Former mega-church pastor will speak in a.m. at Unity Churh service

In the past five years, Pavlovitz's blog, Stuff That Needs To Be Said, has reached a diverse worldwide audience of millions. His message is dedicated to radical hospitality, mutual respect and diversity of doctrine. He wants to help people realize they can change things for the better.

"We all have a small world that we can save," Pavlovitz said. "Compassion, or giving a damn, is one of the most powerful weapons we have in

difficult times. Hope isn't found in a celebrity, religious leader, or politician. It's found in the mirror."

Pavlovitz's core message is one that many of us are yearning to hear: That hope is still possible, and that kindness, inclusion, and compassion are the way forward.

In 2017, he released his first book, A Bigger Table. A year later, he published Hope and Other Superpowers. "Many of us are lamenting the despair and divisiveness around us, aching for something more redemptive but no longer sure how to get to it from where we stand," Pavlovitz wrote in that book.

He sees recent government policies as largely bereft of empathy for the poor, the sick, the marginalized and outsiders. "They (political leaders) don't deserve to claim ownership of the living," he wrote.

"The world you and I are standing on is in desperate need of people still willing to reach and do and believe and, most of all, to be fierce caretakers of hope."

What kind of person does the world need right now is the question he asks in his lecture. "Over the past year or so," he writes. "the term thoughts and prayers has come under great public scrutiny. As a Christian and pastor I have no aversion to prayer, but in the face of injustice and suffering, prayer without behavior change or measurable movement isn't something I'm all that interested in. Whether religious or not, heroic people move from burden to action, from heart to hand; they evolve from simply feeling empathy to tangibly expressing compassion. The people who are the difference makers don't wait for someone else to stand up to corrupt power or oppose unjust legislation or advocate for people who are hurting so that they can join in. They stand up and oppose and advocate regardless of the cost.

Although he despairs the state of the world and the values of its leaders, he holds tightly to hope, and and he asks others to do the same.

"Hope is saying that the things we're fighting for right now, the things that we value so greatly, are the product of the people before us who had hope and lived forward-thinking," he told the Chicago Tribune. "The rights we have, the things we treasure, they're our inheritance from people who came before us. What I'm asking people to think about is that we're going to leave something for the people who come after us. Hope is saying, 'I want to leave something beautiful and something worth inheriting."



Additional \$1.3 million needed for school roadwork Only \$172,000 left of \$8.8 million budget approved in May

Gulf Shores is considering adding about \$1.3 million to a contract initially passed for work on carline entrances, parking lots and other exterior improvements at

the three campuses of Gulf Shores City Schools. "Due to the inability for the architects to have unrestricted access to the interior of the schools prior to June 1, the planned improvements were mostly focused on exterior improvements such as travel way improvements, entryways, parking lot additions, a new bus loop, improved entrance canopies,

irrigation and playgrounds," city documents say.

That was covered when the council voted to spend about \$5.7 million for the improvements on May 6 just a few weeks before the first day of Gulf Shores City Schools. On May 28, the council voted again for a budget amendment to approve a total of \$8.8 million for further improvements at the campuses. With the \$1.3 million change order all but \$172,000 has been spent at the school.

During a work session, the agenda item on the school work said the latest improvements would concentrate on security, roofing and interior improvements.

Other improvements previously charged to this \$1.3 million dollar security include high school cafeteria freezer cooling unit replacement, security camera system linked to both police dispatch and SROs, rekeying the school complex, sports practice field fencing replacement, HVAC cleaning and repair, roof patching and repair to all school campus buildings, elementary and middle school gym equipment, floor repair and painting, school system technology and hardware and miscellaneous repairs and maintenance.

A breakdown of the entire \$8.8 million allotted to schools includes \$5.7 million for phase one exterior improvements, \$800,000 public works expenses, \$1 million for professional services and the \$1.3 million for security, roofing and interior improvements.

During the work session, the council also discussed:

• Authorizing the mayor to negotiate and execute a contract for Design Services to ArchitectureWorks for the Gulf Coast Center for Ecotourism & Sustainability project in an amount not to exceed \$950,000.

• Awarding a bid for street resurfacing to Asphalt Service in the amount of about \$653,000. Included in the project are Wedgewood Drive which would include five-foot bike lanes on each side, West Sixth Avenue and Royal Oaks Circle.

• Airbnb's request to the council to authorize the mayor to amend the Voluntary Collection Agreement with the City to allow certain "registered hosts" to remit lodging tax on their own behalf. Airbnb began paying lodging taxes to the city in November of 2018 and during the first 10 months became one of the top five taxpayers in the city.

• Approving a contract with the Matrix Consulting Group for \$100,000 to perform a projected building program analysis for the city. The analysis will assess several city buildings and facilities and for short and long-term, a recommendation as to how best to obtain efficiencies, and a building program as to how and where to meet the demands for the current and future city operations.

• Renewing a lease with J & J Enterprises to lease an existing medical office building presently occupied by Symbol Clinic. The lease will expire on Dec. 31 and there is an option to renew for one year which includes a 3 percent increase in the monthly rental fee.

• Setting a public hearing for Oct. 14 on the liquor license for The Sloop which will be located in the old Delta Blues spot under the Intracoastal Waterway bridge.

• Reappointing Asha Colvin's to the Library Advisory Board. Her term expires on Oct. 31 and she would like to serve another four-year term.

• ssuing a franchise agreement with Gulf Limousine for the company to operate in the city.

Funding still main topic for planned airport control tower

Everything is still on track with plans to build a \$4.6 million control tower at Jack Edwards Airport and, again, funding is the main topic.

"There're two sources," Airport Authority Manager Scott Fuller said.

"The airport improvement program which will give us 90 percent of the funding and reimburse use for 90 percent of what we've already spent as far as engineering. The timing on that is probably not good. If it were approved coming up

That's the big question mark." in October-November it's a possibility we can get it for next year. If not, Congress made through this FAA bill another fund called the Small Airport Fund available for control towers and that's close to 100 percent."

The current plan is to get the preliminaries done before Jan. 1, be ready to build next spring and open in 2021.

"The schedule right now as far as to complete the design with all the FAA comments and everything else by December of this year," Fuller said. "Be ready for bid and bid advertise in March and complete construction next December and open up in January 2021. The funding has not been approved yet and that's the big question mark."

Fuller says the FAA should finalize its contract with the company that will operate the control tower by October. And, Gulf Shores is still on the fast track to get the next tower via a new approval process by the FAA.

"We're the guinea pig," Fuller said. "We're on a conference call with all the FAA offices that have a say in this project from funding to airspace to flight procedures to obstruction evaluation – everybody that's involved in it. They're talking about how it's working out and basically all I kept hearing throughout the entire conservation was at Jack Edwards we did this, at Jack Edwards we did that. That's all they're talking about."

In addition to the new tower, the the Gulf Shores Airport Authority is making plans for a passenger terminal, allowing the airport to include scheduled service.

"I've been talking to the airlines for a couple of years. But the next step is to let them know when the terminal will be ready and try to get a letter of intent from them in order for us to get grant funds to help build this thing," Fuller said.

"Initiating the design of a new control tower and commercial airline terminal is an exciting step forward," Mayor Robert Craft said. "The continued growth of our airport is a critical factor in providing enhanced economic development opportunities for our entire community."

Gulf Shores has spent about \$1.2 million to improve roads at the airport and inside the Business and Aviation Park. City officials have their fingers crossed for a grant application that, if approved, would fund \$15 million of the total \$23 million estimated for the project.

The Orange Beach Wildlife Center and Management Program has been a huge success but is quickly outgrowing its space at the city's recreation campus.

"A lot of It is capacity. We're in just such a small site right now our capacity is relatively limited," Coastal Operations Manager Wade Stevens said. "There's a pretty big demand especially during the peak season." Stevens said a new facility will be three to four times larger than the small house it's in now.

An intern feeds an orphaned squirrel that will be released to the wild once raised. Another problem is encroachment from the growing recreational complex itself. A new gym is going up next to the recreation cen-

ter and an adult fitness center is planned to go in near the old Walker home where the Wildlife Center is now.

"That somewhat depends on the city's plans to expand the recreational facility on that property," Stevens said. "If those needs eventually consume that area then unfortunately the house would have to be moved or demolished. It's been moved several times and I don't think it could take another one. The house has been around so long it's in Margaret Long's historical account of Orange Beach. It's one of the original homes from the

1940s or 50s."

State Park.

Thanks to a Restore grant of nearly \$200,000, a new home is in the works for an expanded center on 10 acres the city purchased adjacent to Gulf State Park. Plans are in the works and Stevens says the project could go out for bid in 60 to 90 days.

"The Restore grant is only for part," Stevens said. "We were already planning with some city funding to again construct a new trail maintenance facility out there and it just made sense with the Wildlife Center being in kind of an interim facility all along. Plans for eventual progress there at the rec center with the expansion of those facilities it made sense to go ahead and relocate to that site with it being so close to the trail, that's kind of secluded on the island which is tough. For wildlife rehabilitation have a secluded area near a large wildlife refuge like the state park it would be beneficial."

The design of the trail barn and wildlife facility is still underway so the costs is still unknown. Stevens said city officials are expecting a price tag of about \$400,000.

"The Restore funds will be covering the enclosures and some of the equipment," Stevens said.

Trail maintenance crews which previously worked out of the "beach barn" near the water tower on Alabama 161 about a quarter north of the beach are now working out of the home on the 10-acre site. The beach barn is now used for the Leave Only Footprints program.

Out at the new site Stevens says the major change will be adding space to carry out the center's rehab and public outreach activities.

"It's going to give us more enclosure space," Stevens said. "We're slowly but surely building up an inventory of some educational ambassadors. These are non-releasable animals that we use for outreach and education opportunities so we'll have more space for those animals there in addition to the rehab animals.

"In general, space for personnel, storage, things of that nature. We operate a resident intern program so going to that facility is going to allow us more physical space for more interns and staff whereas now we're relatively limited. They're packed into that little house. Not only where they stay but where they work. It's just not enough room."

The center has a resident skunk, macaw, a few snakes, turtles, a bobcat that was bought out of state as a pet, a great-horned owl and a happy, busy otter that has its own pool and play area. But space at the current center doesn't allow enough separation from those being rehabbed for an eventual release back into the wild.

"Another big advantage of the overall size of the property is being able to really separate our educational ambassador animals from our rehab side," Stevens said. "From the disease perspective you want to try and keep that completely isolated. We don't have that luxury right now. We keep them in separate sides of an enclosure with a hallway separating them but ideally you want two separate facilities in general."

A larger facility will also be helpful in keeping similar animals grouped together within the new, larger place.

"Right now, a lot of our animals are kind of comingled," Stevens said. "You might have baby birds and baby mammals in very close proximity in a small building whereas in this building we'll be able to spread out some and have different rooms for each type of animal. That's going to be very helpful. We can have more songbirds in one area and shore birds, baby mammals and be able to separate that."

One of the most exciting features will be outside areas including using the pond on site to help in the rehabilitation of shorebirds.

"We've got the little pond there on the 10 acres which is going to give us something we don't have now a natural body of water," Stevens said. "We're going to incorporate some of that for some of our shorebirds so that during their rehab time they're not just in an artificial pool. They've got some time they can spend there on a body of water. We've got the ability to go out and essentially make a couple of cuts in the fence to fence a small portion of the shoreline and that will allow them to get in the water and still interact in a more natural way. That's going to be really helpful. It's fully enclosed." Another component will help the center expand its care of raptors including bald eagles.

"The other neat thing about out there that we don't have here and it's our large flight enclosure," Stevens said. "It's under construction now. A flight enclosure allows us to take in bald eagle sized birds which has to be over 100 feet long. It's a big enclosure and it was already funded in part by a NFWF grant. We've got mostof that all up and ready to go. Now we're just waiting on the rest of it. As soon as Restore comes through we're ready to get started."

In the future, Stevens says, he'd like to see some classes and clubs from the nearby new high school and middle school start programs at the center as well.

"We already deliver education programming to all grades at the elementary school and now with a middle and high school we're working with those principals and educators to find ways to integrate the middle and high school into a wildlife program as well," Stevens said. "Which could include some afterschool programs, clubs and things of that nature. We already have multiple high school students that volunteer with us weekly. It is part of our plan to incorporate an outdoor classroom area and some other things even including the possibility of woodshop or technical elements in that facility that should they desire to we could help turn it into a school project. They can help build things we utilize or need to utilize out on the trail."

He said plans are also in the works for a connector path from the Backcountry Trail to the new center and eventually some interaction there with the resident animal ambassadors.

The center has come a long way since its start in Stevens' garage when he was a firefighter for the city. "I've done wildlife on and off – mostly on – since about 1999. That was when we really got it kicked off and it's gone back and forth through some different variations," he said. "I rehabbed many animals in my garage at home before there was anything official."


Back in those early days the police and fire department were both called out on emergencies and it seemed the wildlife calls just fell to firefighters.

"It really doesn't matter what the incident is somebody's got to deal with it," Stevens said. "Law enforcement typically dealt with criminal activities and had other responsibilities and the fire department would tend to get the animal calls."

He and interested firefighters began handling marine mammal and sea turtle rescues and rehabs and eventually there were stranding networks and the current Share the Beach programs were created.

"Once that was covered I shifted focus to birds and mammals," Stevens said. "We started over the years working on how we were going to deal with those types of calls. The goal was to do it the right way. We set out with a goal to develop a state and federally licensed and permitted wildlife rehabilitation facility and that's where we are today."

Canal-161 south bypass back on the drawing board

Å bypass plan from Canal Road to Alabama 161 using an undeveloped city street right of way has been on and off the table several times and taken different forms.

As of an Oct. 1 town hall meeting it's back again with yet another tweak to its configuration. A city presentation gave updates on the bypass, the widening of Canal Road, the Wolf Bay Bridge, Canal Road East, the toll bridge and the Gulf Shores bridge.

"We do have y'all's blessing now, right?" Mayor Tony Kennon asked Alabama Department of Transportation Southwest Engineer Matthew Ericksen.

Ericksen nodded his agreement but repeated the same caveats and concerns that are raised every time the route is mentioned.

"It has to go through the environment process so it's a conceptual plan," Ericksen said. "There will be a public hearing, there will be different options but it's probably the one that we all favor."

While on the drawing board, the bypass has yet to be engineered and was not part of the bid in the state's project to add a fifth lane on Canal Road. That project is underway now.

What the bypass brings is the chance for protracted filings and permitting required to traverse a wetland. Not only does the property have wetlands there are also huge concrete poles for electrical lines along the route.

"I think the state is behind it," Kennon said. "It's just a matter of there's a lot of wetlands there so we will have to go through an environmental permitting, wetland mediation and all that has to be done. But we think it's absolutely necessary to help us flow traffic off Canal Road. In July, Assistant Southwest Engineer Brian Aaron said the bypass route would also face scrutiny from the National Environmental Policy Act because of those wetlands.

"We're basically going to have to start from scratch as regards to the NEPA process," Aaron said at the time.

The latest concept has the route going south of the power poles nonstop traffic flowing right onto Alabama 161 south and headed toward the beach. Traffic coming from the Canal Road and Alabama 161 traffic would stop at a new intersection south of McDonald's and could turn right to head west on the bypass or left toward the beach.

On the north side, there will be a similar intersection of Canal Road in front of the parking lot for Luna's Eat and Drink and BuzzCatz Coffee and Sweets.

But the exciting news is the fifth lane is moving forward even if there are lane closures and traffic backups as the work proceeds.

"It's been forever coming but it is actually happening," Kennon said. "In October, we should actually be seeing roadway construction happening. All utilities had to be moved and that has taken about a year. Water, sewer, gas, Mediacom, CenturyLink, everything had to be moved. It's a two-year, two-and-a-half-year project but it is actually happening and it's paid for.

Wolf Bay Bridge On Hold

Wolf Bay Bridge conceptual design in Orange Beach, Alabama.Kennon says the city has been facing scrutiny because of continued spending on prep work on the Wolf Bay Bridge even though its status is limbo.

"We will continue to pursue the permits," Kennon said. "The permit is good for 10 years and we'll know in a year if we have the permits. There was also some chatter on Facebook about us spending money without a contract. That's technically true but there was a reason we did that."

One reason, Kennon said, was to be ready to move forward in case federal funding gets passed during subsequent congressional sessions.

"There was talk with President Trump going into office and Congress that there would be an infrastructure bill with the Republican Congress," Kennon said. "We wanted to be shovel ready and we had to spend that money to get to that point so we were first in line if federal money became available and a short timeline to get the permitting. And everything we paid for is good for years so it's not like it's a waste of money. That's why we did what we did."

The hold up right now is the lack of a memorandum of understanding between the city and George Barber, who owns the bulk of the land on the northern side.

"We have no intentions of signing an MOU or a contract just to make a deal," Kennon said. "If it's not a good deal, if it's not a deal that's in the best interest of the City of Orange Beach then we won't build a bridge. Having said that it doesn't mean we don't need a bridge or want a bridge. That's a matter of opinion.

"With or without the MOU we wanted to know that if we got all the geotechs, surveying, the symmetry and everything done we would save a year and a half on construction if we go through with the bridge."

Canal Road East

The city plans to make Canal Road East into three lanes and add a roundabout to help alleviate traffic backups from cars wanting to turn left into GTs on the Bay, the senior center, library and art center.

"It will be three lanes from Doc's to the rec center," Kennon said. "There will be a roundabout – I don't know what I think about roundabouts but they tell me they work – at the library/arts center. The reason for that is we're going to eliminate completely the u-turn or people turning onto Canal Road going east trying to make a u-turn to go back to Doc's which backs traffic up in the summer into the intersection which is just creating havoc. Now they have to go down to the roundabout to go back to Doc's."

Kennon said the new configuration and extra center lane will also help folks getting in and out of city facilities on the road.

"The other reason the roundabout is there it was becoming very difficult to come out of the senior center, library or art center and make a left because there was so much traffic," Kennon said. "Now all that will enter into the roundabout. Hopefully, we'll start that at the beginning of next year. It's paid for with Restore Act money. We're going to have to contribute some because of the roundabout."

Toll Bridge

Almost 4.4 million people came over in 2017 and with a 13 percent increase in 2018. And city officials are expecting an increase in 2019 over 2018 as well.

"People have found out that coming down the expressway in the summer is probably 20 minutes faster or more than coming down 59," Kennon said. "Wonderful. But at the same time, y'all know what it does to Canal Road. It's a nightmare. That's why it is imperative that we get the fifth lane and look at other options to move traffic down Canal Road."

Gulf Shores Bridge

Plans are still being made for the bridge that state officials were hoping to put out for bid in August but delays in waiting for final permitting from the Army Corps of Engineers and the Coast Guard will likely push that into early 2020.

"It's scheduled for a February letting which means it would be under construction around May of next year," Ericksen said.

Kennon said the bridge has faced some opposition but any bridge would be a big help to moving traffic on the island.

"It is another bridge," Kennon said. "I don't know if y'all remember but July 5 several years ago we had a barge bump the toll bridge. We were blessed that there was no real damage but it was shut down for a day or so. I could not imagine life in Orange Beach if we lost that bridge for a year because a barge took out one of the pylons. We need redundancy in bridges. We need four lanes north and south, not two. So, this bridge is very important in my mind."

Quality Of Life Improvements

During the meeting, Kennon detailed several improvements the city has planned including rebuilding Fire Station One at the city hall complex. It would also include a new administration, fire college and dormitory building to house fire recruits and interns at the Wildlife Center. Fire Station Five must leave The Wharf and the city is looking at moving to Powerline Road.

An expansion of the police department and Justice Center is also planned and will be accomplished by moving the courtroom to a new building to be built west of the current building and using that facility for an expanded police department. Kennon said when the current building went up the city had 25 police officers but now has 60.

The city started its own ambulance service this spring with two new ambulances and is planning on adding a third and hiring nine more paramedics. It is also working with Gulf Shores and South Baldwin Regional Medical Center on a free-standing emergency room planned near Jack Edwards Airport.

Orange Beach is experiencing a boom in not only the single-family housing market but also in government buildings as well. The big one is the new Orange Beach High School and Middle School at Canal Road and William Silvers Parkway. The city is contributing a "state-of-the-art" performing arts center and an athletic complex that will include a covered practice field.

At the **Sportsplex**, the city is expanding the baseball field to seat 500 and an adjacent softball to 400 seats to accommodate school teams. Kennon said after the city's contract with the SEC Women's Soccer Tournament runs out in three years that stadium will be renovated for the schools' use.

In **Coastal Resources**, that department is getting a new complex that will include a marina in the old Walker Marina boat basin east of Sportsman Marina on Terry Cove. Also, planned for that same site is an Auburn University Engineering and Research facility.

On the recreation campus, a new gymnasium is going up now and a free-standing adult fitness center is being planned. The recreation center has become inundated with kids taking advantage of the free afterschool program Expect Excellence. It offers training and help in athletics, academics and the performing arts. The city is also putting together a new program called Continuing Excellence to offer some of the same type of programs to adults.

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



Butterfly walks start Oct. 16 at Bon Secour Refuge

Bon Secour National Wildlife Refuge will be conducting a total of 10 guided monarch walks on Wednesdays and Saturdays starting on October 16 and going through November 16. They will begin at 10 a.m. at the Gator Lake Trailhead located off of Mobile Street. This month's tour dates are October 16, 19, 23 & 26.

The butterfly tours are free to the public and reservations are required. Tours are limited to 12 people and each tour will consist of a two hour round trip walk down one of the refuge trails. At least 24 hours notice for cancellations. Binoculars are helpful but not required to enjoy the tours. Restroom facilities are available at the refuge office and Pine Beach Trail.

Join refuge volunteer, Homer Singleton, as he leads participants along the Gator Lake Trail searching for this beautiful butterfly.

During the walk Homer will introduce you to the butterflies which pass through this area, their habitats and their life cycles. Participants will also be asked to help catch monarch butterflies so that they can receive tags that will allow scientists to track their migration. The walk typically lasts anywhere from 2.5-3 hours and participants should come prepared to walk over two miles in soft sand with minimal shade. Water and bug spray are highly suggested.



Enjoy Elberta's famous German sausage and sauerkraut, plus continuous entertainment, and 200 arts & crafts booths. There will also be carnival rides.

Other scrumptious foods will include German-style filled cabbage, potato salad, goulash, red beans and rice, hamburgers, hot dogs, BBQ sandwiches, ice cream, popcorn, peanuts and homemade baked goods.





"I've seen both sides of not having insurance while on the road playing music full time, and the past 30 years of playing music while having insurance. Most musicians will play a gig with whatever illness they have and the crowd doesn't even know about it. The show must go on. The rent, food, the electric bill, gas to and from a gig has to be paid."

Grammy/Dove award winning artist/songwriter, Bruce Carroll co-produced Dalton's fundraising gospel CD for the GCMM-Fund. The album, "Things Left Undone," was re-

leased at the inaugural fundraiser.

"The love shown at the first fundraiser was overwhelming. The Gulf Coast music community is such a close-knit family between the locals, tourists, restaurant/business owners, and musicians," Dalton said. "The musicians, artists and songwriters that have been helped during this short time, proves there was a need. Because of the outpouring of support, a void is being filled."

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

After first opening Gulf Coast Ballet in Orange Beach, she opened the doors to Coastal Ballet Academy in Foley, where she strives to bring an appreciation of fine arts to local citizens and children. Madame Rio has groomed students who went on to become professional dancers, ballet teachers, beauty pageant contestants, and international dance competition participants.



Ted Hefko and The Thousandaires bring original stories to life with the spontaneity of jazz, the bare-bones sensibility of early folk and the vibrancy of New Orleans.

Hefko plays guitar, tenor sax and clarinet during his sets of mostly original music, and after several years in Brooklyn, he is happy to be back in New Orleans, where he moved when he was 18 and fresh out of high school. His luggage totaled two guitars, a saxophone, cooking utensils, books, cassettes, and a pin-striped suit.

He began writing song lyrics when he was in second grade and picked up the guitar and any other instrument he could get his hands on a few years later.

He studied modern jazz at The University of New Orleans, and was a freelance horn player in New Orleans and New York for 10 years, before song writing and the guitar called him back.

In the late 90's, he drove across this great country in a van, living off sandwiches and bar menus. The pay was abhorrent but driving Route 66 through the painted desert and Colorado's Rabbit Ears Pass in a blizzard was great fodder for his songwriting. T

ed toured nationally with jazz-jam band, idletime for three years and has two songs on the band's "Time Stops..." album.

In 2003, Ted moved to New York to bone up his modern jazz chops and quickly realized that his biggest asset was his experience in New Orleans.

He started playing traditional New Orleans standards even at modern jazz gigs and it worked. Freed from the confines of learning songs for jam sessions and sideman work, he took a closer look at Piedmont blues and the great Duke Ellington.

Ted's first all original album, Egyptland, was mastered by legendary engineer, Gene Paul, whose credits include work with Aretha Franklin, Roberta Flack and The Average White Band.

Ted's second album was more cohesive. One studio with one rhythm section. The album earned positive reviews, and Ted purchased a vintage GMC Safari van and took his music on the road. The van broke down just a few hours outside of the city limits, but they soldiered on and the tours got better. It was with this band that he recorded Distillations of The Blues during a stop in New Orleans.

That album, "Gas Station Guru," has a true New Orleans sound, but in a unique way interpreted.

"Hefko has completely given its own twist and translated it to the time of today. That is why you not only hear the specific rhythm & blues and jazz sound that the city has always exuberated, but also the sounds of country, folk, roots and even a bit of cajun." wrote Ella-Milou Quist, in the August 2018 issue of Blues Music Magazine.

"Years spent in devout study and constant gigging have paid huge dividends, as Gas Station Guru reveals Hefko as adept in songcraft—from lyricism to arrangements to production quality creating an album that's fun, funky and fulfilling," added Frank Etheridge in his July 2018 Offbeat Magazine review.

Florida open for red snapper fishing weekends in Oct.

Just as was done earlier this month in Alabama (Oct. 4-6), Florida has opened up a fall recreational red snapper season in the Gulf of Mexico. The red snapper season for private recreational anglers and state forhire operations in the Gulf of Mexico in Florida will be open on the fol-lowing Saturdays and Sundays: Oct. 12, 13, 19, 20, 26 and 27.

Floida private recreational anglers may harvest red snapper in Gulf state and federal waters. However, state for-hire operations are limited to fishing for red snapper in Gulf state waters only.

Just as with Alabama's extended season, the additional days would not be possible without the Gulf Reef Fish Survey developed specifically to provide more robust data for management of red snapper and other important reef fish. It has allowed individual states the unprecedented opportunity to manage Gulf red snapper in state and federal waters.

All anglers fishing from private recreational vessels must sign up as Gulf Reef Fish Angler to target red snapper and several other reef fish in Gulf state and federal waters, even if they are exempt from fishing license requirements. Sign up as a Gulf Reef Fish Angler at no cost at GoOutdoorsFlorida.com or by visiting any location you can purchase a license. Anglers can share catch information with FWC electronically using the Angler Action Foundation's iAngler smartphone app. This app is available on your phone's app store by searching for iAngler Gulf Red Snapper for private anglers or iAngler Gulf Red Snapper Charter if you are a charter operation. By using iAngler to log catches during red snapper season and beyond, anglers can provide FWC researchers with valuable insights about their trips.
