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



DOT will pay \$14.4 to add southbound lane to Hwy. 59

Pedestrian/bicycle bridge across Intracoastal also in the works

The U.S. Department of Transportation will pay \$14.4 million towards a Gulf Shores road project that includes third southbound lane on Hwy. 59 from Road 8 to Ft. Morgan Rd. (Hwy. 180).

The funds will also be used to build a new pedestrian bridge over the Gulf Intracoastal Waterway and add shared use paths from the southend of the Intracoastal Bridge to County Rd. 4.

Additionally, Two lanes will be added to Road 6 to divide the road into four-lane boulevard with dedicated cycling lanes and a shared-use pedestrian path and sidewalks.

Gulf Shores Mayor Robert Craft thanked the Sen. Shelby and the Congressional Delegation for assisting in the grant process. Craft also pointed out that the improvements are critical to the long term sustainability of the Gulf Shores community, and its many other benefits, including:

- Provide safe bicycle and pedestrian routes.
- Ease traffic congestion for residents.
- Ease traffic congestion for the million visitors the city hosts every year.
- Improve emergency response.
- Expedite evacuation from the island.

"We will be putting the third southbound lane on the bridge," Mayor Robert Craft said at a Nov. 7 meeting on Canal Road. "We know it will start at [County Road] 4 and the third lane will go to at least Clubhouse [Drive]. We're working to expand that to go from [County Road] 6 all the way to Fort Morgan Road, with the third lane to get traffic in and out better that way."

Craft said the project will take pedestrian and bicycle traffic off of the current State Route 59 bridge over the waterway, but the city hopes to pay for a pedestrian bridge east of the current bridge at the site of the old swing bridge. City Environment and Grants Coordinator Dan Bond said the bridge would have to be at least 72 feet above the water.

"We have to deal with how do pedestrians and bicycles get across the canal," Craft said. "Part of this funding we've got the money to explore and build a freestanding pedestrian and bicycle bridge that will have an elevator up, a walkway over and an elevator down. It will leave on the south side on Highway 180 where there is that 90-degree turn."

This will allow the city to further develop the east and west sides of the Waterway Village District, which is split by the turn that is currently the main route in and out of the city for east-west travelers.

"The 90-degree turn will go away and that road will be discontinued back to 24th Avenue," Craft said. "That road will no longer be there. So we now are able to accomplish the walking district and we can get from one side of the canal to the other safely without having to get on that bridge. That is the big news and that will allow the opportunity for all of us who live on this side of town to be able to have the opportunity to get on the bridge on your bike or walk."

Gulf Shores must come up with about \$8 million in matching money or in-kind services, with total project costs estimated at about \$22.4 million. This will come from projects already in the city's 10-year capital plan, including \$4.6 million to widen County Road 6 west where several large subdivisions are planned. The city is also planning on spending \$3.4 million for a road to its planned freestanding emergency room with entrances from State Route 59 and County Road


ChoRuss Quartet returns to GSUMC for Dec. 1 show

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Why Not A Gulf Shores Waterway Village Gallery Row?

"Why not a Gallery Row in the Waterway Village?" asks JD Swiger, a local artist who is featured along with his brother Michael, Kelly West and Nick Cantrell on beer cans being produced at

"The new art center in Orange Beach and the GCAA Gallery have helped a lot. Before that, there was no place to buy art except for maybe furniture stores and Tino's Gallery."

Big Beach Brewing Company, a Gulf Shores Waterway Village business that did not exist when those four artists were growing up on Pleasure Island.

"It is set up for something like that now," JD added about the West Canal Rd. parcel between Big Beach Brewery and the Hwy. 59 Bridge. "It would add so much more to that area. It would be amazing and it would bring in more tourism dollars. I think it's been a missing puzzle piece in the city itself."

The current Gulf Coast Art Alliance didn't even exist when the Swiger brothers were stand-out football players at Gulf

Shores High less than 10 years ago.

Cantrell was walking from his Bay Circle home to watch Mr. Campbell fly his ultra-lite from the beach behind the old Orange Beach Hotel 30 years before the City of Orange Beach built its spectacular Coastal Art Center complex on that same site.

Kelly West spent 10 years in Montana honing her creative side after growing up here as an artistically inclined competitive athlete in Gulf Shores. Also a musician, West is back in time to possibly play gigs at the Performing Arts Center in Orange Beach set to open next summer.

The aforementioned homegrown artists are all committed to seeing their town recognized as a place to find great original art in addition to beautiful beaches and fresh seafood.

The City of Orange Beach, with its beautiful Coastal Art Center, Hot Shop, Clay Studio and popular spring art fest, has always had an eye towards promoting the creative side of beach life.

The growth of art culture in Gulf Shores is slowly catching up, and it can be traced directly to the Gulf Coast Art Alliance and its gallery located smack in the middle of Waterway Village.

The non-profit was started by Tommy Vogel, Eloise Thomley, Maria Bastin and others just six years ago and it has been growing ever since both as a vehicle for teaching art and a way for local artists to sell their work.

The GCAA also presents its annual Ballyhoo Fes-

tival and at least seven art markets every year.

"I would say that 90 percent of our visitors to the gallery are from out of state," Thomley said. "And it's mostly snowbirds that respond to the art classes."

Vogel thinks it is always going to be hard to pull tourists away from the beach during the summer season. But more businesses at Waterway Village would help.

"It would be better if there were other things to bring people around our area, that is for sure," he said. "Of course, it would be nice to have other kinds of shops and businesses geared towards the arts around our property.

"We get kids right out of college coming in here hoping to hang up their art, and I have to tell them that is not how it works. I don't want to disappoint them, but it's a tough business if you want to make a living out of it. We try to promote all of our artists and encourage them to do outside shows besides the art markets."

Thomley points out that Tara Alford at Blue Girl Beading around the corner from the GCAA gallery sells jewelry she creates and potter Steve Dark and painter Rick Tino also both have galleries near the GCAA.

She would also love to see a future Waterway Village that includes working studios, pottery and glass shops, melding with ice cream parlors, novelty shops and restaurants that include outside seating.

"I do see the art scene growing here," said Cantrell. "We've been trying to cultivate it for a long time. The new art center in Orange Beach and the GCAA Gallery have helped a lot. Before that, there was no place to buy art except for maybe furniture stores and Tino's Gallery.

"Having all the art education around also helps others to find their creativity and that has encouraged awareness and support for the arts," he added.

The artists featured by Big Beach Brewing on their craft beer cans are all friends and all supportive of each other's efforts.

"It's a pretty cool little family of folks," said Cantrell. "We help each other out as much as we can."

"We push each other," West added. "We all share what we are doing in our work and share how we are marketing ourselves. Nick and the Swigers are so good about encouraging others to dream. That is what I love that about them so much. They want to make this an artsy town They want people come down here just for the art."

"We appreciate the artists that were here before us like Kelly, and what people like Tommy Vogel and Ms. Eloise (Thomley) have done for us," JD Swiger said. "I know there is more of an art scene here now even since we created Swiger Studio in 2017."

"There is room for everyone to grow," said Michael Swiger. "Collectively, our cause is the same. Hopefully, we can continue that and be ambassadors for art for the next generation."

"More people are buying into it," JD Swiger added. "Even (Big Beach Brewing Company general manager Ryan Shamburger) Ryan reaching out to us for his project is exciting. Michael and I want to be part of creating a booming art community. Maybe one day we can be the old guys who helped pave the way for the next generation, just like the older artists have done for us."



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Big Beach Brewing Co. commissions local artists to design growler labels

Coming up with labels to wrap around canned growlers at Big Beach Brewing Company was a

They were thrilled when general manager Ryan Shamburger

approached them with an offer to create specific growler labels for three of Big Beach's most popular pours: Hundred Daze - Gulf Coast IPA (Kelly West); Area Two Fiftyone - Hazy IPA (Swiger Studios (JD and Michael); and Midnight Cruise - Porter (Nick Cantrell).

The idea was pushed by Julie Shamburger (Ryan's mom), who owns Gulf Shores Brewery with her husband Jim, who also happens to be Cantrell's and West's dentist. Julie was also instrumental in matching the artists' styles with the theme of the beer they were designing labels for.

"She loved the simplicity of local beer supporting local art, and vice versa," Ryan Shamburger said.

Traditionally, can lines have similar imagery so that beer fans can recognize them on grocery store shelves, at bars, or in liquor stores. But since Big Beach's growlers are sold only in its own taproom, there will be no confusion of which brewery makes them.

"That realization gave us some leeway to make labels with wildly different color schemes and imagery," Ryan Shamburger said. "It is common to recruit one artist, but I'm not sure how common it is to recruit four."

Each of the artists had successful "artist takeovers" in the Big Beach

courtyard when their growler labels were introduced.

The Swigers were asked to use a lifeguard stand and an alien to design Area Two Fifty One. And they worked with Big Beach on everything from form to fonts before coming up with a label that clicked.

"It was fun and we appreciated being able to do something like this for a local business," JD Swiger said.

Kelly West has designed logos for clients ranging from paddleboard manufacturers to fitness companies, but designing the Hundred Daze label was among her favorite commissions, because it presented special challenges.

"It is common to recruit one artist, but I'm not sure how common it is to recruit four."

"Since it's on a small scale, vou have to take into consideration that every little thing will be seen," she said. "Sometimes I do a piece several times until I'm completely happy with it. Sometimes it's as quick as one day and sometimes it's a whole month. This was one of

those times it was trial and error."

While Kelly was working through ways to make her label as directed, a friend came to the art studio in her house. "As I was telling him about my frustrations with trying to make it 'trippy and fun,' he said to use your finger. So I got out a glove I use for tattoos and put a swirl in the sun with my finger tip. That was the last touch I needed to make the colors come together."

Cantrell and Ryan Shamburger are longtime friends and fellow sailors.

During a visit to talk about an epic sailing adventure, Nick told Ryan about a particular night when he was on the early morning watch in the middle of the ocean amidst 16 to 18 ft. seas. "All you could see

was phosphorous when each wave hit the windshield," Nick said. "It was glowing and really unbelievable.

"Ryan asked me to try to capture that phosphorus, and find some of that magic and glow that was occurring in the water."

"We brew what we like" is the mantra and philosophy that Jim and Julie Shamburger have stood by since they opened Big Beach Brewing Company.

In less than three years, it has become a Waterway Village hub where dogs and kids are as welcome as snowbirds and coeds.

Offering live music that ranges from new wave to bluegrass and dueling pianos to blues, and nights set aside specifically for trivia nerds and running clubs, Big Beach has quickly established itself as a locals' hangout frequented by tourists.

So it is certainly no surprise that its owners believe that art, just like beer, is best made and served locally.

Nick Cantrell is the old man among this particular group of artists connected by their hometown. Part of the three musketeers who made art cool at Foley High

School in the late 1980's (along with Greg Hopkins, now an artist in Brooklyn, and the late Lance Eslava (who went on to own Down Under Dive Shop), Nick did not consider following his high school muse until he almost lost an arm from a blood clot while at Auburn. He took that as a

sign and switched his major from building science to fine arts.

Married to his Foley High sweet-

heart (he took her to the senior prom), ceramics artist Maya Blume-Cantrell, Nick has been working full-time as an artist for the past seven years, after successful stints selling real estate in Asheville and Gulf Shores.

While doing post Hurricane Irene contract work in New York, he saw a painting that caught his attention. Unable to determine how the artist captured the texture on her paintings, he called her and learned that it was all in the paper. He followed up on that concept and soon had his medium - batik.

He credits re-connecting with Kelly West in the parking lot of the Flying Harpoon with giving him the inspiration to try to make a living creating art.

"I don't remember Kelly in pigtails and braces, but her brother (Jeremy) and I were friends at Foley. So I knew her," Nick said. "I was still a closet artist with a real job and Kelly was out there selling art from the back of her van. She was making music and creating art. She was unafraid. It inspired me. I still have a collection of Kelly's stuff at the house."

Like the Swigers and Kelly, Nick is also a commercial artist, adding his own style to illustrations, corporate logos, album artwork and whatever else a client needs. He spends about half the year selling his nature themed Batik watercolors, each drawn and layered with contrasting washes, at art festivals throughout the southeast. He has also contributed numerous public art projects to schools and non-profits all around the island.

Kelly West

Kelly West went to Gulf Shores for three years and, for a different experience, Foley for her senior year.

A standout in volleyball and soccer as a teen and now an avid surfer, she credits both her parents, Coach B at GSHS and the late Lisa Wood at FHS for nurturing her creative side.

She began designing tattoos at Counter Culture soon after high school and still does design work and tattoos for Carolyn Hall at

David's Gallery.

Kelly uses a pallete knife or a brush to create art that is impressionistic with bold strikes of color. It is a style she honed while living and loving nature in Montana for 10 years.

She has traded mountainscapes for

beach scenes and wildlife for sea life since returning to the Gulf Coast. But she still loves working on both wild animal and pet portraits.

"After high school, I did a lot of design work and logos. But I've gotten away from that and do mostly pet portraits, murals and a lot of oil paintings," she said.

"But I'll do whatever people need and want, if it fits in where I want my art to be."

By design, her use of large colorful brush strokes on portraits does not create picture perfect paintings. That is the idea. Kelly's work can best be appreciated by looking for the fine lines that lead to what is happening within the art. "It's less about perfection and more about feeling and movement," she said.

For pet portraits, she'll use thick brushes, broad strokes and lots of paint. On other projects, she will stick to the palette knives.

That willingness to experiment, to evolve, to blur the lines between abstract and realism is how she avoids her art becoming stagnant. She finds freedom in contrasts that create their own subtleties.

Back home and settled in, Kelly is proud to be part of her hometown's growing art scene. She and her fiance (glass blower and O.B. Coastal Art Center instructor Greg Hoff) bought a house next to her father Gary's place in Foley.

"We want to make this a town where people are coming down here all year for art," she said.

Swiger Studios

Brothers Michael and JD Swiger talked about going into business together even before they entered Gulf Shores High School. Those conversations still include a third brother, Joseph, who is now a respected music producer in Baton Rouge.

As adolescent beach kids, they thought they might follow in local hero Blonde John's footsteps and open a surf shop. They did expec that all three brothers would have the same desire to impact others through careers in the creative arts.

"That we are all artists now and contributing under the same umbrella is incredible," JD said. "I never imagined this."

Both Michael and JD were formally educated in the arts, Michael at Flagler and JD at Huntington, where he was a captain on the football team.

They also both took time to hone their art elsewhere following college. JD went to Australia and Michael moved to Hilton Head, where he worked at ITS Classics doing work for corporations up and down the Atlantic Seaboard. It was sometimes tedious and not particularly glamorous. But he said that background was a key component in creating Swiger Studios when the timing was right.

Although he eventually earned a degree in graphic design, JD changed majors from business management to sports management to communications before landing in the field he has worked in ever since returning from Australia.

At Swiger Studio, the brothers work in complete collaboration, whether its graphic design, photography, videography or other mixed media. That is the work that pays the bills.

"There is not much that comes to us that we don't feel we can handle," JD said

But they go their own direction when they create art for themselves.

"Michael has a style that is almost the opposite of mine," JD said. "The meaning behind our work is similar. But we are both individuals when it comes to our art."

JD's most recent series is based on raising environmental consciousness by taking trash that he finds along his hometown's shoreline and turning it into art. It's a visual depiction of what the Leave Only Footprints and Save The Beach programs exemplify. One of the pieces in the collection was made from 2,000 cigarette butts.

Michael's mixed media artwork can include everything from organic canvas to wood to airbrush. It is a mix of realism and surrealism.

Like all artists, he creates connectivity by adding his own unique intangibles. "Mixing geometric patterns that come from the inter-connectivity between things you don't think connect" is how he describes it. "Some of it is a trial. But it's the mixture. The sense of inter-connectivity in behavior between all things. That has been the magic."

A gifted three-sport athlete in high school, Michael was always artistic. He drew the posters for his school musicals. He designed Homecoming t-shirts, flyers for art shows and whatever else he was asked to do, including a mural at the GSHS entrance. "I was always drawing something," he said.

GSHS Art Teacher Coach Boyd gave him added support. "He pushed me to do what I wanted. To make a career of it," Michael said. "He begged me to please pursue something creative."

JD said their parents put their heads down and worked hard so that their children could feel unburdened and seek a career path in the creative class.

"They worked hard so we would have the option to branch out and try other things and not have to worry as much about financial stability," he said. "That is not to say we don't work hard, but that support has always been there. They gave us the opportunity to be creative. They trusted us to work hard until we saw the light."

"They definitely always let us know that they wanted us to be happy," Michael added. "They would say if we do something we are passionate about, the rest will follow. It's been that way so far, no doubt."

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



Orange Beach City Council

O.B. City Council will explore locations for city golf cart pathways

State law prevents carts on roads with speeds limits of more than 25 Mph

Making good on a promise from the Oct. 1 town hall meeting the Orange Beach City Council is discussing spending \$18,000 to explore locations for new pathways in the city.

"The mayor would like to look into the feasibility of constructing golf cart paths," Community Development Director Kit Alexander said. "Shared paths between golf carts, bicyclists and pedestrians. This is the first attempt to look at the feasibility of constructing multi-modal paths including golf carts on roadways that have a speed limit greater than 25 mph.'

Also, during the dual meeting on Nov. 5, the city formalized phase two of an agreement with Island Fiber to help the company bring fiber technology and high-speed internet to neighborhoods in Orange Beach.

During the town hall meeting, Mayor Tony Kennon said the city will have to move forward on a new golf cart ordinance to address growing numbers and concerns of the carts throughout the city. The city is writing the ordinance to comply with state law which states golf carts can't be operated on roads with speed limits of more than 25 mph, must be driven by a licensed driver and must have lights and blinkers.

"Our goal is an ordinance that will be minimal in nature, to accomplish what state law requires us to do," Kennon said at the Oct. 1 meeting. "What we think will happen is you will have to retrofit the lights and all that stuff. It's about \$650, average, to retrofit golf cart to make it so-called street legal which is not really a correct term. That is probably going to have to happen. We'll have a phase-in period, a grace period. But eventually, every golf cart will have to meet those standards, be inspected and permitted."

This new study will cover the entire city but Kennon said the city has more leeway on city-maintained streets than it does on state highways like Canal Road from the Wharf to State Route 161 and 161 south from there to the beach.

"My point is everywhere we see an opportunity to create a golf cart path, Marina Road may be one

because it's a city street," Kennon said. "That may be something we can do. We may be able to come in and widen that to 10 feet and declare it a golf cart path then that's what we're going to do. I promise you we are going to attack in every way we can to create arteries for golf carts to go anywhere they want to go."

Kennon also said that Canal Road was another possibility from Doc's Seafood Shack all the way to Bear Point because the city recently took over maintenance of that portion of what used to be Al-

It's still under state control from Doc's west as is all of Alabama 161.

"We will have to have the state's permission to create a golf cart path on 161 north and south because that's all state right of way," Kennon said.

The study, Alexander said, will determine what's required for the golf cart paths along both city and state roadways in Orange Beach.

"This is all brand new to us so we need to research what the appropriate width would be, we'll have to look into where there are utilities," Alexander said. "Just basically become familiar with the rights of way that we would look at and what the criteria and specifications would be.

Island Fiber

Orange Beach finalized an agreement with Island Fiber to pay \$1,000 for every customer signed up for the first 1,200 households or \$1.2 million. The company will submit a monthly bill for payment on the customers signed up for that month starting in November.

To pay the loan back, Island Fiber will then make quarterly payments of \$5 per customer until the full amount is repaid to the city. Those payments will begin on May 1.

As part of the agreement, Island Fiber is to provide a construction schedule and set up public meetings to inform residents of the availability of the new service and when to expect it in their neighborhoods.

"Island Fiber will work with the city to plan a marketing strategy to generate sufficient interest among target constituents to meet the necessary

subscribership levels in order to make the construction of the Project economically viable," the agreement states. "Island Fiber agrees to develop verbal presentations and written communications describing the proposed services and the benefits of the project to the target constituents."

During the regular session, the council:



Gulf Shores City Council

Plans call for 3,175 residential units on northshore of Intracoastal 27,000 sq. ft. of retail, 318 boat slips, 100 acres of green space included

A project that has had Army Corps of Engineer approval since 2006 on the Intracoastal Waterway in Gulf Shores is finally moving forward.

Coastal Resort Properties is seeking approval from the city for a planned unit development on 218 acres on the north shore of the ICW near the Claude Peteet Mariculture Center and the Gulf Shores airport. A new Alabama Department of Transportation road and bridge project would cut through the eastern edge of the new development.

Plans call for 3,175 residential units, 27,000 square feet of retail and commercial space, 100 acres of green space with parks, lakes and boardwalks and three marinas. The marinas will have a combined 318 boat slips

and space for 490 boats in dry storage.

"This is a critically important project," Mayor Pro Tem Philip Harris said. "That whole north side of that intracoastal was zoned industrial for years. We've seen the threat to our economy with Hurricane Ivan and Katrina we really took a hard look at the north corridor over there and that is where this ICW zoning came from. An opportunity to incentivize the change and hopefully build a second frontier that would include some vacation destinations and a second source of revenue."

This project along with 14 others on the waterway received environment impact statement approvals from Corps way back when but each project stalled in the economic downturn of 2007-09. City officials hope this project will be the first of several to keep drawing in tourists even if there is hurricane and storm damage in the future.

"This rezoning was done in order to rezone from industrial property to promote shopping and residential in this area," Director of Planning and Development Director Lee Jones said. "We've really seen it as kind of a second opportunity for waterfront activity secondary to the beachfront."

With Corps permit still in hand that's a major hurdle already cleared for the nascent development.

"The (environmental impact statement) permit is still in place," Attorney Richard Davis, representing Coastal Resort Properties said. "It has a life of a couple of years yet. We've applied for a five -year extension. The consideration of that extension has not come through yet."

The city and Coastal Resort Properties ownership have been working on details for this property for years and it will contain a right of way for a roadway the city sees as key to the development of the area.

"These folks have been involved on this north side of the canal and ownership of this property for a long time," Harris said. "We've been working with them for the last couple of years on the location of the city's portion of the spur road. It will come through this property and we needed the right of way to connect to our Business and Aviation Park and back out to highway 59. We appreciated the relationship."

In hoping to foster growth along the canal the city rezoned much of the property in the area from industrial to a special overlay district called the Intracoastal Waterway North district. The rules for that zoning area would allow for eight-story buildings and about 42 residential units per acre. Coastal's PUD request is asking for six-story buildings and will only have 21 units per acre

"It's not often you get a request to downzone property," Harris said. "This is a big deal in right of way and strategic roadway placement and also for the zoning for the future of that 218 acres. It gives really an opportunity to manage that growth and align that growth with

the city's vision."

During the regular session, the council also:

• Accepted an amendment to the funding agreement between the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation (NFWF) and the City of Gulf Shores to include an additional \$1.4 million for the implementation of habitat restoration work as part of the Bon Secour/Oyster Bay Wetland Project.

• Accepted a bid from Traffic Solutions of Herndon, Virginia, for \$23,000 for a radar trailer. The city only received one bid and had budgeted \$25,000 for the trailer.


• Voted to allow a change in the Aberdeen Villas planned unit development to add 13 single-family houses on a 4.7-acre parcel off of Cotton Creek Drive.

• Voted to annex in a lot at 19040 Pine Acres Road north of County Road 8 and west of State Route 59. Lois Gale Walker seeks annexation of her 30,610 square foot property that contains a single home. The purpose of the annexation was to be in the Gulf Shores City School district

• OK'd an assembly permit for Big Beach Marathon for Jan. 25. Most of the course is on the Backcountry Trail but it starts and finishes at The Wharf.

• Approved a change in the ordinance regarding sleeping in vehicles. The amendment is intended to bring the ordinance in line with court decisions that were rendered after the original ordinance's adoption and better describe the activities regulated under this section, a city memo stated.

• Approved Gulf Shores Utilities request to sell off some surplus property, specifically a 2016 Ford F-150 pickup that was totaled in a wreck.







City of Orange Beach road construction update

The City of Orange Beach posted an update on ogoing road and sidewalk projects on Nov.

•Canal Road Eastbound Lane: The Canal Road eastbound lane road construction, between the light at Williams Silvers Parkway and Hwy. 161/Orange Beach Boulevard, is underway. This project is adding a muchneeded second eastbound lane extension and will eliminate the need to merge at the traffic signal at Williams Silvers Parkway. The ADOT project is expected to be complete by December 2020. The Hwy. 161 and Canal Road intersection is now open with two left turns off 161 and the westbound lane closure is now in effect from Cosmo's Restaurant to Gulf Bay Road.

• Wolf Bay Bridge: The project continues to go through the permitting process with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the U.S. Coast Guard, as negotiations continue with the main landowner north of the proposed bridge.

• East Canal Road: Canal Road, east of Hwy. 161/ will undergo widening from 161 to Wilson Boulevard. A traffic circle will also be added just east of the Senior Activity Center. This will remedy the chronic problem of vehicles doing U-turns to get to businesses on the north side of Canal Rd. The project is awaiting funding and is set to begin in the spring with completion prior to summer of 2021.

• Lauder Lane at Canal Road: Construction of a Lauder Lane turn lane onto eastbound Canal Road is expected to begin this winter. The City is awaiting approval for wetland impacts. The City continues to work with ALDOT on acquiring a warrant for a traffic signal at this inter-

• Potential Multimodal Path: The City will be conducting a feasibility study to determine whether golf cart paths can be constructed on East Canal Road, State Hwy. 161 and Marina Road. (See John Mullen's Page 26 story).

• Road Resurfacing: Over the next month and a half. 20 city streets will be repaved and numerous sections of paved paths on the Backcountry Trail will be repaired. and several locations at the Orange Beach Wastewater Treatment Plant. The paving is scheduled to be finished by the end of the year.

Why do leaves change color?

While we love to watch the leaves change color, do we know why this process takes place? Mallory Kelley, an Alabama Extension home grounds, $\,$ gardens and home pests regional agent, said that the color of leaves depends on the pigment in the leaf along with the environmental conditions it is exposed to.

During the fall, less sunlight and cooler temperatures gradually cut off water and nutrients to the leaves as they begin to go dormant. At this point, leaves stop manufacturing chlorophyll and begin to break down. This process begins the color changes.

"The pigment chlorophyll produces the green color of leaves, which helps trees make food," Kelley said. "During the fall, leaves stop producing chlorophyll and as the green starts to fade the yellow, orange and red pigments begin to show through."

Fall leaves - Red, Orange or Yellow?

Kelley said the type of tree is one of the factors that determine the fall leaf color.

"Hickory and ginkgo trees, for example, will always be yellow to brown and are not capable of producing oranges and reds due to their genetic makeup," she said.

Each year there is almost always a guarantee to see the yellow colored leaves as chlorophyll starts to disappear. However, if drought conditions are present, they will affect the leaves' show. Severe drought will cause most all the leaves to turn brown and fall off early. This is the case for many areas across Alabama this year.

The oranges and reds in the fall foliage are dependent on several factors.

Color is a byproduct of chemicals that sugar formation in the leaf produces. Good growing conditions, along with warm sunny days and cool night temperatures, help produce more sugars. This results in richer leaf colors in plants like maples, Bradford pears, Chinese pistache and the Chinese tallow tree, better known as the popcorn tree.

"Two chemicals are primarily responsible for the oranges and reds in the foliage," Kelley said. "Those are the carotenoids, which cause the yellow-orange color in trees, and the pigment anthocyanin, which produces the red to purple in the leaves."

Often, you will see the most red color on the side of the tree that gets the afternoon, setting sun. The bright sunshine and warm temperature dropping into cool night temperature really makes the colors pop in the leaves.

The Caney Creek Falls Trail is a 1.7 mile out and back trail that's located within the William B. Bankhead National Forest near Double Springs. It's an easy hike that's perfect for the entire family, and it'll take you to one of the state's most beautiful waterfalls - Caney Creek Falls.


6. Bald Rock Boardwalk Trail

Much like the Pulpit Rock Trail, the Doug Ghee Accessible Trail, which is best known as the Bald Rock Boardwalk, is located in Cheaha State Park near Heflin. It's an easy 0.6 mile out and back trail that offers a spectacular end view where you can see for miles and miles.

7. Kinlock Falls Trail

Also located within North Alabama's William B. Bankhead National Forest is the Kinlock Falls Trail. With a length of only 0.3 miles, this scenic trail is great for all skill levels. It'll take you to Kinlock Falls, which has a 15-foot drop and a span of more than 20 feet. If you follow the trail further downstream, you'll experience another beautiful waterfall.

"Veterans day is just around the corner. Take this opportunity to demonstrate your organizations gratitude for the sacrifices made by veterans," said Martin Haygood, a volunteer coordinator with the Kiwanis Club. "We ask that people pease give generously and encourage others to give. Last year we only had about 12,000 wreaths for the 40,000 plus gravesites."

The Big Lagoon Kiwanis, with help from the Bailey Middle School Builder's Club and the K- Kids Club, along with several other local area non-profits, will place the wreaths at veterans' head stones to honor veterans and provide an excellent opportunity to teach younger generations about the value of their freedoms and the importance of honoring those who sacrificed so much to protect those freedoms.

As Haygood noted, 12,000 wreaths placed at Barrancas is inspiring, but it still leaves many grave sites unadorned.

In 1992, 5,000 wreaths were donated by Morrill Worcester and Worcester WreathCo. Years later, in 2005, an iconic photo of these wreaths in snow (pictured) became a viral sensation. Finally, in 2007, Wreaths Across America is formed as a nonprofit governed by a Board of Directors. Their day-to-day operations are overseen by Executive Director Karen Worcester.

WAA's mission is carried out by coordinating ceremonies at Arlington, as well as veterans cemeteries in all 50 states. The organization has since expanded to include over 1,000 local charity groups that represent more than 800 cemeteries, military memorials, and other locations. In 2008, and each year since, Congress has issued a proclamation officially recognizing "Wreaths Across America Day" each December.

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Alabama Wildlife Art Hard Licenses now on sale

Want a beautiful piece of wildlife or nature art that you can carry with you wherever you go? Plus, you get a heck of a deal. You can get that piece of art for just \$5 when you take advantage of Alabama's new hard-card licenses currently on sale for the 2019-2020 hunting and fishing seasons.

For an additional \$5 fee, purchasers can select from eight different cards that depict a variety of outdoors scenes. The art scenes include deer, turkey, freshwater fishing, saltwater fishing, wildlife heritage with an indigo bunting, sandhill crane and shooting sports. A deer and feral hog adorn the inaugural bait privilege license.

A total of 32 license privileges are eligible for purchase as a hard card, including annual hunting and fishing licenses for residents and non-residents, state duck stamp, Wildlife Heritage and bait privilege licenses. Trip licenses, lifetime licenses and no-cost privileges are not included in this feature.

"We worked so hard for years to get away from a paper license to something electronically so people could have it on their phones," said Chris Blankenship, Commissioner of the Alabama Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (ADCNR). "That's been really good for a lot of people, but we get a lot of requests for a hard-card license that people can put in their tackle boxes or keep in their wallets, so they can have that with them if they don't have their phones or whatever reason."

Blankenship said other states have seen collectors' markets develop for similar hard licenses with a va-

riety of outdoors scenes.

"We had seen in Florida and some other states where the hard cards have become collectible," he said. "We wanted to create hard cards with multiple wildlife and nature scenes that people could choose from. If they love saltwater fishing, they can pick a saltwater species. If they love freshwater fishing, they could choose a freshwater fish. If they hunt deer or turkey, they can get those.

"Particularly for our Wildlife Heritage licenses, we wanted to create a card for bird watchers or people who may not hunt or fish but enjoy using Forever Wild lands or State Parks. They can support the Department by purchasing the Wildlife Heritage license and the hard card that goes with that. So, we have a hard card that fits just about everybody.

Blankenship hopes people will embrace the hard cards here as they have elsewhere.

"From what we've seen in other states, a lot of people like to buy the whole set that is available for that year," he said. "They might have their license privileges added to one card and then buy the others so they can have a hard card without a license privilege attached to it. While that option is not available this year, we'll see after this year what the demand is for that."

With all the distractions of the modern world, from computer games to smartphones, license sales for outdoors activities have been struggling to maintain status quo. Blankenship said the general public doesn't really understand the importance of license

sales to conservation and wildlife and fisheries management through the ADCNR.

"We are a self-funded agency, so license sales and Parks revenue fund all the work that we do at the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources," he said. "That's why we think the Wildlife Heritage license and the hard card that goes with it might be a good way for people to support the Department. We can match those license sales with federal funds and do good work for the resources of our state."

ADCNR receives three-to-one federal matching funds for licenses sold through the Sport Fish Restoration Act and the Pittman-Robertson Wildlife Restoration Act.

The Sport Fish Restoration Act levies an excise tax on manufacturers, producers, and importers of sportfishing equipment as well as small engine and motor boat fuel taxes paid by recreational anglers and boaters. A 10% tax is levied on sport-fishing equipment, while a 3% tax is paid on electric (trolling) motors. Tax is also levied on motor boat and small engine fuel, and other import duties are levied on boats and a variety of fishing equipment.

Those funds are distributed according to the number of licenses sold and land mass. The number of licenses sold determines a 60% share of the funding, and 40% percent is based on the land and water area in a particular state.

The Sport Fish Restoration Act requires that 15% of all restoration money be spent on public boating access. It also requires Alabama and other coastal states to fund marine recreational fisheries projects at a ratio determined by the number of resident freshwater to saltwater anglers.

Pittman-Robertson funds are derived from an 11% federal excise tax on the manufacturers of sporting arms, ammunition, and archery equipment. Handgun manufacturers are taxed at a 10% rate. One-half of the excise tax on handguns and archery equipment must be used for hunter education and shooting ranges.

For hard-card collectors, Alabama's wildlife and nature images will change annually. After this inaugural roll-out of the hard cards, Blankenship said there is a possibility that the photos of the winners of the annual ADCNR Photo Contest could be used to adorn each year's edition of hard cards.

"We have a lot of ideas about what we can do with the hard cards," he said. "Really, we decided to do the hard cards for two reasons. One was to meet the demand for people who wanted a hard card to put their license privileges on, and the other was to find ways for other people to support the work of the Department."

The easiest way to obtain a hard license with the wildlife and nature scenes is to purchase a license online and click on the link to purchase a hard license. Buyers can choose one or all eight of the cards at \$5 per card. License purchasers who use retail outlets can also obtain a hard license. For those who want to get a hard card after a license has already been purchased, go online and use the "Replacement/Additional Hard Card" link to purchase any or all of the eight cards.


After purchase, the hard licenses will be mailed to buyers within 10 days. If you plan to hunt or fish before you receive your hard card, be sure to keep a paper copy of your license or have it available on your smartphone.

For deer and turkey hunters as well as red snapper anglers, don't forget that when you purchase a hard card, you still must comply with harvest reporting requirements. Hunters who hunt deer and turkey should report through Game Check, while red snapper anglers should comply through Snapper Check. The easiest way to comply is to use the Outdoor Alabama app. Otherwise, hunters must retain a paper record of their harvests.

The new Reef Fish Endorsement is now available for purchase and will be required beginning September 1 to possess any reef fish species in Alabama waters. Marine Resources Division (MRD) Director Scott Bannon said enforcement will be out educating the public regarding the endorsement.

"Anytime we have a rule change we try and make efforts to inform the public about the change and allow some time for adjustment to the rule," said Bannon.

Another option for those who purchase licenses for the 2019-2020 seasons is the ability to round up their purchase to the next nearest dollar. If they choose, that extra money can be designated for research in wildlife, freshwater fishing or saltwater fishing. Also new this year is the ability to opt-in for annual autorenewal of licenses.














