# NAIA track back for championship and community care Outdoor National Championships May 23-25 in Gulf Shores

Character should be at the forefront for any athlete or team, and it is the central thread for the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) as an estimated 1,200 student-athletes head to Gulf Shores, Ala. for the Men's and Women's Outdoor Track & Field National Championships May 23-25, 2019. The Champions of Character program is what makes NAIA stand out, impacting each of its host cities by changing the culture of sport.

Student-athletes representing schools from all over the country will continue a project from 2018 in partnership with Feeding the Gulf Coast's Backpack Program, donating 1,128 pounds – or 950 meals – to local children.

"The Champions of Character® and Teaming Up for Character Event<sup>TM</sup> are what set apart NAIA championships from others," said Katie Green, manager of athletics communications and media for NAIA. "The student-athletes always look forward to it. Last year I got to see the student-athletes pack all of the food that was brought and you could see the pure joy on their faces because they knew they were making a difference in the community."

Locals are invited to partner with the NAIA during this Teaming Up for Character Event<sup>TM</sup>. Through Feeding the Gulf Coast's Backpack Program, donated food items will be distributed to local children whom teachers and counselors have identified as struggling with chronic hunger and in need of food to get through a weekend. These food items are discretely placed in students' backpacks, with each student getting enough food for six meals and two snacks.

Requested items include pop-top meals such as beef ravioli and soups; single-serve microwaveable macaroni and cheese; snack items such as pudding cups, applesauce and fruit snacks; and breakfast items such as single-serve oatmeal and granola bars. Student-athletes will accept and sort donations Wednesday, May 22 at the Gulf Shores Welcome Center (3459 Gulf Shores Parkway) from 9-10 a m

The championships will be held at the Gulf Shores Sportsplex (19025 Oak Road). Day passes are \$10 and tournament passes are \$25. In 2018, the event generated \$3.44 million in economic impact, and the contract for the NAIA outdoor track championships has been extended through 2021.

The program is designed to remold the values and turn around the lives of at-risk young men, ages 18-22. The program was founded in 1984 by current Executive Director Curt Williams, who describes Youth-Reach as, "A hospital for today's damaged and discarded youth."

Set in the structure of a balanced family and home life, Youth-Reach concentrates on developing character, responsibility and a strong work ethic. Facilitated by experienced, trained and respected counselors, Youth-Reach is a long-term program intended to heal past wounds and restore families.

Residents and their families are never charged for the services offered and since change doesn't occur automatically within a prescribed period of time, there are no limits on how long a resident can stay in the program.

From a Biblical perspective, the staff addresses the central issues that lead today's youth to harmful actions such as drug addiction, promiscuity, rage and violence. Underneath rebellion and defiance is a need for healing, security, acceptance and discipline. The program is designed to remold values, turn around lives, and lead these guys to a transformational relationship with Jesus.



# Orange Beach Elementary earns 2018 Safe Schools Award O.B. among only 10 schools in state that earned the recognition

"Anyone involved with our schools can sleep soundly at night knowing the students will be safe.

School Board member Norma Hoots Lynch, Alabama Attorney General Steve Marshall, Baldwin County Schools Superintendent Eddie Tyler, and Orange Beach Mayor Tony Kennon.

In the Orange Beach Elementary School auditorium full of students, school faculty, Baldwin County school administrators, city officials, police and fire personnel on Wednesday, May 15, Alabama Attorney General Steve Marshall commended everyone in attendance for helping Orange Beach Elementary achieve the 2018 Alabama Safe Schools Initiative Award of Excellence. Orange Beach Elementary has earned the award every year

since the Alabama Attorney General's Office reinstated the program in 2013, except 2017.

"We're here to acknowledge how this school is one of the best of the best in the state as it relates to school safety," Marshall said after being introduced by OBES Principal Ryan Moss.

Orange Beach Elementary is among only 10 schools in the state that earned the recognition.

"Every year we accept applications from schools all over the state," Marshall said. "This year we had the highest number of schools that sought this award. Your (safety) plan was judged by a panel of experts in the state, from law enforcement, from public safety, from school administration, from those who understand what it means to keep schools and young people safe. And they decided that this place is one of the best in the state. Part of the reason why is because you have one of the most comprehensive plans around."

The Orange Beach City Council's investment in security at Orange Beach Elementary School began after the school shooting in Newtown, Connecticut in December of 2012. Since then the city has funded panic buttons to all school personnel, a full-time officer dedicated to the school, improvements to the camera surveillance system, and other upgraded facility safety features.

"The importance of school security can never be understated," Mayor Tony Kennon said. "Our children will be safe in Orange Beach. All parents and anyone involved with our schools can sleep soundly at night knowing the students will be safe. It's an honor to have Attorney General Marshall back in town for this recognition."

# Gulf Shores highlights economic development from 2018

During a recent Gulf Shores council work session, Economic Development Coordinator Blake Phelps gave un update on several projects that came on line in 2018 or are expected to be completed this year.

His report, which is also available online at gulfshoresal.gov, also had charts and graphs focusing on population and housing starts in Gulf Shores and around Baldwin County as well as on top employers, commercial developments, growth in revenues and the growth in the Waterway Village District. Below are some of the highlights.

The Lodge

The Lodge at Gulf State Park, A Hilton Hotel, is an iconic hotel found on Alabama's Gulf Coast. Originally established in 1974, it served as a hub of community activity and premier tourism destination for 30 years before being irreparably damaged by Hurricane Ivan. The Lodge has been newly rebuilt to continue those traditions by celebrating its unique location in Gulf State Park. This new facility is a model of resilient, environmentally-friendly coastal development with a focus on sustainability. With direct access to the beaches and natural beauty of Gulf State Park's 6,150 acres, it also offers 350 guestrooms and suites, 5 innovative dining options and over 40,000 square feet of indoor and outdoor meeting space.

The Lodge at Gulf State Park is the first full-service hotel to open in the area in 20 years. It is a premier meetings and events destination, offering an array of indoor and outdoor event space, perfect for conferences, special occasions and gatherings of any size. Under the management of Valor Hospitality Partners, the new Lodge operates with a focused commitment to the sustainability and preservation of the coastline, environment, wildlife and fauna of the Park and the region.

Auburn University

In a move that strengthens the educational and economic development resources for the citizens of South Alabama and the Gulf Coast, Auburn University launched a new educational complex in Gulf Shores. The 24,000-square-foot Auburn University Educational Complex will offer veterinary care, aviation instruction, research administration and Alabama Extension support for that region, delivering a tangible value to the state of Alabama while providing the community access to Auburn's pioneering research and innovative faculty. The centerpiece of the complex will be the Auburn Veterinary Specialists-Gulf Shores veterinary referral center.

"At Auburn, we seize every opportunity to fulfill our land-grant mission," said Auburn University President

Steven Leath. "This outstanding facility affords more Alabamians access to Auburn's world-renowned faculty, innovations and discoveries, and it expands our capacity for transformational instruction, research and outreach."

Embassy Suites

Mayor Robert Craft unveiled plans in June for a new luxury hotel and mixed-use development across from the newly renovated Gulf Place public beachfront. The 398,000-square foot project will be anchored by a 229-room Embassy Suites hotel and will include a fine dining restaurant, street front retail and a 23,000-square foot outdoor rooftop featuring a pool, bar, lounge and event terrace. Additional hotel amenities will include nearly 12,000-square foot of conference space including a 7,800-square foot ballroom.

"This is the type of transformative project we envisioned for the beach area when we adopted Vision 2025." said Craft. "We set out to create a pedestrian- and bikefriendly beachfront that would attract new development to boost our shoulder seasons and stimulate local businesses. This project will be the catalyst to drive these initiatives to a new level and a model for future development by obtaining LEED certification and utilizing flood proofing construction techniques." Construction is expected to begin in January and the project

should be completed before the 2020 tourist season.

Resicum International

Resicum International announced plans to relocate their United States operations to Gulf Shores in June. With a focus on aerospace and defense, Resicum provides government services in aviation maintenance, information services, and maritime services. In their first two years of operations, the company will create new aerospace jobs in Gulf Shores, bringing more than \$1.1 million in new payroll to the area. The company is currently located in an existing hangar facility at Jack Edwards National Airport, with plans underway to construct a new facility in the coming year.


Alabama Gulf Coast Zoo

The long-anticipated construction of the new Alabama Gulf Coast Zoo officially broke ground in March. The project marks the first Zoological Association of America (ZAA) project to be constructed from the ground up in over two decades. The new site is located just 4 miles north of the existing zoo, but will provide a more resilient home for the beloved attraction.

The \$16 million construction project will triple the size of the current zoo to 25 acres which will allow for more space for the zoo's collection of more than 600 animals and will introduce new event venues, on-site dining, expanded retail and educational programs. Construction is expected to be complete by late 2019.


stage, having joined the band in 1986.



# Orange Beach City Council discusses banning plastic bags

# 17-year-old Cameron Blanchard's report on enviornmental damage sparks lively discussion

A report on the environmental damage caused by millions of discarded plastic bags by 17-year-old Cameron Blanchard (pictured) sparked a lively discussion at the May 7 Orange Beach City Council regular session.

The end result was a pledge from the city to study a

ban on plastic bags and movement toward elimination of them from city businesses. A bill in the Alabama Senate to prevent city's from banning the bags and other singleuse plastic products failed to get out of committee on the same day as the city council meeting.

"They make their way into our oceans where they kill more than 100,000 marine animals each year," Blanchard said. "They can

stav in our water from up to 1,000 years. At least eight million of plastics get into our oceans each year and

a huge component of this is plastic bags."

Blanchard, who attends St. Michael's Catholic High School in Fairhope first met with officials at the Orange Beach Publix and while finding sympathetic ears couldn't get the grocery giant to agree to a ban.

"I decided to take the problem to the city level," Blan-

chard told the council.

"I move that the city of Orange Beach ban plastic bags as a whole to help reduce plastic bags in our oceans and in our Gulf and to take on this great environmental issue giving people the necessary time to adapt to the change."

Mayor Tony Kennon and other council members said they would be willing to work with Blanchard and others but first wanted her to study how it could be implemented and asked her to report back to the

council with a plan.

"How does it work?" Kennon asked. "If I go to Publix and buy groceries do I carry little bags with me? I need to know how that would work.'

Kennon then issued a challenge to Blanchard.

"I love ideas, but I like solutions," Kennon said. "I want you to come back sometime in the near future and tell us how you would institute that."

Kennon said he was interested in learning more

about the program.

"I'm all ears and I've got to be educated and from the mayor's perspective the practicality of how you institute it, how do you make it work," Kennon said. "And, how do you deal with 100,000 people who show

up and don't necessarily know they don't have bags. Is there a way to make that pragmatically work? We would love to have your help."

Blanchard said the program could work similarly to the wildly successful Leave Only Footprints program started in 2015 in a joint effort between Orange Beach, Gulf Shores, the Coastal Alabama Business Chamber and Gulf Shores and Orange Beach Tourism.

"When Leave Only Footprints was brought up as an idea my mom said she was very doubtful of its success," Blanchard said. "At first there was resistance but as time went on it worked out and the project has been great. Tourists know what to expect when they come into town now. I think banning plastic bags can and will be just like that."

Councilman Jerry Johnson said that program would be the perfect model to implement a plastic bag ban. After the first year of Leave Only Footprints, Johnson said, people acclimated to the new rules and the cost of labor and the amount of stuff cleaned off the beach daily rapidly declined.

"It's an education process and If we can come up with a marketing plan like we did with Leave Only Footprints and spread it out," Johnson said. "I know if put all our heads together it can be another success like Leave Only Footprints."

Blanchard cited efforts by several cities to slowly implement the ban, some taking as much as 18 months

for the ban to full take effect.

After the meeting, Blanchard met with City Administrator Ken Grimes to set up an internship for her this summer to work on crafting how an Orange Beach plastics ban would work.

"My goal during the internship is to establish a concrete plan of action toward an ordinance that would be specific to Orange Beach for banning plastic bags at point-of-sale city-wide," she said. "Mayor Kennon doesn't want us to mimic other cities who have done this; he wants an ordinance that is unique to the city of Orange Beach, and I completely agree with him. I would hopefully be able to help draft a brand-new ordinance and find specific ways we can implement it. A lot of preparation has to be done before the ordinance can pass, but my aim is to have this all done while I'm still a kid, as I turn 18 next February."

During regular session, the council also:

• OK'd performance contracts with Orange Beach Education Foundation the Makos Academics, Arts & Athletics Club. The groups will apply to the council for funds as needed.

• Approved a liquor license application for Eddie Boy's Franco's for Ole Franco's Italian Restaurant in

the Walmart shopping center.

• Approved a special events liquor license for Event Concessions for Orange Beach Powerboat Week at The Wharf May 30-June 1.

• OK'd a resolution to spend \$5,000 for an animal shelter needs assessment study and conceptual design in an amount not to exceed \$5,000. Gulf Shores, Foley and Baldwin County are all contributing \$5,000 for the study. The council also heard a report from Animal Control Officer Tom Conorly who said the Trap, Neuter, Return program is approaching 400 felines that have been neutered with the program. Bruins Claim NCAA Beach Volleyball Championship: Ne gotiations are underway to ensure that the National Collegiate Beach Volleyball Championships will remain in Gulf Shores when the current contract expires fol-lowingf the 2022 tourney at Gulf Shores Public Beach. Hosted by the Gulf Shores & Orange Beach Sports Commission, UAB and the City of Gulf Shores, the third NCAA sanctioned tourney drew a record 9,449 fans and a national TV audience to Gulf Shores during the first weekend of May. UCLA defeated Southern Cal to claim its second consecutive championship after Southern Cal claimed the inauguoral title in 2018. LSU placed third. Although it has been sanctioned by the NCAA for only three years, the American Volleyball Coaches Association first brought its tourney to Gulf Shores as an NCAA "emerging sport" in 2012. Full coverage from all five courts aired live on ESPN's family of networks. The Bruins swept rival USC, 3-0, to capture their second straight national championship.

# Perdido Beach Resort MAAC Gala raises \$445,000 for Orange Beach kids' programs

Excitement for the new Orange Beach High School and Middle School spilled out in waves at the Makos Arts, Academics and Athletics Club's fundraising gala May 11 at the Perdido Beach Resort.

"The energy and excitement in the room that night was electric," Executive Director Jenni Starling of MAAAC said. "We hope to take that energy and raise even more money for the kids in our community."

It might be hard to top the \$445,000 announced at the gala. The board of directors raised \$250,000 from contributing sponsors, the City of Orange Beach matched \$165,000 of that amount and \$30,000 was transferred from the former Orange Beach Sports Association's recent seafood fest. But Starling said that wasn't the only thing MAAAC set out to accomplish.

"The goal with the gala was to bring the city together, celebrate the new orange beach middle and high school and welcome the new principals Dr. (Erika) McCoy and Dr. (Robbie) Smith, teachers and coaches," Starling said. "We also wanted to thank our founding spon-

sors who helped us reach our goal in eight short weeks. We feel that we accomplished that."

Also, at the event, the Orange Beach Education Foundation had a silent auction to raise \$13,000 for that group. The foundation is different from MAAAC and each group will have a different focus, Mayor Tony Kennon said.

"The money from MAAAC is academics, arts, athletics," Kennon said. "That will be funding something external to the classroom such as the scholar team going to the scholar bowl. We will be funding that trip. The Education Foundation will be funding intra-classroom and professional development. That's where the two are separated."

Starling said how the MAAAC money is spent will be determined by principals at the schools.

"MAAAC is focused on raising funds to ensure that every child, no matter their interests, are given the foundation to thrive in our new schools," Starling said. "Unlike your typical booster club, MAAAC focuses on the whole child which will allow parents to receive one ask per year. These dollars will be guided into the schools with the help of Dr. McCoy who will make sure that every cent is spent where it is needed the most."

Starling thanked all the sponsors for making the evening successful especially the staff at Perdido Beach Resort.

Nicole Woerner, Secretary of the Orange Beach, Alabama, Education Foundation. "The Real MVP for the MAAAC Gala is Perdido Beach Resort," Starling said in a social media post.

"The staff is the best of the best. They went above and beyond to make sure Saturday night was a huge success. We are so blessed by this awesome village in Orange Beach."

One of the most unique items in the auction was a German short-haired pointer puppy that went to Ryan Long. And it came with a funny story.

"He basically tagged the puppy and asked his wife for permission before anyone else walked in the door," Foundation Chairman Laura Thomas said. "He got semi permission and I think he cut his phone off at that point. I did see Cindy yesterday and she was smiling and said their boys loved the puppy. The puppy went to a happy home."



# Alabama's red snapper season will gain stability under Gulf Council's Amendment 50 Beginning in 2020, the five Gulf states will each have control over its snapper season

AL Dept. of Conservation and Natural Resources After a three-year struggle, saltwater anglers are on the cusp of a stable red snapper season with the approval of Amendment 50 by the Gulf of Mexico Fishery Management Council.

Amendment 50, which goes into effect in 2020 with the approval of the Secretary of Commerce, gives the

five Gulf states control over each state's snapper season, and it allows leeway in size and bag limits within certain federal guidelines.

"All of the Gulf states are excited to finally have this solidified and move forward with the management plans for the individual states," said Scott Bannon, Alabama's Marine Resources Director. "It's a win for the red snapper stock and a win for the states."

Bannon said state control of the snapper fishery was

brought before the Council in 2016 to manage the recreational sector, which would have included the private recreational sector and the federal for-hire (char-

The 2016 and 2017 snapper seasons were painfully short under federal control. As a way to alleviate the impact on anglers and the Gulf Coast economies, the Gulf states were issued an exempted fishing permit (EFP) for the 2018 and 2019 seasons, and states were able to set their seasons under a total allowable catch for each state.

Alabama originally set its 2018 season at 47 days, but near-perfect weather and an increased enthusiasm for catching the state's signature saltwater species forced Marine Resources to reduce the season to 28 days, which ended in an almost perfect catch-to-allocation result.

The way Alabama was able to ensure there was no significant overrun on the quota was through the Red Snapper Reporting System, more commonly known as Snapper Check. The mandatory reporting system allowed Marine Resources to monitor the catch and close the season in response to the larger-than-expected har-

The success of the Snapper Check monitoring paved the way for the Council to approve Amendment 50.

"I think the fishery benefits from Amendment 50 because we have the ability, as individual states, of not exceeding our allocation of the quota," Bannon said. "If you look at it from a stock perspective for the Gulf of Mexico and you were managing it as a whole and you had a perfect season, like last year, you had no way to put the season in check. Alabama alone would have consumed nearly half of the entire Gulf allocation if we had fished the whole 47 days. We would have fished it really, really hard, and the amount of fish we would have caught would have been tremendous. As it was, we closed it when we met the number of pounds and showed that we were responsible. I think this is much better for the anglers and the snapper stock. I think the EFP showed the states could come to some decisions about allocations, and that the states could manage

seasons within pretty close tolerances."

Bannon said the Gulf Council faced two challenges with state management of red snapper. First, where do the federal for-hire boats fit into the program? The Council decided to not include the federal for-hire in Amendment 50 and consider other options in the future if conditions change for the federal for-hire boats. Second, what allocations could the five Gulf states live

"These allocations were based on different factors like biomass and historical landings," Bannon said. "So, the state directors used the EFP allocations as a start-

ing point for Amendment 50.

"The EFP only allowed us to set the season within our allocation. Under Amendment 50, we received an increase in allocation from 25% to 26.298%, and that increase will be permanent. We also have in Amendment 50 the ability to set size and bag limits within certain parameters. Those are management tools to maximize the benefit for Alabama."

When the initial EFP allocations were proposed, the totals did not equal 100% of the total allowable catch. Bannon said Florida was given the extra 3.78% be-

cause they were the final state to apply.

"They amended their EFP to get that extra allocation," Bannon said. "We felt like that extra allocation should be negotiated. In the end, Alabama and Florida split that 3.78% under Amendment 50 because we're the two largest consumers of red snapper. The other states were comfortable with that. It seems to be fair

Under the new amendment, each state creates their own plan. Alabama's plan includes a 10% buffer as opposed to the 20% buffer under the federal system. The federal for-hire sector has not exceeded its quota for several years, and its buffer was reduced to 9%

Alabama's allocation of red snapper for the 2019 private recreational season under the EFP is 1,079,765 pounds. Alabama's allocation for the 2020 season increases to 1,122,661 pounds if the private recreational sector doesn't exceed its quota this year.

Bannon said most red snapper anglers are happy with the upcoming season, and he anticipates there could be some season adjustments when Amendment

50 goes into effect.

"Most of the responses I've received for the 2019 season is they were happy to get the June and July seasons and that the season was spread out enough that if the weather was bad they could go another weekend," he said. "We know we still have concerns from the public that they would like more fishing time during the week. As we move forward in state management, that is always a possibility because we now have the flexibility to set the seasons."

The 2019 season length is tentatively set for 27 days, starting June 1 with three-day weekends (Friday-Sunday) except opening weekend (two days) and July 4 week, which will be four days (Thursday-Sunday). The size limit and bag limit remain the same at two fish per person with a minimum size of 16 inches total

Bannon is planning to ask snapper anglers for assistance to keep Alabama's unparalleled artificial reef program at the top. The loss of funding for research in those reef zones will prompt him to ask the Conservation Advisory Board to implement a reef fish endorsement beginning in 2020.

"The reef fish endorsement is set up to help fund some of the research conducted in the reef zones, because we're losing some of the funding used for that research," he said. "The research needs to continue, and we also need funds to support programs like Snapper Check, which we hope to expand into a better program.

"It's designed as a user-based system that applies to the people who are participating in that fishery, including private recreational, charter for-hire and commercial fishermen. Another aspect of it is it defines the user group. It gives us a better idea, especially among private anglers, of how many people are fishing for reef fish off Alabama. That way we can have better directed surveys, which are targeted at people who participate in the fishery instead of just people who have saltwater fishing licenses."

The endorsement fees would be \$10 for private recreational anglers and \$250 for commercial fishermen. The charter for-hire fees would depend on the size of the boat and number of passengers the vessel can

As for Amendment 50, Bannon said Alabama has already shown state management will work. The public is supportive, and he thinks that Secretary Wilbur

Ross will quickly approve.

"As I said on the radio the other day, Alabama has 3% of the Gulf coastline and will receive 26.298% of the total allowable catch for the 2020 season and beyond,' Bannon said. "I think Amendment 50 is a success for the fishery, and I think it's a success for the states because the states can now manage the seasons, size limits and bag limits that best suit their anglers."

# Alabama private vessel snapper season starts June 1

AL Dept. of Conservation and Natural Resources Alabama set its 2019 red snapper season, which is operating under the final year of an Exempted Fishing Permit (EFP), for anglers fishing from a private vessel or state-licensed guide boat for three-day weekends (Friday-Sunday) from June 1 through July 28, including Thursday, July 4.

Except for the opening weekend, which begins on a Saturday, weekends are defined as 12:01 a.m. Friday through 11:59 p.m. Sunday. This does not apply to for-hire (charter) boats with federal reef fishing permits. Charter boats will operate under federal regulations in 2019.

The recently approved Amendment 50 (see page 60) shifts red snapper management to the states and allots each state a share of the red snapper quota.

During the 2018 snapper season, the first under the EFP, Alabama

set an optimistic private recreational season of 47

days, mostly on three-day weekends.

However, a renewed enthusiasm for snapper fishing and excellent weather conditions forced Marine Resources to shut down the season after 28 days.

"We will again be evaluating the season as it goes along through Snapper Check," said Scott Bannon, Alabama's Marine Resources Director. "We have the option to add days if we feel it's appropriate, based on the harvest rate."

Of course, that harvest rate will likely be weather-dependent.

"The weather last year was almost ideal throughout the entire red snapper season, and I think that contributed to the increased harvest rates," Bannon said.

Plus, Alabama's unparalleled artificial reef zone provides easy access to anglers who want to catch a limit of two red snapper with a minimum length of 16 inches.

"In the Alabama reef zone, we feel we have a very healthy population of red snapper," Bannon said. "They are relatively accessible, and the size of the fish caught has been larger over the last couple of years. That also lends to reaching our allocation of pounds earlier."

Dr. Bob Shipp, professor emeritus of Marine Sciences at the University of South Alabama, has been studying red snapper off the Alabama Coast for decades, and he's happy to see that the excellent health of the red snapper stock is finally being recognized.

NOAA Fisheries Southeast Regional Director Dr. Roy Crabtree acknowledged agreed that the red snapper fishery is rebounding at a much faster rate than ex-

"The recovery of red snapper has been very robust," Crabtree said. "There's no evidence that it's not going to continue. It's a remarkable success story." Shipp applauded Crabtree's confirmation that red

snapper resiliency is far greater than NOAA scientists and their computer models predicted.

"I was delighted to hear Roy say that," Shipp said. "Roy has been aware that the recovery is a lot faster than the models projected. That's good news. I think everybody is on the same page now in terms of the status of the red snapper stocks. The species is very, very healthy. All the testimony we get from Texas all the way to the Keys is that snapper stocks are really

Earlier this year, the U.S. Congress passed the Modern Fish Act, which was lauded by the recreational fishing community. However, the effect of the Modern Fish Act is not yet fully understood.

"There are provisions in the Act for the National Academies of Sciences to study the fisheries management plans," Bannon said. "It also directs the Comptroller General to study the allocations, ensuring they are utilizing all the appropriate data that may be provided by the states and other entities. It's really an outside look to make sure we're using all the pertinent information to make management decisions.

"There are some pretty tight timelines, so they'll have to quickly develop plans to present to NOAA and the

regional fisheries management councils."

Right now, the charter industry in Alabama will remain under federal guidelines, which is fine with Capt. Johnny Greene, who runs the Intimidator out of Orange Beach Marina.

"Last year, we fished about 50 days, and we may get about 60 days this year with the reduction of the buffer because we stayed within our sub-quota for the past three years," Greene said. "The buffer was reduced from 20 percent to about 10 percent. When you get 10 percent more, that is significant, especially at that time of year (tourist season).

"At the end of the day, it's all about the people on the back of the boat who are really going to benefit from this. For the non-boat-owning public, this is their best avenue to reap the rewards of the expanded season."

# New reefs zone will honor Dr. Bob Shipp

8 zones added to what is already largest program in U.S.

Commissioner of the Alabama Department of Conservation Chris Blankenship called his state's artificial reef program the world's best during a dedication ceremoney for seven new named nearshore reefs earlier

Blankenship backs up his claim with the facts, including the more than 1,100 square miles of artificial reef habitat, the 15,000 or so artificial reefs and the variety of reef structures that are deployed off the Alabama coast, including ships, barges, bridge rubble and other reefs designed specifically to enhance the marine habitat.

*Individuals* and organizations who helped make the program the best in the world were honored at the reef dedication ceremony

"I can honestly say that with the artificial reef program in Alabama, there has been more concern about doing the good work, building this habitat and building this fishery we have and a whole lot less concern about who gets the credit," Blankenship said.

The seven new reefs that were named are located in the new nearshore reef zones that were finally approved by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers last year.

Dr. Robert (Bob) Shipp, professor emeritus at USA, has been studying red snapper off the Alabama coast since 1973 and has been instrumental in the development of the Alabama Artificial Reef Program. Dr. Shipp (pictured) has served more than 20 years on the Gulf of Mexico Fishery Management Council, including three terms as chair. At last week's ceremony, the Don Kelley North General Permit Area was renamed the Dr. Robert Shipp Reef Zone.

"I think it's just great that Chris and the State of Alabama recognize how valuable the red snapper resource is," Shipp said. "They've done a great job of creating this reef system.

"I will say this - I've said it before - we've got to have state management (for red snapper). If we had state management, we could have a six-month season with a two-fish bag limit, and it wouldn't make a dent in our

One of the nearshore zones was named for the contribution of the Alabama Wildlife Federation, which

helped develop the Alabama Artificial Reef Development Plan. The plan has helped to secure \$35 million in funding for inshore and offshore artificial reef zones.

The Coastal Conservation Association (CCA) of Alabama contributed to reef construction and enhancement after the Deepwater Horizon oil spill in 2010 by providing financial and logistical support for artificial reef work both inshore and offshore.

The National Fish and Wildlife Foundation (NFWF) has been a contributor to conservation research in Alabama since 1984 and provided about \$34 million in recent years for the expansion and enhancement to Alabama's artificial reef program.

The Alabama Charter Fishing Association, formerly known as the Orange Beach Fishing Association, actually started the artificial reef work off Alabama long

before any other organization.

The Alabama Gulf Coast Reef and Restoration Foundation was created to enhance the diving and fishing opportunities off the Alabama coast with fundraising for the deployment of the 271-foot ship "The LuLu" in 2013 and the 128-foot party boat "Capt. Shirley Brown" in 2015. The foundation also worked with Marine Resources to establish the Poseidon's Playground, where novice divers can gain experience in nearshore waters. The foundation continues to work with Marine Resources to develop plans for additional reef deployments and also works with the dive community to monitor the health of the reefs.


