Foley man wins \$1 million from Florida scratch-off lottery game

The Florida Lottery announced on May 11 that Calvin Holmes, 47, of Foley, claimed a \$1 million top prize from the 50X THE CASH Scratch-Off game Holmes chose to receive his winnings as a one-time, lump-sum payment of \$890,000.00.

Holmes purchased his winning ticket from Discount Tobacco Shop, located at 13120 Lillian Highway in Pensacola. The retailer will receive a \$2,000 bonus commission for selling the winning Scratch-Off ticket. The \$5 game, 50X THE CASH, launched in September 2020 and features more than \$131 million in cash prizes, including ten top prizes of \$1 million! The game's overall odds of winning are 1-in-3.97.

1,300 athletes in Gulf Shores for May 26-28 for NAIA National Outdoor Track Championship

The National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) will be back at the Gulf Shores Sportsplex for its 2021 Men's & Women's Outdoor Track & Field National Championship May 26-28.

Approximately 1,300 student-athletes competing in multiple events. The championship will be open to the public with health and safety protocols in place, but tickets can be purchased online only and will not be available at the gate. Three-day tournament passes are \$25 and daily passes are \$10. Masks are required, and social distancing is encouraged.

The meet starts with the first event of the men's decathlon (100-meters, Long Jump, Shot Put, High Jump, 400-meters) at 10 a.m. and the women's heptathlon (100-meter Hurdles, High Jump, Shot Put, 200-meters) at 10:30 a.m. on May 26 and ends with the women's and men's 4x400-meter relay finals beginning at 6:15 p.m on May 28. The awards ceremony will follow at 6:50 p.m.

Gulf Shores, in cooperation with Gulf Shores -Orange Beach Sports Commission, has hosted the championships since 2014. Michelle Russ, the Commission's vice president of sales, said the a contract is already in place to hold the 2022 meet at Blackwell Stadium.

The Gulf Shores area saw an economic impact of over \$3 million in 2018. The 2020 meet was a Covid casualty.

"They have been an excellent host and they continue to set the bar higher every year," said NAIA President Jim Carr.

"We are thrilled to be back in Gulf Shores for the championship to provide these student-athletes the ability to compete in a safe and healthy environment," said Courtney Fegter, championship sport manager for the NAIA. "With the necessary protocols in place, we look forward to feeling a bit of normalcy and getting back to competition this year with spectators in the stands."

Nesting season on the Alabama coast is officially underway

Nesting season on the Alabama coast, under the auspices of Share the Beach volunteers, is officially underway.

Female sea turtles are making their way from hundreds of miles away to lay eggs, which will hatch from May through October on Gulf Coast beaches.

"Our volunteers are out every morning doing their part to find, document and protect new sea turtle nests," said Sara Johnson, Share the Beach Director. "Share these tips (see sidebar) with your fellow beachgoers so everyone can enjoy the experience, and most importantly, our sea turtles can continue to nest undisturbed."

Pictured: With help from super shoveler Ellen Murphy and water boy Stephen Hawkins, Sand Castle University (sandcastleu.com) owner Janel Hawkins created a sand sculpture just east of the blue mats at Gulf Shores Public Beach to help announce the start of the turtle nesting season on Pleasure Island.

The turtle, named Big Mama, took most of the day to build and less than a minute to be trampled by young volunteers.

"We gave her back to the Gulf," Hawkins said. "Smashing our sculptures is necessary in order to prevent hazards for mama nesting or baby hatching turtles. While it may be hard to do, it is for a great cause."

Hawkins' custom sand sculptures have previously been featured on ESPN during the NCAA Beach Volleyball Championships.

"We drew quite a crowd and had so much fun sharing the Leave Only Foot Prints message," Murphy said. "It was a little sad to see her go, but it was kinda fun to see the kids having a blast smashing the sculpture at the end of the day so we could leave the beach just as we found it."

Sand Castle University presented information about how locals and tourists visiting the beach can ensure that it is a successful turtle nesting season.

"Something as simple as a red film, which is free at the Gulf Shores Welcome Center, for your flashlight, filling any holes you dig on the beach for fun and even smashing your beach sand castle before you leave can help keep nesting turtles safe," said Murphy, a former Share The Beach volunteer.

"Can't wait until our first real turtle mama makes her appearance," added Johnson.

Keep these tips in mind if you spot a sea turtle:

• **Stay back** (at least 30 feet away), stay low, and stay quiet. Sea turtles only emerge from the water to nest, so give them space to do their mama stuff!

• No white flashlights and no flash photography. Bright lights are extremely disorienting to sea turtles and should be avoided on nesting beaches. If you must have a light, use a dim red LED flashlight, like ours from Maglite. And remember never to shine a light, even a red light, directly at a sea turtle.

Skate park improvements put on hold FDOT approves light at Fort Morgan Rd. and West Second St.

Improvements to the skate park at Sims Park was put on hold at the May 10 meeting of the Gulf Shores City Council. Bids were much higher than what was planned for in the

"For a temporary solution we would go ahead and install the sidewalk to connect from kids' park behind the rear of the skate park building." 2021 budget and the work will likely be considered later. Three contractors' offers were way off from what was budgeted to complete the work.

"It was interesting to see how far out of budget it was," Craft said. "One of them was almost three times and there was nothing less than double."

Bids ranged from \$180,000 to \$123,000 when the city was hoping to spend about \$60,000 to make a restroom at the skate park accessible from the outside of the building.

"What we had proposed to do was to modify the existing skate park building and convert one of the interior restrooms into an exterior public restroom and install a sidewalk so you could come from the kids' park and use the restroom there instead of having to walk to the concession stand restroom," Construction Manager Clint Colvin told the council. "We opened bids on April 13 and unfortunately all three bids we received were significantly over budget."

Colvin recommended the council reject all the bids and look to include the project at a later date.

"We will reevaluate the situation and possibly include in a future project and future budget year," Colvin said. "For a temporary solution we would go ahead and install the sidewalk to connect from kids' park behind the rear of the skate park building to at least make it easier to get to the existing restroom."

City Administrator Steve Griffin told Council that the Alabama Department of Transportation has backtracked its initiall opposition and now approves of a traffic signal at Fort Morgan Road and West Second Street. When the city first improved the intersection of Fort Morgan Rd. and Hwy. 59 for a signal one block west at Second St., part of that work was to include a traffic signal, but that was not warranted by ALDOT, according to Griffin.

A consulting firm hired to help with the work and City Engineer Mark Acreman, Griffin said, persisted in pursuit of having the light approved.

"To Mark Acreman's credit, Darryl Skipper with Skipper Consultants, they kept pressing and last week we got notice that traffic signal is warranted so we're in the permitting stages," Griffin said. "In the next several months I anticipate having that light erected. It makes for a much safer and better situation. That light should be up by the end of the year."



\$251K allocated for Bodenhamer Center lobby renovation

During the May 17 council work session, Gulf Shores City Council heard a recommendation to award the Bodenhamer Center lobby renovations contract to Green-Simmons for \$251,000.

Renovations include the following: Demolition and removal of existing reception desk and retail center; Interior wall construction around new cardio equipment area; Removal of existing ceramic tile and vinyl tile flooring in the lobby and replace with new laminated vinyl flooring; New doors and storefront systems; Modified HVAC ducting for new layout.

also, modified/new electrical receptacles, data lines, coax cabling, and saw-cutting the existing slab as required for the new cardio and fitness areas to provide power and data to equipment; New light fixtures; Painting all walls; Installation of new reception desk by the main entrance; Construction of new retail location for city store merchandise; Construction of new coffee bar with cabinetry and casework.

More grants for airport

Gulf Shores City Council discussed two FAA grants for the Airport Authority during its May 17 work session.

The FAA is providing Jack Edwards National Airport with funding of \$166,677 to for the purpose of performing pavement maintenance by crack sealing various locations on the airport.

The second one authorizing the mayor and city clerk to apply for and accept a \$23,000 FAA grant for the Airport Coronavirus Response Grant Program. The ACRGP is providing the airport with funding to reimburse various operational expenses as a result of the COVID 19 pandemic. To speed up the process on both grants, the FAA has requested that the city and airport authority gain pre-approval for execution of the grant.

\$30K for prescribed burns

During the May 17 work session, Council approved a \$30,000 contract with Volkert to develop a scope of work for bid purposes to install firebreaks and conduct prescribed burns on two city wilderness areas in Bon Secour and another on Oyster Bay. Council also:

• Approved the reassigning the franchise for Harbor Communications to C Spire which bought all interest of Harbor Communications on Dec. 11.

• Approved a list of items for the spring surplus sale on govdeals.com from May 24 through June 7. Among the items are an SUV, two pickup trucks and a waverunner.

110 unit Phoenix Gulf Shores II includes 24-foot public beach access

During May 3 regular session, Gulf Shores City Council:

• OK'd a request by the developers of Phoenix Gulf Shores II to change the setbacks on the new project planning for East Beach Boulevard across the street from the Comfort Inn. It will be a 24-story, 110-unit building and will provide a 24foot public beach access and the construction six-foot wide dune walk over boardwalk. Developers want to reduce west side yard setback from 35 feet to 24 feet. • Heard a request to give a wetland waiver on 5.65 acres on the north shore of Little Lagoon by with the purpose of subdividing the land into 15 lots called North Lagoon Estates. The planning commission OK'd the subdivision on the condition developers received a wetland waiver. Only the city council can issue wetland waivers and will have to be read twice before it can come to a vote before the council.

• Voted for an amendment to the zoning ordinance's tree protection section to better protect and preserve the trees, Director of Planning and Community Development Lee Jones told the council. The amendment would add an element of landscape maturity to new developments thereby enhancing buffering and privacy. The proposal removes the exemption from the regulations for singlefamily and duplex lots less than one acre in size; adds standards for tree removal permit review; and creates a definition and protection standards for "Heritage

Trees."

• OK'd assembly permits for the Phin Man Youth Triathlon on May 29 and the Bike MS Tour De Beach cycling event Sept. 18-19.

• OKd a bid for apparel for the city store from Express Press Printing, as it was the lowest offer of five conforming bids. Express currently holds the contract for supplying apparel to the store.

• OK'd liquor licenses for Beachin' Eats at the Gulf State Park Pavilion and Comfort Inn's Beachside Bar on East Beach Boulevard.

Orange Beach Billfish Classic open weigh-ins May 21 & 22

Fishing commences May 20 at noon, and public weigh-ins will be held under the marlin at The Wharf Friday and Saturday during The 25th Annual Orange Beach Billfish Classic.

Weigh-ins are May 21 from 7-8 a.m. and 7-10 p.m., and May 22 from 6-10 p.m. for the tourney that has donated more than \$730,000 to The Billfish Foundation since its inception in 1996.

The OBBC includes tuna, wahoo and dolphin (mahi) in its optional cash categories but is primarily a blue marlin tournament and traditionally attracts competitive fishing teams from across the Gulf of Mexico. Prize money, not including optional cash categories, pays out to landed blue marlin and catch and release billfish.

This family run tournament emphasizes team participation and is the only tournament on the Gulf Coast owned and operated by tournament fishermen. Baldwin now state's 4th largest county

Baldwin County has replaced Montgomery County as the fourth largest in Alabama, according to Census Bureau estimates. While Montgomery County lost 5,000 residents, Baldwin County, the state's fastest growing county, added 47,000 people, a 26 percent increase in the past decade.

The Census Bureau estimates Baldwin's population at 229,000 residents.

Madison County, which includes Huntsville, added nearly 7,000 people between 2019 and 2020, according to Census estimates. Madison and Baldwin Counties accounted for more than 90 percent of the state's growth, adding a total of 12,600 people, while the state as a whole grew by just 13,600 people.

Baldwin County has been the fastest growing county in the state for much of the past decade. It added a staggering 47,000 people and grew by 26 percent since 2010.

According to the Census estimates data, the state's most populous county, Jefferson, lost more people between 2019 and 2020 than it did in the entire decade before that, losing 3,200 people in 2019.

Perdido Key beach access gets state permit

The Florida Department of Environmental Protection has issued a final permit that will allow a much needed additional public beach access to the beach on Perdido Key.

The new access point at 16495 Perdido Key Dr. (next to The Crab Trap) will include 35 parking spots and give the public access to 300 feet of beachfront. Perdido Key Access No. 4, will be the largest county-owned public access area on Perdido Key. It is expected to be open by next spring.

Escambia County bought the property in 2013, and set aside \$228,000 to build the access point. But Commissioner Jeff Bergosh noted on his blog that the project could need an additional \$50,000 to \$70,000 in funding.

The Seafarer Condos Owners Association sued the county in 2018 to stop the development of the access site on grounds that it violated the county's land development code, according to the Pensacola News Journal.

Bergosh relentlessly pushed for the parcel to be used for public access over the objections of fellow commissioner Doug Underhill, who represents Perdido Key.

"When it opens, it is going to allow my constituents who live in District 1 access to a publicly owned beach on the west side of Pensacola at Perdido Key," said Bergosh on his blog. "It's going to allow people who don't have a boat or have a condo or have the ability to access waterfront to go to an Escambia County-owned piece of property and go fishing, go hang out. I just think that's the greatest thing."

Gov. Ivey names DISL Estuarium the official Aquarium of Alabama Orange Beach resident Joe Busta suggests name change to better reflect facility's scope

Alabama Governor Kay Ivey, at the urging of an Orange Beach resident, has signed legislation naming the (DISL) Dauphin Island Sea Lab's estuarium the Aquarium of Alabama and designating it as the official aquarium of Alabama. The aquarium was created to improve ocean literacy and enhance public understanding and stewardship of our coastal resources, and how the health of the coastal ecosystem affects the entire state's ecosystem.

The official designtion came at the suggestion of Ono Island's Dr. Joe Busta, who serves as a consultant to the Dauphin Island Sea Lab and its foundation for strategic planning, fundraising and marketing.

Busta also has a passion for aquaria. After a trip to Maine and a visit to the Maine Aquarium he realized the Dauphin Island Sea Lab's Estuarium was not a name well understood by the general public and did not adequately convey the breadth and scope of this fine facility.

He then recommended to the Sea Lab's leadership they consider renaming and rebranding the Estuarium. The leadership agreed and worked

with their Alabama State Representative Chip Brown to created and pass legislation to designate the facility as the official Aquarium of Alabama. A full rollout of the new designation and branding plan will occur later this year. Upgrades to exhibits and new exhibits are also in the planning stages for this year.

The Aquarium (Estuarium) is open daily and can be visited by Gulf Shores and Orange Beach residents and visitors by way of the ferry that runs multiple times a day round trip from Ft Morgan.

Since 1998, more than one million students and visitors have visited the aquarium. The visual and interactive exhibits take visitors on a journey through the Mobile Tensaw-Delta and Mobile Bay, along the barrier islands, and into the Gulf of Mexico.

The aquarium is open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. from March 1 to September 1, and 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. from Sept. 2 to Feb. 28. More info: disl.edu or 251-861-2141.

PIER & SHORE FISHING OUTLOOK By David "The Pierpounder" Thornton

The coastal angling version of making lemonade occurs whenever the weather isn't kind, or our primary target species is not available, or the beaches crowd out with swimmers as summer nears. T

his fortnight begins on all of those notes as the wind pattern has conspired to assure a rough period for at least the rest of the week. Springtime spawning patterns run their course with various fish species like pompano, which are rapidly thinning in numbers throughout the surf zone as we approach the full moon on May 26.

Of course, some pompano will still be available to interested anglers, and some limits are still being caught on set rigs. But savvy anglers should be prepared to alter their tactics, and even their focus if conditions are not in their favor.

Plus, the distraction of competing fish species (like ladyfish) rapidly filling into the near shore waters make targeting pompano all the more difficult in late May. The water temperatures have been languishing in the middle 70s, but are due to jump into the upper 70s to near 80 by month's end. This year, perhaps because of the frequency of late season cold fronts, the air and water temperature have lagged behind historic norms.

Best times to fish on the beach this time of year are before 9 a.m., and after 4 p.m. when there are far fewer folks in the water, and on the beach. If you want to fish all day, try a full-time fishing venue like the Gulf State Park Pier, Perdido Pass seawall, or Little Lagoon Pass. Better yet, walk a little farther to a more secluded spot to avoid the throngs of swimmers also invading the surf zone.

There are chunks of undeveloped shoreline even in Orange Beach and Gulf Shores. And the National Wildlife Refuge along the Fort Morgan peninsula offers miles of open beaches to fish. What we don't want (or need) is confrontations with swimmers or land owners about fishermen just trying to fish. Let's be smart!

Angling options still abound though, for those willing to "make lemonade" and adjust to the conditions and concentrate on whatever species are available.

Ladyfish (also called "skipjacks") are a fine example. They are good gamefish on light tackle, and can provide almost unending hours of fun for fishermen of all ages in the coming months, even in rough or dingy water. Newbie anglers especially, are rarely disappointed by their sporty leaps and sheer numbers. They are available now in droves from the pier, but also from the seawall at Alabama Point, and even from the gulf beaches at times. Likewise, blue runner (called "hardtails") are readily available, pull hard, and strike a variety of small baits or lures intended for other species. They too are plentiful at the pier, Lagoon Pass and west jetty.

Both of these species also make surprisingly good eating, and "bleeding" any fish only makes it better for the table. The meat of the blue runner is firm and flavorful, not unlike their much larger cousins the amberjack. They are quite tasty when pan-sauteed in olive oil with just a dash of salt & pepper, or Cavender's Greek Seasonings.

Ladyfish are a little more challenging because of the numerous "Y" bones in their fillets. But the flesh is very mild and light colored when cooked. The meat can be easily scraped from the fillet (leaving the bones and skin) with a fork or spoon. Then it can be steamed, boiled or baked with a little seasoning for fish salad, or formed into fish cakes. A fast, simple recipe shared by some friends on the pier is to season the meat in a bowl, add a little butter, and microwave it for a couple of minutes. Don't knock it if you haven't tried it!

Black drum fishing from the banks along the Gulf Intracoastal Waterway has gained much popularity this year. These brood fish usually weigh twenty pounds or more, and are tough fighters noted for their stamina because of the broad tail. A few "bull" redfish are caught by these anglers as well.

Canal fishing is a great alternative to fighting crashing waves and scores of folks vying for the same strip of sand on the beach. Drum may live to be 15 to 40 years old, and the larger specimens are coarse fleshed, and often riddled with spaghetti worms. A parasite that often infests members of the drum species like speckled trout. Though they are unsightly, they are harmless to humans and disappear when cooked. Mmm, yummy ;-). Big drum are good candidates for catch, photo, and release.

More conventional target species like spanish mackerel have been making recent showings at the pier, and even within reach of some beaches near Fort Morgan when the water has been fairly calm and clear. Some very fat mackerel near three pounds have been landed from the pier by anglers drifting live shrimp when lures weren't working nearly as well. Marauding sharks are almost always an issue to be dealt with on the pier. But that just adds to the thrill of the catch sometimes.

Some pompano are still being caught, along with occasional flounder. Though many of both have been just undersized. Seems that is often the plague to anglers these days. Another good alternative species to target is spadefish. These unregulated, tasty panfish have a really small mouth, so using hooks of smaller size (#6 or even #8) will increase the catch rate. They will bite small pieces of cut shrimp, although small strips of squid or Fishbites will stay on the hook much longer.

So far this spring speckled trout fishing has not seemed quite as strong as in recent years. Perhaps the cooler water or rougher conditions have contributed to that. But the large numbers of sharks prowling the surf zone this spring hasn't helped the trout fishing either. This should be prime time to surf cast for speckled trout, especially nearer to Fort Morgan. Once the wind and seas calm down, we should see a rapid warm up in air and water temperatures. And that would be better conditions for topwater plugging for trout in the early mornings. But don't forget the suspending and slow sinking plugs and spoons, because you never know what conditions you may have to adjust to, or what may bite. Good luck!

Florida's recreational red snapper season is June 4-July 28

Florida's Gulf red snapper recreational season is set to open June 4 and run through July 28, with a possible fall reopening if quota is available.

Beach.

"This will be the longest summer season anglers will have since the FWC started setting seasons for fishing in the Gulf state and federal waters off Florida," Gov. Ron DeSantis said in a news release.

The season is open to those fishing for red snapper from private recreational vessels in Gulf state and federal waters and those fishing from charter vessels that do not have a federal reef fish permit and are limited to fishing in state waters only.

"Anglers across the state look forward to red snapper season each year," Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission Chairman Rodney Barreto said. "Our agency looks forward to providing 55 days of red snapper opportunities in Gulf state and federal waters."

Those fishing for red snapper in state or federal waters from a private recreational vessel, even if you are exempt from fishing license requirements, must sign up as a State Reef Fish Angler at GoOutdoorsFlorida.com. For more on recreational snapper regulations, visit MyFWC.com.

Alabama open for red snapper fishing weekends beginning May 28

Alabama state waters and federal waters will open to private vessel anglers for red snapper fishing on Friday, May 28. The season will consist of four-day weekends, Friday through Monday, beginning Friday, May 28, and continue until the private angler quota is projected to be met.

These dates only apply to anglers fishing from recreational vessels and state-licensed Alabama commercial party boats that do not hold federal for-hire fishing permits. Anglers fishing from federally permitted for-hire vessels have their own 63-day season beginning June 1 at 12:01 a.m. local time through August 3 at 12:01 a.m. local time.

As in recent years, Alabama will use Snapper Check to monitor landings during the season and will provide semi-weekly updates at www.outdooralabama.com. The exact Alabama private angler quota has not yet been provided by the National Marine Fisheries service but is anticipated to be similar to the 2020 quota which was 1,122,662 pounds. When the quota is anticipated to be met, MRD will announce a closure date.

Weekends are defined as 12:01 a.m. Friday through 11:59 p.m. Monday. The daily bag limit will be two red snapper per person, per day with a minimum size limit of 16 inches total length. Anglers over the age of 16 must have an Alabama saltwater fishing license, and even Alabama residents 65 or older and lifetime saltwater license holder must have a current saltwater angler registration. The saltwater angler registration is free and available at outdooralabama.com.



Ballyhoo Fest will return to shores of Lake Shelby March 5-6, 2022

It will take more than a worldwide pandemic to stop the Ballyhoo Fine Arts Festival from holding its event in 2022. The fest will be held for the second time on the shores of Lake Shelby at Gulf State Park in Gulf Shores March 5-6, 2022.

Although it is a showcase for fine art from all over the Southeast, the fest is at its core a cultural exchange with the Poarch Band of Creek Indians, and that will continue with two tribal dance performances from the tribe on Saturday. Learn about Poarch heritage as tribal members perform original tribal dance in ceremonial regalia. Each dance has a specific meaning and the audience will be invited to join the tribe for their last tribal dance at both of their performances. The Poarch Creek Indians are descendants of a segment of the original Creek Nation, which once covered almost all of Alabama and Georgia. Unlike many southeastern tribes, the Poarch Creeks were not removed from their tribal lands, and have lived together for over 150 years at Poarch, Alabama. They are the only nationally recognized tribe in Alabama.

The fest will again include Sunday banjo and fiddle competitions sponsored by Flora-Bama Lounge & Package and the Frank Brown International Songwriters Festival. Both competitions include separate youth (under 18) and adult divisions, and a total of \$1500 in cash for the top three players on both instruments. The competitions are open to all, and entry forms are available online at ballyhoofestival.org.

"We already have a great cultural exchange event either the Poarch Band of Creek Indians on the first day of the festival," said event founder Eloise Thomley. "Early Americana music is becoming a lost art form, and we would like to present its history through description and the music itself."

As always, Ballyhoo will include a plethora of children's activities, train rides, a children's art tent and animals form the Alabama Gulf Coast Zoo. Food and beverages will be available. More info: ballyhoofestival.org.

Southern Cal claims NCAA beach championship in G.S.

Southern Cal won the 2021 beach volleyball championship, for the third time in the five year history of the sport, stunning two time champ and top seed UCLA 3-1 in the final played at Gulf Shores Public Beach on May 9. USC did not give up more than one dual point in any match on their way to the title.

Although the NCAA will allowed only 700 spectators per day for the three-day championship, all matches were either televised live or streamed by ESPN networks. Gulf Shores will also host the tourney in 2023 and 2024, before the event moves to Huntingdon Beach for 2025 and 2026. Gulf Shores will try to negotiate a contract to permanently host the event beginning in 2027, giving it a signature spring family weekend, as opposed to the raucous Hangout fest. A national qualifying junior beach volleyball tourney drew 480 teams to Gulf Shores Public Beach the same weekend.

Gulf Shores Public Beach has been the tourney site for nine years, including four AVCA Championships before the sport earned its NCAA sanction.



WHAT'S HAPPENING

86 year old Ray Jones bags his 400th turkey

Ray Jones of Huntsville did not bag his first turkey until he was 26. But the 86 year old from Huntsville reached and surpassed a milestone this season by bagging turkeys no. 400 and 401.

"We really didn't have any turkeys north of Birmingham when I was a young boy," Jones said. "They had all been killed during the Depression. We hunted squirrels. We didn't even have any deer."

During the middle of the 20th century, the Alabama Game and Fish Division (now Wildlife and Freshwater Fisheries) started an extensive restocking effort of white-tailed deer and Eastern wild turkeys across the state. Jones recalled being contacted by Game and Fish in the late 1950s. "They called and asked if we didn't mind if they turned loose deer and

turkey on our Jackson County place," Jones said. "They said the only thing is you can't hunt it for five years. I told them that would be all right. The only thing was the turkeys walked up into Tennessee, so we didn't have any for a while. The deer did well, and the turkeys finally backfilled into Alabama."

Jones, who graduated from Auburn with a degree in agriculture, didn't go on his first turkey hunt until he was 26,

and it wasn't on his farm. It was in the storied Alabama Black Belt. "I sold some cattle to a man in Boligee," he said. "Part of the deal was I was to come go turkey hunting with him in the spring. We stayed at his ranch, some bottomland called Shady Grove. It was teeming with wildlife, every kind of wildlife you could imagine.

To say Jones was instantly hooked would be a monumental understatement. In the following 60 years, turkey hunting has been his passion. His 400th turkey was a Rio Grande taken near Haskell, Texas. Recently. Number 401 was a nice gobbler he bagged just across the line in Tennessee.

Jones has hunted all over the United States, and even ventured into Mexico. He has bagged five of the six species of wild turkey – Eastern, Osceola, Rio Grande and Merriam and Gould's, earning him the NWTF's Royal Slam designation.

The only wild turkey he hasn't bagged is the ocellated, and he doesn't plan to hunt the bird, which is located in Mexico's Yucatan Peninsula.

"I did not go ocellated hunting," he said. "The old boy we were supposed to go with told me he went. He said we had to shoot them out of a tree. I said I sure don't want to do that, so I never did go. And they don't gobble. There's not much to turkey hunting if they don't gobble."

Before turkeys became abundant in north Alabama, Jones hunted a great deal in Marengo and Wilcox counties in the Black Belt.

"We really enjoyed our hunting in Marengo and Wilcox," he said. "That's where we learned how to hunt turkeys. We really didn't have turkeys up here until a few years ago. But they had the turkeys down there."

Late legendary turkey hunter and Game and Fish wildlife biologist Paul Maddox, who was heavily involved in the turkey trapping and restocking efforts in Alabama, was a good friend of the Jones family and joined them to hunt the Wilcox property.

"Paul was the best turkey hunter I've ever been around," Jones said. "He taught us a lot. Mr. Claude Kelley (late Conservation Commissioner) hunted with us. too.

"What made the place in Wilcox special was the people as much as anything. As we said later on, you really can't reproduce that. We really enjoyed our time there. We hunted there 17 years and killed a lot of turkeys, but the main thing was the people."

In the last decade, Jones has focused on Eastern turkeys in north Alabama. "Now we have turkeys," he said. "We've got as many as anywhere." Jones penned a book, Southern Turkey Hunting, a Family Affair, about his life in the turkey woods. "There are some stories about some of the turkeys I killed," he said. he also writes of the history of turkey conservation. in this country. "It's a real success story as far as conservation is concerned," he said.

Jones has no plans to slow down.

"It's a real addiction," he said. "No doubt about it. Somebody asked me

if I've really killed 400 turkeys. I said around 400. They said, 'What does that represent?' It represents a lot of lost sleep.

"It's just a way of life with us. Still today, we plant for them. We put in warm-season grasses and other things that will help the turkeys expand. We are now able to kill our limit in north Alabama. We weren't able to do that 20 years ago."

Jones bagged a turkey in Marshall County earlier this spring on his way to 400.

"He was off in a swamp," Jones said. "I hunted him twice. The last time I hunted him, the hens flew over and landed right in front of me, about 10-12 steps. They walked off and I kept yelping. I knew he knew where they flew to. It wasn't long until he flew over to the same spot. He was a nice turkey. He had 1%-inch spurs."

It was only a couple of days later that Jones added to his total just

across the line in Tennessee.

"I climbed up a mountain "I called in my son's first and he wasn't there," he said. "But I could hear just a whisper."

Jones relocated and climbed another mountain to get into position.

"I climbed and climbed and climbed," he said. "I was hearing him good. He was gobbling good. I stopped 150 vards from him. I found a tree, but I didn't like it much and moved to another one. It was near an intersection of

two roads. I said, he's going to come down one those roads. I was cackling and yelping, and he would answer me. I knew he was on the ground, but he wouldn't come.

"I yelped and carried on. He answered me pretty good. I said, well he knows where I am. I laid my box call down. I could tell he was coming. But he didn't come down those roads. He came right between the two roads. He got his head behind a big tree, and I got my gun up. He came out from behind the tree and I shot him at 18 steps. He was a big turkey. He weighed 24 pounds with a 10³/₄-inch beard and 1¹/₈-inch spurs. That's a nice turkey.'

Despite bagging his milestone turkey, one of Jones' proudest accomplishments is calling up turkeys with his family.

"My son, Raymond, I called in his first turkey when he was 7," said the elder Jones. "He made a good shot. That was in Marshall County. And I called in a turkey for his son, Raymond III, when he was 7. That was in Jackson County.

"I think I've killed a turkey with every one of my grandsons. I really enjoy that."






