July 4 Shark Run at 'Bama includes road, beach options

The Flora-Bama Lounge & Oyster Bar will host The Shark Adventure Run, which includes a 4.5 mile road & beach race and one mile beach fun run, on Thursday, July 4 beginning at 7 a.m. sharp. Fun Runners and those racing two miles on the road and 2.5 miles on the beach will encounter "shark people" scattered along the beach section of the course for the purpose of taking the "bait" (or flags) off the belt that all participants will be issued. The sharks are not allowed to touch you, but if they get all three of your baits, you will not be eligible for any awards.

All participants will still be allowed to finish the run. The event also also includes a four mile road race & competitive walk. And a 7:15 a.m. one mile fun run. The post race party at the Flora-Bama will include entertainment, food and refreshments. Preregistration is available through active.com. Fireworks Party Safety Tips

Follow these top 10 tips for a safer fireworks party:

- Plan your firework display to make it safe and enjoyable
- Keep fireworks in a closed box and use them one at a time
- Read and follow the instructions on each firework using a torch if necessary
- Light the firework at arm's length with a taper and stand well back
- Keep naked flames, including cigarettes, away from fireworks
- Never return to a firework once it has been lit
- Don't put fireworks in pockets and never throw them
- Direct any rocket fireworks well away from spectators
- Never use paraffin or petrol on a bonfire
- Make sure that the fire is out and surroundings are made safe before leaving.


Mobile celebrates July 4 at Cooper-Riverside Park

"I do have lots of things going on this year, but I enjoy it, especially teaching the kids. You have to be patient, but there is nothing like it when you see them finally get it."



Design work begins for Gulf Coast Center for Ecotourism and Sustainability Gulf Shores will use part of its \$41.8 million in Restore funding to pay for \$9.7 million project

Gulf Shores accepted just more than \$1 million to begin phase one of building the Gulf Coast Center for Ecotourism and Sustainability on city land adjacent to Gulf State Park. The money will go toward the planning, program management, engi-

neering and design of the new center in what is a \$9.7 million Restore Actfunded project.

"The City is committed to creating and implementing programs to promote sustainable tourism, raise environmental awareness, and encourage the stewardship of natural resources in order to increase community resilience, strengthen the regional economy, and enhance the quality of life for

its residents and

visitors."

"The City is committed to creating and implementing programs to prosustainable tourism, raise environmental awareness, and encourage the stewardship of natural resources in order to increase community resilience, strengthen the regional economy, and enhance the quality of life for its residents and visitors," Environmental Grants Coordinator Dan Bound told the council during its June 10 regular session.

"The regional economy, and enhance the quality of life for its residents and visitors. The facility that will support ecotourism and environmental education in the Gulf Coast region as part of

the Alabama Gulf Coast Recovery Council's Multiyear Implementation Plan."

Bond said the center will partner with and run programs with local schools, Gulf State Park and use the park's many environmental assets in those programs.

"The facility utilize access to the State Park Learning Campus facility located adjacent to Gulf Shores Middle School, as well as sites throughout the State Park, including the Interpretive Center, the Nature Center, Lake Shelby, the beach, and the Hugh Branyon Backcountry trail system," Bond's report said. with Gulf Shores City Schools, Gulf State Park, Valor Hospitality, Gulf Shores & Orange Beach Tourism, research universities, environmental education groups, industry partners, and local business groups."

GULF SHORES CITY COUNCIL

The classes and programs offered, Bond said, will focus on teaching students as well as adults environmental stewardship.

"The project will also develop and facilitate a range of programs for students of Gulf Shores City Schools and other school districts within the region, as well as summer and weekend programs that benefit the local economy and encourage responsible tourism," Bond said. "The Center will provide resources for the development and enhancement of regional ecotourism and sustainability initiatives, and Coordinate efforts with other environmental education and tourism related entities in the region to promote sustainable tourism and raise environmental awareness."

One the first of those projects will partner with the internationally renowned Cousteau Foundation to implement and run an Ambassadors to the Environment learning program.

"One of the core programs that will be implemented is the Jean Michel Cousteau's Oceans Future Society's Ambassadors of the Environment, an experienced-based education program that dedicated to engaging people of all ages with their natural and cultural environment," Bond said. "Travis Langen, executive director of the new center, who has been out and about in the community getting all this started."


Also, at the meeting were Dr. Richard Murphy and Estelle Davies, two Cousteau Society employees in town to work in the curriculum for the center. Murphy has been working with the Cousteaus since 1968 and said the ambassador program grew out of the many television explorations on the show, Exhibition.

"What we're happy to do here is exploring the environment exactly as we used to on Expedition," Murphy told the council. "Learning from the experts, learning from the people who are involved in management of tourism and things like that and figuring out what are the most exciting resources that we can capitalize on to build experiences for particularly kids. But not only kids in the Ambassadors of the Environment program."

The city is approved for a total of \$41.8 million in Restore funding and this is the first one received by the city. Others include \$4.4 million to extend the Fort Morgan Trail all the way to the fort, \$5.9 million for the Little Lagoon Restoration project and \$21.7 million for traffic capacity improvements including Canal Road.

During the regular session, the council also:

- The city hired Southern Engineering Services to prepare bid documents for resurfacing of three streets this fall for \$58,500. The streets are Wedgewood Drive and to add bike lanes, West Sixth Avenue and Royal Oaks Circle. The design costs are about seven percent of the total construction which is estimated to be about \$835,000.
- Amended a resolution for the city staff to pursue a Recreational Trails Program grant to request \$342,699 to improve the Fort Morgan from Callaway Drive to Peninsula Boulevard. Gulf Shores' bid for the grant was recommended by the Alabama Department of Economic and Community Affairs It is a reduced Federal match amount from the City's originally requested \$400,000.
- Approved the annexation into the city of Jasmine Trail Apartments on 13.9 acres on Oak Road East or County Road 6. There are 72 units in the complex and they are requested to come in under R-3 zoning which would match the current land
- Approved liquor a license for Family Dollar Store in the former Winn Dixie Shopping Center.


"Having lived in Florida for most of my adult life, the images around me, both real and imaginary, have intertwined to help me create a style that conveys a contemporary

COASTAL ARTS CENTER OF ORANGE BEACH SUMMER ARTS CAMP

The first week of June, kids from throughout South Baldwin County and around the state gathered at the Coastal Arts Center of Orange Beach for their annual summer arts camp. With such a unique camp and spots filling fast, some families plan their summer trip to the beach around the week in order to make sure their kids get to experience the fun and creativity. This year's theme was "Happy Camper" with a focus on the art within nature and upcycling existing items into interesting and useful pieces.

With help from staff and members of the Friends of the Arts, the campers upcycled pallets, jars, bottles, caps, wire, keys, and old jewelry into magnificent wall hangings, garden sparklers, and macramé lanterns. Guest artist, John David Swiger, showed the students the art he has made from beach trash and made sure they knew how important they are in the movement to keep our island and our planet beautiful. "You are never too young to be a leader," Swiger said. Once students saw what he made from found objects they were inspired to bring their own items from home to make their pieces more personal and truly distinct to them.

Special animal guests from the Gulf State Park Nature Center and the Orange Beach Wildlife Center also reminded students of the beauty of nature and the impact humans have on the lives of our local wildlife. With a baby alligator and a rescued otter from the OBWC, the kids learned about the importance of keeping the environment clean for animal habitats and not feeding wildlife. The GSP Nature Center brought three rescued owls and emphasized

the intellect of owls, but also their vulnerability especially around busy roads. The instructors patiently answered questions and offered insight into the life of local animals, much to the delight of the students

One of the most exciting elements of the camp each year is that the students get to work with professional glass and clay artists. Maya Blume-Cantrell taught the students to use elements from nature to make impressions and patterns in clay. Students used leaves, pine cones, flower petals, and moss on their pieces. They also learned about the process of glazing and firing. Each student got to join glass artists Kerry Parks and Dan Rush in The Hot Shop to blow glass into flowers, paper weights, or an ornament. This is one of the only camps in the country that allows children in grades 3 through 6 to work in a hot glass studio, giving them an experience that few people have ever had, much less elementary students

The week was capped off with a Young Artists Exhibit in the gallery, allowing each camper to show off all that they made. Parent Nicole Godbold commented, "The kids were so happy, eager for the next morning and so secretive each afternoon leading up to the big reveal on Friday." With about 150 attendees, the show was enthusiastically-received. Although kids' camp is only one week each summer. the art center offers a teen camp July 15th-19th and has Pop-Up Art classes for kids on most Tuesdays from 10am-12pm through August. Ospreys: Winged Anglers

Although once a rare site along the Gulf Coast and many other areas, ospreys are now a common occurrence in our area. Also known as fish hawks, these fish- eating birds of prey can be found anywhere there is a source of permanent water, fresh or

Ospreys are found in similar habitats as bald eagles, and are sometimes mistaken for them. Bald eagles are larger and the adults have white head feathers and black bodies. Ospreys have white crowns, foreheads, necks, breasts and bellies, with black wings and backs. Separating the white feathers on the crown from those on the neck and chest is a distinctive black eye stripe. As with many other birds of prey, the females are about 20% larger than the males.

Like bald eagles, ospreys mate for life. Once a pair bonds and mates, nest construction begins. The osprey pair will return to the same nest, year after year, continuously building onto it. Older nests can reach 4 or 5 feet in diameter and weigh several hundred pounds. They prefer to build their nests in the tops of large dead trees with flattened tops, but will build on top of power poles, cell phone towers and channel markers.

Female ospreys lay 2 or 3 brown speckled eggs which incubate for about one month. The eggs hatch in the order in which they were laid, giving the oldest chick an advantage in feeding and growing first. The younger chicks often do not survive during food shortages.

After the nest is built and the eggs laid, the male spends most of his time hunting for himself, his mate and eventually, the young. He will continue this behavior until the young birds can fly and hunt for themselves.

Both osprey parents care for their young, and the chicks grow rapidly. They reach more than 70% of their adult size in just a month. After about 2 months, young ospreys are ready to leave the nest, but often return to the nest for several weeks to beg for food from their parents.

An osprey's diet is pretty monotonous, about 99% fish. They are not particular, feeding on whatever species is most abundant. Although bald eagles will eat dead fish, ospreys prefer to take their prey live. Where ospreys and eagles share hunting grounds, eagles often "mug" the ospreys, stealing their fish.

While bald eagles swoop down over the top of the water and catch fish near the surface, ospreys plunge completely into the water from as high as 200 feet, talons out front, sometimes going

To help hold fish, ospreys not only have sharp talons but also have spines on the pads of their feed called "spicules". They also have an opposable toe that can be rotated forwarded or backward, depending on the circumstances.

After taking flight the osprey will rotate its feet so there are 2 claws on each side of the fish. This helps to reposition the fish to face head forward, making it more aerodynamic in flight.

Like bald eagles and brown pelicans, ospreys fell victim to pesticides like DDT. These pesticides built up in the food chain and caused the shells of osprey eggs to weaken and break under the weight of the females during incubation.

Since these pesticides were banned in the 1970s, ospreys have made a dramatic comeback. Now these winged anglers are once again a common site along our waterways.



O.B. to manage \$475K dredged sediment Restore project for state

Orange Beach has been asked to administer \$475,000 of a \$3 million Restore Act project studying hydrology and sediment in Perdido Bay from the U.S. 98 bridge in Lillian to the Gulf.

"It's a three-part study for beneficial use of dredged sediment," Coastal Resources Director Phillip West said.

"Determining all the forces that go toward moving sediment, displacing sediment, causing erosion, causing hotspots, even accretion if that's the case, or shoaling."

"The state reached out to us because we have done almost like a phase one for the lower Perdido and that's one of the three sites to study. Because we had coordinated that they asked us if we could take all the lower Perdido studies, manage those and direct the contractors and consultants."

The city council OK'd the agreement with the state during the June 4 joint regular session and work session.

Areas in the study include the Denton Oyster Reef, a feasibility study on the restoration of Grand Bay, Mississippi, barrier islands and studying sediment movement in the lower Perdido Bay/Pass area from the U.S. 98 bridge in Lillian to the Gulf. The study is being done in advance of the dredging of the Mobile Harbor Navigation Project and how to use materials removed to deepen and widen the channel.

This would include "complete planning, design, engineering, and feasibility assessments for three project areas where future placement of dredge sediments would achieve habitat restoration. Designing habitat restoration projects that are ready to utilize such materials saves money, creates habitat and is a Gulf-wide objective of the Gulf Regional Sediment Management Master Plan."

The first step, West said, would be to seek proposals from firms who are interested in conducting the study.

"We'll put out requests for qualifications once we finalize this agreement with the state," West said. "Once they give us the green light to do announcement and begin the actual work then we'll proceed hopefully with the whole process. You put the request for qualifications out for 30 days. You have the committee score those respondents, select one, negotiate and award the contract. I'm thinking maybe three months."

Movement of sediment throughout Perdido Pass and the bay will be tracked. The pass is a vital part Orange Beach's charter fishing program

"Determining all the forces that go toward moving sediment, displacing sediment, causing erosion, causing hotspots, even accretion if that's the case, or shoaling," West said. "Then we'll determine what is the total sediment budget, what are some of the dredging intervals and how do we best use that sediment in the most beneficial manner to not only mitigate erosion but develop habitat over a long term. When you're looking at forces that have always been there in the watershed but also, we are considering sea level rise with everything we do along the shorelines now."

Studying how the U.S. 98 bridge affects the flow of sediment at the north end of the project area will likely be included.

"We'll have a report for the sediment management study, we'll have a report for the hydrological study, we'll have a report for the natural resource inventory," West said. "We're probably looking at the 98 bridge or the Lillian bridge. You do have the bridge there that would have some influences and to some point north of the bridge. I'm not sure what the engineers would tell us is sufficient to capture the 98 bridge's influence on this hydrological element."

During the regular session, the council:

- Heard the first reading of an ordinance approving annexation of the Birkenhauer property into the city.

An ordinance establishing a speed zone with a speed limit of 35 miles per hour on the portion of State Route 182 for the last quarter mile or so of road before the Florida line.
- Setting a public hearing date for Summer Salt final planned unit development with the suggested date of July 2.


Taylor Hicks Back to Flora-Bama Bash June 21

American Idol winner and former Pleasure Island resident Taylor Hicks returns to the Flora-Bama for what he is calling his second annual Back to the Bama Bash on June 21 at 9 p.m.

Hicks, who still has family living in South Baldwin County, said his goal is to come back to the beach every summer. The standard Flora-Bama cover charge will apply, but there will be no additional charge to see Hicks' performance.

"The Flora-Bama is my old stomping grounds. It would be ideal if I could nail down something where I could come back down



every year around this time," he said. "This is where I'm from. I like talking to people at the 'Bama. It's always been the kind of place where you meet people from all walks of life.

"I have all kinds of family down there," he added from his home in Nashville. "I will get to see them. I'll fish. Go out on a boat. No shoes, No shirt. No problem, to borrow a line from our friend (Kenny Chesney)."

Hicks will have a full band plugged in behind him and play songs from his American Idol songbook in addition to tracks from the country-soul singer's third album due out this fall.

"The album was a labor of love, but I want to be smart about how I release and market it," he said of the album. "It's a soulful country record. Very rootsy. Sounds like Jackson Browne and Zack Brown got together."

A single, "Six Strings and Diamond Rings" from the album recorded at Zac Brown's Southern Ground studio was released last year. Contributing to the album were Keb' Mo and Robert Randolph.

For Hicks, winning "American Idol's" blockbuster fifth season was obviously a life changing experience. Hailed as "part Stax, part Motown and part honky-tonk" by The New York Times, Hicks' intoxicating blend of soul, blues, country, and rock & roll quickly rendered him a household name as he progressed to the show's record-breaking finale in 2006. That historic television event drew an audience of more than 200 million viewers.

Hicks followed with a No. 1 Billboard single and an RIAA certified Platinum debut, a Las Vegas residency and a stint on Broadway and on tour as Teen Angel in the popular Broadway musical "Grease."

Since then, he has wrapped up the syndicated "State Plate," his own food and travel show that features cuisine and culture from all 50 states. It is now available on Amazon Prime. Hicks' passion for southern cuisine also led him to open up Saw's BBQ & Juke Joint in Birmingham.

Hicks recently took on the role of Charlie Anderson in the Serenbe Playhouse production of "Shenandoah." The outdoor production captured the story of one family's struggle living in the Shenandoah Valley during the American Civil War. He is also partnering in front of and behind the camera on a series of short films

"I caught a little bit of the acting bug and picked up a few gigs lately," he said. "I enjoy it and it's interesting. I have been blessed to be able to have a good start in truly learning about the art of acting

"As I see it, you have to go wherever the wind takes you in this business," he added. "Kind of like those old-school musicians that used to blow into the Flora-Bama and all the other bars up and down the Gulf Coast. They would play for the tip jar before sailing off somewhere else. Whatever way the wind blew is the way they went. I think that is the essence of who I am.

"I don't mean it literally. But I want to be open and follow the wind with my career. I can still relate to those old songwriters I met at the 'Bama when I was 18 or 19 years old."

Captains treat Fallen Outdoors to Alabama's great inshore fishing

After a ride through the significant chop caused an unusual June north wind, Capt. Bobby Abruscato pulled back on the throttle and idled to one of his favorite fishing spots in Grand Bay, west of Dauphin

Aboard were a couple of special guests, Derrick Warfield and Kyle McCleland, who were quickly hooking fish during the inaugural The Fallen Outdoors (TFO) inshore fishing trip that treated a group of active military and veterans to the beautiful outdoors paradise we call the Alabama Gulf Coast.

Warfield, who resides at Maxwell Air Force Base in

Montgomery with his active-duty wife, retired after 10 years of active

our demons. No-Since then. Warfield has taken up the cause that is TFO, which is a support group for active, retired, separated and medically retired military with a focus on the outdoors. Before this week, TFO, a 501(c)3 charitable organization, hosted veterans vet. People look and active military on mostly hunting excursions at you and think with only a little fishing mixed in.

"Most of our trips are done from Montgomery north," Warfield said of the TFO's Team Alabama. "We do a lot of hunting trips. Two weeks ago, we

actually did a hog-hunting trip on a farm just south of Montgomery. We went out with three guys running dogs, and we got into about a 200-pound sow. The dogs caught the hog and we dispatched it."

Needing to schedule events for the summer, Warfield reached out to several inshore fishing guides on the Alabama coast and quickly hooked up with Capt. Richard Rutland with Cold-Blooded Fishing.

"Richard said if there was anything he could do, he'd love to help," Warfield said. "He said we could go out on his boat and make something happen. Then he said, 'We need to make this big, something awesome."

Two weeks later, Warfield got a call from Rutland, who said, "I've got seven boats lined up. How many people can you get?"

Warfield posted the potential trip on The Fallen Outdoors Facebook page that reaches 14,000-15,000 veterans. Initially, Warfield got 25 takers, which whittled down to the 14 who enjoyed a day of fishing on

the beautiful Alabama coast. Rutland, a former president of the Alabama Deep Sea Fishing Rodeo, got commitments from seven other captains. He also got a donation from the Mobile Jaycees, where he currently serves as chairman of the board. Additional boat captains included Abruscato with A-Team Adventures. Patric Garmeson with Ugly Fishing Charters, Wesley Hallman with Bay Sound Charters, Terry Turner, Ben Raines, Joe Geil and Theo Atkinson with Spots, Dots and Scales.

"We just appreciate these captains being able to get these guys who are dealing with physical and mental issues out on the water," Warfield said. "This gives them a chance to get out, get away from the real world and relax, whether it be hunting, fishing, camping or whatever we can do outdoors.

"This wouldn't have been possible without Richard. Richard really pushed it. He wanted to make it really big, and he wants to make it an annual event."

The Jaycees' donation for the trip also provided lunch after a morning on the water. The guides took care of the equipment, and bait dealer Maurice Ryan donated the live shrimp.

The anglers hauled in a wide variety of Alabama's inshore species, including the edible species of speckled trout, redfish, white trout, flounder and pompano. Mixed in for anglers' enjoyment were the acrobatic ladyfish, croakers and the ubiquitous hardhead catfish.

"We've never had an event this big," Warfield said. "Before, the biggest trip was with five or six guys. This was a huge, huge trip for us, and it wouldn't be possible without all these captains. What I tell the captains is if you can help out, great. If you can't, we understand because you have to make a living." Warfield said a good many TFO members want to take part in the outings, but time constraints limit the participation.

"Weekends are really, really busy for them, but today was a perfect day," he said. "It was a Monday, and we had plenty of people who wanted to come." Warfield said the organization tries to get the message out about The Fallen Outdoors through outdoors trade shows and social media. Rutland lined up several media outlets to cover the Dauphin Island event, including the Mobile Press-Register and Mobile TV stations WALA and WKRG.

"This was the most media we've had for a TFO event," Warfield said. "Hopefully this will get us out there more and let veterans know there are free or low-cost hunting and fishing trips available."

TFO was started in the 2009 in Washington state and has grown to a membership of about 34,000 veterans. Warfield said between 13,000 and 14,000 veterans are signed up in the southern region. Visit thefallenoutdoors.com for more information.

"It's just another way to reach out to veterans," Warfield said. "Our focus is strictly on the outdoors, whether it's hunting, fishing, hiking or just hanging out near the water. We just want to make the connections. All of us have our demons. Nobody understands what a vet is going through better than another vet. People look at you and think you're normal, but inside you're torn apart. It could be physical injuries. It could be PTSD. And making the transition from military to civilian is totally different. A lot of things in the military don't translate to civilian life.

"This trip was amazing. We had veterans come from Florida and Louisiana as well as Alabama. These vets get to meet more people they can lean on. They can definitely make new friendships on trips like these."

Because of the proliferation of veterans organizations in the past decade, Rutland admitted he was cautious when originally contacted by Warfield.

"I always like to do my homework before I put something on like this," Rutland said. "After talking to Derrick several times, I looked at my books and realized I had June 10 open. He said he could probably

get 15 to 20 vets to come, and I started calling my guide friends to see who might be available.

"It really came together nicely. This is my busy time of the year, and it kind of got here real quick, but everything came together as well as I could have ex-

Although June is a busy month for charter captains, Rutland said he's sticking with an early June date for next year's event because it's the best time for the veterans.

"Basically, the whole deal with Derrick reaching out to me is this is kind of a dead period for outdoors activities for the veterans," Rutland said. "They have a lot of hunting in the fall and winter and a little fishing in the spring. By the time it gets into early summer, he has a slack period until the end of the summer.

"They really needed to experience the Alabama Gulf Coast. I'm planning to make it an annual event."

Dauphin Island Mayor Jeff Collier dropped by the ADSFR site to share a lunch of fried fish with the veterans.


"First of all, anytime we can do something positive for our veterans, it's a good thing," Mayor Collier said. "When they can incorporate Dauphin Island into it, it's even better. Who wouldn't enjoy going out on a nice day and catching fish."

The Alabama Marine Resources Division (MRD) provided support for the event, and MRD Director Scott Bannon also joined the group for lunch.

Warfield said the inshore fishing trip definitely exceeded expectations.

"We would have been happy if it had been two people, but it turned out to be a lot more," he said. "We're not going to argue with Richard about making it an annual event, because we would love to come back. I can't say thank you enough to all the captains."



Alabama adds coastal zone to alligator season

Mandatory alligator hunting training workshop will now be offered only online

Two significant changes are in store for those fortunate enough to be selected for a tag in the random drawing for the 2019 Alabama alligator season.

The Alabama Wildlife and Freshwater Fisheries (WFF) Division has created a new Coastal Zone and shifted the mandatory alligator hunting training work-

shop to online only.

"We went from mandatory in-person training to mandatory online training," said Chris Nix, WFF's Alligator Program Coordinator. "We did this to try to cut out an obstacle for people to participate. It was always a problem with several people each year, whether it was weddings or vacations or other obligations. It was especially hard on people coming from Birmingham or Huntsville to make the trip all the way to the coast for one class. And, we had just one class per zone each year, so hopefully this will be better.

"I think people that took the in-person training got a lot of really good information and it was effective."

Registration for the alligator hunts is currently open at www.outdooralabama.com/alligators/alligator-huntregistration. All entries must be received by 8 a.m. on July 10 to be considered for the random drawing.

After the registration period ends, applicants can go to that same online page to check their status. If selected as a hunter or an alternative, a link to the mandatory online training video will be available.

"Those people who are drawn have seven days to complete the online training," Nix said. "Once the online training is completed, then they can accept their status. The training is in five segments with questions to answer at the end of each segment. It will probably take most people less than 30 minutes to complete the online training."

Nix said when the first alligator season was sanctioned in 2006, it covered only the southernmost portion of the Mobile-Tensaw Delta from the Causeway (Battleship Parkway) to the CSX railroad to the north. In the years since, the boundaries for the Southwest Zone have been expanded to include all of Mobile and Baldwin counties and private and public waters in Washington, Clarke and Monroe counties that lie east of U.S. Highway 43 and south of U.S. Highway 84.

Nix urged tag holders for several years to try the prime alligator hunting available south of I-10 in Baldwin and Mobile counties, but few gators have been taken in those areas

The creation of the Coastal Zone with 50 tags for all territory below I-10 in the two coastal counties will tar-

get that underutilized population.

"That's where we get 95 percent of our nuisance alligator complaints," Nix said. "That's where everybody lives, but there are also a lot of alligators down there. We would much rather hunters take those alligators out instead of us. Historically, we have averaged less than 5% of the harvest from the area south of the interstate."

The 50 tags for the Coastal Zone will reduce the number of tags for the rest of the Southwest Zone to 100. Nix said 96 gators were harvested in the whole Southwest Zone last season.

"The Coastal Zone will include the private and public waters in Baldwin and Mobile counties that lie south of I-10," Nix said. "Any body of water in the two coastal

counties will likely have alligators. There are some really good alligators down there, and they're not hunted at all."

The Coastal Zone will have the same rules as the Southwest Zone and will utilize the same check station at the WFF's office on the Causeway at 30571 Five Rivers Blvd., Spanish Fort, AL 36527.

Dates for the Southwest Zone and the Coastal Zone are sunset on August 8 until sunrise on August 11 and sunset on August 15 until sunrise on August 18.

Several stories have surfaced recently about alligator sightings in north Alabama, but Nix said those animals are anomalies.

"A lot of the alligators we're hearing about in Blount and Cullman counties, that's not the natural range of the American alligator," he said. "Those were likely put there by somebody. If you draw a line across the state around Montgomery, from a reproductive standpoint, that point south would be the alligator's natural range in Alabama. You'll have a few exceptions, like the few alligators that always show up at Lake Tuscaloosa."

Nix said across the five hunting zones and the alligator's natural range in the state the population is seen as

stable to increasing.

"We did reduce the number of tags at Lake Eufaula several years ago and added a size limit of 8 feet, as did the state of Georgia," he said. "We wanted to protect that female portion of the population and ensure the hunting efforts had no significant impact on their population as a whole.

"All other areas are stable to increasing. The Southwest Zone still has the densest population. That's 100% due to the available habitat. It's by far the best alliga-

tor habitat we have."

Last year, a total of 144 alligators were harvested statewide. John Herthum of Montgomery bagged the heaviest gator in the state last year with a 700-pound gator that measured 11 feet, 10 inches in the Southeast Zone.

The Southwest Zone checked in 96 alligators. The heaviest was 603 pounds and caught by Josh Forbes of Mobile County. The longest gator was a 12-foot, 9-incher taken by Donald White of Stockton. It weighed 588 pounds. Donald Hogue of Alabaster caught the largest alligator in the West Central Zone at 12-3, 538 pounds.

Nix said the average size of the gators harvested has been relatively stable because people almost always want to take the largest gator they can find.

However, a new rule that was implemented last year may affect that average size. The no-cull rule means hunters cannot catch and then release an alligator to

try to find a larger one.

"No more culling is allowed," Nix said. "If you get the alligator next to the boat, it must be dispatched immediately. Once it's captured, it's your alligator."

For those lucky enough to get drawn and complete the online training course, Nix recommends scouting the designated hunting areas before the season starts.

"I would recommend scouting suitable habitat during the daytime hours rather than scouting at night, looking for animals," he said. "That is especially important if you're unfamiliar with the body of water. Get to know the navigable waterways and huntable areas. The Delta is always changing and can get tricky, especially at night. If you can, find a hunting partner that is familiar with the waterways where you're hunting. That goes a long way."

And be prepared for whatever Mother Nature throws your way during those season dates.

"It's happening, rain or shine," Nix said. "We do not

change the dates."


