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Orange Beach will host SEC Women's Soccer Championship Nov. 13-22

All 14 SEC teams will compete in the SEC Women's Soccer Championship beginning Nov. 13 at the Orange Beach Sportsplex. The final is scheduled on Sunday, Nov. 22 at 2 p.m.

Tickets will be available at the gate. Adult tickets are \$5 per game and children (K-12) will be admitted for \$2 per day.

South Carolina and Arkansas are favored to meet in a repeat of the 2019 title game won by South Carolina.

The Gamecocks shut out every opponent they faced in the 2019 SEC Tournament, defeating Georgia 1-0, Vanderbilt 2-0 and No. 6 Arkansas 1-0 on their way to the title. South Carolina also beat Arkansas 2-1 on Oct. 16. Both of those teams, along with Texas A & M, are ranked in the NCAA Top 10 and will receive at large bids to the

NCAA Tournament. Auburn, ranked 14th, and Georgia, ranked 15th, will also receive at large bids.

With the exception of 2004 (Hurricane Ivan), the SEC championship tourney has been held at the OB Sportsplex since 2003.

All tourney matches will be covered live coverage on the SEC Network.

"For over a decade the part-

nership with the SEC proves to other athletic decision makers how we work and how we provide first-class facilities and support services for championships of any type. We are proud to see the teams and fans arrive as the SEC calls it, 'the road to Orange Beach,''' City Administrator Ken Grimes said.

The tourney winner receives the SEC's automatic bid to the NCAA Division I Women's Soccer Championship.

The NCAA field of 64 teams includes 31 conference champions; the balance of the field is selected at-large by the NCAA Division I

SEC schools in the east division includes Vanderbilt, South Carolina, Tennessee, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky and Missouri. The SEC's west division includes Arkansas, Texas A&M, Alabama, Ole Miss, Auburn, Mississippi State and LSU.

Orange Beach-Gulf Shores Tourism is expected to announce a contract extension to host the tourney in Orange Beach through 2025.

The O.B. Sportsplex is located at 4389 William Silvers Pkwy., about 1 mile west of the Foley Beach Express on Canal Road.

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

Two Fort Morgan public boat ramps will remain closed 'til January

Two Baldwin County coastal public boat ramps on Fort Morgan that were damaged during hurricanes Sally and Zeta, will remain closed until January, according to a press release from the Alabama Department of Conservation and Natural Resources.

The basin at the Fort Morgan public boat launch has filled in with sand to the extent that the current shallow water depth restricts access to the ramp or to Mobile Bay, and poses a navigational hazard to boaters. Repairs to the Fort Morgan launch are expected to be completed by January 2021.

The Pines boat launch located on Mobile Bay near Mile 7 on Fort Morgan Road will be closed indefinitely due to erosion and drainage issues under the ramp approach lane that have caused holes to form in the asphalt surface.

Embassy Suites hotel developers ask for third extension FEMA to pay most of \$1 million in contracts to help with Sally recovery

Developers hoping to build an Embassy Suites hotel across from the Gulf of Mexico near the 'T' in Gulf Shores are asking for a delay for the third time.

The first delay of six months came in May of 2019, the second in September was just for just a month and the latest, codified by a city council ordinance will be for an additional start-date delay of six months.

"A month ago, an ordinance was presented on the Embassy Suites development agreement for that project with DD Partners," Economic Development Coordinator Blake Phelps told the council on Oct. 26.

"That ordinance at the time extended their project commencement deadline 30 days to give us a little bit more time to talk with them and understand where they are in the process. This ordinance is coming back to you with another recommendation."

Phelps said events during 2020 have hamstrung the project as developers struggle to get things lined up to start construction. Also, during the meeting, the council took action on some resolutions to help the city deal with the ongoing cleanup after Hurricane Sally.

"The short of it is between the pandemic, between hurricanes, elections all the things that are kind of up in the air right now and affecting the world," Phelps said.

"We believe it would be prudent and reasonable for the city to extend their project commencement deadline to April 30, 2021, to give them some time and hopefully the world some time to stabilize, markets to continue to recover and working with them to hopefully get this project moving forward and reevaluate on April 30. This let us see where we are with the financial markets, the pandemic and everything else."

In May of 2019, the first agreed-upon start date was July 1 but it was changed to Jan. 1 with an eye on opening on March 1 of 2022. On Dec. 2, 2019, the council voted again for a delay with the developers eyeing a July 2020 start date.

King Scovell, Managing Partner and Chief Development Officer of Woodbine, one of the partners said at the time it would take 22 months for the project to be completed. That would push the date for completion to February of 2023.

"That would be a final, final as far as I'm concerned and I think the council agrees," Mayor Robert Craft said. "By that time if we hear positively from them, we're good to go. And if not, we will negotiate a start date for the project at the point in time. But if we don't hear the proper words that probably will our last shot to get a project that we really believe will add a lot to our city."

Plans include a 7,800-square-foot ballroom and a total of 11,000 square feet of meeting space the city asked the developers to include adding another conference venue in the city.

Gulf Shores will give Embassy Suites a tax rebate of 42 percent during the first three years of operation and 35 percent every year following until \$6.5 million is reached. Or the basic cost of adding more than 11,000 square feet of meeting space including a 7,800square-foot ballroom to the project.

Current plans call for 229 rooms, a full-service spa, indoor pool and fitness center. Topping it all will be a 23,000square-foot rooftop with views of Gulf Place beachfront and It will include a bar open to the public and a pool for hotel guests.

During the regular session, the council ratified a pair of contracts worth nearly \$1 million, paid mostly by FEMA, to help the city's recovery from Hurricane Sally.

The city will pay Thompson Consulting Services \$400,000 to perform debris monitoring following a natural or manmade disaster and hired Hagerty Consulting to provide disaster recovery and emergency response grant services for \$450,000.

City staff recommended the enter both contracts before formal council action in the wake of all the debris generated by Hurricane Sally and the \$20 million in estimated damages by the storm in Gulf Shores.

"Due to the declared state of emergency, Mayor (Robert) Craft was able to immediately execute the contract and Thompson began debris monitoring," City Engineer Mark Acreman wrote in a memo to the council. "We are now asking the council to ratify this contract as per our purchasing manual guidelines."

The agenda item on the monitoring notes that Crowder Gulf is the pre-selected contractor for removal of debris for the city after natural or manmade disasters but the monitoring of removal would overwhelm city staff and resources. "In previous events, city staff have monitored debris removal operations," Acreman wrote. "However, we determined staff would not be able to perform debris monitoring as the sheer volume of debris present would deplete our city resources for months and impede our ability to expedite Sally recovery. It would greatly impact our ability to provide essential services to the rest of the citizens."

On Sept. 23 the city opened seven sealed bids for the monitoring services and Thompson more closely met the specifications laid out in the proposal.

"Proposals were received and scored by a four-person selection committee," city documents state. "Of the seven proposals, Thompson Consulting Services received the highest score based upon qualification, experience, resources, operational plans and unit pricing and was recommended as the debris monitor."

Funding for this contract will be from a combination of city, Alabama Emergency Management Agency and FEMA money. Typically, FEMA will reimburse 75 percent of eligible debris monitoring costs, while AEMA and the city will each reimburse 12.5 percent of the costs. Funding for the \$450,000 Hagerty contract will likely be fully funded by FEMA if the city follows certain guidelines.

"FEMA allocates 5 percent of the total value of the authorized project worksheets to fund administrative costs," Acreman wrote in a city memo. "This professional service qualifies as an eligible Administrative Costs and is therefore 100 percent reimbursable as long as we do not exceed our 5 percent allocation."

Five percent of the estimated damage of \$20 million would be \$1 million and the Hagerty contract is less than half that amount.

During the regular session, the council: • Passed a proposal to apply for an Alabama Department of Transportation Alabama Transportation Rehabilitation and Improvement Program II grant program application in the amount of \$2 million. It would be for traffic infrastructure improvements on State Route 59 from Cotton Creek Drive to County Road 8 including access management, a third southbound lane and intersection improvements. If awarded, the city's match for the grant would be for \$300,000.

• Set the Gulf Shores municipal court dates for 2021.

• Reappointed Council Steve Jones and Paula Teipel to four-year terms on the Library Board. Both members' terms expire on Nov. 1.

• OK'd a conditional use permit for a beach access for property at 931 W. Beach Blvd. for West Lagoon Cottages which will have 43 units. The access is located on the western edge of the Crystal Shores West Condominiums.

Discussed during Nov. 2 work session:

• The 2021 budget will have more than \$90 million in revenues with \$89 million going out in expenses, according to a report given to the council by Finance Director Cindy King.

• A request from Crozzzcabz seeking a taxi franchise to operate a 2013 Ford E350 Super Duty van on city streets.

• A bid from Sports Graphics to provide new backstop padding at the Gulf Shores City School women's varsity softball and men's varsity baseball fields for about \$13,000.

• A request from the fire department to buy five new CPR devices for about \$66,000 and nine cardiac monitors for about \$281,000. Reimbursement for both purchases is available through the CARES Act or the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act passed by Congress in March.

Some signature events postponed 'til 2021, but Frank Brown Songwriters Fest will still include 15 venues

Although many of its signature events have been postponed until 2021, the magic of musical prose will continue for the 36th consecutive year. The Frank Brown International Songwriters Festival, which normally runs for 10 days, will be held Nov. 11-15, with shows at 15 venues from Gulf Shores to Pensacola.

"We will still have great players coming in - people who have written some really well known songs. But we want to make sure we showcase our local musicians as well," said fest founder Joe Gilchrist. "In some ways we are retreating back into the past in that it's smaller and has a shorter duration."

Most FBISF concerts include at least three songwriters trading songs and telling the stories behind their lyrics in an intimate setting. And each FBISF venue will host a diverse lineup, with writers often sharing the stage, swapping songs, and turning some sets into spellbinding jam sessions.

The fest's two seminars, the Native American songwriters tribute, the youth showcase, the Autism awareness concert and the fest's memorial concert honoring writers who have passed have been postponed 'til 2021.

Gilchrist, the Flora-Bama co-owner, founded the FBISF in 1984 as a way to celebrate the end of the season with local artists, visiting Nashcats and other musical friends. The first official FBISF was held at The Saenger Theatre in Pensacola. Gilchrist said he lost \$10,000 on the venture. "After that, I figured if I was going to lose that kind of money, I might as well have it at my own place," he said. The festival thrived at the Flora-Bama with 11 nights of non-stop music - usually ending with Gilchrist buying a round for the diehards at 2 a.m.

In 1994, FBISF coordinator Brucie Glassell spearheaded an effort to share the musical wealth with venues throughout the community and into Pensacola. Her tireless passion for the event and its magical moments laid the groundwork for what it is today.

The festival is fluid by nature, meaning the schedule is subject to change. It is best to check FrankBrownSongwriters.com every day for updated information.

Gilchrist thinks it is the fans as much as the music that make FBISF a unique event.

"We are nice people who are respectful," he said. "Quite frequently, these writers are unappreciated even within the music business. We're glad to provide a listening environment where they can play, and it's not background music. It's living music that professes emotions and feelings that all of us have, but very few of us know how to express."

Last year's incredible lineup included the late Mac Davis and 2020 Grammy Award winner Tanya Tucker. Dean Dillon, who has written 50 songs performed by the legendary George Strait, and is a member of the Nashville Songwriters Hall of Fame, will will close out the fest on Nov. 15 at the Flora-Bama. Another writer revered by peers and fans, Billy Joe Shaver, was planning to play this year, but he recently passed away (see sidebar).

Jason Aldean and Thompson Square are among Nashville stars that played the festival before their careers took off.

Both Billboard and American Songwriters magazines have recognized FBISF as the granddaddy of songwriter festivals, and it's been called one of the Top 20 Events by the Southeast Tourism Society.

Most shows are free; a few venues charge a modest cover fee. The festival is named after the late Frank Brown, who was night watchman at the Flora-Bama for 28 years before retiring at age 91.

The late Billy Joe Shaver left his local fans with some wonderful memories

Dean Dillon and Billy Joe Shaver have both played the Frank Brown Songwriters Fest multiple times, and there was a good chance Shaver would have joined his fellow CMA Writers Hall of Famer, who plays at the Flora-Bama on Nov. 15, at this year's gathering.

Festival founder Joe Gilchrist is a good friend of both and was working out the logistics of getting Shaver here from Texas when the Texas troubadour passed away at age 81 on Oct. 28.

I saw Shaver (with his son Eddy playing incredible guitar licks next to him) and The Mavericks back-toback early in the day at my first City Stages. I could have left then and been satisfied. That was the same City Stages that the Nitty Gritty Dirt Band, the closing act, adlibbed the chorus of their finale: "There's a better world awaiting ... Down at the Flora-Bama." The band gave a shout out to what was then my neighborhood bar in front of 35,000 people. What a day.

I met Shaver, who Willie Nelson called the greatest living songwriter in 2010, briefly through our mutual friend Gilchrist after one of his shows at the 'Bama. I went to LuLu's for another set the next night and spoke with him again. He somehow remembered my name.

Turns out, my co-worker John Mullen and local musician Jason Justice have similar memories of Shaver.

After seeing the man Mullen said is one of his top five ever artists performing at LuLu's, Mullen went over to say hello.

"That's the night I said, 'Billy, we've met many times

over the years, but you meet lots of people. So you probably don't remember me.' He said, 'how could I forget an ugly son of a gun like you?' But he used a different word."

Mullen said that conversation gave new meaning to Shaver's lyric from the song Tramp On Your Street: "His body was worn but his spirit was free, and he sang every song looking right straight at me."

Justice, who has established a well deserved following during his 25 years of lugging amplifiers around Pleasure Island and Perdido Key, said Donna Slater, knowing he was a big fan, booked him to open for Shaver at the Flora-Bama.

"This turned out to be the most memorable night of my music career," Justice wrote on his facebook page. "I don't remember most of my set, but that doesn't matter. I just didn't want to disappoint. I've opened for big acts and normally you won't see them. Mr. Shaver sat through my whole set. Of course, he did, that's the kind of person he was. I actually felt like he cared about what we were doing."

Justice said Shaver invited him to play harmonica with him and his band and then asked him to finish the set, as he was feeling ill. No problem. Justice knew the Shaver songs by heart.

"Fast forward four years to a show in Luckenbach. Mr. Shaver is standing back stage," Justice wrote. "I walk up and he remembered me by name. Unbelievable."

Navy turboprop crashes in Magnolia Springs, killing both pilots

The U.S. Navy identified the two pilots killed in an Oct. 23 plane crash in Magnolia Springs as Lt. Rhiannon Ross, 30, of Wixom, Michigan, and U.S. Coast Guard Ensign Morgan Garrett, 24, of Weddington, North Carolina.

Lt. Ross was the instructor pilot and Ensign Garrett the student aviator in a U.S. Navy T-6B Texan II turboprop training aircraft that took off from Naval Air Station Whiting Field in Milton on a routine training flight before crashing on Mansion Street in Magnolia Springs. The crash occurred around 4:30 p.m.

The crash set a nearby house and several automobiles on fire, but there were no other casualties, according to local emergency personnel.

A facebook post from the office of the Chief of Naval Air Training stated: "It is with a heavy heart that we mourn two of our pilots who lost their lives during an aircraft crash in Alabama today. Our deepest sympathy goes to their family and friends at this difficult time. Rest in peace, Shipmates. We have the watch."

Ensign Garrett graduated from the U.S. Coast Guard Academy in 2019 and majored in marine and environmental sciences. She was a regimental activities officer at the academy and competed as a middle-distance runner in track and field]. And Lt. Ross served three years with Helicopter Sea Combat Squadron 26 out of Norfolk, before joining the Florida based Training Squadron Two in 2018, according to a report in The Navy Times.

The Navy issued a safety stand-down to give its aviation units time "to focus on how to further improve operational risk management and risk mitigation across the Naval Aviation enterprise."

Blue Angels will make final flyover in F-18 Hornets Nov. 4

The U.S. Navy Flight Demonstration Squadron, the Blue Angels, will conduct a final flight on the F/A-18 Legacy Hornets on Nov. 4 between 4-4:30 p.m. on a flight path that stretches from Navarre Beach in Florida to Fort Morgan. The final flight of the Legacy Hornets signifies the official transition of the Blue Angels to the F/A-18 E/F Super Hornet platform.

"We are incredibly honored to have the opportunity to salute those teams who have flown, maintained and supported this platform for over three decades of service," said Cmdr. Brian Kesselring, U.S. Navy Blue Angels commanding officer and flight leader. "We deeply appreciate the expertise and operational knowledge Blue Angels past and present have brought to the team and we look forward to enhancing our operations as we fully transition to flying the Super Hornet.

The 2020 show season marked the end of the service life of the aircraft the team has flown for 34 years. The 2021 show season will be the Blue Angels' first year flying the Super Hornet platform as well as the 75th anniversary of the team.

The Blue Angels are scheduled to begin their winter training syllabus over NAS Pensacola beginning Nov. 16. The team will return to its winter training facilities in El Centro, CA in January. Training will continue through April in preparation for the 2021 show season

The mission of the Blue Angels is to showcase the teamwork and professionalism of the United States Navy and Marine Corps by inspiring a culture of excellence and service to country through flight demonstrations and community outreach. Since 1946, the Blue Angels have performed for more than 500 million fans.

"Undoubtedly, 2020 presented the team with unprecedented challenges. That said, the unique nature of this year also allowed our team to deepen our interaction with past teams, in particular, those teams that transitioned to new aircraft during their tenure," said Kesselring. "This engagement has helped us lay the foundation for a safe and effective transition for our team's pilots, support, and maintenance personnel as well as postured us to take on the high operating tempo of the team's highly anticipated 2021 air show season and 75th anniversary."

The final flight will take-off and land at Naval Air Station (NAS) Pensacola lasting approximately 30 minutes.

The Blue Angels will be visible from many locations throughout the Pensacola area and along this route. The public is reminded to continue to follow health and safety guidelines from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention to help prevent the spread of COVID-19.

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-WHAT'S HAPPENING-

PIER & SHORE FISHING OUTLOOK By David "The Pierpounder" Thornton

Let's hope this new month brings a break in having to deal with back to back storms along with the summer like heat and humidity. Overall the Emerald Coast escaped the worst of hurricane Zeta, but the beaches still took a beating from strong onshore winds and huge waves. About the only 'good thing' about a hurricane is when NOAA flies aerial photography of the affected coastline. The latest images can be found online at storms.ngs.noaa.gov/storms.



Żeta's furious winds swept a lot of beach sand inland, covering beach roads and parking lots in Gulf Shores, Orange Beach and Perdido Key. This left a sand deficit along many of those beaches and most of the shallow sandbars, just rebuilding from Sally were wiped out again. But the remaining ones, close enough to cast to from

shore will become the primary feeding stations for pompano, whiting, redfish, drum and even permit through the upcoming weeks and months. These fish will congregate around the sandbars to feed during intermittent periods of moderately rough water. So now is a good time to scout these locations as they have changed dramatically overnight from the tumult wrought by Zeta.

Higher storm surge farther west from Gulf Shores along Fort Morgan's beaches may have actually helped protect the beach sandbars along that area. As the storm tides receded, these shalcreate oases for colonies of beach ghost shrimp to flourish. Fish come to feed near these banks to take advantage of the nearby food source when higher tides allow them access.

These beach bars will be more accessible for anglers to gather ghost shrimp during the upcoming low tides while the surf is still relatively calm. Many surf anglers will 'scout out' the best spots in the most accessible locations. But the most successful will often venture even farther down the beach to fish locations with less angling pressure. The more easily accessible spots will be the first to be 'fished out', especially on weekends. So, anglers able and willing to walk another quarter to half mile are often the ones catching more fish.

This fortnight features a waning moon which will be new on the 14th. The tide range will be strongest through the first week of the month with a NEAP tide period the 11th through the 12th. We are well into our Autumn tides which present the lowest water levels during mid day, and an incoming tide late in the day. Often this gives us two fishing windows to take advantage of.

Early to mid morning look for channels at least 4 to 8 feet deep between the beach and a nearby sandbar. Or fish the edges of the sand bar drop off on the beach side.

Late afternoon into evening, as the tide is begin-

ning to rise, find a point along the beach where there is enough water to encourage fish to feed there (again at least 4 to 8 feet deep).

That may be a good location to soak some baits for pompano and whiting. Also red or black drum may be picked up 'incidentally' by anglers targeting pompano or whiting along these beach sand structures.

Cooler, drier air moved in behind Zeta and quickly calmed the Gulf. Now the water temperature is beginning to drop toward more seasonal levels in the middle 70s. Most of the pelagic fish in the jack species have vacated our waters with the notable exceptions of pompano and permit. These will become more prevalent catches in the coming weeks as the water clears and cools and the bite 'cleans up'. Savvy anglers know this and venture forth with these target species in mind. Larger gulf kingfish (whiting) become more accessible this month as the water cools and competing species thin out.

While fresh dead or frozen shrimp is the most common bait for anglers bottom fishing from the beaches, there can be times when other baits will out perform.

Fishbites, especially in the bright colors can be a bait enhancement or even a viable replacement. Easy Flea is probably the Fishbite crowd favorite in this area. But shrimp, crab and clam flavor also produce well especially in orange or pink. Their newest product is the Bama Beach Bum endorsed Coquina Clam flavor available only online. One of the best things about these products (in the blue pack) is the mesh embedded in it that helps keep it on the hook until fully dissolved. These formulas have been the most successful innovations to surf fishing in the past 20 years.

Remember that flounder are closed the month of November in Alabama. Still the larger females often stage in the passes and just off the gulf beaches this time of year, and many are caught incidental to targeting other species. Slot-sized redfish, speckled trout and sheepshead are often targeted inshore this month. And once the water cools a bit more, those pesky pinfish and pigfish will be less of an issue for anglers seeking the gamier species with live shrimp, especially from the Perdido Pass seawall and jetty.

Meanwhile, some surf anglers target trophy sized bull redfish and black drum. These fish may weigh 20 pounds or more and live to be 40 or 50 years old. They don't make the best table fare and are frankly more valuable to the resource as long term breeders to provide anglers with many more palatable smaller versions. The point at Fort Morgan. But Perdido Pass, Little Lagoon Pass and practically any other location may produce a large redfish or drum now.

Gulf State Park Pier Update

Sadly, no real progress has been made to the pier since Sally took out a 175 foot section near the end. So far, the State Park has devoted most of their efforts and resources to clearing, repairing and reopening the trails, public access areas and other facilities with far less damage. But as a result, ALL of the Gulf State Park facilities and accesses have reopened except for the Campground, and the Pier which of course had the most damage. The Campground is expected to reopen by the middle of this month, and it is hoped the pier (the part still attached to land) may be reopened soon after.



Road closure expected during Nov. prescribed burn at GSP

A prescribed burn is planned at Gulf State Park as part of a forest management plan associated with longleaf pine restoration, fuel reduction and invasive species control. The planned burn will take place in the Eagle Loop section of the park near Lake Shelby during November 2020, weather permitting. Alabama Hwy. 135 (State Park Road) will be closed during the active burn periods.

This prescribed burn complies with a permit from the Alabama Forestry Commission. Every effort is being made to ensure safety and proper smoke management during this burn. Prescribed fire is an effective way to reduce wildfire risk, reduce fuel loads, enhance wildlife habitat and maintain a healthy forest ecosystem. Gulf Shores asks food truck patrons to participate in survey 12 month pilot program granting 10 permits ends in December

The City of Gulf Shores is asking citizens to participate in a brief survey to aid in analyzing if the food trucks should be allowed permanently in Gulf Shores. The info will be summarized and provided at public meetings, but individual responses will not be shared with the public. The survey must be completed by Nov. 9. In December of 2019, the City Council and its appointed planning commission came up with a 12-month pilot program for allowing food trucks to operate under certain regulations while limiting the number of pemits it would issue to 10.

The maximum number of permits was never reached, but the planning commission tabled the issue in June, after Ryan Shamburger, general manager of Big Beach Brewing, asked the commission to go ahead and vote on writing food trucks into the ordinance instead of waiting for the program to end next month. "I want to get this amendment passed while the summer is happening so we can feed the hungry people," Shamburger said at the meeting. "We have hungry people here visitors and locals and I think this is a good option to allow this to move forward."

Shamburger said that the Hangout has been operating a food truck for five years serving soft-serve ice cream and snow cones and the Alabama Gulf Coast Zoo currently operates three food trucks at its new location. He also noted that with the pandemic restriction of limiting restaurant seating to 50 percent capacity, the food trucks offer a different option and can ease the crowding at local eateries

Because of the Corona Virus and then Hurricane Sally, fundraising events for Mary's Shelter Gulf Coast had to be cancelled. But neither of those events deterred the Fly Boyz RC Club of Elberta from hosting their Fly In for the home for homeless, pregnant women who choose life for their unborn child. The event was held at Horak Field in Elberta and brought out radio control airplane enthusiasts of all ages from far and near. Visitors to the area enjoyed the antics brought on by those handling the controls.

Mary's Shelter has been located in Elberta since 2006. It is the only charitable organization that serves homeless pregnant women from five local counties, Mobile, Baldwin, Escambia in Alabama, Santa Rosa and Escambia in Florida. The women stay at the shelter before and after the birth of their babies and receive counseling and other services to help them on a positive path to the future.

At Mary's Shelter women can get away from families who disowned them, from abusive partners and those who just didn't want to take on the responsibilities a child would require. One call to Mary's Shelter and a mom-to-be and even her other children can find a safe home to make the hard decisions a pregnancy requires.

A program manager helps the residents set goals for their future and meets on a regular basis with each resident to review their progress. Some may desire adoption for their child and they are guided through the process.

A grant researcher/writer searches across the nation for sources of funds for the home because the home receives no regular local, state or national funding. The home has the ability to house 10 women and their children, newborns and toddlers. They live there 24/7 with expenses like any other home, utilities, food, cleaning supplies, paper products, sheets and blankets and, of course, diapers.



Enhancement project begins around Lake Shelby at Gulf State Park

Renovations to picnic area, dog park & playground will finish by summer

The Lake Shelby picnic area at Gulf State Park in Gulf Shores, Alabama, will close for renovations on Monday, November 2, 2020. The entire Lake Shelby area will be fenced and closed to the public for the duration of the renovation process. However, trail access near the lake will remain open throughout the project. The renovations are expected to be completed by summer 2021.

Enhancements to the Lake Shelby area will include a modern playground with three areas for different age groups, separate small and large dog parks with covered seating and water fountains, new bathrooms, an improved parking area, a new tram stop, and a bikeshare station for public use within the park.

During the improvements at Lake Shelby, four additional projects will begin in other areas of the park. Additional parking will be constructed north of the fishing pier parking lot. A parking area and tram stop will be constructed across from the middle beach walkover where South Campground Road intersects East Beach Boulevard. Additional amenities will be added at the Beach Pavilion to accommodate volunteers, staff, weddings and other events. Lastly, traffic signs will be updated throughout the 6,150acre park.

"This project has been in the works for several months. Thankfully, we were able to remain on schedule as we also continue the extensive cleanup and repairs associated with Hurricane Sally," said Chris Blankenship, Commissioner of the Alabama Department of Conservation and Natural Resources.

"In recent years this park has become a model for how to blend environmental sustainability with public access to our beautiful coastal landscape. We are looking forward to sharing these new enhancements with the public in the coming months."

Alabama issues \$1.2 billion in bonds to pay for capital improvements at schools across the state

Plan includes \$33.3 million for Baldwin County School System, \$2.3 million for Gulf Shores City Schools

Baldwin County legislators joined with other state officials in celebrating a bond issuance that could mean \$33.3 million for

The Baldwin County School System and \$2.3 million for Gulf Shores City Schools. The Alabama Public School and College Authority announced the approval of a \$1.25 billion bond issuance for public school capital improvements across the state. It is the largest amount of state-issued bond money ever. "This is great news

for growing school systems like ours here in Baldwin County," Rep. Steve McMillan (R – Foley) said. "That kind of funding is essential in keeping up with the growth we continue to see across our county in both school systems and is a big help.'

All seven of the Baldwin County Legislative Delegation members voted in favor of legislation, citing the county's incredible growth, its ability to target future growth areas and to ensure small class sizes. School systems and other educational entities awarded money from the bond are allowed to use the money for repairs and construction projects for their campuses.

Gov. Kay Ivey heralded the bond issue as a big win for Alabama's schools and students.

"The APSCA issued \$1.48 billion in bonds to provide funds for capital improvement projects for Alabama's K-12 schools, community colleges, and institutions of higher education and to refund and retire outstanding obligations of the Authority," Gov. Ivey said.

"The Authority realized \$27 million in aggregate debt service savings by refunding and retiring outstanding obligations. Even amidst a roller coaster year and COVID-19 derailing the Legislative Session, we remain ever committed to the students and teachers across our state through this record investment."


Al. Gulf Coast Zoo Foundation receives \$90K Impact 100 Grant

- 1-1/2 tsp. nutmeg
- 1 tsp. cinnamon
- 3/4 tsp. ground ginger
- 1-1/2 tsp. vanilla extract
- 2 (15-oz.) cans pure pumpkin
- 1 cup unsalted butter, melted
- 1 box yellow cake mix
- Whipped cream for garnish (opt.)
- Freshly grated nutmeg for garnish (opt.)

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease a metal 9-x-13 in. baking dish with cooking spray.

In a large mixing bowl, whisk together half-and-half, sugar, eggs, nutmeg, cinnamon, ginger, and vanilla until well combined. Add pumpkin and whisk to combine, Once fully incorporated, whisk in 1/4 cup of the melted butter. Evenly spread mixture in prepared baking dish. Sprinkle cake mix evenly over pumpkin mixture. Drizzle remaining 3/4 cup melted butter on top of cake mix, and use a spoon to gently spread the butter around, encouraging the butter to soak into the cake mix. Bake until top is browned and fully cooked through, about 1 hour. Allow to cool to room temperature for filling to set completely. Serve with whipped cream and more nutmeg, if desired. Serve warm or chilled. Enjoy!

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

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

• **Hamilton Area:** The Buttahatchee River near Hamilton is so pretty this time of year!




