



#### BLUE MARLIN GRAND CHAMPIONSHIP JULY 10-13 AT THE WHARF

So, what makes the Blue Marlin Grand Championship of the Gulf such a special event?

That would be the over-the-top weigh-in experience appropriately billed as "the greatest show in sportfishing," and the possibility of seeing a state record fish, as happened in 2013 when Chris Ferrara (with Capt. Mike Roberto) brought home a 845.8 blue marlin on The Reel

Recognized as one of the Top 20events in the Southeast, the BMGC will be held July 10-13 at The Wharf.

Thursday Boat Parade The tourney's participating boats leave the docks at The Wharf Marina at 11 a.m. on July 11 for the start of the tournament. The public is invited to witness the boats heading out to sea past Canal Road, a prime viewing point for the general public to see the boats parading in anticipation of the tourney's total cash prize purse of \$1 million plus.

Weigh-Ins Fri. & Sat.

The tourney weigh-in officially opens on Friday, July 12 at 5 p.m. So any marlin that were caught during the first day of fishing will come in Friday evening. The big show occurs on Saturday, as the fleet returns from fishing and to weigh their catches. Last year an estimated 15,000 spectators turned out to enjoy the spectacle and The Wharf's many other amenities.

O.B. boat won in 2018 The crew of Shock Wave will

never be superstitious about Friday the 13th again. The Orange Beach team brought a 795.2-pound blue marlin to the scales Friday, July 13 to win the 2018 Blue Marlin Grand Championship and earn the team a payout of \$371,250.

Brien Blakeney is the owner of the 64 Viking and his son, Austin, was the angler who whipped the trophy-winning catch. Captain Marco Gaona is the skipper, Lawton Shaffer is the mate and Chris Head was the other angler.

Shock Wave's fish was caught on a live bait and subdued after a 4.5-hour battle on 100-pound test monofilament with a 200pound test leader.

"It's prestigious to win any tournament, but this was nice to do it here at home with family and friends looking on," Gaona said before Sunday's awards ceremony. "We were fishing against the best teams in the Gulf of Mexico. It makes me happy for the owners for all the effort and expense they put into the sport. It's a very family oriented





## Flora-Bama employees respond quickly to save lives during devastating Perdido fire

The two friends don't normally stop for an omelet across the street at the Waffle House following their evening shifts at the Flora-Bama. But on June 19 they did just that. And there is a good chance that what seemed then like an innocuous decision saved people's lives.

Around 4 a.m. on June 19, a fire engulfed 14 units at Key Harbour, spread to Pescador Landing, where 12 units burnt down and then jumped to a single family home on Ole River in the 17000 block of Perdido Key Drive before firefighters were able to completely distinguish the blaze around 7 a.m.

Robin Lusk (Right), a night manager at the Flora-Bama, and Janice Curtis (Left), a shift lead with the iconic roadhouse's customer service staff, were just leaving the Waffle House when they heard a pop that drew their attention. A second pop definitely came from east of the state line where they saw an inferno already rising above Key Harbour condos.

"At that point, we didn't even say anything to each other. We just both got in our cars and started driving towards the fire," Lusk said.

Both women called 911 on their way. Lusk was the third person to report the fire. But it was still 15 minutes before fire departments could respond.

By the time the women got to Key Harbour, the fire was coming up around them and spreading quickly in the direction of Ole River. One condo was fully on fire. They began to knock on doors.

"Actually, we were banging on the door as hard as we could," Curtis said.

"We just did what came natural. What we would hope anyone would do if we were in that situation," Lusk added.

As residents came out of the condos, they also began helping to evacuate the complex.

Curtis said her main concern at the time was that there were people in the condos that the fire prevented them from getting to.

"It was a terrible feeling wondering if there were people down there who couldn't get out," she said.

Soon after, two waitresses from the Waffle House arrived and started banging on doors at the adjacent Pescador Landing. Two more waitresses from the Flora-Bama and others also helped.

"The noise was unbelievable when we got there," Lusk said. "It was a very loud cracking sound. It was like the fire was alive. It was so hot and unbelievable how fast that fire was moving. It was like the heat was filling the air. It took your breath away."

As Lusk and Curtis went from door to door awakening residents, they were joined by others trying to help.

"The great thing as we started getting people up, they started doing the same thing. It was neighbors helping neighbors. These were all full-time residents, not people renting by the day or week," Lusk said. "They were able to make sure they were all accounted for. They knew who was supposed to be there. At one point there was one woman who was still missing. Everybody was very relieved and there was a lot of kissing, hugging and crying when she appeared down by the water."

By the time firefighters arrived, evacuees and those who responded first stayed to see if they could help.

"There really was no way we could leave anyway, with all the firetrucks and hoses in the area," Lusk said.

"It is still kind of a blur. The fire was growing so fast. I knew some of those folks who lost everything. It really affects you to see something like that."

Escambia County authorities reported only two minor injuries, including an Orange Beach firefighter who was treated for smoke inhalation. The property destroyed was valued at a minimum of \$5 million.

Curtis said she thinks it was divine intervention that put the two friends in a position to help save lives.

"I think God just put us there for a reason," she said. "We were in the right place at the right time to help."

Lusk said she was heartbroken by what people had lost, but that the whole experience has renewed her faith in the goodness inherent in most people and made her proud of community.

"This was about people coming together to help. The community response was immediate. This showed that there are good people all around us."

The Flora-Bama is accepting monetary donations to help the victims of the fire in its gift shop. Perdido Bay United Methodist Church is also accepting donations, as is The Ameri-



can Red Cross, which was on the scene with provisions soon after sunrise.

At least 75 firefighters from various departments including Escambia County, Pensacola, Santa Rosa County, Orange Beach and Lillian responded to the fire

After sunrise, the women headed home to try to get some sleep before returning to the Flora-Bama for another shift. That proved difficult for both women after what they witnessed. Word had spread about their heroic efforts and they were given a hero's welcome when back at work.

"If my house is on fire I would hope someone would do the same for me, if they could," Curtis said.

"We are not heros. We just did what we were supposed to do," Lusk said.

Although authorities have not determined where the fire started, media reports have stated the fire started when an air conditioned caught on fire. There is no doubt that windy conditions and the close proximity of wooden structures to each other contributed to the fire spreading so quickly.

American Red Cross reported that 28 families (40 people) were effected by the fire.

"This is still shocking. Its' still surreal to me," Lusk said a week after the fire. "When you see what happened to these people, you don't know what to say to them. Their lives were forever changed. This caused a lot of grief for a lot of folks."

Lusk added that she was not willing to call it a silver lining to a terrible disaster, but she is proud of the Perdido community.

"You always see on the news that people don't care about each other anymore. But I've seen lots of people pulling together to try to help in our little community," she said.



## Gulf Shores close to preserving more property on Little Lagoon

A project first awarded grant money about three years ago to acquire and preserve land on Little Lagoon in Gulf Shores is finally moving forward.

"It was first awarded in 2016 to the Department of Conversation and Natural Resources," Environmental and Grants Coordinator Dan Bond said. "The state asked the city to take the project and implement the project. We worked through the agreement with the state and the property owner. It took a while to get here but we're here now and happy to execute the

purchase agreement and look toward acquiring the property. Once we acquire it, we will be in the process of restoration and management."

Part of that process will be to restore and protect wildlife areas. There are about 53 acres there with 6,100 feet of shoreline on Little Lagoon. The entire project will cost about \$4.4 million and the land is being purchased from and with the help of the Erie Hall Meyer Charitable Fund.

The cash sale price is \$3.4 million and accepting a grant and deed of gift from the Meyer Fund for the balance between the seller's appraised current market value of the property and the 2016 appraised value of the property for a grant \$2.2 million.

At the June 24 regular meeting the Gulf Shores City Council voted to accept and administer the NRDA through the state as well as the contribution from the fund.

"There's a lot of critical habitat on the property," Bond said.

There is dune habitat as well as wetlands habitat both of which are critical for the lagoon area. We look forward to working with the state and U.S. Fish and Wildlife to restore and protect that property."

There are some public uses planned once the project is complete but they will be designed with those sensitive natural

"There will be limited, passive public recreation opportunities," Bond said. "We're going to work with local stakeholders and residents in the area to make sure that we are creating something that is a benefit to the area and does not have negative impacts on adjacent properties. But we do want to provide some access to the natural resource. That will probably take the shape of a kayak launch, perhaps a fishing pier of some kind but definitely low-impact recreation."

This could also include a parking area and restrooms, Bond

"The property I believe by right could be subdivided into 38 parcels so we feel like this is an opportunity to really protect the natural habitat that's on the property and have something that's going to be an amenity for residents and visitors," he

GULF SHORES CITY COUNCIL

This plan is keeping with an effort in the city to preserve natural areas including the \$8.3 million purchase of a combined 836 acres in Bon Secour and on Oyster Bay with a National Fish and Wildlife Foundation grant. Two Restore grants coming to the city also have an eye on the environment with a \$5.9 million Little Lagoon Restoration project and the \$9.7 million Gulf Coast Center for Ecotourism and Sustainability planned on city land adjacent to Gulf State Park.

"It's all part of the plan to utilize the funding that resulted from the oil spill and help protect the environment moving forward," Bond said. "We're excited and we've got a lot of work to do now. We've identified our grants and now we're in the process of executing all the grant agreements and getting the funding straight. Now we've got to get to work which is going

On the Little Lagoon the project will restore and improve about 2,500 acres of habitat including 1,000 feet of living shoreline, improving connections to the canal system and converting about 200 septic systems and connect them to the city sewer system. It also aims to restore shellfish and marsh areas, conduct ecological research and implement long-term

During the meeting, the council also:

 Heard a report from Christie Strategy Group on the recently completed session of the state legislature. The report said positive results for the city included stopping legislation that would ban cities from banning single-use plastic items, the gasoline tax to improve infrastructure, a local constitutional amendment forming a Baldwin County Beach Express Toll Road Authority and the failure of a bill to disallow city regulation and taxation in police jurisdictions.

· Accepted a final report from Grant, Sanders & Taylor accountants on the auditing of the 2018 fiscal year budget.

- · Agreed to add Paula Teipel as a signatory accounts involving the Library Advisory Board. Teipel is replacing Judy Watley as treasurer of the board.
- Approved a contract with Olsen Associates for \$50,000 to perform annual beach survey and report. Annual monitoring and surveying are required by FEMA to maintain reimbursement eligibility.
- Approved installation of stop signs in the Andhurst Walk Subdivision at the request of residents.
- Approved a change order of just under \$10,000 for streetscape grading, median, and sidewalk improvements on beach road to Cunningham DeLaney Construction.
- Approve a change order in sidewalk work from West Lagoon Ave to West Sixth Street. During the project, several additional work items were requested of McElhenney Construction. These additions, along with the final adjustment of unit bid quantities resulted in a final contract amount of nearly \$480,000 after an increase of about \$43,000.
- · Approved annexation of a lot owned by Kenneth Higginbotham at 7032 Boggy Branch Lane. The lot is north of County Road 8 and west of State Route 59.
- Passed a resolution of support for the Tri-City Community Foundation and Execute Field of Interest Non-Endowed fund agreement to establish the disaster relief fund.
- Reappointed Mary Wayne Gilmore to the Beautification Board and approved new members David Mayfield as chairman replacing Evelyn Sanders and Matt Lumpkin as a board member replacing Jimmie Van Valkenburg.





"We have over 100 copies of birth certificates of people born in the hospital or delivered at home by one of the doctors or nurses during the time the hospital was in operation," Swanson said. "We know there are probably over 100 more birth certificates we do not have."

Pictured: Located above a still-working drugstore, the Holmes Medical Museum is housed in Foley's first hospital from 1936 to 1958. When the hospital closed, the rooms were preserved just as they looked. Visitors can stroll through the operating room and patient rooms of the four-bed hospital. Steel tools used to pinch, poke, and prod are laid out in cases and and on stark metal trays. 



Čliff McCollum (pictured) may have left the newspaper business for a job with the Baldwin County Legislative Delegation but he walked away with another pile of awards from the Alabama Press



Association. The current Baldwin County Legislative Delegation Constituent Services Director and former journalist swept the Best Public Service award category at this year's Alabama Press Association Media Awards on June 29 at the Perdido Beach Resort.

McCollum, a Fairhope resident, won first and second in the category, and the judges chose to award no third place in that cate-

McCollum won second place Best Public Service for his coverage of a memo from

Fairhope Mayor Karin Wilson to her city's employees in which Wilson told city employees they were not allowed to be directed by Fairhope city council members and that contact with a council member should be reported to a departmental head.

McCollum won first place in Best Public Service for his stories involving usage of City of Fairhope city property in the form of barricades in support of a Roy Moore election rally on private property and whether use of that city property for the event was a violation of state law.

McCollum said he was humbled for the wins in the category, one of the "Big 10" prestigious awards given out by the Alabama Press Association.

"I'm pleased with the awards, though the greatest satisfaction with stories like those in making sure that truth and information got out to the public," McCollum said. "Awards are certainly nice, but helping to create an informed public is the highest goal for a journalist."

# Recreational Red Snapper season should stay open thru July 27

The Alabama Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (ADCNR) has been issued an Exempted Fishing Permit (EFP) from NOAA Fisheries to manage the private vessel and state-licensed charter vessel components of Alabama's recreational red snapper fishery. The 2019 private angler season began June 1 and is expected to be open every Friday, Saturday and Sunday through July 28 and the Fourth of July – a total of 27 days.

In 2019, Alabama's red snapper quota is 1,079,513 pounds. ADCNR  $\,$ monitors red snapper landings via Snapper Check, a program created to collect mandatory reports from recreational anglers landing

red snapper in Alabama.

In order to obtain landings estimates, the number of reported harvested fish is multiplied by the average weight of fish measured and weighed by ADCNR staff from randomly selected vessels. The reporting ratio is determined by comparing information collected by ADCNR staff at public boat ramps and marinas to vessel reports submitted by anglers through Snapper Check.

The first three weekends of the nine-weekend season – an estimated 315,377 pounds have been harvested by recreational anglers from private and state-licensed charter vessels (see graph below). The average weight of the fish has been 7.17 pounds. This estimate is based on the current Snapper Check reporting rate of 50%. The percentage of harvested quota and elapsed fishing days are nearly identical at 29.2 and 28.6, respectively.

ADCNR recognizes the impact that local weather has on the landings this season and will continue to monitor the fishing effort, catch rates, and average fish size to determine if the season length will

need to be adjusted.

The goal of the state-managed plan is to ensure that anglers fishing from Alabama have the opportunity to catch the state's fish allocation but not exceed those pounds. The critical portion of managing the quota is accurate and timely reporting by anglers through the Snapper Check program. Any landings amount above the quota in 2019 will be deducted from the 2020 quota prior to the start of the 2020

"There have been a lot of nice red snapper landed in Alabama this year despite the rough waters," said Chris Blankenship, Commissioner of the Alabama Department of Conservation and Natural Re-

"We are a little below our projections due to the winds earlier this month. We hope the winds are fairer through the Fourth of July holiday weekend, so people can enjoy catching this tasty fish.

"We appreciate the fishermen who have reported their catch through Snapper Check, but there is definitely room for improvement. Our officers will be issuing citations for vessels that fail to report their catch before landing," Blankenship said.

The EFP does not cover federally permitted charter vessels, which have their own season. Anglers are reminded that the federally permitted, for-hire charter boats are not managed under the state system. That season runs seven days a week until August 1, 2019.



# Road improvement projects continue in Orange Beach

Leading up to the peak of the beach vacation season during the Fourth of July holiday, traffic relief is always a hot topic in Orange Beach. Following is a rundown of upcoming road improvement projects, including the widening of Canal

### Canal Road Eastbound Lane

The Canal Road eastbound lane road construction, between the light at Williams Silvers Parkway and State Highway 161, is expected to begin in the fall of 2019. Completion of this second eastbound lane is anticipated to be in December of 2020, weather permitting. The Alabama Department of Transportation is fully funding this proj-

Post-BP oil spill RESTORE Act Multiyear Implementation Plan funding is expected to be provided for the second phase of this project. The second phase is comprised of building a Canal Road - Hwy. 161 bypass south of the McDonald's restaurant within the Orange Avenue right-ofway. The second phase is expected to begin in the fall of 2021.

### Wolf Bay Bridge

Construction of the Wolf Bay Bridge is anticipated to begin in 18 months to 2 years. Completion is expected to take 4 to 5 years. Currently, the project is in final roadway and bridge design as well as permit preparation for submittal to the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the U.S. Coast Guard.

### East Canal Road

The City of Orange Beach has taken ownership of Canal Road east of Hwy. 161 from ALDOT, and improvements are forthcoming thanks to post-BP oil spill RESTORE Act State Implementation Plan funding approved for the project.

With the expected release of funding in the fall of 2019, Canal Road will be widened to three lanes from Hwy. 161 to Wilson Boulevard and a traffic circle will be added on Canal Road, just east of the Adult/Senior Activity Center and public library complex.

The traffic circle is expected to remedy the chronic problem of vehicles doing U-turns to get to businesses on the north side of Canal Road near the Hwy. 161 intersection. The project is expected to begin in the fall of 2019 with completion in the fall of 2020.

Lauder Lane Turn Lane and Traffic Signal

The city is expected to begin construction of a Lauder Lane turn lane onto eastbound Canal Road in the fall of 2019. ALDOT is currently performing a warrant analysis to determine whether the City can fund and install a traffic light at the Lauder Lane/Canal Road intersection. The traffic signal will be programmed to work in sync with the Gulf Bay Road traffic signal.

# Hunting is \$1.8 billion industry in Alabama

There's an old saying that to find a person's passion, follow the money. That apparently is true for Alabama's hunters, who fuel the economies in many parts of the state that need it the most.

To ensure the citizens of the state understand how important hunting is to the state's well-being, both economically and culturally, Hunting Works for Alabama was formed last year to enlist the aid of the business community to spread this

important message.

"Hunting Works for Alabama is basically a grass-roots group of people who want to make sure we inform the public about the enormous impact hunters have on our economy," said Tim Wood, one of the four co-chairs of Hunting Works for Alabama. "You're talking about a \$1.8 billion industry in the state. You're talking about \$375 million that people spend on just huntingrelated equipment. Travel expenses, hunters are spending about \$405 million a year. That's travel, fuel, food and lodging.

"In the rural part of the state, that is extremely important. The tax dollars and economic benefits in these rural areas, it would be devastating if they didn't have it. You could look at Demopolis, Selma, Camden and Faunsdale and look at the effects on these areas. It would be absolutely dev-

astating."

"Our business has changed," said Wood at the second annual Hunting Works for Alabama meeting at the Civilian Marksmanship Program Talladega range last week. "We used to make money three months out of the year, March, April and May, from selling fertilizer, chemicals and seeds. Now we make our money in September, October and November. The paradigm has absolutely swapped. We're also a sporting goods company that sells firearms. You don't see that at farm stores. We sell hunting apparel. Our focus is on the hunting industry.'

According to the latest figures, about 44,000 non-residents hunt in Alabama annually. Because the costs of non-resident licenses are significantly higher than resident licenses, those non-resident sales provide a significant funding source for the Alabama Wildlife and Freshwater Fisheries Division. The economic impact from non-resident hunters also ripples

throughout the state.

"What I think is so important is the outof-state dollars coming into the state," Wood said. "You're talking about some of the poorest areas in Alabama in the Black Belt. People travel from all over the United States to go deer hunting in Alabama. These people are paying lodging taxes, buying food and gas, and buying hunting licenses, which supports the Alabama Wildlife and Freshwater Fisheries Division. These tax dollars are not just being used by people in the hunting industry. It affects everybody in Alabama. Even the birders benefit from hunting in Alabama because the habitat enhancement made for hunting benefits all wildlife.'

Wood also outlines the importance of more hunting opportunities for the general public.

"Hunting leases have become so expensive," he said. "People are having to pay \$15 to \$20 an acre for a place to hunt. The everyday hunter back in the old days didn't pay anything. If you wanted to go hunting, you could go up the road and some farmer or landowner would let you hunt. Those days aren't here anymore.

"That is why it is absolutely critical that programs like Forever Wild and the Wildlife Management Areas from Wildlife and Freshwater Fisheries provide the everyday citizen places to hunt and give them a reason to buy hunting licenses. It is crucial that this Division is properly funded."

Chuck Sykes, Director of the Alabama Wildlife and Freshwater Fisheries Division, said that proper funding Wood mentioned can only be realized when people


buy hunting licenses.


"We rank seventh in the nation on hunting-related expenditures," Sykes said. "If you're not familiar with the Pittman-Robertson Act, it levies a tax on firearms, ammunition and other hunting equipment. That money goes to Washington, and it's divvied back out to the state wildlife agencies, based on states' hunting license sales, so they have a constant source of funding. For every dollar of hunting licenses sold, Pittman-Robertson matches that with 3 federal dollars, which is a great return on our investment.

"When I first started in 2012, our apportionment was \$8 million. Last year, it was \$18 million. How did that happen? During the previous administration in Washington, people were buying firearms and stocking up on ammunition because they were scared of potential gun legislation. The problem was those same people weren't buying hunting licenses. We can't get to that money unless people buy hunting licenses. So the money that hunters pay into that fund, if we can't sell enough hunting licenses, that money will go to another state. For us to be able to provide goods and services for the people of the state and to help support the economics, we have to have hunting license sales that will allow us to put conservation officers and biologists in the field."

Sykes offered a statistic that stuns just about everybody who hears it. Sykes asks for an estimate on the percentage of Alabama's almost 5 million citizens who buy hunting licenses. The estimate normally

ranges from 15 to 50 percent. "We receive not one penny from the State General Fund. Not one tax dollar goes to provide goods and services," Sykes said. "It's all hunting and fishing licenses. Most people have no idea that only 3.8 percent of Alabama citizens buy hunting licenses. We've got to get that number up if we're going to be competitive. We have to have licenses sold and the dollars from those sales to get to the federal money from Pittman-Robertson.'

# COASTAL WILDLIFE & NATIVE PLANTS BY JOHN MARSHALL

# There are actually 78 species of mullet world-wide

Most residents of the Gulf Coast know that the namesake of this fine publication is not a bad haircut but a species of fish. There are actually 78 species of mullet world-wide, but around here it usually refers to the striped mullet (Mugil cephalus). They get their name from the spots on the upper scales that give the appearance of stripes.

Striped mullet can grow to almost four feet in length and 17 pounds, although most are much smaller, averaging just a few pounds. Females are larger and grow faster than males. They are torpedo-shaped and silvery in color on the sides and olivebrown on top. They have two widely spaced dorsal fins and large eyes.

While we think of the striped mullet as a Gulf Coast resident, they have a world-wide distribution in warm temperate and tropical areas. They live in both fresh and saltwater environments, where salinity may vary widely. Mullet exhibit a life style known as catadromous, meaning they spend their adulthood in rivers and estuaries, but migrate out to the ocean to spawn.

When they spawn, female mullet release from one to seven million eggs on the bottom of the ocean, which are fertilized by the males. The eggs are not guarded, and most are eaten by other species. For those eggs that hatch, the young mullet will move back toward the coastal waters to mature. Striped mullet reach maturity at about three years, or around 8-12 inches in length. Striped mullet feed on plankton (microscopic algae, plants and animals) and detritus (dead stuff). Adult mullet are mostly bottom feeders (like catfish), sucking up sand and silt and consuming the dead and living material in it. Their stomachs are equipped with a gizzard-like segment that help grind up the bottom sediments.

Mullet themselves are eaten by a wide variety of other species, from speckled trout to pelicans to bottle-nosed dolphins. As such, they are an important part of the marine food web.

One way mullet avoid becoming something else's dinner is their habit of traveling in schools for protection against predators, since large numbers make it difficult for a predator to single out a victim. One of the striped mullet's peculiar habits, leaping out of the water, is sometimes linked to avoiding predator attacks. Scientists think leaping may also be to expose their gills to higher oxygen levels, since coastal waters tend to have low oxygen concentrations. Regardless, leaping is a distinctive mullet trait.

Humans use mullet for both food and as bait to catch other fish. Striped mullet are caught both for sport and commercial purposes. Mullet from fresh water tend to be of poorer quality taste-wise than those from saltwater. Mullet roe (eggs) are also considered a delicacy by some folks.

Because so many species of fish eat mullet, they are a popular bait fish for species such as speckled trout, red fish and even marlin. In some areas, their commercial value as bait exceeds their value as a food source.

In some parts of Lower Alabama (aka LA), striped mullet are not only eaten or used as bait, but also are valued for their "tossability" ast the annual Flora-Bama Mullet Toss. This is perhaps one of the most unique characteristics of this species.

# Eight-foot sidewalk would connect from West Oak Ridge to the Sportsplex & school property

A new sidewalk project by Orange Beach will connect two neighborhoods to the Sportsplex and have some unintended – at its inception anyway – bonuses with connections to the new school campus as well.

"It's just a great project," Community Development Director Kit Alexander said. "I love this project. It couldn't have worked out better. We started this project even before we knew the

school was going to happen. It was sort of like serendipity."

A recently completed sidewalk from Alabama 161 on the east to the end of West Oak Ridge Drive will be extended through a wooded area between there and the Sportsplex. Alexander said it is expected to be finished and ready for use around Aug. 1.

"If you live off of 161 or if you have access to the 161 sidewalks you will then be able to get to the school

directly through the sidewalk," Alexander said. "We just built the sidewalk on Lauder Lane and it connects to the sidewalk on Lauder Lane, too. So, if you live in Lauder Place, you'll be able to connect to the sidewalk and get to the school also."

Not only does it make those connections but it also connects to the Branyon Backcountry Trail's 28-mile network. It connects to the Fort Morgan Trail in Gulf Shores and soon, with the completion of a \$4.4 million Restore project, it will reach all the way to Mobile Bay.

"Having the Oak Ridge sidewalk extension to the Orange Beach Sportsplex is a perfect example of the city's commitment to connecting our entire community with sidewalks and paths," Mayor Tony Kennon said.

"Our forward-thinking staff spearheaded the first paved paths in Gulf State Park that have evolved into the Backcountry Trail and it is all coming full circle by tying in our neighborhoods with the entire island's trail system."

The city's traffic problem child is Canal Road, especially during the busy summer season. The state is going put the project to finish five-laning Canal Road out for bid on June 28 with an estimated completion date of December 2020. This sidewalk extension, Kennon said, provides an alternative to the busy thoroughfare for residents.

"This new Oak Ridge sidewalk project runs parallel with Canal Road from Orange Beach Boulevard or Highway 161 westward to our new school location avoiding Canal Road as one of the busiest routes in the county, yet providing the same destinations for users," Kennon said.

To make the extension happen the city first had to obtain a small right of way to get over to Gulf State Park property and an easement they city used to add an input line to the wastewater treatment plant. The majority of the sidewalk will run atop that easement.

"The First Baptist Church of Bay Minette provided the necessary easement at the west of West Oak Ridge Drive to make the connection to the Gulf State Park property to the south," Alexander said. "Without this easement, the project would not have happened. We are very appreciative."

The sidewalk will be eight feet wide and travel about 4,000 feet to William Silvers Parkway. It connects to Lauder Lane with a five-foot sidewalk. Total cost on the entire project is just under \$347,000 and construction is underway.



# GSP's Eagle Cottages gain National Geographic recognition

Already a beacon of sustainability, education and ecotourism, Alabama's Gulf State Park is again at the forefront of providing visitors with much more than the traditional "toes in the sand" experience.

In fact, the ultimate compliment has been bestowed on Gulf State Park's Eagle Cottages by National Geographic with a Unique Lodges of the World designation, the only such recognition for any facility east of the Rocky Mountains in the U.S.

The Unique Lodges program is a highly selective process. Only 56 properties worldwide are included in the program. Only six other properties are in the United States, two in Alaska and four in the West.

Already a beacon of sustainability, education and eco-tourism, Alabama's Gulf State Park is again at the forefront of providing visitors with much more than the traditional "toes in the sand" experience.

Chris Blankenship, Commissioner of the Alabama Department of Conservation and Natural Resources, said he always knew Alabama was special, but he's glad that National Geographic will now draw the world's attention to the biological and cultural diversity throughout our great state.

"I think this is very fitting that we are recognized by National Geographic," Blankenship said. "This is a significant milestone for Alabama. This opens us up to about 730 million people through the National Geographic magazine or their digital network around the world. A good portion of those 730 million people don't know that Alabama has such beauty and biodi-

versity.

"This will not only be good for the Gulf State Park and the Alabama Gulf Coast, but people also will learn that we have the largest artificial reef program in the world. They will learn how special the Bon Secour Wildlife Refuge and the Mobile-Tensaw Delta are. They will also learn that Alabama is No. 1 in aquatic biodiversity."

Commissioner Blankenship further highlighted the great range of special places in Alabama, from the river shoals that feature the Cahaba lily in Bibb County, to the Red Hills salamander habitat in Monroe County, to the beauty of the Paint Rock River Valley in north Alabama.

"Working with National Geographic has been great. They did not realize what a wonderful place the Mobile-Tensaw Delta is until they came for some site visits," he said. "Then they looked at other opportunities in the area that included the Grand Bay Savanna and Bon Secour National Wildlife Refuge. It was an eye-opening experience for them.

"We think it will be that way for so many people around the world once National Geographic starts to promote the Eagle Cottages. I can't express how big this is for Alabama as a whole."

Chandra Wright, Director of Environmental and Educational Initiatives at The Lodge at Gulf State Park, said the Eagle Cottages program is one aspect of the overall Gulf State Park (GSP) Project. The vision statement of Gulf State Park reads: "Gulf State Park will be an international benchmark for environmental and economic sustainability, demonstrating best practices for outdoor recreation, education and hospitable accommodations."

"A typical National Geographic traveler is looking for

property committed to taking care of the environment, taking care of the resources, taking care of the local communities and making sure we preserve those assets for the future," Wright said. "It also includes immersing the traveler in the local culture. We're targeting a slightly different traveler than we normally target in coastal Alabama."

With the Unique Lodges designation, Gulf State Park will have access to National Geographic resources, including training to elevate the visitor experience.

"Our staff who undergo that training will be able to promote themselves as a National Geographic guide," Wright said. "We'll be working with National Geographic to bring additional programs to the park. It's exciting to see what's going to happen over the next few years."

"The 11 cottages fit in the concept of a National Geographic Unique Lodge, which is focused on an international traveler who wants to really engage in the local community," Wright said. "That includes local history, local nature, cultural heritage and really getting to know the community."

Almost a year ago, a 'freshening' of the facilities started that included painting, adding new furniture and replacing artwork that better reflected the local environment and heritage.

"We established a theme that the communities of Gulf Shores and Orange Beach grew up around, which was a fishing community," Wright said. "So, we thought about the old fish camps that were up on stilts. That's how the original structures were based.

"We had to figure out how to translate that concept to Eagle Cottages. We rebranded and made more of an authentic Alabama fish camp experience but also worked in some additional sustainability features. All the light fixtures were replaced with LED bulbs. Appliances are being replaced with more energy efficient models. We're embracing some of the things we're doing at The Lodge, but also we're testing some concepts at the cottages that may translate later to the 350-room Lodge."

One aspect that makes the Eagle Cottages so special is the goal of providing a personalized guest experience, Wright said.

"We're putting packages together where we can get to know our guests on an individual basis," she said. "When we find out what their interests are, we can steer them to some personalized experiences. One of the things we talk about is the amount of biodiversity on the Alabama Gulf Coast. We have relationships with outfitters in the Mobile-Tensaw Delta, at Dauphin Island, down at Fort Morgan as well as Gulf Shores-Orange Beach. This allows us to get people out to have a more intimate experience through kayaking, fishing or going on Delta tours.

"If they want to know about our local artists and artisans, we can set them up with a tour of the Coastal Arts Center in Orange Beach and give them the opportunity to take a glass-blowing class or a clay-throwing class, so they get to know some of the local people and engage in a hands-on experience."

Because of this enriched visitor experience, the GSP Project team reached out to Costas Christ, a National Geographic (NatGeo) travel editor who advises NatGeo on sustainable tourism.

A friend of famed biologist, naturalist, author and native Alabamian E.O. Wilson, Christ was somewhat familiar with Alabama but had no idea of the vastness of the natural wonders that make Alabama special.

"Costas didn't really appreciate our wealth of biodiversity until we got him to come down in December of 2017," Wright said. "He spent three days in coastal Alabama, and we tried to give him a crash course in everything we have to offer. We took him around Gulf Shores, Orange Beach and Fort Morgan. We took him to Bird and Robinson islands. We took him to Bon Secour National Wildlife Refuge to showcase our biodiversity, our Native American history, our Civil War history, and we convinced him that we were worthy of National Geographic coming into the park. He has been helping us on how to transition these cottages into something that would be worthy of National Geographic selection. Christ has visited coastal Alabama every four months since December 2017, and he explores a different section of coastal Alabama on each visit.

"We took him to see the Delta by boat. We took him to Mobile to see a portion of the African American Heritage Trail. He had no idea we had that amount of African American heritage in our area. That got National Geographic interested in finding the Clotilda (considered the last American slave ship), which was recently discovered. He was blown away by our natural biodiversity and our cultural heritage that people around the South, around the United States and around the world have no idea about. This gives us an opportunity to educate people worldwide on what we have to offer."

One way Eagle Cottages' management and Wright have reached out to visitors is through an afternoon manager's reception at the Eagle Cottages office, called the Eagle's Nest. Coastal Alabama-specific snacks, sweet tea and lemonade provided by the park's Woodside Restaurant are served as Cottages manager Mark Larkin and Wright interact with the guests about what coastal Alabama has to offer. 





# Shocking picture of road rage incident in the middle of Fairhope

This is not the kind of picture you would expect to see taken in downtown Fairhope at any time of the day, let alone at 2 p.m. on a weekday afternoon. But that is the Shell gas station at the intersection of Fairhope Ave. and Hwy. 98 (Greeno Rd.) in the background. And that is a man, Maurice King Mayo, 23, of Mobile, pointing a gun at another man, later identified as Windell Earl Robinson, 54, of Daphne, standing on the hood of a car in which Mayo was a passenger and his pregnant fiance was driving. A witness took the picture, which has since been widely circulated on social media and media websites.

The road rage incident occurred on June 17 when, after both men exited their vehicles, Robinson jumped onto the hood and kicked out the windshield of Mayo's car. According to Mayo's report to Fairhope Police, Robinson was holding a can of mace while standing on the hood of his car. Mayo retrieved a gun from his vehicle and pointed it at Robinson, who then fled the scene.

The gun was purchased legally, but Mayo was arrested for carrying a pistol without a concealed permit after calling police. He said he spent roughly an hour in jail before he was released without bail. Robinson fled the scene, but later turned himself in to Fairhope Police and was arrested for third-degree criminal mischief

"He was spitting foam out of his mouth. He was in a rage," Mayo told Gulf Coast Media's Allison Marlow. "I don't want to hurt this guy, but I don't want him to mace me. When I backed up behind the car, he instantly stopped and ran back to his car."

Robinson told Fairhope Police that Mayo exited his vehicle and kicked the rear of his vehicle. Robinson told police that he left the scene because Mayo had a gun pointed at him and Robinson's 12-year-old daughter was in the vehicle.

Mayo told Gulf Coast Media that he was thankful that a witness was able to shoot a picture of Robinson standing on the hood of his car and thankful for the professionalism shown by Fairhope Police.







# Whitehaven Insurance's work with Camp Seale Harris results in \$10,000 grant to support program

Safeco Insurance awarded Whitehaven Insurance Services of Gulf Shores a \$5,000 Make More Happen Award to further along Whitehaven's commitment to improving their local community through volunteer work with Camp Seale Harris, a camp where hundreds of youths with diabetes gather together each year for a summer camp experience. Camp Seale Harris' mission is to educate, encourage, and empower children with diabetes and their families to live well.

The award includes a \$5,000 donation will assist with funds to send children to the camp. In addition, Whitehaven received an additional \$5,000 for Camp Seale Harris by garnering more than 250 likes, comments or shares on social media from June 26-July 2, bringing their total donation to \$10,000.

Whitehaven Insurance's Dora Hartsock has led the company's work with Camp Seale Harris in a ver personal way.

In 1997, Hartsock's daughter suddenly fell ill—at the doctor's office, her blood sugar was so high it didn't register on the meter, and she was airlifted to the nearest major hospital.

Shortly thereafter, 8-year-old Bridgette tragically passed away from complications of diabetes. She had never been diagnosed with the disease.

"I needed to do something," Hartsock said. "So I called the local office of the Juvenile Diabetes Foundation and asked how I could get involved. I helped with fundraisers and talked about my experience. And then I met someone from Camp Seale Harris."

The Birmingham organization, founded in 1949, is far more than a camp—although it does host overnight week-long sessions, day camps, and family weekends at sites throughout the state. Each year, 650 kids with diabetes and their families, about 2,000 people in total, participate in camps, support groups and community diabetes walks.

"Camp Seale Harris is not just a place on a map," explained Rhonda McDavid, executive director. "It's a year-round shared experience and community."

Hartsock is not just a supporter, either. A personal lines account manager for Whitehaven, she has volunteered for 20 years at various camps; every year she is at the seven-day Coastal Camp, assists with Family Camp Weekend, and plans the activities (including camp favorite "Dancing with Dora,"). She's also a member of the Camp Seale Harris Board of Directors. Children and adults alike love Dancing with Dora at Camp Seale Harris!

It's vital work. In Alabama alone, more than 3,000 children live with the disease. And it's not uncommon

for victims to go undiagnosed for years, as Hartsock's daughter  $\operatorname{did}$ .

"It happens a lot more than you would think," she said. "Children get sick, go to the doctor, and only then find out they are diabetic."

Once a child is diagnosed, it's important for families to learn about the disease as well, McDavid noted. "We provide knowledge and training on care management, healthy eating, and consistent physical activity," she said. "Our mission is to educate, encourage, and empower children with diabetes and their families to live well."

Hartsock's daughter Bridgette created possibilities for others, too. Her organs were donated, with her heart going to a then-seven-year-old girl who just turned 29.

"My daughter is still an inspiration," Hartsock said, "and using that inspiration to impact others means the world to me."

Whitehaven Insurance has its own mission of giving, too. Several employees volunteer with Camp Seale Harris and support other local nonprofits. The agency even provides paid time off for volunteer efforts.

That dedication to community has earned a Safeco Make More Happen Award, and the \$10,000 to Camp Seale Harris on behalf of Whitehaven.. As many as 20 kids could attend a weeklong camp for that amount.

"With the support of Whitehaven Insurance, we keep moving closer to our goal of making sure every child with diabetes in Alabama can experience our camps," McDavid said. "Dora and her colleagues help make Camp Seale Harris possible for these children."


