Recreational Red Snapper season should stay open thru July 27

The Alabama Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (ADCNR) has been issued an Exempted Fishing Permit (EFP) from NOAA Fisheries to manage the private vessel and state-licensed charter vessel components of Alabama's recreational red snapper fishery. The 2019 private angler season began June 1 and is expected to be open every Friday, Saturday and Sunday through July 28 and the Fourth of July – a total of 27 days.

In 2019, Alabama's red snapper quota is 1,079,513 pounds. ADCNR monitors red snapper landings via Snapper Check, a program created to collect mandatory reports from recreational anglers landing red snapper in Alabama.

In order to obtain landings estimates, the number of reported harvested fish is multiplied by the average weight of fish measured and weighed by ADCNR staff from randomly selected vessels. The reporting ratio is determined by comparing information collected by ADCNR staff at public boat ramps and marinas to vessel reports submitted by anglers through Snapper Check.

ADCNR recognizes the impact that local weather has on the landings this season and will continue to monitor the fishing effort, catch rates, and average fish size to determine if the season length will

need to be adjusted.

The goal of the state-managed plan is to ensure that anglers fishing from Alabama have the opportunity to catch the state's fish allocation but not exceed those pounds. The critical portion of managing the quota is accurate and timely reporting by anglers through the Snapper Check program. Any landings amount above the quota in 2019 will be deducted from the 2020 quota prior to the start of the 2020

"There have been a lot of nice red snapper landed in Alabama this year despite the rough waters," said Chris Blankenship, Commissioner of the Alabama Department of Conservation and Natural Re-

"We are a little below our projections due to the winds earlier this month. We hope the winds are fairer through the Fourth of July holiday weekend, so people can enjoy catching this tasty fish.

"We appreciate the fishermen who have reported their catch through Snapper Check, but there is definitely room for improvement. Our officers will be issuing citations for vessels that fail to report their catch before landing," Blankenship said.

The EFP does not cover federally permitted charter vessels, which have their own season. Anglers are reminded that the federally permitted, for-hire charter boats are not managed under the state system. That season runs seven days a week until August 1, 2019.

Mrs. Marge Moore







Council supports moratorium on business licenses for stores selling CBD CBD oil testing positive for THC in O.B. could lead to felony arrest regardless of percentage

were illegal. Then about two months later the Alabama Department of Agriculture OK'd growing industrial hemp in the state and Congress took the hemp out of its definition of marijuana.

During the business license process, licenses are reviewed by various city department heads and any of those people who have concerns about a particular license can ask the council for a review of that license.

"It's very easy to get confused," Fierro said. "Basically, the state of Alabama needs to make a determination as to what they want to do so we

know what we have to do or not to do. Until that happens perhaps a little bit more time may be better to take a closer look at it."

Hemp contains about 0.3 percent of THC, the substance that gives marijuana users a high. Mar-

ijuana can contain as much as 20 percent to 30 percent of the substance.

At a July 9 work session, the council aired those and other concerns as they discussed a business license for Lotus of Orange Beach. Also, during a 90-minute-long discussion, council members voiced support for a moratorium on business licenses to stores wanting to sell CBD products.

"All we're doing is saying let's take some time to create an ordinance that will prevent what we know what is going to happen with the frauds and the fakes," Kennon said. "Do we require onsite recordkeeping so when we walk in and look at the product you've got the lab tests are right there for us? And what we do with our police department?"

Chase Smith, one of the owners of Lotus and owner of another shop in Foley that sells CBD, said his research says the oil and other products have been declared legal by four state agencies.

Smith quoted one of the releases to read that "as a result of a Congressional action CBD derived from industrial hemp with a THC concentration of no more than 0.3 percent can be legally produced sold and possessed in the state of Alabama."

"There's no ambiguity there," Smith said. "It's legal per all four of those departments that have issued those press releases."

After concerns about quality control and products getting in that might contain higher percentages of THC, Smith said all of his products are tested by an independent lab.

"Everything in our store comes with a certificate of analysis," Smith said. "Not even the company themselves but an outside lab to run the tests to show all the oils that are in it."

Kennon said his concerns weren't with the legitimate dealers with tested products but with products that aren't as controlled getting into

David's Gallery has sold CBD products in G.S. since 2014

Owner says snowbirds are easily the primary customers for her CBD goods

Carolyn Hall was not on site selling tie-dye tees and water pipes when David's Gallery opened as Sunburst back in 1969, but she has been the driving force behind the business for 41 of the 50 years it has welcomed patrons to Gulf Shores.

Located about a half mile north of Gulf Shores Public Beach, David's Gallery is the only retailer in the city selling CBD oil products, as far as its owner (pictured) knows. Hall has been selling a variety of CBD oil based products since President Obama made it legal to do so as part of a 2014 Farm Bill. CBD oil is a derivative of hemp, a cannabis plant that looks like marijuana but has negligible levels of THC, its psychoactive component.

Over the course of a year, CBD sales account for the bulk of David Gallery's business. Sales are especially brisk during snowbird season.

"I don't know if it is going to run its course. But it is really trendy right now. I expect that in another year it will be in Wal-Mart and Rite-Aid."

Hall was spot on, as Walgreens is selling CBD creams, patches and sprays in nine states, and CVS introduced CBD topicals, including creams and salves, to stores in

In December 2018, the U.S. House passed the Farm Bill, which contained a provision legalizing CBD derived from industrial hemp, as long as it has a THC concentration of no more than 0.3 percent. Technically, the bill changed the legal status of hemp from a controlled substance to an agricultural commodity.

Alabama Gov. Kay Ivey signed Senate Bill 225 on June 10, allowing pharmacies to sell CBD products containing no more than 0.3 percent THC. Proponents of CBD oil say it helps with medical conditions ranging from seizures and epilepsy to PTSD and chronic pain.

Hall said when she started selling CBD products, there were three suppliers she could work with. There are now between three and four thousand. She said there

will be close to 900 exhibitors at a CBD oil conference she plans to

attend the first week in August in Miami. "I think this is just a misunderstanding. But I would hate to see

it taken way from children who are dealing with seizures. Once you pass laws that are affecting somebody's kids, people are going to get fired up," she said.

"The amount of THC in the oil can not be more than .3 percent. Not three percent - .3 percent," she added.

Hall said she does not know if Gulf Shores will follow Orange Beach's lead with the CBD oil moratorium (see above story). But first Gulf Shores and, soon after that, Orange Beach passed laws limiting the number of tattoo parlors in each city to those that

were already open at their specific locations.

"The federal and state governments may say it's legal, but municipalities pass their own laws all the time," Hall said. "It is an exciting time to be alive."

It is worth noting that Hall was unable to advertise the word "yoga" on signage when she started teaching yoga classes in downtown Gulf Shores more than 30

"People in general are a lot more accepting now," she said.

112 units behind Doc's; 480 more at Caribe

On June 18, Orange Beach City Council heard ordinances for developments that could add 677 houses, cottages, and condo units combined.

Brett Robinson already has the goahead on Phoenix Gulf Towers and is doing foundation work on that project. It would bring 192 units to Orange Beach on the west end of town between Palm Beach and Sugar Sands developments. At the east end of town Brett Robinson's Phoenix Orange Beach II, a 120-unit project, is nearing completion on the Gulf between the Island House Hotel on the west and Tidewater condos.

Caribe developer Larry Wireman is looking to add two towers of 24 and 25 stories to the east and west of the current three 14-story buildings on the east side of Perdido Pass. The east tower is planned for 228 units with 187 being three-bedroom and 41 being five-bedroom. On the west, there are plans for 252 more condos with 204 three-bedroom units and 48 five-bedroom units.

With the 600 already there this would bring the total to 1,080 units on the Caribe property. Wireman, also the developer of Turquoise Place, has had city permission to build more at the Caribe site since 2005.


During recent regular and work sessions, the Orange Beach City Council also:

- Heard a second reading of an ordinance amendment to allow for the development of Caribe East and Caribe West, two more buildings on the Caribe property to add 480 units and gave approval for the project.
- Held a public hearing and had the first reading of an ordinance change for Summer Salt's final PUD. It is located behind Doc's Seafood and Steaks and adjacent to Live Bait. This is phase one which is planning to have 54 single-family residential lots and 58 cottage lots.

The developers are looking to develop the area in two phases. There are two parcels on the site and this one is 42 acres. The second parcel of 21 acres is planning for 54 single-family residential lots and 31 cottage lots.

- Approved a liquor license Application for B&D Maritime for Weather or Knot, a new charter fishing boat at slip E14 at San Roc Marina.
- Approved a resolution declaring certain personal property as surplus and unneeded and authorizing the Mayor and City Clerk to dispose of such property.
- Approved resolutions authorizing a franchise renewal for two taxis companies, A-1 Taxi Service and Blue Dolphin Taxi.

- Approved a resolution hiring Braxton C. Counts, III, P.C. for lobbying services to consult on federal, regional and state issues at a cost of \$2,000 a month plus expenses.
- A resolution establishing the fee for emergency medical treatment and transport services.
- A resolution authorizing the purchase of CCTV system equipment for the Orange Beach High School and Middle School portables in the amount of \$10.850.
- A resolution authorizing the execution of a task order with GeoCon, Inc., to provide a soil study for the wetland area south of the new high school in the amount of \$4,500.
- A resolution appropriating funds to the Gulf Shores Airport Authority in an amount not to exceed \$14,000.
- A Resolution appropriating funds to the Makos Academics, Arts & Athletics Club in the amount of \$67,050.
- A resolution appropriating funds to the Baldwin County Board of Education for teacher and coach salaries in an amount not to exceed \$60.000.
- A resolution authorizing execution of a memorandum of understanding with the Wharf Marina.
- Resolutions authorizing the sole source purchase of a 30-horsepower submersible pump for \$26,329 and a 15-horsepower submersible pump for \$16,978 from Jim House & Associates for the Utilities Department.
- A resolution for a lease agreement for a portable classroom for the Expect Excellence program for about \$28,000 for a term of nine months. The city-led afterschool program is expecting reach about 350 students in the fall and the extra space is needed until the new gymnasium at the recreation center campus is completed.

Back to School Sales Tax Holiday weekend July 19-21

Beginning at 12:01 a.m. (CST) on Friday, July 19, and ending at twelve midnight on Sunday, July 21, Alabama will hold its twelfth annual sales tax holiday giving shoppers the opportunity to purchase certain school supplies, computers, and clothing free of state sales or use tax. Local sales and use tax may apply. Retailers are required to participate and may not charge tax on items that are legally tax-exempt during the Sales Tax Holiday. This is the third year the tax holiday will occur in July, and Baldwin County and South Baldwin cities, are also participating.

Items included in the tax-free weekend include the following: clothing articles less than \$100, such as Belts, Boots, Caps, Coats, Diapers Dresses, Gloves, Gym Suits, Hats, Hosiery, Jackets, Jeans, Neckties, Pajamas, Pants, Raincoats, Robes, Sandals, Scarves, School Uniforms, Shirts, Shoes Shorts, Socks, Sneakers, and Underwear


For purposes of the exemption, a computer may include a laptop, desktop, or tower computer system, which consists of a central processing unit (CPU), and devices such as a display monitor, keyboard, mouse, and speakers sold as a computer package. Computer parts and devices not sold as part of a package with the CPU, will not qualify for the exemption.

Items commonly used by a student in a course of study in which a computer is used are also included.

School supplies with a sales price of \$50 or less are also included, as is written material commonly used by a student in a course of study as a reference and to learn the subject being taught).

PBR piano-man John Lee Sanders releases "Tweakin' Some Twang"

It would be natural to assume Orange Beach resident John Lee Sanders reached into his pocket deep, grabbed a handful of mulligans 50 years in the making and tossed them on the table to recruit the Alist session musicians playing on his first album of new songs in 10 years.

That is partly true. The go-to-guys on Sanders' new album, "Tweakin' Some Twang," have worked with Ray Charles, Aretha Franklin, Marvin Gaye, BB King, Tower of Power, Willie Nelson and their ilk.

But to record strings for an album cut he wrote for his wife, he went online and found the sound he wanted from a quartet based in China that he contacted through Airgigs.com.

"I never counted them up, but we had maybe 20 musicians altogether," he said. "I have some amazing musicians. Some I knew from way back when I was playing club gigs back in the 80's in California."

Sanders said, like him, most of the session players on his album have in-home studios, which makes the recording process easier and more affordable.

The four guitarists Sanders used on the album included South Baldwin's own main man, Lee Yankie, Sting axeman Lyle Workman and former CMA Musician of the Year Brent Mason. He also used four bass players and four drummers.

"Starting out, I wanted to get a little bit of country on the album. That was the original concept. But it stretched from there and became broader," he said.

John himself describes the album by listing 12 genres of music that it ${f touches}.$

"My 67 years were a slow migration westward from the foothills of Alabama Appalachia, The Mississippi Delta, Louisiana Bayous, Memphis Soul, and Juke Joints of East Texas. It all had their distinctive influences on my music," he said.

"My late mother, a generous supporter of the performing arts, would always shout, 'Turn off that twangy music' when the Grand Ole Opry was on. I hope I tweaked Mama's Gumbo enough for her discerning ears without losing the authenticity of our great musical legacy."

Sanders has been paid to score

classical films and has been in the studio recording with everyone from Stevie Wonder and Jimmy Page to Chuck Berry and Randy Newman. He has cashed checks for composing, writing and arranging music, some-

times in the same week.

"When I was growing up in the south, we would go to concerts in Birmingham and there would be The Rolling Stones playing with a country act like Skeeter Davis opening up.

George Harrison was singing country songs and had that Chet Atkins guitar style on the Beatles albums. It was accepted back. It was accepted back then to do something like that," he said.

Sanders wrote one of the songs on the CD, "Hard Times Coming Down Hard," during the Deepwater Horizon BP Oil Spill.

"The oil spill was in some ways a metaphor to the cancer I was soon diagnosed with, and in retrospect, I see the correlations in the lyrics," he said.

Now cancer free, Sanders has earned his keep at Perdido Beach Resort for the past three years (four nights at Voyagers and Fridays in the lobby bar). He does session work most days from his home studio.

> In deciding to include so many styles of music on the CD, Sanders was just doing what comes naturally.

He played keyboards on the Chitlin Circuit in East Texas. He was the Hammond organist for

five years at one of the largest black churches in the Bay Area. He's had residencies in bars from Beale Street to Bourbon Street, from honkeytonks to Haight Ashbury, from juke joints to Manhattan.

One of his albums, "Mozart: Rhythm & Romance," is an appreciation of classical music. Another, "Beacon Of Light," reflects his gospel

"I've always had an issue with classifying genres, which are geographically, socially and culturally driven," he said. "I juggle the tightrope of the

past and current political and cultural divide.

"And then there are the ghosts of my past growing up in the south, with my roots being more swayed in blues, jazz, and classical piano train-

A multi-instrumentalist (saxophone, guitar, piano, vocals), Sanders has played with Paul Williams since 1988.


Before work that led to Grammy and Emmy nominations, Sanders, as "Little John," was Birmingham's answer to Little Stevie Wonder.

He took his band from the Texas Plains, where he went to college, to San Francisco in 1977 at the urging of Doobie Brother Michael Hossack. The band was immensely popular live, but unable to secure a recording

He has toured the major European jazz and blues festivals many times over and even arranged an entire concert for the 22 piece National Jazz Orchestra of Croatia.

He's written arrangements for the Tower of Power, and the list of artists Sanders performed or toured with also includes Carly Simon, Smokey Robinson, Elton John, The Meters, Jimmy Webb, Kris Kristofferson, Starship, Ashford & Simpson, Freddie King and John Lee Hooker.

In 2014, he performed at the Grammys with Williams. Two years earlier, he was an opening act on



Sanders not only wrote, sang, and played instruments on the 12 song "Tweakin' Some Twang," he painted the cover art as well.

Bonnie Raitt's tour. He has put together bands for ASCAP shows at the request of Clive Davis.

Sanders comes from a musical family. His brothers both led bands in Birmingham. His grandmother gave music lessons and played piano at silent movies. His mom's cousin played with W.C. Handy. Although his dad didn't play, he was Jerry Lee Lewis's insurance agent.

"I was a bit reluctant of doing this, considering my previous music catalog, and the stereotype of certain Country music genres, of pickup trucks and Good Ole Boys," he said. "But these original songs tell the

much larger story. I realized I needed a bigger table to fit everybody in.

"I've worked with some of my heroes of this music - Willie Nelson, Chris Stapleton, Bonnie Raitt, John Lee Hooker. Writers like Jimmy Webb, who transcended genres. Their inspiration, and so many others inspired me."

"Tweakin' The Twang" was recorded over a four year period in studios in Germany, Sacramento, Berkeley, Nashville Austria, Spain Orange Beach, New York, Daphne, New York and St. Petersburg, Russia

Stevie Ray & John Lee

With 50 years of touring behind him, John Lee Sanders is going to have stories from the road, including this early one: "My first visit to Austin was opening For Rod Argent, in the mid-70's at Armadillo World Head-quarters. Our roadies' equipment truck broke down on the way down from Dallas. The band was in another car. So we never got to play the gig, and no money for a hotel. Our drummer knew the Thunderbirds, who had just moved down from Dallas. They had a band house where we crashed. We ended up partying with Stevie Ray, and Jimmie Vaughan the whole night."

Elvis & John Lee meet

We're not sure what this story has to do with John Lee's decision to devote himself to playing music, but Sanders did say his earliest music memory is listening to the first single from Elvis, "That's Alright Mama" on the A side, and "Blue Moon of Kentucky" on the flip-side. Sanders and Elvis met briefly when Elvis owned a house near Sanders' aunt in Memphis. Sanders was standing among a yardful of screeming teenage girls when Elvis and his female entourage left the house and climbed into a convertible. When things simmered down, Sanders asked Elvis' father, Vernon, if he could use the bathroom in the house and was able to see the throne of the king for himself.

A Gong Show Winner

While recording in Hollywood, Sanders auditioned for the Gong Show and won. Dressed as the Louisiana Chicken Man, he hand played the first part of Sweet Georgia Brown before finishing the song on his saxaphone. He earned \$516.32 for his troubles. "I ended up making a few grand in residuals because I was in the musicians' union," he said.

Little Lagoon Watershed Plan topic of July 18 LLPS meeting

The Little Lagoon Watershed Management Plan will be the main topic for discussion during the July 18 Little Lagoon Preservation Society summer meeting beginning at 5:30 p.m. at the Gulf Shores Activity Center (260 Clubhouse Drive).

Geosyntec Consultants was selected as the contractor to prepare the Watershed Management Plan for the Perdido Pass and Little Lagoon watersheds, and will be the presenters for the member meeting, which is open to the public.

The first half hour of the meeting provides an opportunity to meet, mingle and enjoy refreshments. The program begins at 6 p.m. and will include a question-and-answer period. Updates on Little Lagoon Pass and the Little Lagoon oyster gardening program will also be presented.

The plan will use stakeholder engagement coupled with sciencebased solutions to set goals focused on common values most important to those living in Coastal Alabama.

The plan will determine a suite of projects and programs targeted to improve ecosystem services within the watershed, and most importantly - target future funding opportunities to areas where they would result in the greatest benefit.

A brief presentation will provide an overview of the planning process and the need for input and unique insight from a local perspective into the environmental challenges we face.

Funding for this project comes under the RESTORE Act as administered by the Gulf Coast Ecosystem Restoration Council.

Little Lagoon Watershed Management Plan

The Little Lagoon Watershed Management Plan will provide a roadmap for restoring or conserving watersheds and improving water and habitat quality in areas where resources could have been damaged by the Deepwater Horizon oil spill. The plan will chart a conceptual course for improving or protecting the things people value most about living along the Alabama coast, including:

• Water Quality – The coastal community continues to desire water that is drinkable, swimmable, and able to support aquatic and marine life.

• Fish and Wildlife – Fishery resources are valued an industry, a primary recreational pastime, and a staple of the diets of residents and visitors.

• Environmental Health and Resilience – The coastal community relies upon coordinated actions to reduce vulnerability to and recover from the range of hazards we face, natural and otherwise.

• Access – Having access to coastal waters and natural resources is something about which people care deeply.

• Heritage and Culture – Preserving heritage and culture is important due to concerns that the bountiful waters that provided such pleasure through our lifetimes will not be available to our grandchildren.

• Beaches and Shorelines – They provide critical edge habitat to aquatic and terrestrial animals and recreational opportunities for residents and visitors.

In addition to the six values identified above, these Plans should provide a strategy for conserving and restoring coastal habitat types providing critical ecosystem services and identified by the MBNEP's Science Advisory Committee as most threatened by anthropogenic stressors. These habitat types freshwater wetlands; streams, rivers, and riparian buffers; and intertidal marshes and flats - were classified as most stressed from dredging and filling, fragmentation, and sedimentation, all related to land use change. These habitats and the ecosystem services they provide are related to several, if not each, of the six identified values.





City seeks funds to add pedestrian bridge over Intracoastal Waterway

The City of Gulf Shores is taking its fourth swing at a federal grant to add a third southbound lane from County Road 6, over the bridge to either Clubhouse Drive or perhaps even Fort Morgan Road.

"We will need to work that out during design," Environmental and Grants Coordinator Dan Bond said. "Our goal is to improve capacity and efficiency as much as possible."

Gulf Shores is seeking about \$15 million from the Better Utilizing Investments to Leverage Development (BUILD) Transportation Discretionary Grant Program, a new Congressional program similar to the former Transportation Investment Generating Economic Recovery, or TIGER Discretionary Grants. The city was declined for grant money three times in that pro-

Nearly \$5.6 billion will be granted in nine rounds of grant issued in the BUILD program for transit, rail and port projects. Other parts of the Gulf Shores project includes a pedestrian bridge either attached to the current Intracoastal Waterway Bridge or a freestanding bridge east of Tacky Jack's at the site of the old cantilever

"A new pedestrian bridge across the ICW would connect the north and south Waterway Village areas, adding pedestrian improvements and complete streets throughout the Waterway Village District," Bond said.

The city's planned \$8 million match will come in the form of two projects already in the 10-year capital improvement plan. One is \$4.6 million for improvements to County Road 6 to widen the roadway to accommodate more traffic from several planned large subdivisions.

Gulf Shores will also use \$3.4 million to build two access roads to the medical building it bought with hopes of developing it into a freestanding emergency room. One of those intersections will be a four-way connection with State Route 59 at 34th Avenue with hopes of getting a traffic signal there as well. The other access would come south off of Cotton Creek Drive or County Road 4.

"Grants will likely be awarded in fall 2019, with final agreements executed in spring 2020," Bond said. "Spending would likely begin on Engineering and Design in 2020, with construction starting in 2021. It is estimated the project will take five years to complete construction, with all work completed by 2026."

During its July meeting, Gulf Shores City Coun-

• Gave approval for the mayor and city clerk to sign a letter of support to receive a Small Community Air Service Development grant from the U.S. Department of Transportation. The federal agency is making available \$12.5 million for cities to study air service and air fares in their communities. The city would be asked to provide a 3 percent match and spend no more than \$14,000 on the program.

• Declared a 2006 Dodge Dakota pickup and a 2001 Polar 1796 boat with motor and trailer as surplus and donated them to the Gulf Coast Center for Ecotourism and Sustainability for use in

programs at the facility.

 Appointed Councilman Joe Garris to the Coastal Alabama Business Chamber Board of Directors to replace Councilman Steve Jones who resigned. Jones was recently hired as the vice president for events and advocacy for the cham-



Since breaking off from county, city has spent \$5 million on schools Students will report for first ever day of classes in own system Aug. 9

As the first day of school gets closer and closer the Gulf Shores Board of Education received about \$3.4 million from the city council on a vote in its July 8 meeting.

"We're actually going to get that (tax) money back over five years and really get back more than we gave up so it was a good deal in the long run. Short term we all knew we were going to be a little report on Aug. 6. bit short this summer going into the fall."

Also, during the meeting, the council voted to pursue federal funding to help pay for a \$23 million traffic capacity improvement project including a third southbound lane on State Route 59 over the Intracoastal Waterway bridge.

This appropriation is for the third quarter expenses for operating costs for the new system. Students will report for classes for the first time on Aug. 9 and teachers

In 2018, the city council gave nearly \$347,000 to the fledgling system and so far in 2019, with the latest \$3.4 million influx, a total of \$4.4 million.

Since voting to start its own system in 2017 the city has spent a total of nearly \$5 million on the system.

"Most of that is \$2 million in salaries and benefits, about \$440,000 in instructional supplies, \$200,000 in technology equipment and maintenance tools, \$157,000 for a new security system within the three buildings and then \$220,000 in operations," Superintendent Dr. Matt Akin told the council. "With the separation agreement with an effort to settle with the board to start the

school system we gave up the sales tax for summer months which is about \$2.5 million and then also about \$1 million in September payroll."

In lieu of losing that tax revenue, Gulf Shores also negotiated for Baldwin County to continue to

pay about \$500,000 of yearly debt service for five years on the buildings and facilities - about \$2.85 million – to free up funds for work on the Gulf Shores buildings.

"We're actually going to get that (tax) money back over five years and really get back more than we gave up so it was a good deal in the long run," Akin said. "Short term we all knew we were going to be a little bit short this summer going into the fall."

Money was also spent to improve several academic programs for the schools including a new reading curriculum for the elementary school, Spanish in the elementary school,

physical science classes for all eighth-grade students and new progress monitoring software.

"We've thought a lot about language arts curriculum, especially middle and high school, about raising the rigor," Akin said. "That's one of the things that we felt all along that our students weren't achieving what they were capable of."

During fiscal year 2019 elementary reading curriculum was upgraded by the Baldwin County system but with the separation looming Gulf Shores wasn't included in that program, Akin

said. Gulf Shores purchased its new curriculum from the College Board, the same organization that conducts college entrance exams.

"This curriculum will give us the ability to not only raise the level of kids who are typically at the top of the class but we want to raise the instructional level of all kids," Akin said. "Our teachers are going through training and we'll implement that curriculum in the fall."

An extra effort on history in the elementary school will focus on local events and the coastal environment will be emphasized through classes and working with the developing Gulf Coast Center for Ecotourism and Sustainability.

"Fourth grade is Alabama history and state-mandated but we are really going to focus on Gulf Shores history," Akin said. "We're going to teach those same standards for the whole state but we also want our kids to be aware of the history of this area and this city. We're going to teach Gulf Coast ecology. We already teach an ecology class at the high school but we are going to specifically focus on the Gulf Coast."

Mayor Robert Craft praised the moves as exactly what he and the city council expects out of the new system.

"These kinds of programs are exactly what we were hoping to accomplish," Craft said. "We knew it was going to be an expensive process given the condition of the schools. It's admirable what you've presented to give us exactly what we wanted to accomplish."

Craft also said the council understand with the growing population, housing developments in the city and annexations by parents wanting their kids to attend city schools, growth is inevitable.

"The thing that I think it's important for us all to recognize is this is not a one-shot deal," Craft said. "We've got this issue to overcome, this kind of expense to incur, this revisioning and restarting our program but we also have growth to deal with. We know that very shortly as we start growing and building more subdivisions and recruiting people to come be a part of this education program, we're going to have start envisioning a new school. Pretty quickly."


Local Beta Sigma Phi Sorority named AL Chapter of Year




Flora-Bama Gulf Coast Paddle Championship July 19-20



Commemoration of Battle & Siege of Fort Morgan Aug. 3

A commemoration of the Battle of Mobile Bay and siege of Fort Morgan is scheduled from 9 a.m. 'til 3 p.m. on Saturday, Aug. 3 at Fort Morgan Historic Site, located at 110 Hwy. 180 in Gulf Shores.

This one day living history event will remember the sacrifices of the United States Armed Forces and Confederate States Armed Forces during this pivotal naval battle and siege. Uniformed interpreters will bring the fort to life through demonstration of period drills on the fort's parade ground as well as artillery demonstration at the water battery. Special talks given by the site historians will provide insight into the events that transpired as well as introduce topics little written about in books.

The Battle of Mobile Bay is one of the iconic confrontations of the American Civil War at sea. During the three-day event, the fort's museum will feature rarely exhibited artifacts from three of the fleet of ships engaged during the battle; the USS Tecumseh, USS Philippi, and the CSS Gaines.

The USS Tecumseh, an ironclad ship widely thought to be unsinkable, sank during the Battle of Mobile Bay when she struck a mine called torpedoes during the war. The ship capsized and rests upside down northwest of Fort Morgan.

Union Admiral David Farragut, lashed to the rigging of his ship, saw his fleet pulling back after Tecumseh went under. That's when Farragut yelled out his now famous order, paraphrased as, "Damn the torpedoes, full speed ahead."

The USS Philippi was set afire by Confederate artillery and destroyed while following Admiral David Farragut's fleet into Mobile Bay. The CSS Gaines was heavily damaged during the Battle of Mobile Bay and as she took on water became grounded within 500 yards of Fort Morgan. Overlooking Mobile Bay, Fort Morgan went on to contribute during the Spanish-American War, World War I and World War II.

1-1.2 tsp. salt

1-1/2 tsp. paprika

1/2 tsp. ground mustard

4 lbs. bone-in beef short ribs

2 Tbsp. canola oil

2 medium onions, sliced

1 cup beer or beef broth

1 garlic clove, minced

GRAVY:

2 tsp. flour

1 Tbsp. cold water

In a large resealable plastic bag, combine the flour, salt, paprika and mustard. Add ribs in batches and shake to coat. In a large skillet, brown ribs in oil; drain. Place onions in a 5-qt. slow cooker; add ribs. Top with beer and garlic. Cover and cook on low for 6-7 hours or until meat is tender. Remove ribs and onions to a serving platter; keep warm. Skim fat from cooking juices; transfer to a small saucepan. Bring to a boil. Combine flour and water until smooth; gradually stir into the pan. Bring to a boil; cook and stir for 2 min. or until thickened. Serve with ribs. Enjoy!



RARE BEAKED WHALE BEACHES ITSELF ON NAVARRE BEACH: A 13 ft. female beaked whale, a rare species which is typically found deep in the ocean and very rarely seen close to the Gulf Coast, beached itself on Navarre Beach, FL, about 60 miles east of Gulf Shores. The whale died while rescuers from Emerald Coast Willdlife Refuge tried to save it and was transferred to the Dauphin Island Sea Lab, where a necropsy was performed to determine the cause of death. day by ECWR technicians. "They are a very, very offshore, deep-diving species, they're one of the deepest diving whales," Britany Baldrica, Emerald Coast Wildlife Refuge Marine Mammal Stranding Team coordinator, told the Pensacola News Journal.

Baldrica said. If you see a whale, dolphin, manatee or any other marine mammal or animal stranded on the beach, it's important to not touch the animal in any way or try and push it back into the water. Instead, keep your distance and call the FWC immediately at 1-888-404-3922 or use the FWC app.

"These animals strand because they're either extremely ill or injured," Baldrica said. "There's a reason dolphins and whales don't show illness out in the wild, that's how predators prey on them," Baldrica said. "So instead of showing illness, they'll actually beach themselves, because then they don't have to fight off predators. So when you push the animal back into the water, there's a better chance for them to get attacked by predators, and it exhausts them even more."

COASTAL WILDLIFE & NATIVE PLANTS BY JOHN MARSHALL

Cattails will grow anywhere there is standing water

When most people think of a wetland, the first thing that comes to mind are cattails, with their long blade-like leaves and thick, fuzzy seed heads. Of course it need not be a marsh or swamp, since cattails will grow anywhere there is standing water: a de-

pression, seep or roadside ditch.



While there are many species of cattails world-wide, here along the Gulf Coast we have 2 species, the common cattail (Typha latifolia) and the southern cattail (Typha domingensis). Both species grow in either fresh or brackish water. While the common cattail is found from Alaska to Florida, the southern cattails occurs across the southern part of the United States, Mexico, Central America and the Caribbean.

Cattails get their name from the thick brown cluster of female flowers that are borne on a spike near

the top of the plant, resembling a cat's tail. These are called the pistillate flowers. Male, or staminate flowers, are on the same spike, only a above the female flowers. The pollen from the male flowers simply falls onto the female flowers and fertilizes them. The best way to tell the difference between the common and the southern cattail is the position of the male and female flowers. In common cattails, the flower clusters are right next to each other on the spike. In southern cattails they are separated by 1 to 4 inches on the spike. Both species are tall, reaching heights of over 8 feet. The flower spike alone can be over a foot in length.

Cattails not only reproduce by seed, but also asexually by underground extensions of the stems called rhizomes (like grass). New spikes and leaves will sprout from the rhizomes, producing clones of the original plant. In this way, one plant can occupy a wide area of habitat. One looks like hundreds of individual plants is just one plant with many sprouts. This can be a problem is some areas, with dense monocultures of cattails crowding out all other species of aquatic plants.

Cattails have a wide range of uses for both wildlife and humans. Numerous species of birds feed on the thousands of seeds produced by each female flower, while the leaves are eaten by muskrats and nutria. The leaves and seeds are also used as nesting materials for many species of aquatic birds and even alligators.

Humans have used cattails for a variety of purposes for thousands of years. The rhizomes can be ground into a nutritious flour. The shoots, if harvested before the flowers are produced, can be eaten raw or cooked and are sometimes called "wild asparagus". Cattails leaves have been traditionally woven into baskets, hats and mats and flower heads have been used in flower arrangements.

One modern use of cattails is the treatment of sewage and industrial wastewater. It seems cattails have a high tolerance for pollutants and can absorb them from the water. Their prolific growth rate also makes them a likely source of renewable biofuels. The leaves and shoots can be harvested for biofuel, leaving the rhizomes to regenerate.





The 3-day event features 30 categories with prizes awarded for 1st, 2nd and 3rd place in all categories. One Master Angler is also awarded along with cash prizes for King Mackerel, Speckled Trout and Big Game Jackpots.

The ADSFR has donated over \$275,000 to the University of South Alabama Department of Marine Sciences and annually funds academic scholarships.

Festivities kick-off at the Rodeo site with the annual Liar's Contest on Thursday, July 18 at 6 p.m. Rodeo ticket holders can participate in the competition by telling their best, or worst, fish tale. A distinguished panel of invited judges will determine

The weigh station will be operating from 10 a.m. -7 p.m. on Friday and Saturday, and from 10 a.m. - 5 p.m. on Sunday. Fishing will begin with a ceremonial cannon blast on Friday, July 19 at 5 a.m. and will conclude with an additional ceremonial cannon blast on Sunday, July 21 at 5 p.m.

Bands will play all weekend (see schedule) on the stage at the rodeo's home base at 531 Lemoyne Dr., located 2.5 miles from the Daulphin Island ferry landing. There is no admission, and refreshments, including beer, will be served.

The rodeo, a Project of the Mobile Jaycees, is the largest fishing tournament in the world. Founded in 1929, it now attracts over 3,000 anglers and 75,000 spectators. Tickets for the ADSFR Open competition are \$50 per angler. Options are also available for a speckled trout and kick mackeral jackpots. Rodeo History

In the sultry summer of 1928, a party of Mobile businessmen were sliding through the tides of Mobile Bay, their fishing lines stretched for that elusive Big One. Surprisingly, the Big One struck. But the catch was no hard-fighting fish, it was a simple, but grand idea of organizing a competitive fishing tournament. The first rodeo in 1929 was such a success that Quinn suggested an association be formed to perpetuate the contest on an annual basis. The first competitive fishing event in America to be dubbed a rodeo had hosted (at the time) a staggering 260 widely enthusiastic sports fishermen.

The first rodeo ticket was \$5 and covered sleeping quarters and special prizes. Meals were a la carte seafood delicacies. Also, because a fast news service was needed to transmit news of daily catches to town, carrier pigeons were pressed into service.

In earlier years Fort Gaines Pier headquartered the Rodeo. A boat ride was the only transportation to the island. Rodeo brochures boasted, "There's a fish for everybody at the rodeo and they bite as a matter of civic pride."

Nineteen years later, in 1948, the Mobile Junior Chamber of Commerce, and subsequently the Mobile Jaycees, assumed leadership of a rodeo which had grown too grand to be staged every year by interested individuals alone.

The Alabama Deep Sea Fishing Rodeo continues to be conservation minded in all its efforts with the input from Dr. Bob Shipp regarding the state of the fisheries in the Gulf of Mexico.



Seatrout, Flounder limits change August 1

Alabama's saltwater anglers will soon be required to abide by changes to the bag and/or length limits on several popular fish species.

On August 1, the length and bag limits will change for speckled trout (spotted seatrout) and southern flounder, while the length limit will increase for cobia, also known as ling or lemonfish.

Jason Downey, Alabama Marine Resources' Enforcement Chief, said the speckled trout regulations will move to a slot limit, which means anglers will be allowed to keep

trout that measure between 15 and 22 inches total length with an allowance for one fish over 22 inches total length. The bag limit will be reduced to six speckled trout per person per day.

Alabama's inshore anglers should be familiar with the slot limit. Red drum (redfish) have been regulated for several years by a slot limit of 16 to 26 inches total length. An allowance for one fish larger than 26 inches (bull red) is included.

The southern flounder size limit will be increased to 14 inches total length, and the bag limit will be reduced to five per person for recreational anglers.

The limits for commercial anglers will be 14 inches total length with a daily limit of 40 per person or 40

of my customers just want enough fish for supper, and others don't want any fish at all. They just love catching them"

Abruscato is one of the veteran guides who started fishing the Alabama Gulf Coast when the inshore fishing pressure was limited to a dozen or so regular guides. Those numbers have increased dramatically.

Bannon said MRD sold 269 guide licenses for boats with six passengers or less in 2018. Most of those guides are fishing inshore.

"We saw a huge increase from the early 1990s through the early 2010s," Bannon said. "We went from 50,000 inshore fishing trips annually in the early '90s to more than 500,000 in 2011. That's 10 times the number of anglers targeting trout."

Bannon said the increase in the number of inshore trips has not abated since that survey was completed.

"I tell people that a good economy translates to an increase in fishing pressure," he said. "We've seen that in the last couple of years. We realize some of that comes with effort shift with the short seasons for some of the federally regulated offshore species that are highly sought after. People still want to fish, so they target these inshore species.

"In south Alabama, fishing is just a way of life. That's what people want to do with their recreational time. So, they're going to target species that are available to them, whether it's inshore or offshore fish."

Kevin Anson, Marine Resources' Chief Marine Biologist, noted during those earlier public meetings that stock assessments conducted independently through the University of South Alabama indicated that both speckled trout and flounder populations are in decline. The harvest in the past five to seven years shows the trout breeding stock are not at a sustainable level. Although not as critical as flounder, speckled trout could reach that stage if changes (in harvest) are not made.

Anson said an increase in the trout minimum length to 15 inches would allow more than 227,000 trout to be returned to the water annually. The slot limit will increase the survival of the large, female trout, which account for the bulk of egg production during spawning activity.

Other Gulf states have seen reduced flounder landings

and have either made regulation changes or are considering them.

MRD estimated the harvest of about 350,000 flounder in 2002. That harvest has dwindled to about 150,000 in 2017.

Fisheries managers use spawning potential ratio (SPR) to determine the health of a fish stock. For flounder, the target SPR to maintain the population is between 25 and 30 percent.

At the current harvest rate, a 12-inch minimum size for flounder would not be able to reach the target SPR and achieve a sustainable population. The larger a female flounder grows, the greater the number of eggs she releases during the spawn.

According to MRD data, an increase in the minimum size to 14 inches would allow 38 percent more flounder to remain in the water.

After hearing concerns from anglers, MRD approved an increase in the cobia size limit to 36 inches fork length, consistent with federal regulations. The bag limit remains at two per person for recreational anglers.

When anglers get ready to renew their fishing licenses at the end of August, a new endorsement will be required

for those who target popular reef fish.

"The Gulf Reef Fish Endorsement will be available when people renew their licenses for next year," Downey said. "When they renew their licenses, they need to get the Gulf Reef Fish Endorsement if they plan to fish for snapper, triggerfish, tile fish, amberjack and a list of other reef fish."

The Gulf Reef Fish Endorsement will be \$10 per angler for private recreational anglers. Charter boat fees range from \$150-\$250, and commercial vessels are assessed at \$200 per vessel.

The reef fish covered in the endorsement are defined in state law 220-3-.46. Visit www.alabamaadministrative-code.state.al.us/docs/con_/220-3.pdf for a complete list of reef fish included.

In other changes, the minimum size limit for shortfin make shark has been increased to 71 inches fork length for males and 83 inches fork length for females, which is also consistent with federal regulations.

Also, new hook regulations will go into effect for reef fish and sharks. When fishing for sharks and all Gulf reef fish, anglers must use non-stainless circle hooks.

Additionally, hooks used for sharks must be non-offset, which means the tip of the hook must be in line with the shank

per vessel.

The entire month of November will be closed to flounder fishing, both recreational and commercial. November is when flounder migrate to the Gulf of Mexico to spawn.

Marine Resources (MRD) conducted five public meetings along the Alabama Gulf Coast to discuss proposed trout and flounder changes, provide information from the stock assessments for those two fish and gain feedback from the public on the potential changes. MRD also accepted email comments from the public as well as by phone.

"In general, the public was supportive of making changes to both trout and flounder because people had noticed changes in their ability to catch these species," said Marine Resources Director Scott Bannon. "They also realized the amount of people who are targeting these fish and how dramatically that has increased over the past few years."

Eastern Shore resident Rob Constantine recently shared how he often watches boat after boat heading to the inshore artificial reefs to target trout, redfish and flounder.

"I used to be able to count on catching five or six speckled trout every time I went out," he said. "I can't do that anymore. Some days I don't catch any trout. I'd like to be able to take my grandchildren out and catch a few trout. The future is our grandchildren, and we have to have something for them to catch or they lose interest."

During the recent fishing event for The Fallen Outdoors, Capt. Bobby Abruscato said he welcomes the changes to the trout limit

"The people who fish with me understand that I prefer to release as many fish as possible," Abruscato said. "Most






