Celebrating 10 years of beachside fun

Big Gigantic, A Boogie Wit Da Hoodie, Camelphat and SNBRN will all play sets during the tablesetter for the 10th annual event at the Gulf Shores Public Beach. Admission to the May 16 kickoff party is included with VIP tickets and \$55 as an addon.

Scheduled May 17-19, the fest's headliners include The Lumineers, Kygo, Cardi B, Travis Scott, Diplo, The 1975, Walk The Moon, Jimmy Eat World and Alison Wonderland.

The Red Clay Strays, this year's local presence, will play at 12:45 p.m. on Sunday on the Alabama Newscenter Sunset Stage.

"First off, I'm so excited for the music lineup," said fest director. Sean O'Connell. "It's going to be an amazing weekend of music from the very first note.

"I'm very excited that the festival will be broadcasted across the US on Sirius XM," he added.

Cardi B, the Bronx-born rapper, made history this winter as the first solo female rapper to win a Grammy for Best Rap Album in the category's 20-plus year history. She was nominated for seven awards across major categories, including Album of The Year and Record of the Year. Another Hangout headliner Travis Scott, was

nominated for Best Rap Artist.

General admission tickets (\$319) and VIP tickets (\$1,099) as well as shuttle passes were still available as of May 6. But the VIP experience, which includes pool-side and jacuzziside views of the main stage, and complimentary food, beer, wine and cocktails all weekend, were expected to sell out way before the fest starts.

Billed as a music vacation, Hangout Fest organizers try to create immersive musical experiences that is unique on the festival circuit. Patrons can swim in the Gulf, relax in comfort at Hammock Beach, find dog love at the smooch a Pooch Puppy Kissing Booth, or make their love official, at least for the weekend, at the Wedding Chapel.

Organizers will bring back the tremendously popular full-sized Roller Disco roller skating rink again this year.

47th Art in the Park May 11-12 in Foley



NAIA Men's & Women's Track Championships in Gulf Shores May 23-25

The National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics Men's and Women's Outdoor Track and Field National Championships will be held on May 23-25 at the Mickey Miller Blackwell Stadium on County Rd. 6 in Gulf Shores. This is the sixth consecutive year the Alabama Gulf Coast Convention and Visitors Bureau has hosted the event. Tickets are \$10 per day or \$25 for a weekend pass.

Seventy-one events will take place over the three-day span. The national championships begin at 10 a.m. Thursday with the men's decathlon (100-meters, Long Jump, Shot Put, High Jump, 400-meters). The women's hammer throw. follows at 1 p.m., with the opening ceremonies scheduled for 2 p.m. on Thursday. The championships conclude with the awards ceremony on Saturday at approximately 6:50 p.m. The top eight athletes in each event and top eight relay teams will earn team points and achieve NAIAASICS All-America status.

The men's and women's outdoor track and field championships will remain in Gulf Shores at least through 2021 at the Mickey Miller Blackwell Sta-

dium at Gulf Shores, with The Gulf Shores and Orange Beach Sports Commission and the City of Gulf Shores co-hosting.

The new contract is set for two years with provisions for improvements to the stadium such as a relocated and expanded high jump and repairs to the pole vault and javelin runways.

The event had an economic impact of over \$3 million in 2018, a \$70,000 increase from 2017.

Southern (La.) won the women's and Wiley (Texas) the men's championship in 2018.

"Gulf Shores continues to upgrade its track facilities to provide a championship-caliber experience, benefiting student-athletes and spectators as well as our local students," said Beth Gendler, vice president of sales for the Sports Commission.



AL. Wildlife & Fisheries K9 unit more likely to lick than bite

One turkey hunter was extremely grateful that the Alabama Wildlife and Freshwater Fisheries (WFF) Law Enforcement Section has a K9 unit, although there is little public awareness of this enforcement asset.

Of course, the reason few people have heard about it is this K9 unit does not fit the stereotype of large, aggressive dogs trained to bite and take down a suspect.

Nope, the WFF K9 dogs are far, far more likely to lick you than anything else. This K9 unit consists of the loveable beagle breed that uses its nose and tracking abilities to aid the WFF's Conservation Enforcement Officers (CEOs).

Early in the 2019 spring season, CEO Ben Kiser received

"There was some concern about liability, but our beagles just lick people and try to find people so they can get a peanut butter sandwich,"

a call about an overdue turkey hunter. Kiser loaded up his beagle. Luke, and headed out into rural Calhoun County.

"I just got a call about a lost turkey hunter," Kiser said. "It turned into a medical emergency because he was diabetic. He had an episode. He got lost and fell and lost his gun."

Kiser said most of the time when hunters get lost, he can get a cell phone number from the family, call the number and get clues where they might be found. To pinpoint the location, sometimes Kiser gets the lost hunter to fire a shot. He didn't have that option this spring.

"I found his truck and deployed Luke on his tracks," Kiser said. "Luke followed the trail a little over a mile and walked right up on the

hunter. He was in a location where the ambulance couldn't travel. He was somewhat coherent, but I basically dragged him out of the woods and got him in my truck. We met his family back at the main road, and they took him to the hospital. He recovered fully from what I understand.

"Without the dog, I would have had a hard time locating the hunter. It's an area on the edge of a national forest where cell service is very limited. In the past, it's taken hours to find people. I've worked cases like this both with and without a dog. This incident went extremely well, extremely fast, and it was all because of the dog. I can't say he would have died. But he had his best shot to make it be-

cause of the dog."

Kiser said that was the first time he has used Luke to find a hunter in distress, but the beagle has been used in many of the CEO's normal duties as well as in assisting local law enforcement in searching for suspects. Luke has made cases for illegal baiting of game and fishing on private property without permission. He's also helped locate a turkey hunter poaching on property he didn't have permission to

"Luke tracked that turkey hunter right up to his blind," Kiser

WFF Assistant Chief of Enforcement Chris Lewis said the K9 program started in 2012. CEO Brad Gavins talked to officers at the Department of Corrections about the tracking dogs used to find escaped prisoners. When Corrections offered to give WFF one of their dogs to try, Gavins got permission and quickly accepted.

Lewis said. "That's their reward. That's how they were

Gavins worked his dog, Taz, for a couple of years and proved the concept works well. Lewis said the Department of Corrections was generous enough to give WFF several dogs that were not suitable for tracking escapees.

"We prefer dogs that don't bark because we don't want to announce our presence," Lewis said. "Corrections is hunting armed felons or escapees in dangerous situations. So, they turn loose a whole pack of dogs that bark. They work as a team to drive that person. By the time they get there, they want those dogs to run that person to where there's no fight left in them.

"We want dogs that are good, strong trackers that can work independently and don't bark. That's a rare commodity. When Corrections sends us a dog that's a strong tracker that doesn't bark, that's huge for us. These are well-seasoned, very capable dogs. Our people then go to Corrections for handler training. The dogs know what to do. We're just training the people to learn how to handle and read the

Jonathan Howard has a K9 in District 5, while Jason McHenry and Cliff Quinn both have dogs in District 3. Kiser is in District 2, and Gavin is in District 4. Lewis said the next dog available from Corrections will go to District 1.

Gavins recalled one of the early incidents where his dog proved its worth. Coffee County CEO Jason Sutherland was working a complaint when he spotted someone parked in a

"The lady in the vehicle said she was arrowhead hunting, but Jason found two sets of tracks," Gavins said. "He discovered the other set of tracks was from her companion, who was notorious for running afoul of the law. Jason suspected that her companion was poaching."

Gavins got a call to head over with his dog, which picked up the scent at the vehicle and followed it through the woods for several miles.

"We found where he had squatted down," he said. "We found an empty cartridge where he shot at a deer."

The dog tracked to the edge of the road where the suspect had ditched a shotgun and rifle. When confronted with the enormous evidence, the suspect confessed.

"It wound up being a good case that we would have never done anything with without the dog," Gavins said. "I've used the dog to track turkey poachers. Some people will get permission to hunt 10 or 20 acres, a place to park their trucks, and then go to wherever the turkey gobbles. We've been able use the dogs to track the hunters to where they sat

next to a tree or find feathers where they shot a turkey. I think on one case, the hunter had crossed through three different properties, and we were able to enter that into evi-

Another incident happened in Russell County where a hunter witnessed a poacher firing at a deer from a climbing treestand. Gavins was called by CEO Mark Jolly, and they set the dog on the tracks as close as they could. The beagle quickly picked up the track and led them straight to a dead doe, followed by a huge, 11-point buck.

"We backtracked across a pasture, through a fence and up to a house," Gavins said. "Just before we got to the house, we found the gun hidden in a hay bale."

After securing the scene, a search warrant was issued, and the officers found even more evidence, which resulted in a conviction.

Gavins said the dogs have also been used to track people with Alzheimer's and other forms of dementia.

"The dogs are not aggressive at all," Gavins said. "That's why they're so good to use in our outreach programs."

Lewis agreed, adding that the dogs help the public lose their reticence about talking to an enforcement officer.

'The public in general and kids just love the dogs, and the dogs love that they get petted and loved on," Lewis said. "It's an icebreaker for us. People who normally won't approach us and ask questions will come up and start petting the dogs. That usually generates a conversation. Then we can tell them what we do and why we do it to get our message out in a different way."

Kiser does not hesitate to use Luke as a public relations assistant.

"I take him to all the hunting expos," Kiser said. "I take him to elementary schools two or three times a year. I take him to our youth dove hunts we have every fall where we may have 100 people there.

"Recently, I took Luke to UAB Children's Hospital. The local FOP (Fraternal Order of Police) had built a wagon that the patients and families can use to get them away from wheelchairs. Luke went with us to take the wagon, and he saw a few kids. I'm working on the process to get Luke cleared to where he can go in the patients' rooms and do more that type stuff at the hospital."

Kiser takes Luke on boat patrols as well.

"He pretty much goes wherever I go," Kiser said. "He's my only partner in Calhoun County."

GULF SHORES CITY SCHOOLS

Gulf Shores school system expects about 1,900 students in first year

Each school will have summer program; foreign language classes to be offered at elementary school

When the Gulf Shores City school system opens its doors for the first time this August, Superintendent Dr. Matt Akin said he expects about 1,900 students to report for classes.

All three schools will be below capacity even with about 70 out-of-district kids signed up. At the elementary school, about 770 students are expected, 400 for the middle school and 790 in the high school. Helping to relieve overcrowding at the elementary school will be the transfer of sixth graders over to the middle school, Akin said.

"We think we probably have room for roughly 50 kids in the elementary," Akin said. "Middle's a little tighter where we only have room for 30 or so. In the high school, ninth grade is the one that's open that we don't know. We could certainly take up to 90 or 100 in ninth grade and I don't think there's that many out there. Any ninth grader we're 100 percent sure we could take."

The application period for out-of-district students closed on April 30 and some of those students applied for financial assistance. Tuition for a year is \$1,500 for the first student and \$1,000 for other students in the same family.

"We have part of our policy that says if there's financial hardship and I've met individually with several parents who have requested waivers," Akin said. "Confidentially we look over their income, the number of kids they have and so the waiver could be down to zero or it could be 50 percent off. It just depends on their specific need.

"The board is adamant that we don't want someone who wants to come to Gulf Shores to not be able to afford it."

Out-of-districts students are also eligible for transportation with part of the separation agreement with Baldwin County requiring the new city system to transport 10th, 11th and 12th graders who are out of district and want to graduate from Gulf Shores.

"While we're doing that if other students are in those same areas, which they will be, we'll certainly provide transportation for them," Akin said.

All of those students will have summer learning opportunities almost immediately, Akin said.

"We are really adamant beginning June 1 making an im-

mediate impact," Akin said. "Since I've been here the conversation has been around changing learning and learning not just being from eight to three every day but be throughout the year in the summer and virtual."

Each school at the campus will have a summer program like one for the high school to give students there more flexibility in the fall schedule.

"Let's say they want to take English 11 this summer so they can take Physics 2 in the fall to fit in their schedule," Akin said. "Or they want to take Health so they'll be able to take a theater class. We are offering those courses this summer so basically there's an incentive. There's a \$50 fee for the course but if you complete the course, we're going to refund half of the money."

At the elementary, school students will be offered a chance to begin studying a foreign language.

"In the elementary school we are hoping to do a Spanish immersion academy this summer," Akin said. "In the middle school, we are doing eco-tourism and arts. They are going to be very low-cost. Our goal is not the money our goal is expanded learning opportunities."

The system is studying how many teachers it will need when school officially opens. The Baldwin County Board of Education sent out non-renewal notices to 15 teachers at Gulf Shores on April 26. Systems routinely send the notices to non-tenured teachers. A teacher earns tenure when they are hired back for their fourth consecutive year by a school system.

"Those teachers may be hired with Gulf Shores if they are interested or they may be rehired with the county," Akin said. "As we looked at the reduction in enrollment, we knew we were going to lose teacher units. We'll continue to look at our out-of-district numbers and then look as we have teachers who choose to go to county then obviously, we'll have a need to bring teachers in."

A total of102 non-resident students have applied to attend Gulf Shores and of those 22 were from teachers with children they want to go to city schools and five annexation requests. Of the total number 22 made a waiver request for a break in the tuition costs.

At the elementary school 45 out-of-district kids applied with 33 at the middle school, 13 ninth graders and two 10th graders who didn't are not students at GSHS this year. In 10th through 12th grades, those from out of district who decided to come back to Gulf Shores and finish will not be charged tuition.

In other staffing, the system recently hired Dr. Stephanie Harrison, the secondary curriculum coordinator at Baldwin County. In Gulf Shores she'll be the assistant superintendent over instruction and innovation.

In March, Gulf Shores said it will also immediately launch and ambitious project to spruce up the campus and address traffic issues on all three campuses. All of the schools are on East 15th Street east of Fort Morgan Road.

"If we're going to change the culture it's going to start with our image and with the appearance and our pride in the buildings," School Board President Kevin Corcoran said. "That's why we're jumping in right away."

Gulf Shores paid for a traffic study to formulate a plan to get cars in and out more efficiently. At drop-off and pick-up times cars line Fort Morgan Road, also known as East Second Street as both the middle school and elementary use the same routes in and out.


"We're putting in a big traffic circle that's actually a huge loop south of the elementary school where parents will come in and drop their kids off," Corcoran said.


With the new plan, middle school traffic will use East 15th Avenue and enter the big loop from the west for drop-offs. A similar pattern is set up for the elementary school but those parents will use East 16h Avenue.

"We're segregating the middle school and elementary school traffic so they won't compete with each other for space," Corcoran said. "We had traffic engineers, architects do a very intense study and this is what they came up with. If there is stacking and waiting in line it's all going to occur on campus and get that load off of East Second."



Gulf Shores wants to develop medical campus near airport

A free-standing emergency room in the city will cut drive times to Foley and save lives

Á little strip of land donated to Gulf Shores by the Erie Meyer Foundation will help the city in its quest to develop a medical campus near the intersection of Cotton Creek Road and Highway 59.

During a council work session on May 6, the council discussed a budding partnership with South Baldwin Regional Medical Center to bring a free-standing emergency room to the city to help cut drive times to Foley. Also, during the session, the council discussed adding landscaping personnel to the Recreation Department to maintain

the grounds at three schools the city is taking over on June 1.
The donation from the

The donation from the Erie Meyer Foundation will be on the west side of Alabama 59 at 34th Avenue.

"In doing that we are planning a new road network most particularly a new traffic signal that we've got under warrant study right now with the highway department," Čity Administrator Steve Griffin said. "To do that the signal needs a fourway intersection. The Erie Hall Meyer Foundation property is adjacent to what is now a small gravel road now, 34th Avenue.

"The property that the Meyer is going to donate to the city will provide 44 feet so we'll have 80 feet of right of way to do a full signal with four connections to it. Highway 59 north and south and 34th Avenue to the west and then the new medical campus road network to the east of it."

Mayor Robert Craft, speaking at the Coastal Alabama Business Chamber's First Friday Forum in a state of the city address, said the addition of the emergency will fill a vital need in the community.

"Right now, there is nowhere in Gulf Shores or Orange Beach ambulances can stop," Craft said. "They have to go all the way to the north side of Foley. They have to get to here from wherever they are, pick us up and then get back. If you've got to go to Ono Island or Fort Morgan it's impossible in a critical situation to take care of them. So having an emergency room in Gulf Shores that serves the island is big because you don't have near as far to get when you have a real problem."

If the plan does come to fruition – officials say they are very close on an agreement – Craft said it could include emergency helicopter services.

"We will have a helipad there and a medivac helicopter will have to be there in order to operate that emergency room," Craft said, "Therefore it can go get you if you are in Fort Morgan, Orange Beach or Ono Island. If you are having a heart issue and need something right now, they can pick you up and take you wherever you need to go."

Orange Beach Mayor Tony Kennon gave a similar speech at the chamber breakfast and said his city fully supports the clinic and its location.

"It'd be great to have one in Orange Beach but that doesn't make any sense," Kennon said. "Right there where it's at is perfect. It is going to give us service for those with head trauma, heart attacks, strokes, saving 15 to 20 minutes to getting on the table with a doctor in front of you. That's huge for us."

His city took a big stride in health care in 2018 when Orange Beach decided to start its own ambulance service. Combined with the new emergency room, Kennon said he was excited at the improvements in island health care.

"Nothing against our previous provider but when they are north of the bridge in the summer it may take 45 minutes to an hour for them to get here to transport," Kennon said. "We have two ambulances and a backup to get you from your house and in eight to 10 minutes be in the emergency room."

Gulf Shores School Landscaping


The Parks and Facilities Division of the recreation department currently maintains the grounds landscape at City Hall, the Municipal Annex, Fire Station 1, GSPD, Activity Center, Civic Center, Recreation Center and all parks and sports fields throughout the city. In order to meet the added responsibility of the three campus school grounds, the city is looking to add two workers and buy new equip-

ment for work on the grounds there.

In addition to adding two workers, the city will buy a new truck and other equipment spending about \$122,000 for the remainder of 2019.

In other business during the work session:

- Awarding a bid to Sysco to supply concession stand supplies at city sports facilities for \$156,000. Last year the city had \$312,000 in concession sales. The contract would be for one year with an option for two one-year extensions.
- Allowing the police department to pursue a grant from the School Violence Prevention Program which provides funds to local jurisdictions to enhance the physical security and responder efforts to ensure school safety. The program will provide funds for technology, structural improvements, and certain training relevant to security in schools. The intended request is for \$400,000 which will require a match of \$100,000.
- Considering joining Foley, Orange Beach and Baldwin County in approving \$5,000 to hire Shelter Planners of America to provide a comprehensive needs assessment study for a tri-city-county animal shelter for the southern part of the county.
- Adopting minor changes in the flood damage prevention ordinance per recommendations from the state coordinator of the National Flood Insurance Program.
- Declaring May as National Bike Month with ride to school days set for May 8 and May 17 and ride to work week May 13-19.
- Considering a petition for annexation Taylor's Riverview Subdivision owned by David and Lisa Keenum. The property and is located at 19074 Pine Acres Road which is off County Road 8 on the west side of Alabama 59.
- Considering an assembly permit for the city's Fourth of July fireworks show. The council also discussed paying Pyro-Shows about \$30,000 to put on the show at the Gulf State Park pier.
- Considering awarding a bid Award bid to Perfect for \$23,000 to upgrade recreation management computer software for the Recreation and Cultural Affairs department.
- Considering offering a bid to Jani-King of Mobile to clean city buildings that are used as rental facilities. This service is offered at a fee to renters of the Activity Center, Civic Center, Cultural Center Auditorium and Cultural Center Gym, and includes all of the cleaning responsibilities that are required of the center.







Lillian Bicentennial Committee unveils historic markers

Lillian Boat Launch and St. Joseph Catholic Church are recognized as significant sites

The first historic markers in Lillian, Alabama were unveiled recently. The Lillian Bicentennial Committee had been working on the project for 18 months and everything came together in three locations in May.

The first marker is located at the Lillian Boat launch and gives information about the history of Perdido Bay and the Lillian Bridge.

Perdido Bay was popular with Spanish Explorers in the late 1500s. Because of the changing landmarks and difficulty for ship captains to find the opening to the bay, it was called "Perdido", the Spanish word for "lost." In 1780 the King of Spain gave land grants, the oldest land titles in Baldwin County, to the Suarez family. Descendants of the early settlers are still living in Lillian.

Prior to the construction of first Lillian bridge in 1916, only a ferry was available to cross the bay from Alabama to Florida. This bridge was replaced in 1943 and the current bridge was dedicated in 1980.

The second marker gives information about the community of Lillian and St. Joseph Catholic Church. This marker is located on Santa Piedro Street and US Highway 98, in from of the early church.

The community on the west coast of Perdido Bay was named Lillian when the first post office was opened. It was named in honor of the daughter of the first postmaster, William Thomas Kee.

In 1923 the Baldwin Colonization Company purchased 55,000 acres, including Lillian, to promote as a resort location. The popularity of the area spread throughout the country and Europe, bringing many nationalities to the

The heart of historic Lillian was on Barclay Avenue, including a one-room schoolhouse, the post office, hotel and several homes. The post office was later moved to 6th Street where it now serves as a bakery.

The Bicentennial program was completed at the Lillian Community Club where Price Legg, Chairman of the Lillian Bicentennial Committee spoke of the history of Lillian and introduced several members of families who can trace their heritage to the early days of the community.

Lillian organizations are planning special events throughout the year to commemorate the 200th anniversary of Alabama statehood. The vear's celebrations will culminate on Saturday, Dec. 14, the actual date of statehood, when the Optimist Club of Perdido Bay hosts the annual Christmas Parade. Many of the entrants in the parade will have a Bicentennial

Shark fishing by permit most weekends at State Park Pier

The Alabama Department of Conservation and Natural Resources' permitted, managed shark fishing season at the Gulf State Park Pier continues at the south end of the pier - called the octagon - from 7 p.m. Sunday, on most Sundays and Tuesdays through September from 7 p.m. until 7 a.m. the following morning.

The octagon will close to routine use 30 minutes prior to these events and reopen to routine use 30 minutes following them. During the events, the octagon area of the pier will be designated for the exclusive use of the participating shark anglers and their designated assistants. The remainder of the pier will be open to anglers and other pier guests as normal.

The managed shark-fishing events will allow for 15 anglers per occasion, with no more than one rod and reel per angler in use. Each angler may have one assistant. This allows for a maximum of 30 individuals on the octagon area during each event. Anglers are encouraged to assist one another while fishing.



During its annual meeting earlier this month in Fairhope, Alabama, The Gulf of Mexico Climate and Re-



silience Community of Practice presented Lannie Smith, building official and floodplain manager with Orange Beach. Alabama, with the Spirit of Community Award in recognition of his exemplary

job communicating climate challenges and why it is important to provide cities and regions with additional capacity to absorb adverse economic or environmental changes.

When he was working on implementing the 2012 International Building code for the city of Orange Beach, Smith worked with local government colleagues, the mayor and city councilmembers to develop new code requirements calling for more hurricane-resistant construction. The result was the Coastal Construction Code Supplement, which led to Orange Beach and 13 other communities building to the IBHS Fortified Home standard.

More recently, he led the efforts to start the first National Flood Insurance Program Community Rating System user group in Alabama, which increases the capacity of Alabama coastal communities to better manage flooding issues.

Smith has worked with partners across local, state and federal government, the private sector and academia to increase resilience in his community and in other communities across the Gulf. (By Stephen Deal, masgc.org)

Officials celebrate conservation of 470 more acres at Bon Secour National Wildlife Refuge

Private-public partners laud broadening of recreational access, habitat protection and economic opportunities

Public officials, including Alabama Governor Kay Ivey joined federal, state, local and private partners at a recent special event to celebrate the conservation of 470 acres (pictured) of critical land, water and wildlife along the Alabama Gulf Coast.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, The Conservation Fund and the Alabama Department of Conservation and Natural Resources dedicated the newly conserved property at the Little Point Clear Unit of the Bon Secour National Wildlife Refuge.

The addition will expand public recreational capabilities for fishing, wildlife viewing, photography, boating, paddling, and other opportunities enjoyed by more than 120,000 visitors a year.

"Alabama's Gulf Coast remains a staple in our state's abundance of natural resources. I am pleased to see the Bon Secour National Wildlife Refuge grow through the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation's Gulf Environmental Benefit Fund," said Gov. Ivey. "The Deepwater Horizon spill took a toll on our Coast, but in natural Alabama fashion, we are continually taking steps to overcome and make improvements."

The Conservation Fund purchased the property and transferred it in two phases to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (Service) at the request of the Service and the State of Alabama. This project was made possible thanks to funding from the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation's Gulf Environmental Benefit Fund, established by a federal court order addressing criminal cases related to the 2010 Deepwater Horizon oil spill.

"By acquiring this land, we are helping preserve land that is as valuable to wildlife as it is to anglers, hikers, boaters, bird-watchers and others who get outside," said Leopoldo Miranda, Regional Director of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

Located on the Fort Morgan Peninsula, the newly conserved property features a variety of coastal habitats shoreline, pine flatwoods, saltwater marsh, freshwater lagoons and wetlands, dune systems, maritime forests, and tidal creeks.

The living shorelines and interior terrain provides ideal habitats for several native species, including young adult Kemp's ridley sea turtles, snowy plover, piping plover, Wilson's plover, and the endangered Alabama beach mouse. T

he conserved property celebrated today also has the potential to benefit manatees migrating through the northern gulf, and ultimately increases protected coastal habitat at the Refuge for wildlife and public recreation by approximately 25 percent.

"While we cannot undo the damage done by the Deepwater Horizon spill, we can prioritize collaborative efforts that ensure a healthier Gulf Coast for both communities and wildlife," said Larry Selzer, President and CEO of

The Conservation Fund, "These actions provide for a thriving gulf, while delivering expanded opportunities for public recreation and diversified tourism related offerings, as well as support for local private businesses like oyster farming. We are delighted that NFWF recognizes the importance of increased protection for coastal resources, as well as the unique benefits it brings the community.'

"The protection of the Little Point Clear Unit of the Bon Secour National Wildlife Refuge will bring more opportunities for Alabamians and folks across the country to enjoy our state's unique natural treasures," said U.S. Senator Doug Jones. "Protecting the Gulf Coast is essential, not only for the benefit of future generations, but for our coastal businesses and tourism industry. As an avid outdoorsman and fisherman, I will continue to support expanded recreational access, because all Alabamians should have the opportunity to enjoy the abundant natural resources our state has to offer."

"I've worked hard to ensure Deepwater Horizon settlement funds are directed to benefit the communities of Southwest Alabama, and this land acquisition is a wonderful example of the opportunities provided by publicprivate partnerships to enhance our economy and ensure our beautiful wilderness areas remains pristine for future generations," said Congressman Byrne.

NFWF's Gulf Environmental Benefit Fund—created to implement a federal criminal settlement against several oil companies—supports efforts like the Little Point Clear Unit project that benefit natural resources in and around the Gulf of Mexico by remedying damage and eliminating or reducing the risk of harm caused by last decade's Deepwater Horizon oil spill.

"Bon Secour National Wildlife Refuge is home to some of the most pristine and productive coastal habitats in Alabama," said Jeff Trandahl, executive director and CEO of the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation. "Protecting these rich habitats along the Alabama coast is one of the most effective ways we can help wildlife recover from the Deepwater Horizon oil spill. We appreciate the strong partnerships with The Conservation Fund, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, and the Alabama Department of Conservation and Natural Resources that have made this project possible."





For Hicks, winning "American Idol's" blockbuster fifth season was just the beginning. Hailed as "part Stax, part Motown and part honkytonk" by The New York Times, Hicks' intoxicating blend of soul, blues, country, and rock & roll quickly rendered him a household name as he progressed to the show's record-breaking finale in 2006.

That historic television event drew an audience of more than 200 million viewers. Hicks immediately followed his Idol victory with a No. 1 Billboard single and an RIAA certified Platinum debut, and soon went on to make history as both the first male Idol champion featured on a Grammy-winning record (Jimmy Fallon's Blow Your Pants Off), and the first to land a Las Vegas residency.

Hicks has since ventured into theater and television, touring as Teen Angel in the popular Broadway musical "Grease" and appearing on "Law & Order: SVU." He also hosts "State Plate," his own food and travel show now entering its third season on the INSP television network. 



FBISF Foundation For Music donates \$39,593 to UWF Dept. of Music

Representatives from The Frank Brown Frank Brown International Songwriters Festival Foundation for Music recently presented a \$39,593 check to the The University of West Florida Department of Music in support of the Larry Butler Memorial Music Award. The donation will provide opportunities for students to work with world-class artists and travel to competitions, conventions and elite music festivals.

The Larry Butler Memorial Music Award was created in 2015 by Peggy Butler in memory of her husband, a Grammy Award-winning songwriter and producer and Pensacola native. More than \$132,000 has been raised by the Butler family and friends since then. Nearly \$40,000 in scholarships have been awarded from donations and fundraisers, including an annual benefit concert at Vinyl featuring Dean Dillon.

"This gift - this legacy - is a testament to the profound influence music can have on a community, and I know that Larry is smiling," Peggy Butler said. "The show was an amazing success, and I want to thank every individual, business and organization who played a role, including the hosts, artists and supporters. Larry's family and friends are especially grateful for this fund established in his name for UWF students; it is a hometown

honor."

"This gift will positively impact our students, faculty and community on a daily basis," said Dr.
Sheila Dunn, chair of the Department of Music. "it is truly transformational for our music students and for our department."

Larry Butler worked with renowned recording

artists Johnny Cash and Kenny Rogers, among others, during his career in Nashville, and continued to show appreciation for his hometown through his generosity, including holding a benefit concert to raise money for the rebuilding effort following Hurricane Ivan.

The award has also allowed the UWF Music Dept. to forge a partnership with the Pensacola Community Music School to provide free music lessons to underprivileged children and purchase critical instruments, make classroom and music studio upgrades at UWF. upgrades to our classrooms and music studios.

"Larry started his music career here in Pensacola, singing the national anthem at Naval Air Station Pensacola and playing the piano on the Lynn Toney show," Peggy Butler said. "Little Larry Butler from Pensacola, who went on to win a Grammy Award for Producer of the Year, would be thrilled that his legacy continues in his hometown that he loved."

The Frank Brown International Songwriters Festival hosts Grammy Award winning songwriters and rising stars, who perform original songs in multiple locations in the Florida and Alabama Gulf Coast. Festival attendees enjoy a personal concert experience and learn the stories behind the songs as told by the original author. Venues attract more than 200 songwriters who come from around the world.


