

South Baldwin Regional Medical Center and USA Health Children's & Women's Hospital have grown their relationship to enhance the newborn nursery services offered in Southern Baldwin County. The community's tiniest patients now will have access to the clinical expertise of the neonatology providers at USA Children's & Women's Hospital.

The agreement enhances the obstetric and delivery care provided to patients at SBRMC. The relationship also will lead to enhanced education and training opportunities for SBRMC's staff as well as the development of improved patient care protocols.



Without the foundation, local patients would not have received these drugs and would not be alive today. That in itself is the foundation's motivation to focus on having funds available to help patients today while continuing to fight for a cure.

The Foundation has assisted patients recently with oral chemotherapy medications where one pill can cost several hundred dollars.

The Foundation helps patients pay for COBRA benefits and provides Christmas to selected patient families. The Foundation funds transportation needs of patients who do not have any way to make their appointments and in certain circumstances has paid electric bills and food costs for patient families. 



Gulf Shores Schools are "Making Waves"

School is in session for long awaited city schools system

It was two years in the making, but Gulf Shores City Council, along with its brand new school system's superintendent, various department heads, school board members and city staff finally saw their push for an independent school system come to fruition when they lined up for a ribbon cutting in front of Gulf Shores Middle School on Friday, August 9.

About 90 minutes prior, school bells rang out for the first time ever at Gulf Shores City Schools.

"It went really well considering it was a whole new traffic flow. It's the first day. So a lot of elementary parents would park and get out, but it went really, really well," said superintendent Matt Akin. "When you look at starting June 1, this was very ambitious. A lot of work has gone into making this happen."

Akin, the Huntsville school superintendent for the previous 18 months, was the only candidate interviewed for the Gulf Shores job and the new system he has been hired to oversee is already generating a buzz for its innovative curriculum.

Spanish and algebra classes will part of the GSES curriculum. AP standard classes will be offered beginning in grade 6. A virtual academy has already been established for 6th - 12th graders. Progress monitoring software was also updated at all three schools.

A new reading curriculum was added at GSES and physical science classes are now part of the 8th grade curriculum. A drone class is even a student option at GSHS, and local history will be taught in the elementary school.

"Fourth grade is Alabama history and state-mandated, but we are really going to focus on Gulf Shores history," Akin said. "We're going to teach those same standards for the whole state, but we also want our kids to be aware of the history of this area and this city.

"We're going to teach Gulf Coast ecology. We already teach an ecology class at the high school, but we are going to specifically focus on the Gulf Coast."

The coastal environment classes will be emphasized through a partnership with the Gulf Coast Center for Ecotourism and Sustainability, located adjacent to the campus.

The Gulf Coast Center for Ecotourism and Sustainability is part a \$9.7 million Restore Actfunded project at the Gulf State Park Learning Campus. Classes and programs offered there will focus on teaching students environmental stewardship and also be open to other students from Baldwin County and beyond.

A partnership with the internationally renowned

Cousteau Foundation will also touch Gulf Shores Schools through an Ambassadors to the Environment learning program. Travis Langen is the executive director of the new center.

"These kinds of programs are exactly what we were hoping to accomplish," Mayor Robert Craft said.

In addition to extensive renovations and a new security system featuring cameras linked directly to GSPD, the new campus includes virtual fencing, rain canopys at drop-off stations and lots of new signage.

Five portable classrooms were moved and three others eliminated. Additional parking was added at GSHS. A new teacher parking lot was built in front of GSES, and a brand new state-of-the-art playground was built in the interior of the campus.

The campus entry ways incorporate a new logo and slogan – "Makin' Waves." The City of Gulf Shores will oversee landscaping for the entire campus.

A major road widening project on two of the campus entrances was designed to keep traffic from backing up on 2nd St.

And it worked even on opening day thanks in part to extra help from GSPD officers directing traffic at all three entrances to help parents get acclimated. The city's 14 school buses enter and leave campus via Dolphin Way. Four of those buses will be making double trips until the city can purchase more vehicles.

No less an authority than school board member Nicky Gotschall said after dropping off her 8th grader that "it was the fastest I've ever gone through the line."

School Board members Kevin Corcoran, (president), Kelly Walker, (secretary), Dale Jernigan and new member Frank Malone (replacing Ralph R. Gold, Jr.) also participated in the ribbon cutting ceremony.

Regular School Board meetings are held the second Thursday of every month at Gulf Shores City Hall at 5 p.m. These meetings are open to the public and input from the community will always be welcome, according to Corcoran.

Mayor Craft, obviously proud to see one of his legacy projects come alive, compared the opening to Christmas.

"This is a historic moment for everyone in our community," he said. "We are going to do whatever it takes to create a school system that is second to none."

As Akin noted, The Gulf Shores School System, a first for a city in Baldwin County, was not official until June 1, even though Gulf Shores City Council voted to break off from Baldwin County in the fall of 2017.

The decision came immediately after Baldwin County announced plans to build a new high school in Orange Beach and use the former GSHS for an elementary school in Gulf Shores.

The City has also introduced the Dolphin Foundation for Education and Arts as a community fundraising arm of its school system. A similar

group, the Makos Academics, Arts and Athletics Club, recently formed in Orange Beach.

Since voting to start its own system, Gulf Shores City Council has allocated nearly \$5 million to fund it.

"Most of that is \$2 million in salaries and benefits, about \$440,000 in instructional supplies, \$200,000 in technology equipment and maintenance tools, \$157,000 for a new security system within the three buildings and then \$220,000 in operations," Akin told the council in July.

"With the separation agreement and in an effort to settle with the board to start the school system, we gave up the sales tax for summer months which is about \$2.5 million and then also about \$1 million in September payroll."

In lieu of losing that tax revenue, Gulf Shores also negotiated for Baldwin County to continue to pay about \$500,000 of yearly debt service for five years on the buildings and facilities – about \$2.85 million – to free up funds for work on the Gulf Shores buildings.

"We're actually going to get that (tax) money back over five years and really get back more than we gave up so it was a good deal in the long run," Akin said. "Short term we all knew we were going to be a little bit short this summer going into the fall."

Mayor Craft praised the moves as exactly what he and the city council expect out of the new system.

"We knew it was going to be an expensive process given the condition of the schools," he said.

Mayor Craft said the city has budgeted funds to run the school system up until the point that major capital improvements, namely a new elementary or high school, are needed.

He doesn't know how soon that will be. But the school will be built on the northside of the Intracoastal Waterway.

At that point, he said, City Council will ask citizens to approve a property tax increase, probably three mils, to pay for the growth.

"It just all depends on how fast we grow. The elementary school is already full," he said. "We do want small classes - low student- teacher ratios."

"I expect we will ask for a modest millage increase in a couple of years. I think everybody knows that," said City Councilman Steve Jones.

Orange Beach welcomes its first high/middle school students

Schools will operate at self-contained portable buildings until fall of 2020

A total of 42 staffers will be on hand Aug. 14 to open the first day at the new Orange Beach High School and Middle School. It's the strength of those people, principal Dr. Erika McCoy says, that will determine the success of the schools.

"If you don't get anything

else right, get the people

right," McCoy said. "Because

the people are what make

the difference in our schools.

from the top down – our cus-

todians, our workers, our

All returning 11th and 12th grade students living outside the city limits will be allowed to attend

Gulf Shores until graduation. Students in the 10th grade have a choice to attend in either Orange Beach or stay at Gulf Shores.

Next year the school will move to the sparkling new building

from both schools under construction now on Canal Road. That campus will include a performing arts center paid for mostly by the city.

"A building doesn't make a great school," McCoy said. "It's the people that make a difference in the school and the community. This building stands for so much more than just a school. It stands for a community."

Among the Orange Beach staffers will be 25 certified teachers, three administrators, nine support workers, three bus drivers and two school resource officers provided by the City of Orange Beach.

"We look for innovators, yes we look for those

push the limit for education, those that are going to make connections and build relationships with not only the students but their families and community partnerships," McCoy said. "It's just going to be the most interesting thing in the world to watch them evolve and come together as a team. I can't tell you how proud I am to be one of that group."

Orange Beach schools were featured during the Coastal Alabama Business Chamber's First Friday Forum, where Yo Johnson of the Orange Beach Education Foundation gave a presentation on that group and McCoy, Orange Beach Middle School Principal Dr. Robbie Smith, elementary school Principal Ryan Moss and Superintendent Eddie Tyler spoke to the group about the upcoming school year.

Smith told the crowd about how all the teachers hired for the new schools were following the work of Robert Marzano's book "The New Art and Science of Teaching."

"As we're hiring these folks, we're asking them to buy into our instructional framework and when we brought them on board, we asked them to go to training," Smith said. "Our training comes from the A+ College Ready and it includes the power to expect more. We sent all our content teachers to this training. It helps teachers take students to a deeper level of thinking. The teacher becomes the facilitator not necessarily the guide.

"They came back and told us this is the best training they've ever been to."

Johnson said the OBEF paid for the professional development for these teachers with about \$95,000 raised in the community. OBEF is also receiving support from the City of Orange Beach as

well.

"The city has had the resolve to help our students, support our students in all aspects of education and through the opening of these schools," Johnson said. "We have presented

grants in robotics, calculators, science, technology, math programs, teacher professional development opportunities. We raised private funds to provide a two-week eco-camp for students at the Gulf Coast Center for Ecotourism and Sustainability."

While strong academics will be a big part of the new schools, McCoy says a strong arts program is also in the works and will be led by Fine Arts Director Darren Butler.

"The arts change kids, the arts change lives," McCoy said. "Part of our focus is not only to provide an excellent curriculum that's bringing in those strong academic skills but to also provide

exposure to the fine arts."

One of those areas McCoy feels particularly strong about is photography and how it relates to teaching students about the world.

"We're doing digital photography because I believe that our students need to learn to appreciate the environment in which we live and what better way to do that than to teach them how to capture that," McCoy said. "We are heavy into fine arts. Yes, we have a heavy emphasis on academics and that will always be a front seat but they can be taught integratively and that's what we're going to do."

During the meeting, the principals announced there are plans to field teams in 13 sports.

Fall sports will include volleyball, cross country, cheerleading, football and swimming. Winter sports will be basketball and wrestling and spring sports will have track and field, golf, soccer, softball, baseball and tennis.





SAMPLE OF QUESTIONS FROM 2018 CITIZENS' POLICE ACADEMY

Question: What are the qualifications to become a magistrate?

Answer: Must be U.S. Citizen; Must reside in State of Alabama; Must NOT be convicted of treason, embezzlement of public funds, larceny, and bribery; Must be sworn under oath to take office; Must be neutral and detached from Law Enforcement.

Question: How many law enforcement agencies work on the water in Orange Beach?

Answer: There are a total of 5 law enforcement agencies that work the area around Orange Beach. Basically, it's the same as the streets of Orange Beach. All federal, state, and county law enforcement agencies can perform their duties in and around Orange Beach.

Question: What are the majority of the tickets written to boaters in Orange Reach?

Answer: Alabama Marine Resources most popular ticket involves illegally possessing fish. By far, the majority of OBPD Marine Unit tickets are "Failure to Obey Restrictive Signs or Buoys". This state law includes all No Wake, No Motor, and Restricted Access areas. Careless Operation would probably come it second. We also write several tickets for improper/no navigational lights, expired/improper registration, and failure to obtain Alabama Vessel Endorsement on the Alabama driver's license.

Question: Why when there is one or two officers do they block the entire lane? Answer: Officers are responsible for the safety of the car they pulled over as well as their own safety. By blocking the lane and turning the front wheels left, it provides safety to that officer if their patrol unit is struck, it will not collide with the officer or stopped vehicle. Also is useful in slowing other vehicles down while the officer is on a traffic stop.

Question: Where do the K-9 dogs that work for Orange Beach come from?

Answer: Two of our dogs came from inside the United States, and our two new canines came from Europe.



Foley to extend South Jupiter St. and support Baldwin's eastward extension of County Road 10 & southward extension of James Rd.

While two roadway projects in Foley are pretty much done deals, the city and Baldwin County also have an eye on the future as officials announced efforts to get grants to jump start at least two road projects.

The east-west Fern Avenue extension is nearing completion with a two-mile addition to connect Alabama 59 to the Foley Beach Express. The city recently announced a southern Juniper Street extension that would eventually turn west and connect with Alabama 59 at County Road 20 South with an eye on starting construction in 2020.

"One thing that the City of Foley is doing, and I think Gulf Shores is doing the same thing, we're at a point in time where we're updating our long-term roadway projection." That same County Road 20 South intersection on Alabama 59 will be the target of another extension on the west side of the highway to a connection on County Road 65.

Earlier in July the Foley City Council passed two resolutions of support for two Baldwin County projects the other one being an eastward extension of County Road 10 and a southward extension of James Road from County Road 20 East across the County Road 10 extension down to County Road 8 in Gulf Shores.

"Those are projects that are probably out into the future," Foley City Administrator Mike Thompson said. "One thing that the City of Foley is doing, and I think Gulf Shores is doing the same thing, we're at a point in time where we're updating our long-term roadway projection. Obviously, these two they are in the county, they are right on our edge and really, they would be a big plus not just for county citizens but for Foley citizens. We recognize those two in our 10-year roadway plan as something we'd like to see move forward during that time."

The County Road 10 project would have to involve Gulf Shores, Thompson said, because of a long-ago ruling about the boundary between the two cities.

"County Road 10 is a line that was set by a judge a number of years ago as a demarcation line of how far south Foley can grow and how far north Gulf Shores can grow and it goes from 59 over to the east to Wolf Bay," Thompson said.

That's where the county comes in and why all three governments would have to be in on the project.

"If it were to happen, its kind of in no man's land

because either city would never be able to annex both sides of the road and therefore take control of the road," Thompson said. "If it happens it'll be a county road. What we're trying to do is work with Gulf Shores and the county to see whether or not the three of us would partner in developing that County Road 10 corridor for a road connection between 59 and the Foley Beach Express."

Thompson sees Foley's role as providing support through matching funds as the county looks for grants to fund the projects.

"We would support the county by sharing a portion of the grant match," Thompson said. "Since it's not in the City of Foley and not in the City of Gulf Shores it would have to be an application by the county. We've just voiced our interest in partnering with them if they were to go after a grant."

James Road extending all the way down to Gulf Shores is also a big part of this project providing an alternative to Alabama 59 and the Foley Beach Express in that part of the county. James Road starts south of County Road 20 East on the west side of the Forge pizza restaurant shopping center.

"The idea is to create some additional north-south corridors between Foley and Gulf Shores that our citizens would be able to take advantage of," Thompson said. "If we could get a project going with the county and Gulf Shores, we would do County Road 10 from 59 to the Foley Beach Express and then extend James Road where it doesn't exist today down to County Road 8. I think ultimately Gulf Shores would like to see it go down to County Road 6 but I'm not sure if that would be included in a joint project or not."

Gulf Shores City Administrator Steve Griffin said his city would see plenty of benefits from this project.

"Currently, residents that want to travel between Foley and Gulf Shores rely on Highway 59 or the Foley Beach Express," Griffin said. "If constructed, the James Road extension coupled with the (County Road 8) connector road to County Road 6 East would shift the local traffic away from the arterial roads and help relieve traffic congestion."

Partnerships to accomplish this, Griffin said, will be vital to the success of the project.

"In order to address both current and future traffic demands, the city will continue to work with other agencies such as Foley, ALDOT and Baldwin County to construct additional roadway networks to provide relief to traffic congestion and protect the quality of life for our residents and visitors," Griffin said.

The County Road 20 south extension west to County Road 65 would create yet another connection for residents to a north-south roadway that is not Alabama 59 or the Foley Beach Express, this one on the west side of Foley.

"That's another one where the city has not annexed both sides of that corridor but it's something that the county commission is interested in seeing happen," Griffin said. "Obviously, it would be a benefit to the City of Foley and our citizens. It would give them another corridor to go over to 65 and then use 65 to go north and south."

On the Juniper Street extension, also from County Road 20 East, that project is in the stage of getting right-of-way access and Mayor John Koniar said that process is nearly complete.

'In theory all the right of way will be donated because we're increasing the land values for the property owners there," Koniar said. "They see the value there."

There is \$2 million budgeted for the project and it will be included in the next two fiscal year budgets until all the rights of way are acquired and construction can be started. No completion date has been set.



Gulf Shores to spend \$1.2 million for paving on Commerce Dr. loop

\$35K in design work approved for Oyster Bay-Huggers Landing Firehouse

Gulf Shores agreed to spend \$1.2 million for paving to connect the Commerce Drive loop in the Business and Aviation Park at Jack Edwards National Airport.

"It will open up 50 acres of Business and Aviation land that will help us continue to diversify our economy in the city and high-paying jobs that aren't relying on the tourist industry."

"This will not only support the redevelopment of the Business and Aviation Park, but we also have a location for a future control tower here," Public Works Director Mark Acreman said. "And Resicum International is relocating its headquarters here as well. We have a five-acre commercial apron that's ready for development. It will open up 50 acres of Business and Aviation land that will help us continue to diversify our economy in the city and high-paying jobs that aren't relying on the tourist industry."

Also, during the meeting, the council agreed to spend \$35,000 for design work on a redesign of the

former Oyster Bay-Huggers Landing fire department building and parking lot. Gulf Shores bought the building in December for \$190,000 and it is now operating as Fire Station Four.

The paving and utilities contract was awarded to Cunningham and Delaney Construction and will include a waterline and connection to the city sewer system.

"This would be to complete the roadway infrastructure and the waterline and the gravity sewer system," Acreman said. "We would tie that into a recently completed manhole at Waterway East that Gulf Shores Utilities just recently installed. Originally for this project, we had a lift station planned for this and we will no longer need that lift station. Probably saved the city about a quarter of a million dollars and us being able to tie in with Gulf Shores Utilities."

City Administrator Steve Griffin said bringing an entire loop to the waterline will help with fire protection as well.

"What we've been finding out is the fireplug pressure because of the water lines there have to be such because of the hangars and gasoline and airplanes getting in there," Griffin said. "By creating a looped water system it gets that fire flow up needed for the minimum requirements of a lot of those buildings that are going in there." Acreman said this is phase five a project that was started in 1995.

On the Fire Station No. 4 renovation, Griffin said the work will be an assessment of what needs to be done to get the facility upgraded.

"It is need of renovation and upgrades to make it look better and make a bit more functional. It's just a plain-Jane metal building. Currently, we have a gravel entrance."

"This is to provide the design services so we can have firm costs when we do our budget presentation for next year," Griffin said. "It's a need for rehab. The HVAC equipment in there is just not doing the job for the entire square footage. There's no office per se for the battalion chiefs that are there and just an upgrade and general improvements."

Outside, Construction Manager Clint Colvin said there are some cosmetic needs as well as better use of the areas around the station.

"It is need of some renovation and some upgrades to make it look better for one thing and make a bit

more functional," Colvin said.

"It's just a plain-Jane metal building. Currently, we have a gravel entrance so we would probably concrete that and maybe pave around to get to the back, add some parking in the front and rear and put some fences on the sides just to make this thing look a little better. We would create a façade to cover the metal siding."

To address the lack of office space the front two smaller engine bays will be converted for other uses.

"Probably some meeting, training spaces and of-

fices," Colvin said. "We would create a new entry and walkway, update the existing restrooms, address any ADA or compliance issues. We need two new coiling doors over the two large bays. We'll go through exactly what all needs to be done in there. We've been having some issues with HVAC so we would do an assessment of that and make any corrections to fix those issues."

During the meeting, the council also:

- OK'd the purchase of a parade float from Kern Studios for \$49,000 for use in the annual Christmas and Mardi Gras parades.
- OK'd a sign variance request for One Club to put more signs on the east side of State Route 59 south of County Road 6 and another sign on County Road 6.
- Agreed to a public hearing for a liquor license for the Safari Club, a restaurant that will part of the new Alabama Gulf Coast Zoo campus.
- OK'd a taxi franchise request for Fancy Taxi to operate in Gulf Shores. Each franchisee pays a \$200 franchise fee annually and is required to maintain a business license. Annual business license fees are based on gross receipts and start at \$135. Individual drivers also pay an annual permitting fee, \$25 for new and \$10 for renewal.
- OK'd adding a credit card to be used by the jail detention officer to buy supplies with a limit of \$3.500.
- Appointed members to a Complete Count Committee to oversee the upcoming 2020 U.S. Census in Gulf Shores. On the panel will be Chairman Steve Jones, Grant Brown, Steve Griffin, Lee Jones, Hanna Lairy, Dean Long and Jennifer Watkins.
- OK'd an assembly permit for the Brett Robinson Alabama Coastal Triathlon on Sept. 7. The events start and finish at Gulf Place near the Hangout.
- OK'd an assembly permit for the city to have a Sunset Series event each Thursday in September. There is a showing of the movie Aquaman planned for Sept. 5, a Songwriters Showcase coordinated with the Frank Brown International Songwriters Festival on Sept. 12, the Jimmy Lumpkin band (below right) on Sept. 19 and the John Hart band (below left) on Sept. 26.

Traffic fix at Orange Beach McDonald's has nothing to do with proposed bypass

\$7.4 million bid awarded for construction of 5th lane on Canal Rd. from Silvers Pkwy. to Al. 161

Rumors of work starting on a bypass from Canal Road behind Big Fish, Frank & Co. and Your CBD Store intersecting with Alabama 161 south of McDonald's are greatly exaggerated, Orange Beach Mayor Tony Kennon said. Changes are coming at the Alabama 161 part aimed at improving safety in what has become a dangerous entrance-exit to McDonald's. There was a head-on collision there on the morning of Aug. 7.

Working with state officials, the City of Orange Beach is planning to extend lane-dividing poles south past the southern entrance to the restaurant. Traffic coming north on 161 would not be able to make a left turn there any longer. Traffic in the southbound left lane also would be denied access to the southern entrance to McDonald's

"It's because we've had an unbelievable number head-ons and T-bone accidents there," Kennon said.

"It's the state's decision and we've been talking with them. They were very concerned about the number of accidents. They've come to the conclusion that the access is not as important as the number of wrecks."

Most of the accidents happen when northbound traffic makes a left into McDonald's or when traffic exiting that entrance tries to make a left turn north.

"There's no line of site if you're trying to make a left turn to cross over and head north," Kennon said. "We're in the process of those being closed off. You'll be able to make a right in at all of them but you won't be able to do a left in if you're heading north or a left out.

"We're going to continue those lane delin-

eators south on 161 so that you can't cross over. If you're going south in the right lane you can turn in or turn out but right turns only. The only left turn in and left turn out will be on Canal Road."

Cars in the southbound left lane have been known to stop at the current end of the lane dividers and wait for the right lane to clear to turn into McDonald's bringing that lane to a standstill.

"It's crazy," Kennon said. "Sometimes when they are busy it will back up all the way to the intersection because they are sitting there trying to cross over to McDonald's. That's going to eliminate all of that."

The state recently awarded the \$7.4 million bid for construction of the fifth lane on Canal Road from William Silvers Parkway to Alabama 161 but it doesn't include work on the Canal-161 intersection, Alabama Department of Transportation Assistant Southwest Engineer Brian Aaron said. It will be bid as a separate project.

"That project is being funded through Restore," Aaron said. "We are in the process of getting grant agreements in place so that design can begin."

Kennon is anxious for that project to be bid as well but it could face some delays getting the permitting because it involves wetlands.

"We're trying to get that in the process but we've got some wetlands to deal with and some other things," Kennon said. "We're trying to put it on a fast track as well and get that thing done and (the state) seems to be all in."

Kennon was unsure when the new poles would be installed. While it's the state's road they must give permission for the installation but the city will have to buy them

Pina Colada Zucchini Bread

- 4 cups flour
- 3 cups sugar
- 2 tsp. baking powder
- 1-1/2 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. baking soda
- 4 large eggs
- 1-1/2 cups canola oil
- 1 tsp. each coconut, rum and vanilla extracts
- 3 cups shredded zucchini
- 1 cup canned crushed pineapple, drained
- 1/2 cup chopped walnuts or chopped pecans

Line the bottoms of three greased and floured 8x4-in. loaf pans with waxed paper and grease the paper; set aside. In a large bowl, combine the flour, sugar, baking powder, salt and baking soda. In another bowl, whisk the eggs, oil and extracts. Stir into dry ingredients just until moistened. Fold in the zucchini, pineapple and walnuts. Transfer to prepared pans. Bake at 350 degrees for 45-55 minutes or until a toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean. Cool for 10 min. before removing from pans to wire racks. Gently remove waxed paper. Yield: 3 loaves (12 slices each).

OBFD RESPONDS TO CHARTER BOAT FIRE: Coast Guard Station Pensacola assisted the Orange Beach Fire Department in fighting a charter boat fire around 2 p.m. on July 27. All eight passengers aboard were transferred to a good Samaritan vessel and no injuries were reported. An OBFD fire boat quickly extinguished the fire but not before major damage occurred on a 38 foot charter boat, Hoss Fly. Orange Beach Fire/Rescue personnel were assisted by Orange Beach Police, US Coast Guard, Alabama Marine Police and numerous private vessels who responded to the distress calls. All occupants of the boat had been removed prior by private vessel operators before the OBFD arrived. ALEA towed the burned vessel to their office adjacent to Perdido Pass. OBFD offered "huge thanks to all responding agencies and especially to the private vessels. Without their help the outcome of this could have been very different."



Hall of Famer Schlitz at Bama on Aug. 29





Brett/Robinson triathlon Sept. 7 at The Hangout

Local leaders inspire others to "Tri-It-On" during Al. Coastal Triathlon

For the 13th year, the Brett/Robinson Alabama Coastal Triathlon will take off from the Gulf Place Public Beach at The Hangout in Gulf Shores Saturday, Sept. 7. Two local triathletes,

Jim Kinder and Lane Gilbert, share their experiences participating in this long-time favorite event along Alabama's beaches.

Kinder, lead pastor at Orange Beach United Methodist Church, and Gilbert, co-owner of Ginny Lane Bar & Grill and other restaurants at The Wharf, have different views and a common bond. When Kinder and Gilbert began training together in 2017, Kinder had competed in the notable Boston and New York Marathons but could barely swim a lap in a pool, much less an open water swim in the Gulf of Mexico.

"Looking out over the water course before my first Brett/Robinson triathlon was so intimidating," Kinder recalls. "But, coming out of the water was equally exhilarating. Nothing compares to crossing the finish line to celebrate with family and friends!"

Gilbert, a more seasoned triathlete, has participated in a variety of high endurance events, such as many full and half IRON-MAN triathlons as well as major marathons, including the Big Sur and Big Beach Marathons. But, the Alabama Coastal Triathlon holds a special place for him.

"Every year I look forward to participating in the Alabama Coastal Triathlon as it has something for all participants regardless of skill level or experience," Gilbert notes. "Some of Gulf Shores' most experienced and fastest triathletes are always in attendance, which makes it a very competitive race. But what makes this truly a great event is the number of people participating for the very first time and having the opportunity to complete a triathlon. Those that accept the challenge will not only appreciate the day but the time and dedication it took to train for the event."

Not only is the Brett/Robinson triathlon their favorite since it is in their community, but also because elite and beginner athletes alike can participate individually or as a team. The Olympic-distance competition begins with a 1.5k swim in the Gulf, a 40k bike ride on the beautiful beach road and finishes with a 10k scenic run. The beginner "Tri-It-On" version features a 300-yard swim, nine-mile bike ride and two-mile run. Friends and families can alternatively participate as a three-person relay team.

Most Americans – and Alabamians – have derived their knowledge of Helen Keller's childhood from William Gibson's play The Miracle Worker, which was transferred to the screen in 1962. However, the 1962 film embellishes the famous scene in which Helen spells "water" into Anne Sullivan's hand at the water pump. NOAA's Gallaudet Gets Tour of Coastal Culture

One of the tenets of the 'Blue Economy' is aquaculture

One of the top officials from the U.S. Department of Commerce, National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) recently received a grand tour of the Alabama Gulf Coast during one of the busiest weekends of the summer.

Rear Admiral Tim Gallaudet, who holds a doctorate in oceanography and currently serves as Assistant Secre-

tary of Commerce for Oceans and Atmosphere and as Deputy NOAA Administrator, was the guest of Dauphin Island Sea Lab Executive Director John Valentine.

Chris Blankenship, Commissioner of the Alabama Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (ADCNR), joined Admiral Gallaudet's visit, which included stops at the Alabama Deep Sea Fishing Rodeo (ADSFR), world's largest saltwater fishing tournament, as well as the Weeks Bay Reserve, the Dauphin Island Sea Lab and an oyster aquaculture operation.

"We appreciated the opportunity to get Admiral Gallaudet down to the Alabama Deep Sea Fishing

Rodeo and showcase what great fisheries we have in Alabama and further offshore," Blankenship said. "He's the man who supervises the Assistant Administrator of NOAA Fisheries. He was able to see many big red snapper, tuna, king mackerel and inshore species like red drum and spotted sea trout and to talk with Marine Resources Director Scott Bannon. We were able to talk to him about our artificial reef program, state management of red snapper and the need for more timely stock assessments that come through the NOAA Fisheries Southeast Science Center. Having him at the rodeo and seeing how much fishing means to the economy and culture in Alabama helped to show him the importance of quality management and why we need them to do their part on the stock assessments."

The 86th annual ADSFR definitely made a big impression on Gallaudet.

"I was very impressed with the Jaycees," he said. "They were opening up the whole rodeo to science. That's really important from a conservation standpoint. Then there is the contribution to the local economy. But it was their ethic of service that impressed me. They were just a bunch of great guys."

Gallaudet was also able to enjoy working hands-on with the Gulf sea life.

"I held a barracuda and a huge black drum. There were speckled trout and the red snapper. They were all beautiful to me," he said. "It was really, really interesting and

Commissioner Blankenship said the department had two main goals for the NOAA administrator's visit.

"One of the main reasons Dr. Valentine wanted Admiral Gallaudet to see the rodeo during his visit was to see all the research that was being done at the rodeo by the Sea Lab and Dr. Sean Powers and the University of South Alabama's Fisheries Ecology Lab," Blankenship said. "We have the opportunity to get data on a lot of species and different sizes of those species at the rodeo. The event is a real treasure trove of data collection and scientific opportunities. I think the admiral was really impressed with Dr. Powers' team and the students.

"Another area Admiral Gallaudet is responsible for is the national estuarine reserves, including Weeks Bay Reserve and Grand Bay Reserve. State Lands Director Patti McCurdy and her staff took him out in a boat on Weeks Bay to show him some of the work that's being done to protect those areas as well as the research being done on those critical habitats. He asked a lot of good questions about the work and value of the reserve system and especially what was happening in and around Weeks Bay. It was very informative. I learned a lot too. Our staff is great!"

Blankenship also discussed how the funds from the Deepwater Horizon oil spill settlement are being used to enhance marine habitat all over the Alabama coast.

"It was great for him to come for a visit so that we could talk about specifics for the needs for our area from NOAA and the Department of Commerce to help to continue to grow the \$15 billion outdoor recreational and commercial fishing interests in Alabama," Blankenship said. "We also got to talk about the burgeoning oyster aquaculture in Alabama and why we need NOAA's support as we try to grow that industry. He was extremely interested in oyster aquaculture. One of the tenets of the 'Blue Economy' is aquaculture. I think he saw the possibilities and room for expansion of oyster aquaculture here on the Gulf Coast."

Admiral Gallaudet ended his visit to Alabama with a public meeting at the DCNR Five Rivers Delta Resource Center where he talked about a myriad of issues relevant to the work taking place at NOAA.

"I want to give a shout out to Senator (Richard) Shelby (R-Alabama) for his leadership in the Appropriations Committee," Gallaudet said. "He has taken great, great care of my organization, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration. He is a partner and fan, and we are grateful for his service.

"I would also like to thank Dr. Valentine for his leadership in the Mobile Bay area and really nationally. He gets all around, advocating for science and conservation. He is a great partner and key ally."

A retired rear admiral who spent 32 years in the U.S. Navy, mainly in oceanography, Gallaudet also directed the Navy SEALs during the insurgency in Iraq and served as deck watch officer on the aircraft carrier U.S.S. Kitty Hawk.

"I am having more fun in this position as deputy administrator at NOAA and Assistant Secretary of Commerce for Oceans and Atmosphere than in the service, which I loved," he said. "I love the Navy. But what we do is so interesting and fantastic – weather, information about fisheries and ecosystems, charts and data and information services that affect every American life every

day. We also affect one-third of the U.S. GDP (Gross Domestic Product) directly."

Gallaudet mentioned the recent celebrations around the nation of the 50th anniversary of Neil Armstrong's first steps on the moon and how that era of the 20th century became known as the Space Age.

He believes the world is moving into a new era in the 21st century that is a lot closer to home.

"I will wager that if you look at all the activity in the maritime domain, our oceans and coasts for our states and territories, the activity is increasing so much – 400 percent over the last two decades – that I think this first half of the 21st century will heretofore be regarded as the Ocean Age," Gallaudet said. "In this Ocean Age, our main effort is growing the 'Blue Economy.' This is the area I own for NOAA."

The 'Blue Economy' is the contribution from the oceans, coasts and Great Lakes to the nation's economic health. That effort has been divided into five categories – seafood production, tourism and recreation, ocean exploration, marine transportation and coastal resilience.

"Two of these really relate to me as far as this weekend – tourism and recreation and seafood production," Gallaudet said. "Tourism and recreation is really about protecting our natural resources and places so that people can use them sustainably.

"But the main element of this is recreational fishing. I definitely got an eyeful of that this weekend at the Alabama Deep Sea Fishing Rodeo. That was really, really a joy. We do a great deal to support the recreational fishery in the Gulf and nationally. It's big business."

Gallaudet said commercial sales alone in recreational fishing account for \$208 billion annually, generating about \$62 billion in personal income. Other indirect impacts are valued at \$97 billion.

Gallaudet said recreational anglers caught more than 1 billion fish last year with 65 percent of those released back into the wild.

Seafood production presents unique challenges, according to Gallaudet, because of the amount of foreign seafood the nation imports.

"We actually import 90 percent of the seafood we consume," he said. "Half of that has been growing in a foreign fish farm. Those foreign fish farms practice some pretty sketchy protocols, which make that seafood not the most healthy or most ethical. But that is a lot of the shrimp you see in stores."

Gallaudet said NOAA is focusing on turning that trend around in seafood production in three ways.

"First, for wild-caught, commercial fisheries, is maximizing yields in a sustainable way," he said. "We have restored more than 45 fish stocks since 2000. This is something for the best managed fishery in the world."

Gallaudet said NOAA is also working to streamline regulations that will make it easier for commercial fishermen to increase yields.

"We're also trying to promote aquaculture," he said. "This is an incredible opportunity. We have no aquaculture going on in our federal waters. Most of it is happening in state waters. I saw Andy Duke's great (Mobile Oyster Company) farm. We basically want to clone what Andy is doing. We want a lot more of that going on, not only in state waters but federal waters.

"We have several successful companies who are doing their aquaculture overseas because permitting in federal waters is a mess. As many as four national agencies are involved. We are seeking to put (NOAA) as the central, one-stop-shop for aquaculture permitting. We have some of the best science in the world, so we can do this sustainably. And there's also the export-import imbalance. We're \$16 billion in the red annually. With aquaculture, we can turn that around."


