50th St. Patrick's Christmas Bazaar Dec. 3-4 in Robertsdale





City Council makes case for raising bed tax three percent

Mayor Craft says it's a better option than raising property or sales tax

During a presentation at a specially called council meeting, Gulf Shores Mayor Robert Craft said the council and city staff looked at three options to raise an extra \$7 million yearly to help fund what they consider much-needed transportation and other capital projects.

"We're trying to figure out how we continue to grow this city and make it better and have it balanced," Craft said during a presentation at the Nov. 29 meeting. "Where it supports residential, the residential growth we're seeing and the residents in this community. And, it continues to support the tourism industry that is so important to all of us. Trying to balance all of that out is where we are."

He presented a case that of the three, raising the city's portion of the lodging tax from 7 to 10 percent would be the less painful option for Gulf Shores residents. The public and members of the vacation rental industry were invited to provide input on the proposed tax hike and are invited again to the Dec. 6 and Dec. 13 sessions. A vote is expected on Dec. 13 because a new tax would have to be considered in the 2022 budget which the council wants to pass before Jan. 1.

The other options considered to reach the \$7 million target for new revenues were increasing the sales

tax or upping property tax millage both measures that would cost residents money.

"The lodging tax is something we've been looking at and right now the city's current lodging tax is 13 percent," Craft said. "The state of Alabama gets 4 percent, Baldwin County (Lodging Tax District) 2 and Gulf Shores 7. We've discussed adding 3 percent to that. We think it is the most effective way to move forward on this because most of the things we want to do with this is supporting the tourism industry."

During his presentation, Craft said even though the lodging tax in Destin is just 12 percent, his comparative analysis showed a unit in Destin would cost about \$700 more a night in rental and other fees to up the total cost to about \$2,300. A like unit in Gulf Shores would total about \$1,500 including the 3 percent lodging tax hike. The Destin vacationer would spend about \$95 in lodging tax compared to \$195 in Gulf Shores.

Resident Rick Kieffer, who also owns two vacation rental properties, said he believed using Destin to compare rates and fees didn't give a true picture.

"First of all, you picked Destin which is a much more expensive area than we are," Kieffer said. "If you compared us to Panama City you would find that we are more expensive than Panama City. We're also more expensive than Pensacola Beach. I sent you an email on four properties on VRBO and in each case we were more expensive. In Panama City, our daily rate is much higher. In all cases, it came out to be an 11.5 percent tax in Florida. We're at 13 percent currently and you want to raise it to 16 percent. I remind you Orange Beach hasn't raised theirs to 16 percent so would be at a competitive disadvantage with Orange Beach."

Resident Robert Schwartz who lives on Sunrise Drive off of Windmill Ridge Road asked the council to pass the tax to deal with the infrastructure facing impact from the growing tourism industry.

"The other options are sales taxes and property and I don't want those to increase," Schwartz said. "I feel these extra services are for our guests and I personally don't want to subsidize some landlord's income by paying more in sales tax or property tax."

Raising property taxes more than 7.5 percent – 9.3 is needed to raise \$7 million a year – must be approved by the state legislature and be passed by voters.

Craft said 70 percent of property taxes paid in Gulf Shores come from vacation rental properties and businesses and that increase would cost an average of \$418 annually to property owners. Craft said the sales tax is regressive and would hurt the "least amongst us" the most with food costs.

Geoff Gaberino of Gulf Shores Vacation Rentals, Leonard Kaiser with Kaiser Vacation Rentals and others in the vacation rental business wondered how they would collect the tax on properties already rented for 2022 at the 13 percent lodging tax rate.

"There's been a lot of reservations already made and taxes paid," Kaiser said. "We've got to go back to those people. The last time you did this in 2018 a lot of businesses had to come out of their pocket and pay the additional taxes."

Gaberino said 83 percent of the properties he manages are booked up for next year and he asked for a slow implementation of the tax rather than a 3 percent hike all at once

"If you implemented this on a backwards basis, I would literally have to go to every one of those guests and they will chose differently," Gaberino said.

"I would like this to be implemented and rolled out in a much longer time. Doing it at 3 percent from the jump is going to cost me business."

Councilman Philip Harris said the city wasn't acting rashly with its ambitious list of projects during the next 10 years but have been studying and fine-tuning plans for them for the past 10 years.

"I keep hearing slow down but we're so far behind and if we stop, we won't be able to keep up with the demand," Harris said.

O.B. to require permits for all golf carts

The Orange Beach City Council approved an ordinance that will require golf cart operators in Orange Beach to have a permit issued by the police department, and pass an inspection covering state law requirements of having carts equipped with headlights, brake lights, turn signals, and a windshield (see the ordinance for more details). A rearview mirror and liability insurance will also be required for each cart. No permit will be issued for any cart that fails inspection. The ordinance will go into effect on March 1, 2022.

Inspections and permitting are expected to be con-

ducted by the Orange Beach Police Department starting in January. Details on those inspections, which will be held in neighborhoods, will be shared later this month.

Description will be valid for three years, and must be of

Permits will be valid for three years, and must be affixed to the vart. There will be a \$75 fee for the inspection. Each permitted cart will need to have the assigned permit number displayed on each side. The cart operator must have a valid driver's license issued by a state or other governmental authority.

Carts can be operated on designated cart streets or multi-use cart paths. The headlights on the cart shall be illuminated at all times when it is in operation regardless of the time of operation and shall not be illuminated above 36 inches. Operators must adhere to all state and municipal laws applicable to motor vehicles, including all laws concerning the operation of a vehicle under the influence of alcohol or drugs.

ALDOT gathers more info from G.S. & Baldwin Co. Bridge Company

Decision could come as soon as Dec. 3, but project has already been delayed once

The Alabama Dept. of Transportation Waterways Bridge project, which is part of a planned new corridor from the Beach Express just south of Coastal Gateway Boule-

vard over the Intracoastal
Waterway, was
originally on the
bid letting for July
30

The bid letting for that bridge is now on ALDOT's list for Dec. 3 but since it was pulled one day before the monthly letting in July, another delay is definitely possible.

It was removed

late in the process in July after Orange Beach Mayor Tony Kennon asked for three months to negotiate with the Baldwin County Bridge Company, owners of the Foley Beach Express Toll Bridge, to among numerous other traffic easing improvements, add an additional two-lane span over the Intracoastal Waterway in Orange Beach, with BCBC picking up the \$25 million tab.

The Baldwin County Bridge Company has met with officials from Gulf Shores, Orange Beach and the state and was given criteria it must meet for traffic counts by Alabama Department of Transportation Director John Cooper.

ALDOT said on Oct. 28 that negotiations were ongoing and it is "making steps to include the bridge project in

our December bid opening."

"Director Cooper's mandate is that they prove that they can move 40 percent of the traffic that's coming over both bridges to that bridge and that bridge would carry 40 percent and this bridge (in Gulf Shores) would carry 60 percent," Gulf Shores Mayor Robert Craft said. "To prove they could do that is a pretty steep climb. I don't know how they prove it."

Unless they can, Craft said, the state is looking to move forward with the bridge over the Intracoastal Waterway about 1.5 miles west of the toll bridge by The Wharf.

In the bridge company's presentation, it was projected that the new lanes would give the bridge to ability to handle 2,400 cars an hour compared to the proposed state bridge, which it projects could only handle 1,000 an hour.

Another part of their proposal would give a discount to Gulf Shores and Orange Beach residents of \$5 per month to use the toll, with Baldwin County residents given the option to do the

same for \$10 a month. Tourists would pay between \$2.50 and \$3.25 per trip.

The BCBC also said it would provide a cash payment of \$10 million to the city if the expansion is built and \$1 million a year for 50 years to be "used at the city's discretion." It also stipulates after 50 years

as an expanded bridge the company would simply give the structure to the state.

Also offered to the state was 25 percent of revenues collected above \$13 million. The 25 percent would not include island and county resident discounted passes.

With the additional span, the toll booth would expand from five to 11 kiosks, including fly-throughs with electronic tolling to help keep cars moving. The queue lanes would be widened and shaped so traffic would be free-flowing on both north and south sides.

Craft and Gulf Shores Councilman Philip Harris attended a meeting brought officials from traffic consultant Skipper and Associates and Volkert Engineering, the designer of both proposed bridges, to a meeting with ALDOT. Skipper brought the results of a study on the volume of traffic over both bridges.

"The number of cars going over our bridge is 55,000 cars a day average and they're carrying a little over 10,000 cars a day," Craft said. "We need them to take more or we need a new bridge and that was really the way it was left. Director Cooper instructed them in things that he was looking to see and if they could convince him that they could carry that amount of traffic which is a significant portion of the total."

In the event Cooper is convinced a new toll bridge can attract 40 percent of the traffic from the Hwy. 59 bridge in Gulf Shores, Craft said his city would continue to advocate for the new state bridge.

"If that comes back in a different way, if he feels like he can do it then I think then we go and complain," Craft said. "I don't think we can possibly believe they are going to take 20 percent more of the bridge traffic away from here or 40 percent. I don't know how they get there. I don't know how we get people to them is the big issue. Depending on how this goes I don't think I'm willing to sit back and say OK, we believe you. I think it will require more of a public outcry."

Skipper's study projected without a new bridge at either location in 20 years the combined traffic over each span would reach almost 100,000 a day with more than 80,000 coming in at Gulf Shores and about 16,000 going over the toll bridge. The same study projected with a new Gulf Shores bridge the traffic volume in 20 years would be in the same range but 66,000

a day would come across at State Route 59, 30,000 over the new ICW bridge and about 1,300 on the toll bridge.

In a closer year comparison, Skipper estimates 61,800 cars per day would be using the State Route 59 bridge in 2027 with 12,000 using the toll bridge for total of 73,000.

With a third bridge Skipper projected that 2027 traffic volumes would 51,100 per day in Gulf Shores, 23,150 on the new ICW bridge

and 950 at the toll bridge.

The report also said averaging 55,000 cars per day puts the bridge at 135 percent capacity so even the 51,000 per day with a new bridge would still have way above capacity.

The state has already spent \$20 million buying property for the right of way for the entire length of the project and all permitting for the project is in place. State funds were allocated more than three years ago and Gulf Shores agreed to donate more than 26 acres to use as a right of way for a new spur road that would eventually link the Foley Beach Express to the emerging Waterway Blvd.

The proposed bridge location is in Orange Beach near the city's eastern boundary, about a half mile west of the

Beach Express Toll Bridge. Craft said ALDOT had also committed to a connector from The Foley Beach Express to the emerging East Waterway Blvd.

Craft said enhancing public safety by providing a third access on and off the island during hurricane evacuations is

also a major concern.

Traffic from the new bridge turning back east through a roundabout on Canal Rd. towards Orange Beach would make congestion at the southend of the Foley Beach Express nightmarish, according to the Orange Beach mayor.

"I would prefer to have the situation right now than for us to have to deal with what that would create on that side with the quagmire. I can't even imagine what an auto accident in the middle of one of the roundabouts would do to traffic congestion," he said.

Kennon stated ALDOT's goal from the beginning was to alleviate traffic congestion on Hwy. 59, not necessarily to build a new bridge, and Orange Beach was tasked with doing that by finding a way to help move more traffic through the Foley Beach Express toll booth.

to great acclaim in 2000. Through a contract that runs through 2063, Orange Beach earns about \$1.5 million for its general fund from its share of bridge tolls every year, according to Kennon.

Both cities' may-

ors noted that Baldwin County is growing as a tourist destination, while also experiencing huge

growth in the number of people moving here

Kennon said the bridge project was a second option only because Orange Beach was not even able to get the previous BCBC owners on the phone. "Waterway Bridge was always a fall-back position. It was never the primary objective. Improving traffic flow over the toll bridge and down the expressway was by far the most efficient and effective way to move traffic off and on the island," he said.

"Let's be clear. The desired result was not to create or impede traffic flow for a local convenience or result. And, that's exactly what the Waterway Bridge and roadway is," he added.

"That is a locals bridge with a local roadway to local schools that has nothing whatsoever to do with improving the ability to move traffic north and south or get traffic off of 59."







Big Fish Ministries South Baldwin women's transitional home opens

"The possibilities for how this facility will bless our area are many and have yet to be fully realized"

Big Fish Ministries founder Isaac Stooksberry was onhand to welcome well wishers during a recent ribbon cutting for the ministry's new South Baldwin County women's transitional home.

He said the community resource to help women in recovery is not only beautiful but also fills a great need, as it will provide Christ-centered recovery program availability to women while they transition from a residential recovery ministry back into mainstream society.

"At Big Fish Ministries, we believe there is hope for every person and that hope is in Christ," Stooksberry said at the opening. "Our goal is to produce independent, God-honoring, hard-working, law-abiding citizens who are contributing members of our community."

Since being founded in 2016, Big Fish Ministries has provided over 25,00 nights of shelter and over 86,000 meals, along with countless hours of recovery classes, counseling, case management, life-skills training and job readiness programs. Most of this transformation and preparation takes place through its 12-month, faith-based residential recovery program.

"Because of our new women's transitional home, we can now take in 6 to 8 more female recovery program residents at a time," Stookesberry said.

"At a time when overdose numbers are higher than ever before in the history of our country and the state of Alabama, this new community resource is needed more than ever before," he

Mobile County emergency rooms reported nearly 900 drug overdoses between January and November of 2020. Health and drug abuse leaders say the increase was in large part due to the lethal prevalence of fentanyl, plus the burdens and tensions of the pandemic.

"Despite these alarming statistics, there is hope for those struggling with addiction," Stookesberry said. "We're very grateful for this new much-needed resource and excited about welcoming more women into our program who will be transformed into restored and whole people through the love of Jesus Christ. For many, that transformation process necessitates transitional living."

Stooksberry said for the final six months of the 12-month BFM recovery program, women in the program will move over to the transitional house while working full-time. Many of the women struggle as they re-enter mainstream society while they work towards from addiction and selfdefeating behavior.

"Staying accountable and free as they grow into independent and productive members of the community requires a lot of new growth and support," Stookesberry said. "The possibilities for how this facility will bless our area are many and have yet to even be fully realized."







Macadamia Nut White Chip Pumpkin Cookies

2 c. flour

2 tsp. cinnamon

1 tsp. cloves

1 tsp. baking soda

1 c. (2 sticks) butter or margarine, softened

1/2 c. granulated sugar

1/2 c. packed brown sugar

1 c. canned pumpkin

1 large egg

2 tsp. vanilla

2 c. (12 oz. pkg) white chips

2/3 c. coarsely chopped macadamia nuts or walnuts, toasted

Preheat oven to 350 degrees

Combine flour, cinnamon, cloves and baking soda in small bowl. Beat butter, granulated sugar and brown sugar in large mixer bowl until creamy. Beat in pumpkin , egg and vanilla extract until blended. Gradually beat in flour mixture. Stir in morsels and nuts. Drop by rounded table-spoonful onto greased baking sheets; flatten slightly with back of spoon or greased bottom of glass dipped in granulated sugar. Bake for 11 to 14 min. or until centers are set. Cool on baking sheets for 2 min; remove to wire racks to cool completely. **Enjoy!**



"We want to do for septic tanks what the Strengthen Alabama Homes program did for roofs in our area," Manelos said. "The legislation will use Restore Act money to give grants to people who live near streams and waterways to help fix or replace their malfunctioning or damaged septic tanks or connect to existing nearby sewer systems. By doing that, we help avoid more runoff and more sewage finding its way into our waters and prevent further damage before it can start."



WHAT'S HAPPENING

PIER & SHORE FISHING OUTLOOK

Typical late fall type weather is forecast to continue through this upcoming fortnight. We can certainly expect some more chilly morn-



ings after each frontal passage. Followed by a day or two of milder air temps with onshore winds and building seas before the next front blows through.

A La Nina pattern is expected to continue into the winter, which usually means it will be a bit milder and

drier than average. But that should bode well for from shore anglers as the Gulf waters will continue to slowly cool due to the incursions of cold air and shorter length of days.

Frost, or even the first brief freeze of the season becomes a distinct possibility now.

Catches of smallish whiting (Gulf and Northern kingfish 8 to 12 inches long) continue to be the mainstay of surf and pier fishing success. Along with Southern kingfish (locally called ground mullet) and Atlantic croakers. But these croakers are spawning, so they tend to be be a little longer and heavier. Interjected among assorted panfish are occasional pompano, oversized redfish or black drum, out-of-season flounder, and the ever possible stingrays and catfish (hardheads and gafftops). Ugh! LOL

The tide level will be lowest during the late morning to midday hours, followed by an incoming tide in the afternoon. This give anglers two fish feeding windows of opportunity to find a good spot for catching fish.

But the middle of the day can be productive at times too, especially for sheepshead from the Gulf State Park Pier, and seawall or jetties at Perdido Pass.

It seems these striped bait stealers are not usually early risers. In fact they tend to feed better when the sun is highest or the water a little warmer with the afternoon incoming tide.

Most sheepshead are caught while they are most active, between the hours of 9 a.m. and 3 p.m. The deeper Gulf waters should only gradually cool through the upper 60s, while the shallower waters in the bays cool faster in the wake of strong cold fronts, from the middle to lower 60s. Beach anglers can expect the water temperature in the surf zone to be somewhere in between those two extremes, depending on the tide phase and meteorological conditions of the day.

Water temperature, salinity and clarity, along with wave heights, wind speed and direction are critical factors to determine when the more commonly targeted species of the surf zone will be feeding. Equally important is your bait and tackle presentation, along with the ever imperative: location, location, location.

It is often said that 90% of the fish are in 10% of the water. That is certainly true when speaking of the ribbonous surf zone along our Gulf beaches. Beach structure like sandbar drop-offs provide the prime habitat where pompano, whiting, redfish and black drum will be feeding and seeking shelter.

Also, breaks in those sandbars that provide egress to deeper water. And long points that provide wide flat areas for ghost shrimp and other invertebrate prey items to congregate are going to be most attractive to the fish. So finding the right spot at the right time is just as important as your bait and how palatable those fish perceive it to be. Always keep in mind, as the water cools down the metabolism of fish will slow down because of their cold blooded nature.

Any time the water visibility is decreased, a bit of flash on a pompano rig often lends toward success. No doubt the brightly colored beads or floats aid the angler to get the fishes' attention in rough or dingy water. Increased scent distribution with a piece of synthetic attractant like Fishbites or Fishgum is another way to lure the fish toward your terminal rig. But getting them to commit to eat what is on the hook can at times be another challenge.

As the water cools off, bait selection and freshness often become more critical. And this must be tempered with the logistics of getting your bait in front of fish, which may be a long cast away. Anything you can do in terms of tackle selection that makes your presentation more natural looking or appealing to these fish will result in more hookups.

Fine-tuning with the size of your bait mass and hook size and style goes a long way to determine your catch. Matching what is on the end of your line with the size of the mouth of the fish you are targeting is rudimentary, but too often overlooked.

During "super calm surf periods" when the waves are only a foot or so, a light tackle approach may tend toward more success and fun. These are the conditions when those smaller combos with lighter line often out produce the longer, heavier, and more gaudy gear that is necessary when the wind and waves are churning the Gulf.

My carpenter father used to tell me, every tool has a particular use. So choose your surf or pier fishing 'tools' with a specific purpose in mind when you are ready to specialize your approach. It is a great way to take advantage of the ever changing conditions we encounter along this stretch of coastline.

Lee Elder earned place in golf history at 1974 Pensacola Open

He changed in parking lot at segregated Pensacola Country Club in 1968

Lee Elder, who recently passed away at age 87, made history as the first African-American golfer to compete in the Masters, a signature moment in the breaking of racial barriers on the pro golf tour back in 1975. Less known, even locally, is the fact racial partiers on the progon tour pack in 1975. Less known, even locarly, is the fact that the moment was made possible by Elder's win on April 26, 1974 at the Pensacola/Monsanto Open at the Pensacola Country Club.

The Monsanto/Pensacola Open ran from 1956 to 1988 and was later played at Persacola Country.

dido Bay Golf Club. Arnold Palmer won the tourney twice, and Curtis Strange's first pro win happened at the 1967 tourney.

Elder's previous claim to fame was taking Jack Nicklaus to a playoff at the American Golf Classic in Akron in 1968, his first year on the PGA Tour. That same year, Elder had to change shoes in the Pensacola Country Club parking lot because its members would not allow non-whites to enter the clubhouse.

Elder sank an 18-foot putt on the fourth hole of a sudden death playoff to defeat Peter Costerhuis and earn his invitation to the 1975 Masters, one of golf's four major

championships. Two earlier African American golfers, Pete Brown in 1964 and Charlie Sifford in 1967 and 1969, had won PGA Tour events but were denied an invitation to the Masters because of rules in place at the time.

"Those things had pretty much subsided by the time I got to the Masters," Elder said. "I had made a statement that I would never go back there to Pensacola because we couldn't go in the clubhouse. I went back in 1973 and played, then went back in 1974 and won. I was so overwhelmed with the fact that I had qualified and won there, the place where the problem had occurred.'

Elder was already 40 when he competed in Augusta, having honed his game playing in the sport's version of baseball's Negro league. It was sometimes called "The Peanut Tour" because of its small winners' purses, usually \$500. During one torrid stretch in the early 1960s, Elder won 21 out of 23 United Golfers Association tournaments.

The PGA of America accepted only "members of the Caucasian race," as its rules had spelled out, until 1961. The tournament eased a bit in 1971 by announcing that any player who subsequently won a PGA Tour event would automatically qualify for it. Elder came close, finishing second in the Texas Open and losing a playoff to Lee Trevino in the Greater Hartford tournament in 1972, before breaking through in

In the run-up to the 1975 Masters, Elder received death threats. He rented two houses near the course and moved between them as a security measure. His shot off

the first tee was straight down the middle, but he missed the cut by four strokes.

Elder played in the Masters six times, his top finish a tie for 17th place in 1979.

He won three other PGA Tour events and finished second 10 times, playing regularly through 1989 and earning \$1.02 million. He also played for the U.S. team in the 1979 Ryder Cup. He joined the PGA Senior Tour, now the Champions Tour, in 1984 and won eight times, earning more than \$1.6 million. He won four tournaments overseas. In 2019, Elder received the United States Golf Association's highest honor, the Bob Jones Award.

Elder's father, a coal truck driver, was killed during Army service in Germany in World War II when Lee was 9. His mother, Almeta, died three months later. Elder caddied at an all-white club in his hometown, Dallas, then went to Los Angeles to live with an aunt and dropped out of high school to pursue a career in golf.

In 1997, Elder returned to Augusta National to watch Tiger Woods win the Masters by a record-setting 12 strokes, becoming the first African-American golfer to win one of golf's four major tournaments.

"Lee Elder came down, that meant a lot to me," Woods said afterward. "He was the first. When I turned pro at 20, I was able to live my dream because of those guys."


