

Ballyhoo Fest March 5-6 at Gulf State Park

As always, the tribal dancers from the Poarch Creek Indians will be a major attraction when the locally produced Ballyhoo Fest returns to the shores of Lake Shelby (20115 State Park Rd.) at Gulf State Park in Gulf Shores on March 5-6. Hours are 9 a.m. until 5 p.m. Saturday and 11 a.m. until 5 p.m. on Sunday.

The fest is also a showcase for fine artists from all over the Southeast and includes fiddler and banjo competitions. But at its core, the fest has always taken pride in being a cultural exchange with the Poarch Band of Creek Indians, who will perform traditional dances dressed in spectacular ceremonial regalia twice on Saturday. Each of the dances has a specific meaning. And the audience will be invited to join the tribe for their last tribal dance at both performances.

The Poarch Creek Indians are descendants of the original Creek Nation, which once covered almost all of Alabama and Georgia. Unlike many southeastern tribes, the Poarch Creeks were not removed from their tribal lands. They have lived together for over 150 years as the only nationally recognized tribe in Alabama.

The fest's Sunday banjo and fiddle competitions are sponsored by Flora-Bama Lounge & Package and the Frank Brown International Songwriters Fest. Both competitions include separate youth and adult divisions and will award cash prizes to the best players. For more fest info, visit ballyhoofestival.org.

Another fest highlight is a Sunday performance from the Cotton Pickin' Kids, six siblings, ages 11 to 19, who play different in-

struments and specialize in bluegrass music.

The fest includes a children's art tent, live art demonstrations and unique food. Parking is available across from the Lake Shelby fest site at Gulf State Pier for \$5, and limited handicapped parking is available on festival grounds. Attendees can also drop off and pick up at the park entrance, then park across the street and walk over the bridge to the festival. Shuttles will be available at the Gulf State Pavilion only if there is a need for overflow parking.

After 40 years and hundreds of awards, Steve Dark still thinks his most creative work is in front of him

Proprietor of World Pottery Headquarters in Gulf Shores found his fate working the door at Sam & Shine's

It is entirely possible that if Steve Dark did not take a job working the door at the legendary Sam & Shine's (There is a Walgreens there now.) more than 40 years ago, he would not have ended up forging a career in the creative arts.

"I just decided to start making what I thought I should be making.
That's when things started to turn."

A Detroit native, Dark moved to Bon Secour in 1979 to live with his father. He was two years out of high school and had never even considered art as a career path.

Content to party and work in the service industry or off-shore on supply and crew boats, he was enjoying life as a care free young man and working the door at Sam & Shine Powell's

popular juke joint when he met local potter Steve Burrow.

Soon after that, Dark started hanging out at Burrow's studio. But his friend insisted that if he was going to hang around, he had to work. So Dark helped Burrow with the grunt work of churning out mugs and cups. He liked it. But

he wasn't thinking it was going to turn into a career that would see him still working in that same exact studio more than 40 years later.

"T --- 11-1-1-

"I was usually hungover when I was there, and I really had no idea what I wanted to do," Dark said from World Pottery Headquarters in Gulf Shores. "Steve had already graduated from South Alabama in ceramics and he suggested I go to college."

Although he was accepted into every school he applied to from T-Town to Tampa, Dark decided on South Alabama because it was the closest to his adopted home. He ended up being the only graduate in pottery in his class.

He was already selling art at fests and shows while at South, but upon graduation he took off for Edinboro University in Western Pennsylvania to earn his masters in fine arts. It was there that he had no choice but to get serious about his craft. The school had three full time demanding pottery instructors and a student body that inspired him to create

"It was like night and day," he said.
"The quality of the instruction just blew me away."

me away." Dark brought two classmates from Edinboro with him when he returned to Pleasure Island after earning his masters. He inherited the lease from Burrow, who by that time had built a studio behind his home. He named the studio Pottery Central World Headquarters. And he has been there ever since.

"That is where the name came out of. We were friends, but we were all so different. The phone rang constantly and it was never for the person who answered the phone," Dark said. "Of course, we were all still moonlighting to keep our art going."

Although he put his offshore gigs behind him, Dark waited tables for seven years at Perdido Beach Resort and taught art at Faulkner State while learning the ropes of the festival circuit.

It wasn't until after 2004's Hurricane Ivan that he decided to put almost all of his energy into art. His style now can be identified in everything from the gloss of his glaze to the viscosity of his clay. His colors, textures, even his curing methodology are all well thought out and unique to him.

"I just decided to start making what I thought I should be making. That's when things started to turn," he said.

He has won literally hundreds of ribbons at art festivals dating back to his days at South. He modestly credits that to his advanced academic training, not his creative ingenuity.

But he is proud of a best of show ribbon he won last November at the Peter Anderson Art Fest in Ocean Springs, if only because the show's namesake was

a world renowned potter.

Dark will participate in the March 5-6 Ballyhoo Festival at Lake Shelby, but he will skip the following weekend's Festival of Art in Orange Beach to build up his stock for the 70th Annual Fairhope Art Fest later in March.

He said he does not keep track of how many hours he works each day or each week, but his goal every day is to find a zone where time and creativity are blurred.

"It does sometimes seem like I am in here all the time. But I purposely try not to keep track of the hours. It would probably be depressing, if I think about all the time I spend in here when other people are doing fun things. I tell people I'm married to the clay. When the clay calls, I have to go."

Dark added that when he answers that call, it sometimes results in creative nirvana.

"It's kind of selfish in a way. But it's also a beautiful place to be. That is where the best stuff comes from. Total immersion"

Dark continues to teach classes at

Coastal Alabama Community College and he continues to make turtles, seashells and cups that the Gulf Shores City Store buys in bulk, but he more than ever sees those activities as distractions that keep him away from reaching his creative peak.

"I do work all the time, and I'm not as fun as I used to be. That is for sure," he said.

Maybe his best known creations are the flummoxed faces he creates on a variety of torsos, planters and jugs.

Face jugs in Dark's style originated in the U.S. with slave potters from Africa who made ugly faces to put on graves to scare evil spirits away. They later turned up on jugs to warn people to not drink the contents. But Dark's faces are like no others. He said they are not necessarily self portraits. But they were inspired by surviving a hurricane, a flood and a fire.

"I'm sure I had that look on my face for awhile," he said.

Dark also produced submersible art in the way of hula girls and busts that he put in lagoons and waterways around Gulf Shores. Barnacles eventually attached to the busts, taking the work to an entirely new dimension.

The key to his art and his enthusiasm for it is its ever changing possibilities. His latest passion is creating Appalachian folk art ring jugs using a wood fire kiln. Collectors can hang the jugs on a wall like a canteen.

He still makes turtles, seashells and

"potheads" that he sells at Rick Tino's studio in Gulf Shores, the Coastal Art Center in Orange Beach, The Eastern Shore Art Center in Fairhope, the Foley Art Center and Innova Arts on Old Shell Rd. in Mobile. But that is not his future.

"I still do things to make ends meet, and it's a fair trade off because it's better than waiting tables, I guess, although that was fun. I quit working at the hotel (Perdido Beach Resort) in 2000 and I've been teaching for 22 years at Coastal Community College. I wouldn't mind giving teaching up just to keep the doors open here all the time," he said.


Dark knows his art will change direction, but he has no compass in his pocket to indicate what direction his creative juices will flow.

"It would be interesting to know. I wish I had a crystal ball. I'm not much for setting mile markers though. Maybe I'll be in the same place, but farther along," he said.

"I'm always trying to learn," he added. "I think when you make a break-through, it opens up a whole new channel. But it's hard to tell when that will come. I think musicians go through the same kind of thing."







The indoor water park will

be a year-round attraction and include 11 slides, a lazy river and a children's area.

The 65,000-ft building will be the first in the entire country to include a retractable walls and a retractable roof, according to OWA officials.

Some of the slides will have loops that extend outside the walls, and one, aptly named Tangerine Scream, will have a 75 ft. vertical drop. Another notable slide is Piranha Plunge, a 75' super loop with a drop floor.

with a drop floor.

The water park complex will also include a restaurant and retail area, a concert stage, a lazy river, and a 30,000-squarefoot outdoor wave pool named Big Water

The park will also include lockers rooms, private party rooms and an arcade, a kids' play area with a 6-inch pool and tip buckets, private cabanas, concessions and a cocktail bar and restaurant named Smugglers Café.

Around 300 seasonal workers, including 100 lifeguards, will be hired to work at the water park. Currently, the amusement park employs approximately 375 part-time positions and OWA Corporate Division employs 75 full-time positions

Behind the stage are will be a 48-foot screen that can be used to broadcast movies, simulcasts and football games in high definition or for live performances.

OWA also announced it has partnered with Kidcam Camps to bring summer day camps for children 5-13 to Downtown OWA this summer. Campers will have access to daily activities and programs through Kidcam's curriculum of science, technology, engineering and mathematics. Kids will also enjoy sports, arts and swimming. Camps are scheduled on weekdays from May 31-Aug. 5 from 9 a.m.-3 p.m.

Stephanie Bryan, tribal chair & CEO of the Poarch Creek Indians, said the new water park will be a slice of tropical paradise and a win-win for the Tribe and the City of Foley.

"What better place to go in the summer and winter?" she said.

Originally opened as The Park at OWA in 2017, the resort is transforming its 14-acre amusement park, featuring 23 rides and attractions, as well as a the new water park expansion into a tropical paradise named Tropic Falls.

Being inspired with OWA's meaning of big water, which is derived from the Muscogee Creek language, the entire amusement park will now be filled with tropical touches allowing guests to feel like they have stepped into an island paradise.

This will include a complete makeover of the front gate and an expansion of tropical theming throughout. Guests can still enjoy the amusement park on weekends during the winter season, even while construction is taking place at the entrance.

"We are incredibly proud of OWA, the direction its moving and the economic impact it continues to have on not only the local community but state as well,' said "We are so excited to share that upon completion, Tropic Falls will be the only indoor water park in the United States with a retractable wall and retractable roof, allowing for the ultimate experience in Coastal Alabama climate control," said Kristin Hellmich, the Director of Marketing and Public Relations for OWA Parks & Resort.

Tropic Falls will introduce a toucan as its first mascot. People can vote on their favorite names for this tropical friend or suggest one themselves through a survey link on OWA Parks & Resort Facebook page.

The projected opening date for the water park is May 2022.

OWA is owned and operated by the Poarch Band of Creek Indians. OWA's name is derived from a Creek word for "big water," and the tropical theme of the 520-acre property was inspired by the Gulf of Mexico. Just outside the ticketed areas is Downtown OWA, a pedestrian-only streetscape was inspired by Southern small towns with numerous options for dining, shopping, and entertainment.

Future planned phases at OWA include a luxury RV Resort with 150+ sites set to open this fall.

Little Lagoon piers needed for oyster garden program

Volunteers, cages & gear are available to willing property owners

Property owners with a pier or access to a pier in Little Lagoon are needed for the Little Lagoon Preservation Society oyster gardening program. Maintanence is minimal - about 30 minutes a week, and the only requirement is access to a pier/dock to suspend oyster babies (spat) in Little Lagoon waters. LLPS will provide cages, spat and gear for gardening.

"We'll also teach you what you need to know to be a successful gardener," said LLPS President Dennis Hatfield.

Gardening season is from late May thru mid-November. And the oysters are for restoration purposes only.

In 2021, Little Lagoon gardeners utilized 32 sites to grow 35,068 oysters with an average length of 2.06". The oysters were moved to Mobile Bay and restored.

"This was an awesome effort by all involved, especially considering we are still recovering from Hurricane Sally, which heavily damaged or destroyed 70 to 80 percent of Lagoon gardening piers," Hatfield said.
















SBCT revises "Cancer Can Kiss My A\$\$ as a fundraiser March 5 festivities benefit Anchor Cross Cancer Foundation

Of course, local playwright Laura Pfizenmayer was self reflecting when she wrote "Cancer Can Kiss My A\$\$." The story of one woman's battle and triumph over anal cancer is based on her own

After debuting at South Baldwin Theatre in Gulf Shores last April, the play was a featured zoom production at the International Center For Women's Playwrights and was also produced by The Merely Players Troupe in Atlanta.

"This is a play that has some legs. I hope to see it produced all over the country," Pfizenmayer said.

A special local revival of the play on March 5 will also serve as a fundraiser for the Anchor Cross Cancer Foundation, a community based not for profit foundation dedicated to cancer patient assistance, community education and providing hope to patients when all hope seems lost.

The evening will begin at 7 p.m. with heavy hors d'oeuvres provided by the Coastal Community College Culinary School. There will be cancer screening information available in the lobby, and Pfizenmayer's doctor at The Southern Cancer Center, W. Curry McEvoy, will introduce the production. The play will begin at 8 p.m., and desserts and coffee will be served at intermission. Tickets are \$40 per person, and all funds donated at the event, which includes a silent auction will go directly to Anchor Cross. (Info: sbct.biz) The play is also set for March 6 at 2 p.m. at SBCT.

"I am hoping we can help a lot of Baldwin County cancer patients, which is what Anchor Cross does," Pfizenmayer said. "They help patients pay the power bills or help with medicine or with rent. The are there to help, and it is a wonderful thing that all the money we raise will help them with that.

"If one person attending is induced to get a cancer screening than it will have been totally worthwhile," she added. "All the actors wanted to revive it because they wanted to see the play be put to good use."

Pfizenmayer said that in most productions dealing with cancer, the patient dies, even though most cancer patients survive.

"But this is a very uplifting look at cancer," she said. "Instead of people dying, they get to live. I was able to go through that experience and it does change you. One of the lines in the play is that it changes you on a cellular level. And it's true. This play is about not only living with it, but thriving with it and having a good life. As a playwright, my plan was to take what happened to me and put it to good use. To make it matter. That is why we all wanted to revise this."

Directed by Jan Hinnen, the cast includes (pictured with Pfizenmayer) Ann Gaynor, Mel Middlebrooks, Barbara Campbell, Steve Henry, Rio Cordy and Robert Gardner.

Community colleges offer incentives to consider hospitality jobs

By Fran Thompson

Students attending the Alabama Community College System across the state will have financial incentives to consider jobs in the hospitality industry thanks to a \$1 million in state funds allocated to prepare up to 2,000 students to earn online certifications for jobs in the state's \$16 billion hospitality industry. Gov. Ivey made the announcement at this past January's Governor's Conference on Tourism in Gulf Shores.

The Alabama Community College System is offering the course for free to Baldwin County applicants. Tuition without this grant would be \$500

Alabama Tourism Director Lee Sentell said Alabama is the first state to institute such a program. "We know tourism revenue makes an economic impact for Alabama, and that spending generates jobs in other sectors," he said. "This project has the potential to not only bring new professionals into our industry but to also create opportunities for Alabamians as a whole."

Gulf Shores-Orange Beach Tourism CEO Beth Gendler told those gathered for the Jan. 5 Governor's Conference on Tourism at The Lodge at Gulf State Park that, if short term accomodations already booked this spring are any indication, 2022 will mark another record year for tourism on the Alabama Gulf Coast. Tourism figures just through August of 2021 were higher than all of the prior record-setting year in

Taxable retail sales through August hit \$1 billion for the first time, a remarkable number considering the pandemic and the continued impact from September 2020's Hurricane Sally.

"Tourism down here on the Gulf Coast is a money-making machine," said Gov. Kay Ivey. "That's for sure and it does go toward other places to help them have the benefits of hospitality in their area as well, so it's a win-win situation."

Gateway Initiative

The Gateway Initiative - a coalition of local cities, businesses, Chambers of Commerce and the CVB, has a plan for a South Baldwin Workforce Training Campus that would provide much-needed housing for up to 2,000 seasonal workers, an education and training center, and even a childcare center. But least \$214 million would be needed to fund the project.

"South Baldwin continues to grow - both in terms of full-time residents and in guests who choose our area for vacations," said Gendler. "That growth is a blessing, but it also brings challenges we have to find solutions for. While our mission is visitor-focused, we are community inspired, it is our beach, our businesses, and our cities that make this such a great place to live and that make millions of people want to visit

here. But we can't get the summer workers we need if there is no place

for them to live."

Fort Morgan Fishing Pier expected to open in early March

For the first time in almost eight years, onshore anglers should have access to the great fishing on the lower end of Mobile Bay this spring when the new and improved Fort Morgan Pier opens. The renovated pier will be L-shaped with dimensions of 305 feet by 210 feet and 40 feet wide. The pier floor will be 8 feet off the surface of the water at mean tide. Actual construction on the pier started in July 2020, said Alabama Marine Resources Division Director Scott Bannon, but a variety of situations caused delays. "But I think we're on the downhill side. We anticipate an early March completion," Bannon said.

Bannon said the sheet pile work has been completed as well as a portion of the concrete caps that cover the sheet pile. The old retaining wall demolition work has also been completed.

The original pier was built with timbers and held up considerably well through its 40-year lifespan, but the double whammy of Hurricane Ivan in 2004 and Hurricane Katrina in 2005 took its toll. "It was pretty much rendered unsafe and had to be closed in 2014," Bannon said.

The total cost of design, construction and oversight of the new pier was \$3.2 million, and was paid for with Deepwater Horizon oil spill settlement money. The upgraded pier will serve dual purposes by providing a fishing venue and serving as a seawall for the adjacent boat ramp and basin.

The project includes steel sheet pile with a concrete platform, railings made of cables, handicap access points, more parking for anglers and boaters and a rebuilt boat ramp.

Bannon said the contractors were able to dredge the sedimentation from the boat basin, much of which was deposited during Hurricane Sally, and use that material to fill the pier instead of having to truck in fill material.

The good news for anglers is they will soon have access to the abundant inshore species that inhabit the mouth of Mobile Bay, including red drum (redfish), speckled trout and flounder. Rock material around the base of the pier will provide protection but also serves as fish habitat.

David Thornton, known as Pier Pounder on social media, is a dedicated pier and surf fisherman. He celebrates the reopening of the pier. "It's an element that has been missing for several years," he said. "It was a nice venue, especially when the Gulf beach was too rough. In the summer and fall, it's a good flounder spot. And people should catch lots of white trout and ground mullet and quite a few redfish. It's really neat it's coming back into play."

"This is about providing access to people who don't have boats," Bannon said. "We know access to water is limited, and this new pier is an iconic structure that we want to have back available to anglers. For that population that didn't have access to the water, I think this will soon become another destination spot much like the Gulf State Park Pier."







Little Lagoon Preservation Society asks ADEM to delay issuing sewage treatment plant permit

Baldwin County Sewer System (BCSS) upgrade will increase volume 65 percent at Fort Morgan Rd. facility

The Little Lagoon Preservation Society has asked the AL. Dept. of Environmental Management (ADEM) to hold off issuing a permit to the privately owned Baldwin County Sewer System (BCSS) that would allow a 65 percent increase in the volume of wastewater to be treated at its plant on Fort Morgan Rd. until a Mobile Bay National Estuary Program (MBNEP) study has been completed.

The 30 day comment period on the proposal ends Feb. 25, and the local environmental watch group has asked ADEM to etend that period and hold public meetings and/or wait for the results of the current study that will identify nutrient point sources, pathogens, and other harmful chemicals within the Little La-

Considerable documentation of water quality within Little Lagoon spanning more than 14 years clearly indicates that Little Lagoon would benefit from no additional increases in the amount of permitted wastewater treatment at the Fort Morgan BCSS plant, according to LLPS president Dennis Hatfield.

Hatfield noted that the MBNEP data indicates a high nutrient zone exists in the area south of the BCSS plant, but it has yet to be determined if the WWTP effluent disposal ponds are a source of nutrients in Little Lagoon.

"We would, at a minimum, ask ADEM to hold off on approving the BCSS permit increase until the MBNEP study is completed so that the findings can be shared and made part of decision-making relative to BCSS' permit request," Hatfield

The BCSS plant, located about a quarter mile north of Brigadoon subdivision, is currently permitted to process a monthly average of 1.2 million gallons of sewage per day, including wastewater piped in from areas north of the Intracoastal Waterway. BCSS has applied for a permit to process up to two million gallons per day, according to LLPS documents.

Processed wastewater from the plant is placed in ponds where the treated water seeps into the subsurface water table and flows towards the Lagoon.

"LLPS is most concerned about nutrient loading from the plant to Little Lagoon and its potential to cause harmful algal blooms amongst other things," Hatfield said. "Our Board believes this is a very important matter concerning the current and future health of Little Lagoon."

ADEM issued a 30 day notice for public comment on the application on Jan. 26. But the LLPS believes that past safety issues with BCSS warrant at least a public hearing before any

permits are granted.

Why has BCSS been allowed to exceed Biological Oxygen Demand in plant processed effluent numerous times and why have steps apparently not been taken to prevent recurrence? In July 2020, the plant exceeded the BOD limit in 1 of 4 required samples," Hatfield said. "In July 2021 it exceeded the BOD limit in 3 of 4 required samples. ADEM only contacted them about the 7/21 violation and the BCSS response was 'clarifier upsets for unknown reason.' They also responded with an 'n/a' for steps taken to prevent recurrence.

Hatfield also questions what percentage of the daily wastewater flow at the Ft. Morgan plant is coming from north of the Intracoastal Waterway and why that wastewater is not being

treated at BCSS plants closer to its source. He said his group also wants to know what other steps BCSS

is taking to prepare for the rapid growth that is occurring in South Baldwin County.

"Are other treatment facilities being planned to accommodate that growth? The Fort Morgan plant has exceeded allowable ADEM limits on several occasions under the current permitted volume of wastewater to be treated at that facility. What modifications to the current facility are going to be made to avoid these past problems?" he asked. "If the current facility has chronic problems staying within its permitted standards, why should we believe that the Fort Morgan plant can successfully treat larger volumes of wastewater and stay within acceptable water quality standards?"

PIER & SHORE FISHING OUTLOOK

Recently at least, there have been some signs of life in the cold, barren wasteland we refer to as the surfzone. The temperature of shallow coastal waters has languished in the upper 50s lately, which is a few degrees below average for late February. A warmer



weather pattern would change that for the better as we move into March when we typically see the water begin rise back into the 60s. That would signal the beginning of more 'springlike' fishing patterns with more pompano,

sheepshead, and redfish.

Sheepshead is likely still the best bet for shorebound anglers, as they are gathering in prespawn aggregations near the passes and bays before moving into the Gulf 'en masse'. That's when the fun really begins at the Gulf State Park Pier where dozens and even hundreds of these fat, feisty, tasty striped gamefish gather to mate and test the anglers' tackle. Schools meander around the pier in calm weather to begin courtship and spawning rituals, meanwhile proving sport to anglers inclined to bring home dinner.

Most fishermen use live shrimp on medium heavy tackle rigged with a Carolina rig presentation. At times though, these notoriously finicky bait thieves prefer crunching on fiddler crabs dangled around the pier piling. Occasionally the schools may lay near the bottom where a live ghost shrimp is supreme bait. You might also pick up an occasional pompano, redfish, or black drum with ghost shrimp or live Penaeid shrimp this way. And a few speckled trout might start showing up around the pier and gulf passes as the shallow water warms.

With warmer water and strong tidal flow expected through most of this fortnight, fishing opportunities should abound along the beaches as well. Pompano will be the most targeted species with longer rods and set rigs placed along sandbar drop-offs and cuts being the best locations. It pays dividends to scout the beach and move around to find spots where you can get your rigs into the feeding zones for these free ranging fish. As the water warms, more pompano begin moving into the surfzone and they too begin gathering into prespawn schools. Though far from

peak numbers, finding any kind of a pompano bite right now is another sure sign that spring has sprung along the coast.

Most surf anglers like the professionally tied double drop "pompano rigs" with beads or brightly colored floats near the hooks to get the attention of passing pompano. The hook is baited with an inch long piece of fresh shrimp, and/or Fishbites or Fishgum sold in local bait and tackle stores. These colorful synthetic baitstrips are designed to hang on the hook getting the attention of pompano or other gamefish and formulated to slowly dissolve in seawater. The scent (in several flavors) also helps draw pompano to your hook and further entice them to commit to biting. Just keep in mind that the total size of your bait presentation should not exceed the size of the mouth of the targeted fish. For pompano and other panfish with no teeth, this is no longer or bigger around than your index finger. In fact, a two-inch-long bait wad allows the pompano (or whiting) to inhale it all at once instead of repeatedly 'pecking' at a larger sized bait to break it into manageable pieces.

When the water is calm and clear the gaudier or heavier double drop rigs are often not as effective as a less visible presentation of thumbnail-sized pieces of dead shrimp or a beach ghost shrimp. These might be rigged on a Mortician rig, single drop rig or Fishfinder ("Carolina") rig. The last of these is the stealthiest of all presentations in calm clear water and puts the bait on the bottom where the fish expect to find it. A little slack created by the 12 to 15 inch long 10-to-20pound test clear mono or fluorocarbon leader is just enough to allow the unsuspecting fish to pick the bait up in its mouth and move away for a couple of seconds before the line comes tight. As it does, the fish panics and darts away which allows the number 4 or 6 kahle hook or small circle hook to find the corner of the mouth.

Fishing success may be far from a sure thing this time of year, but it seems we are slowly moving away from the dreaded winter doldrums as we move into March.

In a slow current a free line presentation is often more effective, and certainly covers more water faster. Splitshot weights (one or two) affixed on the line about a foot or so above the hook are very effective for drifting live shrimp or fiddler crabs into the strike zone. Though an increasing number of sheepshead anglers like the Bottom Sweeper ("Knocker") and Free-Swinging style jigs. These are designed to move flat along the bottom while keeping the hook point facing up baited with a fiddler crab, or shrimp. It is a great presentation method for sheepshead staging on a sandy bottom, and offers great sensitivity of the light bite of a sheepshead.

Low tide after cold front best time to find ghost shrimp

Though pieces of fresh dead or frozen shrimp are the most used baits, beach ghost shrimp are natural baits most commonly found throughout the surfzone. But they are often the most difficult to procure. Gathering ghost shrimp with a suction pump is exercise for anyone and an exercise in futility for many beginners. But once you become successful and learn what to look for, and where, and when it gets much easier. Low tide the mornings after a cold front is the best time to search the beaches for the tell-tale inch high mounds of these burrowing arthropods. They look like three-inch-long soft-shelled saltwater crayfish, and everything that swims in the surf zone loves to eat them. But they easily fly off the hook when casting, so securing them on the hook with a piece of Magic Thread is the best way. This thin, elastic thread is available at many of the coastal bait and tackle shops that carry surf fishing tackle and have sales associates who can assist you where to find it and how to use it.







Aldi Distribution Center will open this spring in Loxley

Grocery chain's first local market will be on Blue Angel Pkwy.

Grocery chain Aldi will hire 300 store associates and 200 warehouse employees to support its 564,000-square-foot regional distribution center in Loxley scheduled to open later this year. Ground was broken in February of last year.

A German company, Aldi is based domestically in Illinois. The chain ambitiously announced that it plans to open about 150 new stores and become the third-largest U.S. grocery retailer by the end of the year. That includes 100 new stores between Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi and the Florida panhandle. The Loxley facility will be distribution headquarters for all 100 stores.

The supermarket will open on Rangeline Crossing Drive in Tillman's Corner and in Navarre, FL this week and 20 additional stores throughout the area by the end of 2022.

Two other Pensacola area stores are currently under construction for expected openings later this year. One will be located at 4830 Mobile Hwy. and the other at 2950 Blue Angel Pkwy. Aldi's Florida Panhandle expansion will also include a store in Pace. Site plans have already been approved for a parcel on U.S. 90 at Santa Rosa

The two other Mobile stores will be at Airport Boulevard near Interstate 65 and Schillinger Road just north of Hitt Road. The Airport Blvd. location was previously leased to Babies R Us.

The chain has already purchased a seven-acre parcel in Fairhope just north of the Wal-Mart on Hwy. 181 and purchased land for future store locations in Daphne, Spanish Fort and Foley.

The Daphne location would be near 98 and Whispering Pines, the Foley location at the old Ryan's on McKenzie Street and the Spanish Fort location at Highway 31 and 81, according to Lee Lawson with the Baldwin County Economic Development Alliance.

Construction has not started on any of the Baldwin County sites. The company opened its first Louisiana store (Lafayette) on Feb. 10. Plans have, at least temporarily, been put on hold for an Aldi retail store on North Davis Hwy. in Pensacola, according to Aldi Loxley Division Vice President Heather Moore.

O.B. adds March 5 & 19 for golf cart inspections

The Orange Beach Police Department has added two more golf cart inspection dates - Saturday, March 5 and Saturday, March 19 from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. at Orange Beach City Hall, in the front parking lot. More than 600 permits have been issued.

Effective March 1, all golf carts in the city will require permits to operate on designated city streets. The first few weeks will be an education period for golf cart owners in the city, with warnings being issued.

Orange Beach City Hall is located at 4099 Orange Beach Blvd. If one of the inspection requirements is not met, the cart will fail and no permit will be issued. Every golf cart owner must present a valid driver's license, proof of insurance and have all of the needed equipment upgrades.

If all items pass inspection, a fee of \$75 will be collected on site (cash, check or credit card) and two permit decals will be issued to be placed on each side of the cart as specified in the ordinance. Permits will be valid for three years.
