Divers encounter Great White Shark 25 miles off Orange Beach

A group of Birmingham based scuba divers came in contact with a great white shark about 25 miles in 100 ft. of water off the coast of Orange Beach while spearfishing over Memorial Weekend. Chase Tucker was operating a camera while fishing with JoJo Bates and Forrest Phillips when he spotted the shark that he recognized as a Great White by its massive size and characteristis and tried to alert his friends, Forrest Phillips and JoJo Bates.

"I saw another mangrove snapper and shot it. And I hear him saying, 'Good shot, good shot.' Really, he wasn't saying good shot at all. What he was saying was 'Big shark, big shark, big shark," Phillips, a diver and president of Southern Skin Divers Supply in Birmingham, told Brian Pia of ABC 33/40 upon returning home.

"I was probably the only one in the water at the time that did not realize it was a great white. So, probably, ignorance is bliss at the time for sure," Bates said.

The men told Pia they estimated the shark to be 12 ft. long and it came to within 30 ft. of them. But they didn't panic and the shark never acted aggressively.

"When you first see something like that. It's almost if you're in a dream-like state. You know, it takes a minute to kick in. Like, 'Hey man, wake up. That's a white shark,"

"You can get in the vessel with your fish and say, 'Hey, Saturday, What did you do? We'll you were cutting your grass. Well, I was down with a great white shark," Phillips told Pia of ABC 33/40 during an interview at Southern Skin Divers Supply.

The U.S. Navy Blue Angels flight demonstration team continues to practice in hopes of reviving at least part of its show



season. The Pensacola Beach Air Show on July 11 and the Blues practice show the day before have not been cancelled.

G.S. Bodenhamer Center is back open with many safety precautions in place

Although there are modifications to the way members get their sweat on, the Gulf Shores City Bodenhamer Recreation Center is back open for business.

The Cultural Center Studio Fitness remans temporarily closed. The pool remains temporarily closed to complete expedited deck renovations. Bodenhamer locker rooms, basketball and racquetball courts, pool house and game tables remain closed, as are the coffee and water fountain stations. Towel service will not be provided.

"We have been working hard to modify our operations not only to follow the necessary guidelines, but to ensure that you feel safe when you return," said Recreation Division Manager Nicole Ard. "

We have developed a careful, considered phased plan. I understand that some members may not agree with every guideline but it is vital that everyone cooperate and comply in order for us to open and stay

The center will be open to members 15

years of age and older Monday-Friday from 5:30 a.m. to 7 p.m., Saturdays from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. and Sunday from 1 p.m. to 6 p.m.

Deep cleanings will be performed daily of all areas after closing and hand sanitizing stations located throughout the facility

Fitness services will occupy four areas within the facility. Cardio equipment will be in the lobby, and weight equipment upstairs. Yoga and aerobics class numbers will be limited. Soft equipment such as mats and blocks will not be supplied and each participant must wait for class to begin on indicated green X's located floor.

Bodenhamer staff will wear masks covering their nose and mouth to remain consistent with government guidelines.

Garrett Ard's Eagle Scout reef project honors his grandfather, a local charter boat captain

When Garrett Ard started his Eagle Scout project four years ago, the goal was to honor the memory of his late grandfather, Capt. Gloyice Ard, a longtime Gulf Coast charter boat captain.

The culmination of all the work involved in such an endeavor recently

"When Dad and I started talking about raising \$25,000 to build a reef, it almost seemed unattainable. Then it happened, and it was like, 'We just did that." sank to the bottom of the Gulf of Mexico – in the form of an artificial reef.

What Ard didn't realize at the time was when the repurposed boat slipped beneath the waves the project also honored the heritage of another Gulf Coast captain. The shrimp boat, the Southern Heritage, used in the project was captained by the late Paul Rogers.

Garrett said he was sitting around a campfire when the idea of building a reef in Alabama's unparalleled artificial reef zones popped into his head.

"Growing up on the coast, building a reef made sense," he said. "We didn't have to do a project that big for my Eagle Scout project, but we decided to go big or go home."

Garrett's mom, Kimberly, said guidance from Lee Kibler, the Scoutmaster from Elberta, helped Garrett proceed with the reef-building plan.

"Lee said the project needs to fit the scout," Kimberly said. "He said not every project fits the scout's capabilities. We just felt like Garrett's capabilities were up to this project."

Garrett then started fundraising for the project. He made presentations to the Alabama Reef Foundation and the Orange Beach City Council. The Reef Foundation chipped in \$5,000, and Orange Beach City Council donated \$10,000 to the fund. Garrett's presentations to several more community organizations added to the coffers, and one of his dad's connections provided additional funding.

"We were having a Gulf Council (Gulf of Mexico Fishery Management Council) meeting in Orange Beach, and I asked Garrett to come because there was somebody there I wanted him to meet," said Garrett's dad, Capt. Tom Ard, who has a fleet of four charter boats. "It was Buddy Guindon, one of the largest commercial fishermen in the Gulf. He has a huge seafood market in Galveston (Texas). He donates to a lot of different projects.

"I told Buddy about the Eagle Scout project, and he and Garrett had a nice talk. Buddy gave us a very generous donation of \$5,000. He realized the reef would help recreational fishermen, charter boats and commercial boats. I can guarantee you commercial boats will be catching snapper off the reef for the public market."

Although the donations were secured, the Ards ran into an obstacle. Suitable reef material was difficult to find, especially in their price range.

"The original idea was to use a barge, but we couldn't find one or it cost too much money," Garrett said.

Tom happened to call David Walter (aka Reefmaker of Walter Marine) and asked about finding reef material. Walter told him about an old shrimp boat that would make a quality reef.

"I asked him how much he wanted for it," Tom said. "He said \$30,000. I told him we had \$25,000, and he said, 'I'll take it."

Because Walter Marine is so busy deploying reefs all over the Gulf, the Ards had to wait in line. When it appeared the shrimp boat reef wouldn't happen before Garrett's 18th birthday, they had to amend their reef-building plans to meet the Boy Scouts' requirement.

With guidance from the Mobile Boy Scouts office, a smaller reef operation preceded the big deployment, but it was also an operation that would have been so familiar to Poppa Gloyice, a jovial character who was a fixture in the Orange Beach charter industry with his boat, the Boll Weevil, a salute to Gloyice's days as a cropduster pilot.

"We got two chicken coops," Garrett said. "We built a platform on the back of my grandpa's boat, and we tied these huge chicken coops on the back of the boat and got to deploy them by hand. It was really cool."

Tom added, "He got to see how we used to build reefs in the old days. This will be the Boll Weevil's 40th season."

Before the shrimp boat could be deployed, Garrett and several of his Boy Scout buddies had to complete the task of cleaning out foam insulation from the bowels of the boat.

"We had to climb inside the boat and pick up these huge chunks of foam and other trash," Garrett said. "We had to be careful because of all the rusted, jagged metal. We spent an afternoon in the boat, and we got it cleaned up."

The day to deploy the 50-foot, steelhulled shrimp boat finally arrived, and the Ards headed out about 14 miles into the Gulf. The superstructure had already been removed from the shrimp boat, and a large steel cylinder with many nooks and crannies was welded onto the hull for improved fish habitat.

"The barge with the shrimp boat left about 3 a.m.," Garrett said. "When we got there on the Fairwater II (another of Tom's charter boats), the crane just picked the shrimp boat up and put it in the water. When it caught water, it just went straight down.

"It was a huge sense of relief – like, 'Wow, we actually did it.' We had been working on this for so long. When Dad and I started talking about raising \$25,000 to build a reef, it almost seemed unattainable. Then it happened, and it was like, 'We just did that.' It was a huge sense of accomplishment."

Garrett had previously met with Marine Resources Director Scott Bannon and Artificial Reefs Coordinator Craig Newton to discuss the reef project and get it properly permitted.

"Alabama's artificial reef program was founded by anglers like Garrett's grandfather, and Garrett's project is a testament to his legacy," Newton said. "I'm extremely proud of Garrett's achievement, and I'm anxious to watch the reef develop over the coming years."

Director Bannon added, "I am a big supporter of Scouting and was excited to hear about Garrett's plan to create an artificial reef. It required a lot of physical and administrative work on his part, and I applaud his diligence to see it through to the end. Watching the video of Garrett's reaction to the reef being deployed was priceless. His contribution to the Alabama Artificial Reef Zone will be enjoyed by anglers for many years to come."

When the local news media heard about the memorial reef, Garrett gained a great deal of exposure, which led to the revelation of how the reef memorialized another captain.

When word spread about the reef, Garrett was contacted by the daughter of the late owner of the Southern Heritage, the shrimp boat that the Ards de-

ployed.

The message from Amber Rogers Joyner read: "The Southern Heritage was my daddy's boat, his pride and joy. He loved that boat, and he loved being on the water. Not sure if you know the story along with the boat, but he passed last January. He'd be so happy to know what you've done – the Southern Heritage staying in the water and being a place people will be able to enjoy for years to come. Thank you, Garrett! It's a place I will definitely be taking my children to enjoy."

Garrett said, "It was kind of the same deal I had with Poppa's boat, the Boll Weevil. It started out as a memorial reef for my Poppa and it grew into a memorial reef for her dad."

Unlike his dad, Garrett will not continue the family tradition of becoming a

charter boat captain.

Despite his connection

Despite his connection to the Gulf Coast and the Gulf of Mexico, Garrett's interests are in the wild blue yonder instead of the deep blue sea.

He's headed to Mississippi State University this fall to study aerospace engineering and play trombone in several of the school's bands.

Garrett, however, will be back home for a trip on his dad's boat next year to see how many big red snapper are hanging around the Capt. Gloyice Ard Memorial Reef.

McMillan to push bill allowing pet dogs in outdoor dining areas

Rep. Steve McMillan, an Orange Beach resident, said he will continue to push his bill to allow pet dogs in outdoor dining areas of restaurants. The bill was moving towards

Kay Iveny put COVID-19 safety measures in place.

"I think it would be something we'd want to continue in another session to get it through and get it signed," McMillan said. "It's kind of a no-brainer from my look at it, and I haven't seen any major opposition come out against it."

The bill, HB 209, passed the House overwhelmingly on March 3, but did not see action through the Senate due to the COVID-19 delays and shortened

legislative session.

"Had the COVID-19 crisis not happened, I think the bill likely would have been moved through and signed by the governor well before the end of session," McMillan said.

McMillan said his constituents that wanted to be able to dine with their dogs in appropriate venues. That contituancey includes residents of Elberta, Foley, Gulf Shores, Orange Beach, Robertsdale, Summerdale, Barnwell, Magnolia Springs, Lillian, Perdido Beach, Josephine, Miflin, Bon Secour, Fort Morgan & Ono Island.

"Everybody loves their dogs and often want

to bring them with them when they go places," McMillan said. "Here in Baldwin County, and especially in my district, we've got a lot of restaurants that offer outdoor dining, so it just makes sense that we amend the current law to allow folks to bring their furry friends with them and enjoy the great views and good food together."

McMillan's bill was a statewide bill that would have affected not only his district in Baldwin County, but food service establishments around the state. He said he had also received backing from the Alabama Restaurant Association.

"This was not just a Baldwin County issue, though that's who I heard the most from," McMillan said. "If a restaurant has a outdoor area and wants to allow people to bring their dogs with them, I don't see any reason why the government should be out there trying to put a stop to that."

Under the proposed bill, the owners of food service establishments would decide whether to allow pet dogs in their outdoor dining areas. If they chose to do so, the owner would file for a waiver with the State Health Department and agree to follow prescribed rules. Signage stating the designated outdoor dining area would be available for patrons with pet dogs would also be required.

"I'm going to keep pushing this bill whenever I have the next opportunity, and I think we'll see positive results for all Alabamians on this, including our four-legged canine friends," McMillan said.

A realtor by trade, McMillan, has represented South Baldwin County in teh State Legislature since 1980. He was born in Mobile on July 6, 1941, and graduated from Auburn in 1964. He and his wife, Gayle, are the parents of two children, Scott and Jason, and have three grandchildren.

Gulf Shores accepts \$5.3 million grant for air traffic control tower

Gulf Shores Airport Authority officially accepted a \$5.3 million from the Federal Aviation Administration to fund the building of the first air traffic

control tower in Baldwin

"Around here it's see and be seen. Once the tower is in operation that will cease. It will not allow that to happen."

Also, during the joint work session-regular session, the council approved the annual repaying schedule for city streets and will spend abut \$850,000 on those projects this year.

"This is to accept an FAA grant of \$5.3 million for the construction of a new air traffic control facility at the airport," Airport Authority Manager Scott Fuller said. "Good news about this grant is typically, they're 90 percent. This one is a 100 percent grant. The \$700,000 we had set aside for our share

of this project will be reallocated toward a future airline terminal building."

Bids for construction of the tower will be opened in July and Fuller says the goal is to have it finished by July of 2021.

"With this we will rank as the second busiest tower in Alabama behind Birmingham and basically, we are already the second busiest airport," Fuller said. "Nationwide we will rank as the 40th busiest of 256 facilities nationwide. They recognize the need for that facility."

Fuller said the tower will bring in safety features needed at Jack Edwards Airport.



"Typically, at this airport you talk on the radio but at this airport it's not required," Fuller said. "With a tower you cannot come within four miles of the airport without permission."

Added safety features will include single runway operation, proper spacing between the aircraft in the air and on the ground, coordination of arrivals and departures with local traffic and regulatory enforcement support.

Efficiency improvements include reducing go arounds caused by congestion, reducing runway incursions, coordinate arrivals and allows consecutive approaches to the airport thus reducing costly holding patterns and delays.

"Runway incursion is when one aircraft is trying to take off while another is in the process of landing," Fuller said. "That's a main safety concern of the FAA. Right now, there are a lot of days when we have a north-south routine going and an eastwest at the same time. This makes the patterns over cross each other. It's not a very safe condition. Around here it's see and be seen. Once the tower is in operation that will cease. It will not allow

The tower will be located in the southeast corner of the intersection of the two runways at the airport, Fuller said.

\$850K allocated for roadway projects

"Every year we let bids for various roadway improvement projects in the city," Public Works Director Mark Acreman said. "This year we're recommending awarding the 2020 bid to Asphalt Services in an amount not to exceed \$850,000."

Bids were opened on May 7 and is a unit price contract for work including resurfacing, widening, seal coating, restriping and repairs as needed.

Included in the project is resurfacing in Craft Farms north to finish up work that has been going on for several years. On the east side of town work is planned on East Third Street and East 21st Avenue, Acreman said.

"West Fairway we'd like to continue the work we started this year on Wedgewood and resurface the continuation of that roadway down West Fairway Drive all the way back to Fort Morgan Road,' Acreman said.

In an area south of Fort Morgan Road and west of State Route 59, West Second Street, Hilltop Drive, Oak Ridge Drive, Yupon Drive, Sunset Drive, Magnolia Drive, West First Street, West 12th Avenue, West 13th Avenue and West 14th Avenue need work but not a complete repaying.

"We've got a whole selection of roads in and around the Hilltop area that are in really good shape," Acreman said. "They just have a little bit of weathering and oxidation because of their age. Those particular roadways we would like to seal coat those and extend their life expectancy before they are subject to any kind of structural degradation. This would be a brand-new seal coat on all those roads and it would seal in the aggregates and we'd restripe those as well."

Other roads getting work will be West Third Avenue, Creekview Avenue and West Fourth Street in the West Beach area. Mayor Robert Craft asked if some of the roads not mentioned were badly in need of repairs could the work be shifted to get those fixed.

"We have the ability to move those funds around as needed on the worse of the worst roads," Acreman said. "Should a road be brought to our attention that is in a more severe state than the current list then we absolutely can prioritize that road. We do have some funding available. We have \$850,000 but the bid is for \$843,000 so we have \$7,000 there. We always build in a substantial amount of contingency, about 10 to 15 percent into our bid packages when we let these out. So, we do have contingency funding that we could appropriate to some of these other roads being brought to our attention."

During the session, the council also reappointed Vic Roberts to a six-year term on the Airport Authority Board and took over rights of way and maintenance for five streets in the Colony subdivision on Fort Morgan Road.

Also, at the end of the meeting City Administrator Steve Griffin said more city facilities were opened per Gov. Kay Ivey's new Safer at Home order relaxing some restrictions due to the pandemic. Those inlude the Gulf Shores Sportsplex, Kids Park playground, Meyer Park playground,

Skate Park, all picnic pavilions, outdoor fitness equipment, public restrooms, benches and picnic tables.

Pool renovations continue; members welcome in O.B.

Due to the extended closure of the Bodenhamer Recreation Center, Gulf Shores was able to successfully expedite renovations for the pool that were originally planned for Fall 2020. The project began in late April and is expected to be completed by the end of July.

"We are very proud of these efforts to minimize future facility downtime while taking advantage of the closure to make these much needed pool improvements," said said City of Gulf Shores Recreation Division Manager Nicole Ard.

"The project will include: removing all concrete decking and drainage, replace with new improved drainage system, new tile deck, replace drainage in all locker rooms, new tile flooring in locker rooms," Ard said.

Pool members will be able to use the Orange Beach Aquatics Center for exercise swimming only. 

Alligator hunt registration opens June 2 50 tags allocated for zones south of I-10

The Alabama Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (ADCNR) will open online registration for the state's regulated alligator hunts on June 2, at 8 a.m. Registration must be completed by 8 a.m., July 8.

A total of 260 Alligator Possession Tags will be distributed among five hunting zones. The administrative fee to apply for an Alligator Possession Tag is \$22 and individuals may register one time per zone. While the tag is free, the selected hunters and their assistants are required to have valid hunting licenses in their possession while hunting.

Fifty tags are allocated for private and public waters in Baldwin and Mobile counties south of Interstate 10. The season runs from sunset on August 13, until sunrise on August 16, and again from

sunset on August 20 until sunrise on August 23.

Only Alabama residents and Alabama lifetime license holders ages 16 years or older may apply for tags. Alabama lifetime license holders may apply for an Alligator Possession Tag even if they have moved out of the state.

To register for the 2020 alligator hunts, visit www.outdooralabama.com/alligators/alligator-hunting-season-alabama during

the registration period listed above.

Hunters will be randomly selected by computer to receive one Alligator Possession Tag each (the tags are non-transferable). The random selection process will utilize a preference point system. The system increases the likelihood of repeat registrants being selected for a hunt as long as the applicant continues to apply. The more years an applicant participates in the registration, the higher the likelihood of being selected. If an applicant does not register for the hunt in a given year or is selected and accepts a tag for a hunt, the preference point status is forfeited.

Applicants can check their selection status on July 8, after 12 p.m., at publichunts.dcnr.alabama.gov. Those selected to receive a tag must confirm their acceptance online by 8 a.m., July 15. After that date, alternates will be notified to fill any vacancies. Applicants drawn for the hunt are required to complete an online Alligator Training Course prior to accepting their hunter/alternate status. The official course will be available on the applicant's sta-

tus page upon login.

If selected for an Alligator Possession Tag at two or more locations, hunters must choose which location they would like to hunt. The slot for locations not chosen will be filled from a list of randomly selected alternates.

Private and public waters in Baldwin and Mobile counties north of interstate 10, and private and public waters in Washington, Clarke and Monroe counties east of U.S. Highway 43 and south of U.S. Highway 84 are been allocated 100 tags. Hunt dates are sunset on August 13, until sunrise on August 16 and sunset on August 20, until sunrise on August 23.

Most dangerous animal in the world is a wolf in sheepdog's clothing

I became a police officer to catch bad guys. To protect good people from those predators that would do those good people harm. My close friends in this job - those I respect and look up to - became police officers for the same reason. In fact, most of us - the absolutely overwhelming majority of us - feel the same way. We act accord-

Unfortunately, there are a few, very few, that slip through the cracks, get into our ranks, and do not feel and act the same way we do.

I've had the honor of speaking at several of the same Federal Law Enforcement Conferences as

Lt. Col. (RET) Dave Grossman. Like many attending his seminars, his words recalling a conversation with an old soldier on sheep, wolves, and sheepdogs hit home with

It makes sense that we revisit those words now: ...most citizens are kind, decent people who are not capable of hurting each other, except by accident or under extreme provocation. They are sheep.

I mean nothing negative by calling them sheep. To me it is like the pretty, blue robin's egg. Inside it is soft and gooey but someday it will grow into something wonderful. But the egg cannot survive without its hard blue shell. Police officers, soldiers, and other warriors are like that shell, and someday the civilization they protect will grow into something wonderful. For now, though, they need warriors to protect them from predators.

"Then there are the wolves," the old war veteran said, "and the wolves feed on the sheep without mercy." Do you believe there are wolves out there who will feed on the flock without mercy? You better believe it. There are evil men in this world and they are capable of evil deeds. The moment you forget that or pretend it is not so, you become a sheep. There is no safety in denial.

"Then there are sheepdogs," he went on, "and I'm a sheepdog. I live to protect the flock and confront the wolf.'

If you have no capacity for violence then you are a healthy productive citizen, a sheep. If you have a capacity for violence and no empathy for your fellow citizens, then you have defined an aggressive sociopath, a wolf. But what if you have a capacity for violence and a deep love for your fellow citizens?

What do you have then?

A sheepdog, a warrior, someone who is walking the hero's path. Someone who can walk into the heart of darkness, into the universal human phobia, and walk out unscathed.

Let me expand on this old soldier's excellent model of the sheep, wolves, and sheepdogs. We know that the sheep live in denial - that is what makes them sheep. They do not want to believe that it is evil in the world.

They can accept the fact that fires can happen, which is why they want fire extinguishers, fire

sprinklers, fire alarms, and fire exits throughout their kids' schools.

But many of them are outraged at the idea of putting an armed police officer in their kid's school. Our children are thousands of times more likely to be killed or seriously injured by school violence than fire, but the sheep's only response to the possibility of violence is denial. The idea of someone coming to kill or harm their child is just too hard, and so they choose the path of denial.

The sheep generally do not like the sheepdog.

He looks a lot like the wolf. He has fangs and the capacity for violence. The difference, though, is that the sheepdog must not, cannot and will not ever harm the sheep. Any sheepdog who intentionally harms the lowliest little lamb will be punished and removed. The world cannot work any other way, at least not in a representative democracy or a republic such as ours.

Still, the sheepdog disturbs the sheep. He is a constant reminder that there are wolves in the land. They would prefer that he didn't tell them where to go, or give them traffic tickets, or stand at the ready in our airports in camouflage fatigues holding an M-16. The sheep would much rather have the sheepdog cash in his fangs, spray paint himself white, and go, "Baa."

Until the wolf shows up. Then the entire flock tries desperately to hide behind one lonely sheep-

But now in light of recent events, I'll expand on the Colonel's message.

Here's the thing:

Not all criminal suspects we arrest are wolves. Many are.

But many more are not.

The sheepdogs in our profession have to protect the sheep. But we also have a sworn duty to protect those in our custody even if they are wolves.

We are sworn to stay within the law regarding the use of force. To protect even those resisting our lawful actions. To stop using reasonable force immediately – once a resisting suspect is under

We're sworn to make sure our fellow sheepdogs do the same. To step in and stop them if they

To make sure that those not suited to be sheepdogs are never again allowed to have that tremendous authority we are given.

Because the most dangerous animal in the world isn't a wolf.

And it isn't a wolf in sheep's clothing.

wolf in sheepdog's clothing.

OBFD puts out Memorial Weekend fires at 2 popular Orange Beach restaurants

Meat lovers in Orange Beach were in mourning over Memorial Day weekend, as two thriving restaurants, Big Mike's Steak House on Canal Rd. and Moe's BBQ on Perdido Beach Blvd., placed emergency calls two days apart to the Orange Beach Fire Department to come put out blazes.

The Big Mike's fire on May 23 forced evacuation of the building during dinner service and the fire at Moe's occurred around 9 p.m. on May 26, as employees were closing up and the last four customers were finishing meals. There were no injuries reported at either location.

The fire at Big Mike's was less destructive and the restaurant, which also has locations in Andalusia and Thomasville, is expected to reopen before July 4 weekend, according to its facebook page. The restaurant has been operating at capacity since first opening its Orange Beach location in the summer of 2017.

According to Big Mike's facebook post, restaurant signage wasn't the only thing that had flames on it on May 23. "We are hoping to be able to repair damages and be back open in about a month. Thank y'all for the outpouring of support from everyone and for everyone who checked in on us during this unfortunate, stressful event. We will keep y'all posted on progress in the upcoming weeks."

The fire at Moe's was way more destructive. Owners are waiting for a report from insurers as to whether they will renovate the building or tear it down and rebuild. But the restaurant employees are already cooking and dispensing food from a huge RV in the parking lot. The RV is the centerpiece of Moe's catering operations.

Moe's owners, who have been a huge part of the Pleasure Island community for the entire 14 years the restaurant has been at the Orange Beach location, completed a major upgrade to their restaurant facility just two years ago. They were scheduled to speak at the June 2 Orange Beach City Council meeting to request a permit allowing them to operate from the RV until they get back in their building.

With the city's expected approval, Moe's will continue to serve its signature dishes daily beginning at 11 a.m. Moe's also has locations in Foley and Daphne open for in-house dining, take out, deliv-

ery and catering.

Moe's fire started in its smoke house and spread to the restaurant and kitchen. There were reports of a propane tank explosion, but Moe's co-owner Mark White said the reported explosion was a Co2 tank, and it was not the cause fo the fire. He said the OBFD had responded and put out the fire within 20 minutes of the 911 call.

Moe's received an outpouring of support from its facebook post about the fire. Within two days, a local band, Hundred Dollar Car, was hosting a fundraiser for Moe's employees at another Orange Beach restaurant, Oso.

"The community support has been over the top," White said. "Just the outpouring and offers of help from our customers and the surrounding businesses has been so overwhelming. We had more than 40,000 responses from the first facebook post."

Both White and co-owner Matt Lovato said they had no plans of leaving Orange Beach or their current location.

"We like it here and we want to stay," White said. "It's been our home for 14 years. Our out of towners are familiar with us being in this location."

Moe's has received accolades from USA Today and The Daily Meal for being one of the best BBQ chains in America. It has also been recognized as the fastest growing, emerging restaurant chain by Restaurant Business Magazine, and one of the Top 10 Rib Joints in the U.S. by Relish.

The Moe's owners' sentiments were well stated on its facebook page in a post thanking the OBFD for putting out the fire so quickly.

"We appreciate all of your support and kind words. We will be back rockin' 'rollin' in no time," the post stated.



Governor Ivey thanks Poarch Creek Indians for \$500K donation








Burger King added to Tom Thumb planned complex at Wharf entrance

Å new Burger King and Cinnabon are coming to Orange Beach to be a part of the new Tom Thumb complex at the now vacant east entrance to the Wharf.

"Now everybody knows we are not blocking fast foods from coming to Orange Beach," Mayor Tony Kennon said. "That is an urban myth, folks."

"We wanted something that looked like us. We gave them some design features we wanted added. I think it's pretty nice for a Tom Thumb-Burger King.

The council during a May 19 work session reviewed the new design from the developers after the city asked them for something more than the normal quick mart-gas station design. Also, during the joint regular session-work session the council discussed an agreement with the Baldwin County Board of Education on usage of the Performing Arts Center under construction at the new school complex. Kennon also gave a report on the Canal Road work.

"This was out of their wheelhouse but we would

not approve the typical square box Tom Thumb/Burger King," Kennon said. "We wanted something that looked like us. We gave them some design features we wanted added. They came back with this and I think it's pretty nice for a Tom Thumb-Burger King."

There is a potential hold up pointed out by Community Development Director Kit Alexander with the sign planned for the new stores. Current design has Tom Thumb at the top, gas prices below that and Burger King and Cinnabon signs below that.

"Staff failed to bring to your attention that the height of the sign is 22 and a half feet," Alexander said. "Our sign ordinance limits the height of signage to 15 feet. So, this sign as shown in this elevation is deviating from our sign ordinance."

Council members who loved the new coastal look of the building were not so enamored with the outof-compliance sign.

"I've got reservations about this, I really do," Kennon said. "We just don't do it anywhere else. I guess it gets back to principle. We have a sign ordinance for a reason, we have height for a reason and we have denied it anywhere else. And I do understand but we have the same issue with our sign in front of our Medical Arts building. I have a problem with an exception for anyone because we have not done that."

Alexander said she'd meet with the developers to see if they can redesign the sign making it wider and complying with the 15-foot rule.

"Because the square footage is correct instead of

it being this kind of sign you can make it wider and not higher and have the same square footage," Alexander said.

Performing Arts Center update

Kennon is working with the county on what usage of the building will be for the city once it is open and running. Orange Beach voted in January of 2019 to fund \$7.2 million of the \$8.6 million center with the county paying the remaining \$1.4 million.

"This Is the contract on how the building will be used, who'll be allowed to use it," Kennon said. "It is going to be approved in a more substantial form but there are still a few details to be ironed out. Y'all are giving me permission to work those details out but there are still deal killers out there that we're going to get through. I think we will. It's working out insurance and things like that."

Kennon said the talks have been amiable and the city will have plenty of opportunities to use the building for classes and performances.

"The school board has been great to work with," Kennon said. "We have been given complete control of the building outside of school hours for the most part for us to develop out performing arts program as we see fit. That's very much appreciated and they were a big help to getting that done."

Eight new tennis courts coming

The council also awarded the contract for the demolition and rebuilding of the eight courts at the tennis center. Residents expressed concerns about doing them all at once and not having access.

Kennon said that with the construction of the new adult gym north of the Community Center and a major drainage project in another parking lot at the complex access would likely be limited anyway. Splitting the project into two phases would also cost more money than doing it all at once, Kennon said.

The council awarded a bid for recreation center drainage and tennis court improvements to Ammons & Blackmon Construction for about \$1.4 million at its May 5 meeting.

During the regular session, the council:

- Passed a resolution established a \$10 million line of credit with Bryant Bank in case emergency funds are needed during the COVID-19 pandemic. Awarded a bid of \$602,000 to M.W. Rogers Construction for a new sewer office building.
- Passed a resolution appropriating funds to to fund two teaching units at Orange Beach High

School for an amount up to \$172,849.30. One of the units will be for 10th and 11th grade English and ACT Prep and the second will be a dance and PE instructor for the middle school and for the Expect Excellence afterschool program.

• Passed a resolution authorizing execution of a professional services agreement for a special needs aid for the Camp Sunshine program.

- Passed a resolution authorizing the single source purchase for construction of Gulf Bay Road drainage improvements associated with the Canal Road widening from John G. Walton Construction Company.
- Passed a resolution authorizing the execution of a task order with Sawgrass Consulting to provide land surveying and civil engineering services for a new shooting range in an amount not to exceed \$14.800.
- Passed a resolution authorizing execution of Change Order No. 2 with Asphalt Services for the Coastal Resources Center site work in an amount not to exceed \$15,494.
- Passed a resolution authorizing the execution of a subaward grant agreement with the Alabama Department of Conservation and Natural Resources for the RESTORE Act state expenditure plan funded Orange Beach North Sewer Force Main Sewer Upgrade Project.
- Passed a resolution authorizing the execution of a subaward grant agreement with the Alabama Department of Conservation and Natural Resources for the RESTORE Act state expenditure plan funded Canal Road Improvements East of State Highway 161 Project.
- OK'd the business license for Gulf Duck Boats which will be operating in the city this season.

During the work session, the council:

- Reviewed and discussed the architectural and sign elevations for Tom Thumb at The Wharf.
- A resolution authorizing the execution of a task order with Thompson Engineering for professional engineering services for a Canal Road sidewalk to be located between The Wharf and Oak Street or the front of Bryant Bank.
- A resolution authorizing execution of a reciprocal agreement to exchange information with Baldwin County. In August of 2017 Orange Beach authorized a reciprocal agreement to exchange tax returns and information with the Baldwin County Commission. The current agreement ends on July 31 and this resolution will extend it through July 31 of 2023 at the request of Baldwin County.
- A resolution declaring the "Back-to-School" sales tax holiday July 17-19.
- Considered setting a public hearing date on a planned unit development modification for Beach Village, 69-lot cottage development east of Lartigue's Seafood on Perdido Beach Boulevard. The suggested date in June 16.
- Considered setting a public hearing date for a modification to The Wharf's PUD to make changes to its reader board sign.

Extra Canal Rd. lane comes earlier than expected

Getting five lanes up and running on the Canal Road widening project was made possible when city officials asked the state to reconfigure the existing roadway to get the extra lane even as work continues. Pavement needs to be added to the south side of the road and the entire project won't be completed until later this fall.

"We were only going to have the one lane," Orange Beach Mayor Tony Kennon said of the eastbound traffic flow. "We measured the width. We said if we reduced the lane width, we could get five. We took a shot and ALDOT jumped right on board with the contractor and helped us. We did not expect five lanes this summer."

That doesn't mean there won't be delays during the further construction on the project.

"There will be times when they are doing cuts that they'll have but for the most part Friday evening through Sunday they are not working and you see how much they're open during the week," Kennon said. "So, it's been a Godsend. This was a record weekend (May 16-18) guys. We had no real backups at all. We had one fender bender right down by the Tom Thumb that backed it up briefly but other than that it moved real well."

G.S. residents now have dedicated beach parking

Eastside Public Beach Lot open only to cars with decals

The City of Gulf Shores has added another amenity for city residents by allocating all 120 parking spaces in the public beach parking lot east of the Pink Pony for cars displaying a Gulf Shores resident (or business owner) valid hurricane re-entry decal.

"The mayor and council thought it was the right thing do,"said Grant Brown, the city's recreation and cultural affairs director. "When the beach reopened and waves of visitors from other communities began to return to town, we used that opportunity to allow our true local residents to have a place to access the beach."

Pay stations are in place at the beach parking lots from March 1 through November 30 each year. Locals with decals can park at

any of the lots for free, if they are lucky enough to find a spot. But during peak beach hours and busy tourist weekends spots in the parking lots are at a premium. "The plan now is to keep that parking lot restricted to City of Gulf Shores residents only through Labor Day," Brown said.

"We will monitor this as time moves forward."

The parking fee at all locations for cars without decals is \$5 for up to 4 hours or \$10 per day. Hurricane re-entry decals should be clearly displayed on the drivers side of the front windshield of the vehicle.

There are many other public beach parking locations that do not require a fee. These locations also operate on a first-come, first-served basis.

Tuscan Fish Packets

- 1 can (15 oz.) great northern beans, rinsed and drained
- 4 plum tomatoes, chopped
- 1 small zucchini, chopped
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 1 garlic clove, minced
- 1/4 cup white wine
- 3/4 tsp. salt, divided
- 1/4 tsp. pepper, divided
- 4 tilapia fillets (6 oz. each)
- 1 medium lemon, cut into 8 thin slices

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. In a bowl, combine beans, tomatoes, zucchini, onion, garlic, wine, 1/2 tsp. salt and 1/8 tsp. pepper. Rinse fish and pat dry. Place each fillet on an 18x12-in. piece of heavyduty foil; season with remaining salt and pepper. Spoon bean mixture over fish; top with lemon slices. Fold foil around fish and crimp edges to seal. Transfer packets to a baking sheet. Bake until fish just begins to flake easily with a fork and vegetables are tender, 15-20 min. Be careful of escaping steam when opening packet. Yield: 4 servings. Enjoy!

Racoons in O.B. exhibiting signs of canine distemper

City of Orange Beach Coastal Resources suspicions after responding to reports of raccoons exhibiting signs consistent with the canine distemper virus were confirmed on May 16 when results from the lab tests confirming this suspicion. Distemper is not uncommon in a variety of species including raccoons.

Raccoons with distemper may approach people, or curl up to sleep in open areas in close proximity to people. They generally act disoriented or lethargic, but can become aggressive if cornered. They may also have seizures, show their teeth and have been known to stand on their hind

Canine distemper does not pose a threat to human health however; dogs not vaccinated for distemper can become infected if they come in contact with an infected animal or its droppings, fluids, etc.

If residents notice a raccoon displaying abnormal behavior they should call 251-981-9777 to make a report and Coastal Resources staff will be contacted. Please note that merely seeing a raccoon, even during daylight hours, is not abnormal especially this time of year when they are with young.

What is Canine Distemper?

Canine Distemper (CDV) is a viral disease affecting animals in the canine families in addition to some other mammals. Raccoons are pre-disposed to this disease, as are dogs. It also commonly infects foxes and skunks. The disease is most often fatal, and those that recover may display permanent neurological damage.

Can my dog catch distemper?

Yes, if your dog has not been vaccinated against distemper, and comes in contact with a raccoon with distemper. Most dogs receive vaccinations as pups against distemper, and regular booster shots may be given. If you are not sure your pet is up-to-date, check with your veterinarian. Pupples not yet vaccinated are at particularly high risk. To protect your pet, keep your dog on a leash when on walks (it's the law).

What are symptoms of distemper?

Raccoons with distemper may move slowly and may stumble as they walk. They lose their fear of humans; appear blind, confused, and may wander aimlessly; and may become aggressive if cornered or approached. A mucous discharge will often be present around the eyes and nose.



COASTAL WILDIFE & NATIVE PLANTS

Red-tailed Hawks

Of all the magnificent birds of prey found in North America, few are more widespread or familiar than the redtailed hawk (Buteo jamaicensis). These are large hawks with broad wings designed for soaring. They get their name from the red tail feathers on most adults.

Red-tailed hawks are inhabitants of woodland edges and open fields. In these habitats they find most of their prey, consisting of small and medium-sized mammals and reptiles. When the opportunity presents itself, they will prey on bats, birds and even insects.

There 14 subspecies, or varieties, of red-tailed hawk in North America. They are found from Alaska to Central America and the Caribbean. Along the Gulf Coast, the most common variety is the Eastern red-tailed hawk, with its brick-red tail feathers, dark head and back, white underneath with a band of dark feathers across the upper belly. A lighter subspecies, called Krider's hawk, from the Great Plains occasionally migrates through our area. It has white head and tail feathers.

Male and female red-tailed hawks look just alike. The females are about 25% larger than the males. Adult birds reach lengths of up to 18 inches with wing-spans of over four feet. Immature red-tailed hawks do not get their adult plumage (red tail feathers) until their second year. Their tail feathers are brown with narrow dark bands.

Red-tailed hawks require tall structures on which to perch, search for prey and build nests. Nests are made of sticks and twigs and are about 30 inches wide and four or five inches deep. They are usually built in late winter or early spring. Nests are built in trees, on ledges or human structures such as power poles. The same nest may be used for several years by a mated pair of hawks, which

Once a pair of red-tails has mated, they establish a territory, which varies from 1 to 2 square miles. Both hawks defend the territory, which they remain on their entire lives. Around March or April, the female lays two to four dull white eggs. The incubation period is about four weeks. The female incubates the eggs while the male hunts for food and brings to her. After the eggs hatch, the male continues to hunt for the female and chicks, while the female stays at the nest to protect the young.

Red-tailed hawks are generalist when it comes to food. They will eat whatever is available, although studies show about 95% of their diet is small mammals, like mice and rats. They search for prey either by soaring above a field or meadow or by perching in an elevated location until they spot a potential meal. They can frequently be seen perching on telephone poles next to highways,, where they feed on mice and rats.

The prey is killed with their sharp talons. Small animals are swallowed whole while larger ones (like rabbits or squirrels) are torn into smaller pieces with their beaks. Hair and bone is compressed into pellets and periodically regurgitated.



Coast Guard & OBPD terminate voyage of illegal charter vessel

The Coast Guard and the Orange Beach Police department terminated the voyage of an illegal charter vessel near Orange Beach Saturday.

Orange Beach Police contacted Coast Guard Sector Mobile with concerns of a suspected illegal passenger for hire operation in the area after seeing multiple advertisements on social media over the last few weeks. Coast Guard law enforcement officers, patrolling with Orange Beach police, boarded the 21-foot center console boat and found it operating with paying passengers embarked. The captain of the vessel had no valid Merchant Mariner's License, no current vessel registration, and no business license to operate. The voyage was terminated and the vessel was escorted back

Under federal law, owners and operators of illegal charter vessels can face maximum civil penalties of more than \$59,000.

"Illegal charter boats place passengers in great danger," said Capt. LaDonn Allen, Sector Commander of Coast Guard Sector Mobile. "They do not provide the same level of safety as a legal charter vessel. The safety of the boating public is our top priority and along with our partners, like the Orange Beach Police Department, we are dedicated to stopping this illegal activity and ensuring the appropriate penalties are applied."


The Coast Guard urges anyone paying for a trip on a passenger vessel to verify that their captain has a safety plan and a Merchant Mariner Credential. For larger charter boats, ask to see a Coast Guard issued Certificate of Inspection. If the operator cannot produce appropriate credentials, passengers should not get on the boat.



Keg manager Joe Coe put together the coolest local photo op of the pandemic guarantine when he invited friends in the restaurant industry to join together for a picture at Orange Beach Waterfront Park as a way of showing solidarity among the island's close knit hospitality indus-

"We talked about how the pandemic was affecting us and what we could do to help provide financial relief for employees and tried to help each other connect the dots in processing the systems with the SBA," Coe said.

"It was also a way to show the great solidarity and the unification of the profession here here on the island," he added.

Coe said the restaurant owners and managers discussed revising a recognized coalition during the gathering, but he assumes that all of the hospitality businesses have been as busy as the Keg since last month's lifting of the quarantine.

"I don't think anybody was expecting this kind of response when we opened back up," he said. "With Florida not fully opening up, it has been crazy at the Keg. Last weekend may have been even busier than Memorial Day Weekend."

Restaurant, Luna's Eat and Drink, GTs On the Bay and BuzzCatz Coffee and Sweets, Leck Labron of Big Fish Restaurant & Bar, Jonathan Kastner of Anchor Bar & Grill, Bryan Tillee of Live Bait, Eric Beech of Brick & Spoon, Brannon Holloway of Cactus Cantina, Michelle Deerman of Duck's Diner, Scott Bryant of S&S Seafood Market, Jesse Sonnier of Bon Temps Poboys and Specialty Meats, Sanford McLain of the Undertow and Shannon Robbins of Sandshaker at The Wharf.

"I thought it was nice and we powwowed before and we powwowed after," saide Harsany. "We've been working to possibly get the restaurant and hospitality and hotel crews back together that has failed several times. I think that this might just be as bad as this is something that can definitely bring us back and unify

Scott Coe of Island Time Daiguiris and Pizza lined up the restaurant group with proper social distancing in place and took a picture of the group in front of the Coastal Arts Center of Orange Beach. The group discussed the current situation and other issues going forward for the tourist-driven industry.

"We can acknowledge and agree that there are many common factors that we need to battle together," Harsany said. "If we get the state support and the national support then we can get a lot further with

our goals. It was definitely a great show of solidarity. We all know we're on the same boat even beyond this pandemic going on. We all have the same issues that we are battling. We can soundboard ideas off of one another and come up with solutions."

John McInnis III of the Flora-Bama Lounge and Package said the group already has an eye on a leader.

"We pretty much agreed to do that and we all volunteered Brian Harsany to be the president," McInnis said. "He circulated email chains and tried to get everybody together before so that's one of the reasons we volunteered him."

Harsanv may be a slightly reluctant choice.

"I don't know if the guy's name they are floating is very accepting of that," Harsany said with a laugh...

"I think that we shared different things we've learned about the SBA process and the current stimulus plan," McInnis said. "I think there were a lot of unanswered questions but we were able to share information about that and everybody picked something up on what to do or not to do."

"All in all, it did exactly what I wanted it to do. It showed unification and strength and professionalism in our industry that we have down here on the island. It went good," Coe said. "I just thought I'd do something to show the solidarity and resilence we have down here on the island. It's just something that I thought needed to be done with all of us out here struggling."






