325 dwellings approved for Innerarity Point

Ground has been cleared for construction of a multi-family apartment complex providing 325 dwelling units within 12 buildings on a 28 acre parcel at 3450 Perdido Key Dr. behind the Publix Shopping Center on Perdido Key Dr.

The site was approved for development in January near what is already a busy intersection.





City prepares to take its case for a new bridge directly to governor

Mayor Robert Craft said at a recent Gulf Shores City Council meeting the city would soon be drafting a letter laying out its case for the Alabama Department of Transportation to move forward with plans to build a new bridge over the Intracoastal Waterway. The council

erway. The council met on Aug. 22, in an executive f session to discuss the city's response.

"I know we've been talking about bridges and traffic and all those types of things," Craft said on Aug. 15. "We're working hard to try to understand exactly what ALDOT and the bridge company are proposing." City leaders

have been kept informed on the negotiations and have heard hints that talks between ALDOT and the Baldwin County Bridge Company could be nearing a conclusion.

BCBC has to convince ALDOT it can woo 40 percent of the traffic from the Holmes Bridge in Gulf Shores by adding another two-lane span and ALDOT backing away from plans for a new bridge. The latest deadline for a settlement is set at Sept. 5.

"We don't have that in front of us to react to," Craft said. "We're kind of negotiating with a ghost right now and we really don't know what their final plan is. We believe that is forthcoming soon. We've had conversations that imply we should get something to understand this week and when we get that we will prepare some opportunities to discuss it."

In the meantime, Craft and other city officials have been working on a direct appeal to Gov. Kay Ivey's office in the form of a letter.

"But right now, to make statements and comments about something we don't really understand would be ill-advised," Craft said. "We're not ready to go forward yet but we will be soon. We promise you that as soon as we know what the facts are, we're going to present them with our thoughts to join with yours and make comments as you see fit."

Craft pledged the letter from the city would go out as soon as officials learn more about what ALDOT and BCBC have settled on for the second toll span.

"I had hoped it would be but we're not ready and it's wise for us to pause a little bit longer and hopefully have something sooner rather than later," Craft said.

"But we're going to have input into this before it's finalized, I can promise you that. Rather than holding a town hall, and having a discussion, I felt like it was better to just put it in writing. To do that, I need all five councilmen with input, and we come up with a statement."

ALDOT Chief of Communications Tony Harris didn't offer any details into the negotiations other than they are ongoing.

"Discussions remain ongoing to determine whether the bridge company can offer an alternative that may relieve congestion on Highway 59," Harris said.

Among the proposals the bridge company has laid on the table include \$10 million upfront for the city of Orange Beach and \$1 million a year for 50 years thereafter, \$25 million to ALDOT to help with construction of the spur road from the Foley Beach Express to Cotton Creek Drive in Gulf Shores and after 50 years BCBC would give the toll bridges to the state.

Council considers amendment to require garages for townhouses

At its Aug. 22 regular meeting, Gulf Shores City Council discussed an amendment to the multi-family and townhouse use regulations in the zoning ordinance to better control growth on 100s of acres of undeveloped property in the city.

Among the changes it would require individual lots for townhouse dwellings, change area and dimensional requirements for townhouses, require garages for townhouses and apply open space, access, circulation and parking and infrastructure and architectural regulations to new townhouse developments.

The Planning Commission recommended the council pass the amendment.

At the same meeting, Council adopted a 2023 transportation plan which is required to apply for Rebuild Alabama Gas Tax Funds for several projects the city has on the drawing board and ready to go out for bid.

Part of the terms of the new gas tax passed in 2019 includes allocating about 8 percent of the funds generated by the new tax to be paid to municipalities based on certain criteria. One of those is having a transportation plan adopted by Aug. 31 of each year for the following year.

Among the projects Gulf Shores has planned and funded in the 2023 budget include:

• State Route 59 widening from the redlight at Target to Fort Morgan Road

• North Waterway Boulevard East extension

• A pedestrian bridge over the Intracoastal Waterway at the 90-degree turn from Canal Road to East Second Street

• The first phase of the County Road 6 to Coastal Gateway Boulevard connector road

• Phase two of improvements in the Gulf Beach Walking District

• Annual city streets resurfacing and pedestrian improvements

Under the rules of disbursement of the Rebuild Alabama gas tax laws, Gulf Shores is eligible for about \$100,000. Besides developing the transportation plan, the city must also post the plan for the public to see. Other criteria include:

• Creating a receivable account and expenditure account for the Rebuild Alabama funds.

• The City must utilize pre-approved ALDOT contractors and material suppliers to implement the Transportation Plan.

• The city engineer has to present to the Council a written report detailing expenditures made from the fund and the status of the adopted Transportation Plan. The written expenditure details are included in our annual budget book.

• Each Oct. 1 the city has to give a list of contractors who have been awarded projects to the Senate president pro tempore, the speaker of the house, and the chair of the Joint Transportation Committee.

• The city shall publish the project plans and bid openings on a website maintained by the League of Municipalities.

• The city shall follow state bid laws when awarding contracts and follow state closeout procedures.

So far, the city has received a total of \$148,707 in 2020-21 and is expecting to receive \$99,754 in 2022 for a total of new gas funds of \$248,461.

During the meeting, the council:

• OK'd a contract for Alabama Coastal Area Management Plan with the Alabama Department of Environmental Management to enforce the Division 8 Regulations for the coast. By doing so, the city is able to streamline the permitting process, hear variance requests and patrol the beaches within our permitting jurisdiction. ADEM will reimburse the city for \$66,550 for performing the tasks.

• OK'd a memorandum of understanding with the Baldwin County Commission to authorize the city's police and fire departments to use county radio channels. The three-year contract will annually cost the police department about \$20,000 and about \$12,000 for the fire department.



BCSD breaks ground on \$73 million job prep academy Industry partners will help train 10th-12th grade students

Baldwin County Board of Education members and BCSD officials, shovels in hand and the luxury of cover overhead, broke ground for the BCSD's Baldwin Preparatory Academy, a \$73 million building that will be set on a 50-acre site on Hwy. 59, two miles north of Interstate-10. The school is scheduled to open in the fall of 2024.

"This unique school will be teaching industry sponsored job development, career tech curriculum with college-level and dual enrollment opportunities, as well as internships and apprenticeships, with the area's leading employers. I am very excited about what we will be offering through this facility," said Eddie Tyler, BCSD superintendent

The academy will offer job prep programs in health sciences, automotive technology, cyber security, culinary arts, engineering, cosmetology, construction, welding, graphic design, HVAC, teaching, aviation and logistics. Industry partners will help train students in 10th-12 grades in industry-specific environments while also offering the core curriculum necessary to earn a high school degree.

"This is a great opportunity for our students to be ready for a career the day they graduate high school. Baldwin County Public Schools System is leading the way in workforce development in our state. Tremendous job by everyone involved in making this vision become a reality," said Alabama State Rep. Matt Simpson.

"This represents the most innovative education delivery method in Alabama," added Alabama State Senator Chris Elliott at the Aug. 17 ceremony. "Our kids will be career ready to enter the workforce as soon as the graduate from high school."

The school will have a huge economic impact on Baldwin County, as businesses and industries are looking to fill skilled positions in the 7th fastest-growing metropolitan area in the country.

Novelis, a leading sustainable aluminum solutions provider, has already started building a \$2.5 billion low-carbon recycling and rolling plant in Bay Minette that will create around 1,000 jobs when it opens in 2025.

"With industry support, this high school promises not only education but an opportunity for students to enter the workforce immediately in high-paying jobs," Tyler said.

Al. Conservation Officers deploy beagles for man hunts & missing person searches

The Ålabama Wildlife and Freshwater Fisheries (WFF) Division's Law Enforcement Section K-9 Unit has integrated the latest technology in its quest to track down poachers and those attempting to flee from law enforcement as well as missing persons.

In a training session held recently in Baldwin County, the WFF K-9 unit and other WFF Conservation Enforcement Officers (CEOs) demonstrated the use of a tracking system to the Baldwin County Sheriff's Department and law enforcement officers from several municipalities in the county.

The technology involves GPS tracking collars for the beagles used by the K9 Unit as well as a tracking unit that is on board the Alabama Law Enforcement Agency (ALEA) helicopter. When a search is in progress, each tracking

unit, worn by K-9s in the form of a collar, is displayed on a screen in the portable command center, CEO vehicles and the helicopter to maximize search efficiency.

The WFF K-9 Unit was created in 2019 after CEO Brad Gavins became interested in the Alabama Department of Corrections' (DOC) use of tracking dogs to find escaped prisoners. Corrections gave WFF one of their dogs to try and soon the K-9 unit came into existence. WFF now has eight tracking beagles deployed with Conservation Enforcement Officers around the state.

CEOs Jason McHenry of Au-

tauga County and Ben Kiser of Calhoun County are among the officers with tracking beagles, and they were among the WFF staff at the recent training session.

McHenry explained the practical rural canine training that occurred at Perdido River Wildlife Management Area. "We have a mock scenario set up where an individual, the suspect, is in the woods," McHenry said. "The initial officer on the scene has made a traffic stop. That individual has

fled into the woods. That officer has contacted his supervisor and asked for backup, which includes DOC, ALEA Aviation and Wildlife and Freshwater Fisheries to assist in establishing a perimeter and tracking."

McHenry said when the supervisor arrives at the scene, that individual sets up the incident command, which is the hub of communications. Responding officers check in at incident command to keep track of the officers in the field and issue assignments at the scene.

Hitching a ride with McHenry and Kiser, we loaded into McHenry's vehicle equipped with the Garmin DriveTrack tracking receiver and rode the perimeter as the WFF K-9 Unit unloaded their tracking dogs to pick up the scent at the site where the suspect entered the woods.

During the exercise, McHenry and Kiser were able to watch the screen and see the positions of the dogs and the ALEA helicopter as they performed the search for the suspect. This allowed the WFF CEOs to move their vehicle and personnel into a position to best intercept the suspect. Gavins, the CEO in Crenshaw County, is the team leader for the WFF K-9 unit, which procures all the beagles, man

tracking dogs from DOC already trained. The beagles are trained not to bark so the suspect won't be alerted to the tracking team's approach.

Gavins said the WFF K-9 Unit assists local law enforcement agencies on manhunts, and the recent training was the result of discussions on how to best coordinate their efforts and increase the chances of apprehending suspects or finding the missing persons as quickly as possible.

"We've had discussions on what goes right and what goes wrong during a manhunt," Gavins said. "We talked about what we can do to get the information out to the agencies that will be on scene,

setting up the search and communicating more efficiently so that we have a safer, more effective search.

"When the Garmin DriveTrack became available to our agency about a year ago, it worked out so well that our Wildlife and Freshwater Fisheries officers became perimeter security for many searches across the state. Since we can see where the canines are in real time on a satellite image map, it becomes possible to direct officers to the area that a suspect may be fleeing through or to an area where a lost child or person suffering from dementia or Alzheimer's disease may be located. We can see all the roads, food plots and terrain features. If the canines start





to get close to a road, our officers can shut down the road for the safety of the dogs or prepare for a fleeing fugitive."

The WFF officers can gather information from the ALEA helicopter and DOC and relay that information to the incident command center or whatever agency is in control of the scene.

Gavins said WFF works closely with the DOC and can assist in any search effort.

"We train with them and we already have the DOC tracking collar codes programmed into our computers," he said. "If they call and ask us to come to a certain county to assist them, we turn our computers on and we can see where their dogs are on the ground. We can immediately start assisting without having to find out where the dogs are."

Gavins said ALEA Aviation and several county aviation units tested the system and agreed to install a tracking unit in their aircraft.

"It's a game changer for a manhunt or a search for a missing person," Gavins said. "Sometimes the suspect can be miles ahead of the dogs. The helicopter knows where we are and can tell us if it's a hot track or a cold track. It actually helps them get in the area where the person is running, and it keeps them in the area where the person is. With this tactic, the suspect's focus remains on the aviation assets. It helps suppress the suspect's movement as long as the aircraft is there.

"Through interviews with suspects after they have been apprehended, it became evident that if the helicopter makes a loop or is gone to refuel, that's when a fugitive will try to cross a road or make a move. In the suspect's mind, if the aviation is in the area, they know where they are, which keeps their attention on the aviation instead of the other efforts with the tracking dogs and pursuing officers."

Gavins said once word spread of how successful the new technology was for performing searches, other law enforcement agencies became interested. The WFF K-9 Unit started working to develop a training course that would bring the outside enforcement agencies into the group. The training that was developed includes a morning of classroom discussion, followed by an afternoon of demonstrating the tracking system with WFF K-9s, WFF officers and the ALEA helicopter.

Gavins said the classroom discussion includes communications, incident command preparation and tracking site contamination mitigation techniques.

"When we developed the classroom portion and practical portion, one thing that was important was to clearly establish the call-out protocol for ALEA Aviation, DOC and Wildlife and Freshwater Fisheries," he said. "What ALEA Aviation stressed was that any enforcement agency that needed their help for a manhunt or finding a missing person should call right away instead of waiting eight or nine hours. ALEA's concern was found to be the same concern that all agencies involved in this training expressed.

"We talk about protocols to be followed for a missing person or suspect – things that need to be done before calling aviation or the K-9 unit. This falls into the hands of the first responding officer. The key is to set that up right away and not contaminate the area for the canines."

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Orange Beach Schools see 12 percent enrollment increase

The brand new Orange Beach City School System recorded a 12 percent increase in enrollment compared to K-12 enrollment figures from last scjhool year, before the separation from Baldwin County Schools. Orange Beach City Schools is currently serving 1,250 students; this number is inclusive of two preschool units. During the regular meeting of Orange Beach Board of Education, members unanimously approved the employment of an additional kindergarten and third-grade teacher to accommodate this increase. The school system will also conduct a search for two physical education aides.

Orange Beach & Foley to follow Gulf Shores' lead in using inmate labor

Everybody's hiring and everybody's looking for help so two coastal Alabama cities are turning to inmate labor to fill in gaps where workers are lacking.

"We're picking them up through the Alabama Department of Corrections program with their work release inmates from their program up in Loxley," Foley Mayor Ralph Hellmich said. "That program's been around here since I was a kid and they are routinely used out in the community."

At council meetings on Aug. 15 in Foley and Aug. 16 in Orange Beach, both cities passed resolutions to start using the inmate labor from the work release center. Several private businesses including several restaurants in the coastal area already use the inmates.

"We're doing a one-year on this and we will be doing it as-needed," Orange Beach City Administrator Ken Grimes said. "We'll use the work release folks. It's \$15 a day per person and then \$5 per person per day for transportation. We opted to have them deliver them."

In Foley, officials plan to start out slowly and see how the program works initially and then decide later if they want to hire more workers.

"We're going to start out real small with maybe four or five in our Public Works and see how it works out," Hellmich said. "They are going to be doing things like washing city vehicles, picking up trash on the road."

Hellmich says the city has several openings for those types of jobs but nobody to hire to fill them.

"Frankly, in this county right now there's a labor shortage especially of the entrance level jobs," Hellmich said. "People just don't want to do that so we want to try to fill the gap."

Grimes said his city will evaluate the workers the state sends to figure out

where they best fit in the city.

"Once we get used to the individuals just like a staffing company, we'll have more of an opportunity to figure out what their skill set is and use them where we feel appropriate," Grimes said. "Most of what we will use workers for will be on the right of ways and in the grass cutting, cleaning, picking up trash, etc. A lot of highway and roads working with the crews."

Gulf Shores already uses inmate labor in its landscaping, streets and maintenance departments.

Council Reports:

BCSS denied permit to expand Fort Morgan facility

The AL. Dept. of Environmental Management (ADEM) recently denied a permit to the privately owned Baldwin County Sewer System (BCSS) that would have allowed a 65 percent increase in the volume of wastewater to be treated at its plant on Fort Morgan Rd.

The City of Gulf Shores, the watchdog Little Lagoon Preservation Society and the vast majority of those attending a May 19 public meeting strongly opposed the permit application.

Considerable documentation of water quality within Little Lagoon spanning more than 14 years clearly indicates that Little Lagoon would benefit from no additional increases in the amount of permitted wastewater treatment at the Fort Morgan BCSS plant, according to LLPS president Dennis Hatfield.

Hatfield noted that the MBNEP data indicates a high nutrient zone exists in the area south of the BCSS plant, but it has yet to be determined if the WWTP effluent disposal ponds are a source of nutrients in Little Lagoon.

Additionally, the City of Gulf Shores issued a cease-and-desist order for a sludge pit BCSS built without the proper permitting on property directly adjacent to Little Lagoon Mobile Home Park.

BCSS, the state's largest private utility company, provides sewer service throughout Baldwin County. In a letter to the city, BCSS stated the sewer plant, built in 1986, was in operation long before the property was annexed into the city.

"The purpose of acquiring additional land around a sewer treatment plant is to allow for the use of the land for needed ponds or storage as deemed necessary to adequately and efficiently operate the sewer treatment plant," said Gerry McManus, controller with BCSS, in the June 10 response to the city.

"With all due respect, this sewer treatment plant has been in this location for over 30 years. For years, there were few residential properties near the plant. The residential development has come to the facility, and the property owners were clearly aware of the facilities existence when they purchased their property."

"We feel like it's as important to make that plant as benign as possible. We're not saying decommission it, but we are saying the technology exists to reduce nutrients and metals and to address the effluent surfacing before it gets to the Lagoon," Hatfield said. "All the tools exist for BCSS to do something for the environment."

Gulf Shores was awarded \$5.9M in RESTORE funding to implement programs that improve water quality, increase and enhance habitat area, and improve ecological productivity in Little Lagoon. The current five-year project will have secondary beneficial impacts to the region that include creating more resilient and sustainable infrastructure, and increased recreational and ecotourism opportunities.

Specific programs will include living shorelines, improved hydrologic connectivity of the existing canal system, conversion of approximately 200 individual septic systems to municipal sewer, shellfish restoration programs, marsh and seagrass restoration, hydrodynamic modeling, ecological research and long-term water quality monitoring.

PIER & SHORE FISHING OUTLOOK By DAVID "THE PIERPOUNDER" THORNTON

Summer is slipping away as we approach September's doorstep, meaning many good things are happening 'fishingwise' along the Alabama coast. It doesn't seem to get quite as hot during the day. And sunlit hours of the day are well over an hour less than just a couple of months ago. Sea life senses that by going into 'feeding frenzies' whenever the opportunity, and conditions allow in preparation of leaner times to come.

The present weather pattern of mostly early



morning or late afternoon thundershowers is likely to continue well into this fortnight, along with calmer than average seas. But we are fast approaching the historical peak of the Atlantic hurricane season. 'Bad' things can happen rather quickly this time of year, so let's pray we

are spared the worst!

Recently fishing activity sparked after several cloudy days allowed water temperatures to drop several degrees into the middle 80s. At the same time rapidly growing baitfish like the two to three inch long "LYs" (Scaled and False herring) have swarmed into the surfzone. They are looking for food (plankton) and shelter from larger fish like jacks, bluefish and mackerel. These fish are feeding a bit more heavily now in anticipation of the upcoming change of seasons and plentiful food source. Shorebound anglers can cash in on the fray with either live bait, or artificial offerings that resemble the natural prey. Three inch silver spoons are especially effective on foraging gamefish, as are jigs and plugs of similar size. Bubble Rigs may be even more productive this time of year. The splashing action attracts fish to it, especially on calm mornings when the predators may not be as aggressively chasing food.

Coincidentally, the NEAP tide period around

the end of August might make the bite generally a little more lethargic too. Otherwise we can expect early morning high tides with an outgoing tide the rest of the day.

This is often not the best situation to encourage gamefish to feed near the shore through out the day. So anything that tweaks the interest of target species (like mackerel, speckled trout and redfish) will give the angler an advantage. This rings quite true at Gulf State Park Pier, Perdido Pass seawall and jetties, and Little Lagoon Pass where concentrated fishing pressure can cause the fish to seem uninterested in striking lures with regularity.

The terms "swatting at" and "window shopping" are commonly used to describe the lackadaisical feeding attitude of fish at times like this. But small live LYs presented on light tackle are often the angler's answer to solve this riddle and get some fish in the box.

This is especially true when the water is clear and the wind and waves are slight. Of course these fish may be more easily lost because of the lighter line. But when you are getting two or three (or more) times as many strikes (as opposed to just one occasionally) it makes a great deal of difference overall.

There are several tackle items that can aid the angler's hook up rate with such a setup, while lowering the cut-off rate. Clear monofilament (or fluorocarbon) makes great leader material in 20#, 30#, 40# and 50#. Long shank single hooks (Aberdeen style) like # 1 or #2 Tru-Turn hooks. And using a short piece of light steel leader 27# or less will help a lot.

A trick anglers on the 'old' Gulf State Pier used to minimize cutoffs was to unravel a foot long piece of 90 pound Sevenstrand steel wire. The resulting 12# test wire works great to fool finicky mackerel that may otherwise be "leader-shy" The short, light leader was not intended to last all day, but is ideal for a few fish, and sure lessens the number of lost fish. Just use a net for anything larger than about 1.5 pounds.

Besides the spanish mackerel pier anglers have been catching, there have been some speckled trout, slot-sized redfish and mangrove snapper landed, along with a few flounder (mostly too small) plus the usual host of bycatch species. Live shrimp are the preferred bait on the pier, but hordes of hungry pinfish and jacks make fishing for the target species miserable at times. Light tackle is not what you want when you tussle with mangrove snapper however. These are tough adversaries in close quarters to pilings or rocks covered in sharp barnacles. Better to use medium heavy tackle with small hooks like a small circle hook. This has a good hookup ratio with live bait while abiding to local regulations. Be sure to check the regs on mangroves whichever state you are fishing in.

Beach fishing has been decent of late as good numbers of August pompano have been showing up all along the coast. Pro guides like Jordan Gooding (G2 Coastal) have been regularly catching pompano, and even occasional Alabama limits (3 fish per angler over 12" TL). Live sandfleas (mole crabs) have been Jordan's bait of choice, fished out deep (when the grass allows) on double dropper pompano rigs. Though the old standby 'shrimp and Fishbites' has been producing as well at times.

Meanwhile, 'keeper-sized' whiting have been relatively scarce in the surfzone, as they often are in late summer. But bounteous early morning surf casting action with feisty bluefish and ladyfish has been quite dependable for retired teacher Michael Brown (Dr. Mike's School of Fishing). Spoons are the mainstay for this fishery, though the action is far too often short lived. So be prepared to loose a little sleep and be on site at dawn in order to cash in on this top notch action. Interference by sea grass will continue to be only 'spotty' as long as the wind and seas remain relatively calm. The sea grass staying on bottom is also conducive for plugging the shoreline for jack crevalle, speckled trout and even pompano in many locations. Big topwater 'chuggers' can be used to entice big jacks into doing battle on heavy class spinning rigs. While 4 inch topwater lures (like Heddon spook) are often preferred for specks in the early morning. Watch out for big bluefish though!

Later into the day, or anytime there is a chop on the water's surface try a suspending bait like MirrOdine which mimics the small LYs. Speckled trout really like this lure and soft plastic minnow imitations too. Scattered pompano can be caught while wading and casting pompano jigs or 'Goofy jigs". These are slowly dragged along the bottom with periodic 'jumps' imparted by a flick of the wrist. The pompano usually strikes as the lure falls back to the bottom. There can be a good bit of bycatch with these lures, but the method offers a lot of action for the angler on relatively light tackle.

Hammerhead shark swims near shore in Orange Beach

A widely circulated facebook video post from Aug. 15 show what appears to be a 10 to 12 ft. Hammerhead shark swimming near shore while chasing stingrays in the shal-low part of the Gulf of Mexico at around 10 a.m. in Orange Beach. Catarena Peek, a touist from Texas, posted a video of the shark that was viewed 30,000 times within 24 hours. In the video, the shark appears to be distressed while in very shallow water and soon swims off. A common tropical and subtropical shark that inhabits the open ocean and the shallow coastal waters of the Gulf and the Atlantic Ocean, Hammerheads are often found in inlets and the mouths of bays. Scalloped Hammerheads are the most common in Alabama and average between 8 and 10 ft, with a maximum total length of about 14 ft.




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
