigations Division. In 2018 Corporal Ashton made 62 arrests on 48 felony7 charges and 14 misdemeanor charges. These cases included sex crimes for both adults and children, robberies, assaults, abuses, attempted murder and murder. Corporal Ashton's award was



We are finding out that we are playing to three generations of fans who have followed us and our music from day one. The fans are the ones responsible for our continued success on the road and we love them."

With a catalog that includes 43 No. 1 singles and a mind boggling 21 straight No. 1 songs, Alabama will be hard pressed to play all of the tunes that garnered them more than 178 CMA, Grammy and ACM awards, 21 gold, platinum and multiplatinum albums

and 75 million records sold.

But you can expect to hear "Can't Keep a Good Man Down," "If You're Going to Play in Texas (You Gotta Have a Fiddle in the Band)," "Tennessee River" and "Dixieland Delight."

"Born Country" and "Down Home" will also bring the band's loyal fans on their feet. Not to mention "Love in the First Degree," "The Closer You Get" and "Old Flame." Any five of those songs would make a fine career for any band, but the boys from Fort Payne are not just any band. They are among the best ever.




ter how stressful, he wanted to keep intact.

Show Support For Conservation With Boat Registration: Boat owners can now help support conservation efforts in Alabama when renewing their boat registration. First made available in 2018, the purchase of a distinctive $registration\ identification\ sticker\ for\ their\ vessels\ provides\ boaters\ the\ opportunity\ to$ help financially support certain college and university programs as well as state parks, the Forever Wild program and freshwater fisheries conservation in Alabama. The distinctive identification sticker, which is displayed on the bow of the vessel, is similar to the personalized license plate program for motorcycles, cars and trucks. The stickers are 4 ½ inches by 28 ¼ inches, display the vessel's registration number, and can be issued with a variety of Alabama university and college logos or feature one of three Alabama Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (ADCNR) designs including Alabama State Parks, Freshwater Fishing, and the Forever Wild Land Trust. However, unlike the car tag program, the sticker cannot be personalized. The cost of the distinctive identification sticker for boats is \$50 in addition to the regular vessel registration and county issuance fee. For each sticker sold, \$20 is allocated to ADCNR for the operation of Alabama's state parks. When purchasing one of the three ADCNR-themed stickers, that amount increases to \$40 with the additional \$20 being allocated to State Parks, Forever Wild or the ADCNR Fisheries Section, depending on which sticker is purchased. The distinctive identification sticker fee applies each year one is purchased. Available from probate offices throughout the state (either in person or online), the sticker is valid for one year from the date of purchase. Once purchased, the distinctive identification sticker is printed and mailed to the vessel owner usually arriving within one to two weeks. A new sticker will be issued for each year the registration is renewed. For more information about the availability of the distinctive vessel identification stickers, contact your local probate office. In addition to renewing their boat registration, boaters are reminded to always practice safety on the water including wearing a lifejacket. 

Historical marker honoring two major personalities unveiled in Fairhope

The City of Fairhope in concert with the Friends of the Fairhope Museum of History, achieved a milestone in its history with the recent unveiling of a historical marker recognizing two major personalities in Fairhope history.

Nancy Lewis, a widowed ex-Slave sold her homestead in 1895 to the Fairhope Industrial Association. Her acreage was a part of two-hundred acres bought by the Fairhope Founders and Mrs. Lewis having paid taxes on her homestead for many years and proving ownership, became a contributor to the settlement of the Single Tax experiment on the Bluff. She used \$4.58 of that payment to buy forty acres where Thomas Hospital stands today.

Frank Stewart, renowned as "Stewart the Picture Man" photographed a growing Fairhope for a quarter century. He came to Fairhope in 1903 and became popular for creating postcards for tourists and locals. His

pictures documented the day-to-day lives and struggles of moving to this new place some called Utopia.

Fairhope Mayor Karin Wilson hosted the unveiling and introduced Thelma Todd, a descendant of the Young and Lewis families, two of the several that settled in the area before the arrival of the Fairhope Founders. Todd led in a heart-warming prayer and read scripture connoting the trying times and the faith of her ancestors. She also expressed the gratitude to the City and the Friends of the Fairhope Museum of History for funding the historical landmark.

Local historian (and recently retired director of the Fairhope Museum of History) Dean Baarrett, told the story of the marker and the honorees' significance.

The Nancy Lewis homestead was located about 400 feet south the site of the marker and Stewart lived and worked about 300 feet west of the marker site.

According to Barrett, the marker had been a work-in-process for over two years. Researching the chain of title for the Lewis property required a study of Baldwin County deeds, Single Tax Corporation land purchases and tax records over the years. T

he Friends of the Fairhope Museum of History funded fabrication of the memorial. Mounting of the marker was arranged and performed by the Fairhope Public Utilities Department. The project is part of Fairhope's participation in the Alabama 200 Bicentennial.

Stewart came to the area in 1903 at the age of 48 years. He was an advocate of the Single Tax experiment and wanted to try farming nearby in Silverhill. He bought forty acres on Pole Cat Creek.

While there, he became interested in photography and captured images on glass plate negatives with a wooden box studio camera.

In 1913, he gave up farming and

moved to 105 South Section Street in Fairhope to pursue photography. He became known for novel postcards using paper that would allow a written message on one side and a Fairhope picture on the other.

After his wife Hattie died in 1934, he sold his business and remained in Fairhope until his death at the age of 87 in 1942.

He had kept his land on Pole Cat Creek and his great-grand niece still lives on that land. Stewart, known widely as the Picture Man, photographed the day-to-day lives and struggles of moving to this place called "Utopia."

The occasion of the placement of the Lewis – Stewart marker had an added charisma for the Lewis – Young family lineage.

Mildred Young and husband Larry Brown drove from Houston, Texas for the unveiling ceremony. Unknown to them, their married daughter, Tiffany Brown-Dominique, flew from Philadelphia to surprise them.

Shortly before the pomp of the formal unveiling, Tiffany walked across the green of the Coastal College campus and surprised her parents. The surprise arrival of another generation of Lewis's made the day even more special.








