Experience The Oyster Fest Nov. 19 in G.S.

Grab the wide end of the half shell and slurp it down juice and all. Set it on the grill until the butter is bubbling and the cheese is melted.

There is no wrong way to eat an oyster. That's the message emanating from Murder Point Oyster Company, creators of "oysters worth killing for" and sponsors of the First Annual Experience - The Oyster event on Saturday, Nov. 19 from noon 'til 4 p.m. at The Hangout Courtyard in Gulf Shores.

Oysters sourced from 10 farms in South Alabama and a few others will be served at the fest, and 33 chefs from around the region will put their own take on those oysters during.

Appropriate select art venders and the Mario Mena Band will add to the atmosphere. Gulf Shores' own Big Beach Brewery will be among the vendors serving craft beers.

The \$75 general admission ticket is good for 18 individual oysters from any vendor and two drink tickets. There is also a VIP ticket option. Ticket info is available at experiencetheoyster.squarespace.com or eventbrite.com.

According to lore, Murder Point earned its name after a knife fight between two men over an oyster lease in Bayou La Batre back in 1929. The Zirlott family, owners of Murder Point Oysters, originally raised oysters in leased water off Murder Point. They have since moved their oyster farm to Sandy Bay, where it produces around 3 million shallow water oysters in the bays around Horn Island Pass. Their farm is the largest in Alabama.

The Zirlotts have been catching shrimp and fish off of the Alabama Coast for five generations. Their focus now is harvesting Eastern/American oysters (Crassostrea Virginia), a species that thrives in the unique conditions off Alabama's coastline. Because they are grown in a controlled environment, Murder Point oysters can be harvested exactly when they reach three inches. They use a long line method to harvest rows of baskets that are raised and lowered depending on tidal flows. This produces oysters known for the firmness of their meat.

According to the Murder Point website, its oysters have "a full, rich, creamy taste with a light metallic finish and a drop of butter flavor in each one."

"We were planning to do a little fest behind our storefront in Bayou La Batre and it very quickly grew into this," said Jennifer Russell, marketing director of the family business.

"Marti (Duncan) will do one large scale cooking demonstration, but all the other chefs will be set up to host little mini-parties.

"It's more of a tasting. than a celebrity meet-ngreet. People can move from party to party," she added. "It will be a little more personal. And we think people are going to love the smaller, more intimate setting."

In addition to the festival host, oyster farmers participating include: Crystal Coast - North Carolina; Island Time - Dauphin Island; Turtle Backs -Bayou La Batre; Low Country Oyster - South Carolina; Point of Pins - Grand Bay, Pelican Oyster Company - Tallahassee; Admiral Shellfish - Fort Morgan; Salty Bastards - Bayou La Batre; and Matheson Oysters - Virginia.

Murder Point Oyster Tips

Examine The Oyster

• Inspecting your oysters is a very important part of your shucking experience. Look at each oyster and examine the shell. As you take in the beauty make sure the oyster is tightly clamped and no liquor is dripping from the oyster. This will ensure your oyster is still alive and ready to eat. **Keep 'Em Cold**

Oysters should be maintained at a temperature between 32-40 degrees. For maximum shelf life, keep oysters refrigerated with the flat shell up, covered in a damp cloth. If you would like to keep oysters on ice, be sure they do not sit in the melting water. Oysters are a live product and will "drink" this water causing them to lose their salty flavor.

A Good Shuck

To properly shuck an oyster, hold it in a gloved hand cupped side down. Using an oyster knife, place the tip of the knife at the hinge of the oyster. Using pressure, twist the knife until the hinge pops open. Slide the knife between the two shells, releasing the abductor muscle and enjoy.

Killough was welcomed into the legion of Flora-Bama possible/probable musicians around the turn of the century and soon recruited arguably the Gulf Coast's best guitarist (John Joiner), drummer (Bryan Wheeler), bass player (Darrell Roberts), and vocalist (Larry T. Wilson) to back him up both on the road for sweet gigs such as the Bum Phillips Charity Golf Tourney. The band, The Dixie Flyers, was able to record one CD, before Wheeler and then Larry T. passed away.

By the time he joined the Bama regulars, Rock had already hung four gold records in his home and performed with The Oak Ridge Boys, Sammy Kershaw, Randy Travis, Brenda Lee, Waylon Jennings, Hank Jr., Merle Haggard, David Fizzell, Larry Cordle, Jerry Reed, Carole King, Jerry Jeff Walker and Mickey Newbury.

Always a storyteller anyway, Rock has gathered his wit and wisdom and put it into a book that includes an audio version scored by Craig Morris.

A country boy from Greenville, Rock currently lives in a cabin near Guntersville on land owned by his niece and her husband. The Greenville native honed his songwriting skills during a stint in the Army, and continued on that path in college at Auburn. In 1976 he connected in Nashville with HOF songwriter Hank Cochran. That led to a publishing deal and an appearance on the first "Austin City Limits" songwriter's special with Floyd Tillman, Sonny Throckmorton, Hank Cochran, Red Lane, Willie Nelson and Whitey Shafer.

Rock has assembled a book of essays that are more about living a laid back life than gossip about his famous friends. His stories in the quick-read/picture filled book are often self-deprecating and always heartfelt.

Humorous and charming in person, Rock's book also writes with little pretention, whether the topic is gardening, old haunts like the 'Bama and The Auburn Supper Club, favorite songwriters such as Billy Joe Reynolds or suffering the effects of food poisoning on his way to play at Jensen's Marina on Captiva Island.

Although losing more of his compadres every year, Rock still plays house gigs and at songwriters fests. And he is still producing music, despite enduring health issues such as atrial fibrillation and openheart bypass surgery.

"Sometimes it's hard to keep my spirits up, what with being a shorttimer and all," he writes. "But sitting on the porch, getting to see the sun come and go, with the wind whispering in the pines, I feel the certainty of that line, "He restoreth my soul." (**By Fran Thompson**) Ad. Barbato on other side of the bar at Front Porch LuckyDoggs band leader opens music bistro in Lillian

It may have been three years too late for Haight-Asbury's Summer of Love, but NOLA, specifically its French Quarter, was teaming with young drop-outs back in 1970. Johnny Barbato was

among them. He was all of 15 years old.

"The French Quarter was hippie heaven," said the proprietor of Johnny B's Front Porch in Lillian, "I wasn't running away from anything. I came from a very nice family. I was just stupid. The French Quarter was full of kids from the suburbs

like me looking to party."

A junior Louisiana state golf champion several times over (his father was a golf pro) and the starting quarterback for Holy Cross High School in the 9th Ward, Johnny said he was crashing at "The Green House on Broad St." until he got pulled over riding a Honda 90 CC motorcycle that he conveniently borrowed so often that he forgot he was never given permission to do so.

"You could start that bike without a key," he said. "I was going to bring it back."

Given the choice of a juvenile facility in Mandeville or going back home to Mobile, where his family had moved, Johnny made the 144 mile leap to the Port City and Davidson High School.

"I had never even been to school with girls before, and I was used to being the biggest, toughest and fastest player on the football team," he said.

That was not the case at Davidson, where QB Richard Todd reigned. Todd would go on to start for Alabama and play 11 years in the NFL, including two with the Saints (1984–1985), after being drafted no. 6 overall by the Jets.

Johnny caught passes from Todd as a tight end and kicked field goals for two vears before taking over at QB on his way to an expected college scholarship.

Instead, wary of the beating he was taking and not sure he would ever recover from a painful shoulder injury, he and a friend, on a whim, enlisted in the Army

"Just like in the movie. We showed up the next day and we were in," he said. Johnny made a great connection during basic training and spent his entire Army committment as an on-base golf pro in Petersburg, VA. "I ran a golf course for two years. It was the best job I've ever had," he said.

He was already strumming his guitar and singing Waylon, Willie and Jerry Jeff songs as a solo act when he started running around with Port City blues players that included David Moody, JW Slyde and Wick Larson.

"The show became about Luther. It was never the plan. It was like watching a quarterback call audibles. I wouldn't have had a career in music without him."

That led to the formation of his first band, Southbound, and what he calls a musical apprenticeship under the tutelage of guitarist Luther Wamble. "Luther was probably better then than he ever got to be as a grown man. He didn't think. He just played, and it was with a vengeance," Johnny said. "He

was playing music I had never heard before. It was something special.

"It opened up a whole world when I had Luther at my side," he added. "I learned how to direct my own bands by watching him command a stage."

Southbound, a Charlie Daniels loving ensemble of Mobile's best in cowboy hats, had a residency at Thirsty's and also played at Red's, the first bar on Dauphin St. The band also played at The Blues Tavern and at Traders on the Mobile Causeway.

Johnny has many stories about band trips to Pleasure Island just as it was growing into the national tourist destination it is today. He would gig at LA Pub & Grub, listen to Jessie James at The Dirty Bird (The Seagull), party with Shine Powell at the club he owned with his wife, Sam, and drop in on Kenny Stabler at The End Zone.

At one point, Johnny says he and Luther (pictured to left of Johnny) got in a car and went looking for the crossroads to make the pact in pursuit of musical stardom.

"When I got busted, Topper Price was the mac-daddy in town. He was the greatest entertainer I've ever seen in my life," Johnny said. "But Topper believed you had to go to that certain place in your mind to play the blues.'

That bust, for trafficking drugs, got

Johnny three years in the federal prison at Maxwell AFB. While doing time, in addition to swearing off hard drugs for life, Johnny started writing songs that he would play for a producer in jail for tax evasion who was married to a then Mobile based country singer.

"It was just effing time. That's all. I'd play him my songs and he'd tell me they sucked - over and over," Johnny said. "Finally I played him a song that he complimented me on. He was right. They were bad. It was just prison stuff. Pretty comical, looking back.'

Back in Mobile, Johnny re-united with Wamble, who was spending time in and out of Gatemouth Brown's band, and they formed The Lucky Doggs.

He would be hard pressed to name all the players who went on stage with that band in the past 30 years, but guitarists included Ricky Chauncey and Corky Hughes. Leaves from the band's tree also included Keith Lee, Steve Carmen, Zach Taylor, Donnie Skidmore, Rat Connell. Rick Rains and current members

Britt Meacham, Cathy Pace and Dave Padgett.

Even though they were in competing bands on the SEC fraternity circuit, Johnny still has high praise for George Eberlein of Mr. X and Rick Carter of Telluride.


"George Eberlein (a Fairhope grad) was just shredding it with Mr. X. Rick Carter's band was huge. But he was always such a gentleman to me. He helped me get a gig at City Stages."

Great musicians (Wet Willie to Will & The Bushmen to The Filthy Rich) were abundant on the Gulf Coast then. And they still are (Lee Yankee, Grayson & Corky, Justin Fobes, et al). But Johnny said nobody has ever influenced him like Luther.

"Luther just killed it. People - even the band - would stop what they were doing and just pay attention. The show became about him. It was never the plan. But he would just go off. It was like watching a quarterback call audibles while looking out over the defense.

"I would not have had a career in the music business without him. Even in my guitar playing, I hear a lot of Luther. He did the simple things so well that nobody else sounded like him," he added.

Johnny also re-acquainted himself with the Flora-Bama and the bistro's holy trinity of original possible/probable per-

formers: Ken Lambert, Jimmy Louis and J Hawkins.

"Man, Lambert and Hawkins. Those guys were outlaws. And then you add Louis. You'll never again find three outlaws playing in the same place like that," he said.

"People had no idea how good they were when they came in. But they soon found out. J didn't just strum, he beat the strings. I was intimidated by those guys."

Johnny said he found playing in front of FBISF founder/Bama owner Joe Gilchrist especially intimidating.

"The battle of my life was learning how to not be afraid on that stage. It used to scare me to death when Joe would come in with his friends. And there was no greater satisfaction than knowing you hit a home run in front of Joe. Nothing could match that experience," he said.

Johnny said he learned how to play lead guitar accompanying the greatest Flora-Bama performer ever, Rusty McHugh. This was before Rusty's childhood friend Mike Fincher showed up and claimed that gig. "Those two were as connected as me and Luther," he said.

The Lucky Doggs have played national festivals and opened for The Black Crows and, through their connection with Gilchrist, played a gig at the White House for the Florida Caucus.

"That was a crazy good band and we worked hard," Johnny said. "I liked being on the road. So it was no big deal for me. But we'd take off for North Carolina on Wednesday and work our way back through Atlanta to play at the Flora-Bama every Sunday. We had that Sunday gig for many years."

Barbato recorded No Pain - No Gain (with Jon Cook, Brock Barreman, Mark Laborde and Howie Johnson) in 1994, and somewhere around that time, he and Luther, both by then Christians, tried to play on the gospel music circuit.

"Our music was too weird a fit into gospel," he said. "We were playing prisons and churches. But our music was just not intended to play at church."

Johnny said his life changed for the better when his great niece Madison came to live with him when she was 10. Now 22, Madison began working at The Front Porch when she was 18, and it was through Madison that Johnny befriended the Front Porch owner and was eventually able to buy the business and the property at terms that were much, much less than market value.

"I took a 9 to 5 job when Madison came to me," he said. "But I was still playing four nights a week. It was the only time God spoke directly to me in my life. He said, "This is yours.' and I never questioned it."

He said he was more than ready when he was presented with the incredible business opportunity to run a bistro that showcased live music.

"Those old blues clubs gave way to franchises and corporation owned restaurants," he said. "I wanted to try to recreate something that had an old school feel to it. And that all goes back to Joe (Gilchrist). Much of it was tough love. But Joe loved me and he taught me a lot. I ask myself, 'what would Joe do?' all the time."

With live music six days a week, the Front Porch hopes to be a foundation for songwriters to work on their craft and mature as performers.

"When I book an act, I am not looking for pretty girls more interested in being an artist than playing a room. I want to know if they can hold a crowd," he said. "Once you can do that, the crowd will listen. That's what Joe did at the Flora-Bama. He taught people to listen to music."

His bistro is part of this year's FBISF, but Johnny said he also plans to hold the first Hwy. 98 Songwriters Fest over one weekend in late March. He will recruit two other places that front Hwy. 98 and the fest will include an old Flora-Bama player night. It is all part of his plan to make The Front Porch a music venue with food rather than a restaurant that books music. If that doesn't work out, he will have no regrets.

"I didn't have anything when I got here, and if I don't have anything when I leave, that's OK," he said.

The Front Porch is now in its second year and Johnny has taken on a partner (Rick Douglas) to lesson his load, but the 67 year old still works 85 hours a week.

"I enjoy what I'm doing and I believe in what I am doing," he said. "I believe the world is going to come to me eventually. I've never been driven by money. I wanted to satisfy my heart, and that's what I am doing with this."

Early fests were strictly Flora-Bama affairs

Robert Sutton/Bill Wilson gave fest a western outpost at Barefoot

The first mention of the Frank Brown Songwriters Festival from newspapers in my archives was a story filed by Bob Hyer from November of 1989.

That same issue had what might still be a timely story from the late great Birney Jarvis about relations being contentious between Pleasure Island's two cities. Orange Beach had incorporated five years earlier, the same year that Flora-Bama owner Joe Gilchrist started his songwriter's fest with a sparsely attended and bank account draining first and last show at the Saenger in downtown Pensacola.

Birney wrote that Orange Beach Mayor Ronnie Callaway spoke to the Gulf Shores Rotary and announced that the city had \$500K in the bank drawing interest and revenues of about \$2 million, with \$250K of that collected in taxes from the Perdido Beach Hilton (Resort), plenty enough to pay the city's 38 employees.

A charter member of the Hell's Angels, a Golden Gloves boxer and martial arts instructor who stopped counting his bar fights at 200, Birney drank only Busch beer before 5 p.m. and vodka after that. And he was the guy showing me the ropes around here. Just his sailing exploits and career with 14 newspapers were worthy of the autobiography Birney would eventually write.

That issue also included a story about Andy Andrews, the Country Comedian, written by Jennifer Brust and a story about Point Rest. owner David Lively raising funds so Chief Del Levis could buy a defibrillator for the Innerarity Pt. Fire Dept.

I have not spoken to Bob Hyer in years, but I know he's around, as I still see him running with pace across the Perdido Pass Bridge, just as he used to do then.

Bob worked at the 'Bama and was writing a book about the famed Lounge-on-the-Line. I don't believe that book was ever published. But I would love to see Bob's notes and combine them with my own research and memories and transcriptions from the hours of interviews that Spencer Adams and Trevor Towle conducted to produce easily the best documentary yet about everybody's favorite bar. "

The Last American Roadhouse the Documentary of the FloraBama" was the title and the boys, serious filmmakers both, were in the middle of their mostly musician interviews when Ivan hit in Sept. of 2004. Amazingly, the committee was able to scrap together a semblance of a FBISF just two months later.

Bob"s story was about Red Lane, who helped headline the first fest and was an FBISF mainstay until he passed back in 2015. It also included a few paragraphs about Randy Branch, who I befriended when I became involved with the Lower Alabama Songwriters Fest in Fairhope many years later. Randy was co-founder of that fest. He is still plugging away on the Eastern Shore selling real estate and playing gigs when the mood strikes him.

"If indeed I had one place to play as a solo artist, it would be the Flora-Bama," Randy said in Bob's story. Raise a hand if you've heard a musician say that before.

Bob also interviewed Hutson Brook and Kent Cuchaine and mentioned that the great blues historian/guitarist Spencer Bohren was coming over from NOLA to play.

In 1990, I misspelled songwriter/musician/nurse Dar-

rell Roberts' name in the story he penned about the fest. My misspelling of names would become a theme over my next 32 years of covering the fest.

The fest, after the financial debacle downtown, had moved to where it belonged - the 'Bama main room. Darrell reported that the entire fest would be recorded and made available on cassette tapes. He mentioned Hank Cochran, Bertie Higgins, Lane, Larry Jon Wilson and Richard Gilewitz among the visiting writers.

As I remember it, Gilewitz played a 12 string and he was paid to support a certain company's guitar strings while he traveled from gig to gig. He was the first person I heard refer to the Flora-Bama as "the kind of place where you wipe your feet on the way out."

I'm sure Alan Rhody also played that 1990 fest. He, like Gilewitz, was a traveling troubadour. We all looked forward to when they would come hang and play at the Flora-Bama for a few days.

Rhody's first big hit was also the Oak Ridge Boys' first no. 1 song. "I'll Be True to You" spent a total of eleven weeks on the country chart and helped that Atmore based family band make the transition from gospel band to country legends.

The Oak Ridge Boys would also play a role in the FBISF's expansion outside of the Flora-Bama to the late great Barefoot Bar (located between The Spot and Adolph's) on Gulf Shores Public Beach in 1992.

Robert Sutton, who co-owned the Barefoot with Bill Wilson, was from Atmore and a lifelong friend of the Oak Ridge's William Lee Golden and his son Rusty.

Robert had previously ran interference for an Oak Ridge Boys beach concert near the Gulf State Park Pier.

With Rusty booking the talent, the Barefoot started putting on shows for nine of what was then an 11 day FBISF run. There was no shush patrol and no cover at the Barefoot. Billy Dean, T Graham Brown and Jimbeau Henson were among the long list of writers who played for the price of a hotel billet and some meals.

"I give all the credit to Joe Gilchrist for turning this loose to other venues," Sutton said later in the Mullet Wrapper. "It just keeps growing every year. So, we must be doing something right. The writers keep coming back. That's how you know you are creating the right atmosphere.

"These guys are what I consider America's poets," he added. "They write about our loves, passions, wars. They chronicle everything we do. That's what I enjoy most about sitting here and listening. It's not the music I hear, it's the poetry."

Years later, I happened to be coming into the Flora-Bama behind Jeffrey Steele, who was on a roll at the time. I wouldn't have known all that, if I had not just heard him play about six number one hits at a packed out Barefoot. He didn't have his wallet, and the door attendant was under strict instructions from Joe. I am proud to say I was able to fish out a fiver and send Jeffrey into the main room to meet his pals.

Other tidbits from the early FBISF days.

Eric McDonald's 1997 poster was a painting. Eric had already made his bones doing celebrity portraits and had a hand in portraits that hung in the White House.
Ricky Whitley, Donna Slater, Cathy Pace and Capt. Eddie were listed among the must-see shows in 1995. The first three will be playing this year. I have seen a

pic of Ricky playing guitar next to John Prine at the Flora-Bama on his facebook page. I believe Ricky has also written a 'Bamacentric autobiography.

• In 1997, Guy Clark headlined an FBISF show at the Erie Meyer Civic Center. The table setters were not to shabby either: Sonny Throckmorton, Bruce Channel, Rock Killough and Craig Dilligham.

• Brent Burns, the official songwriter for our Visitor's Bureau, was the MC for that show. A multiple Trop Rocker of the Year award winner, Brent tells stories before every song and he plays only songs he wrote. And he's been doing that on this island a couple times a week since the 1970's. How cool is that?

• Larry Butler, the first Nashcat to win a producer Grammy and the only person to win Grammy's for producer (Kenny Rodgers' The Gambler) and writer (Somebody Done Somebody Wrong Song) added his star power to the fest when he returned to his Pensacola hometown to open LB's Country Cafe on the grounds of Perdido Bay Country Club. The bistro's walls were lined with memorabilia from Butler's Nashville years. • In 1992, ASCAP introduced a songwriter seminar and Jim Beam kicked in a \$1,000 grant for the writer of a song played at the fest that best "surrounds" the Jim Beam name.

• He had played at the Flora-Bama once before. But Mickey Newbury's FBISF debut was among the best of many great moments for the fest founder. Joe Gilchrist loved Mickey. So did Pat Richardson, who somehow tracked down the show and the fest from Richmond. "His is feeling music. He sings about things you can sink your teeth into. That have meaning. He doesn't just sing a song. He paints it," Pat said. "I told him 'when I go to heaven, I hope the Angels sing like you."

• I am not sure if it has been tweaked since then, but the mission statement for the FBISF back in 1990: "To increase recognition of songwriters and their artistic talent, to provide songwriters an opportunity to interact with their peers in an idyllic setting and to provide professional growth to aspiring songwriters."

• The Mobile Songwriters Assn. sponsored a writers' night at the Seaspray Lounge at the old Gulf State Park Resort. George Rohm and Tammy Vice of the Port City Writers organized the show. Johnny Barbato (profiled on the previous two pages) was one of the featured writers in 1998. "It's humbling that the Songwriters Fest has welcomed us aboard with them," Rohm said.

• The Baldwin Museum of Art in Foley featured the Images of Musicians Art Exhibit featuring functional instrument art lamps from Nick Branch and paintings from Rhody, who designed several fest posters. Both will play the fest this year.

• Although he had played the 'Bama before, Bill Jo Shaver and his son Eddie made their FBISF debut in 1998, and, as always with those two, it resulted in that musical magic that fest regulars live for.

• In 1998, we profiled a then 19 year old Guthrie Trapp, who would soon be slinging his guitar in Nashville. Guthrie was raised in Lillian by a music loving family and surely was playing at the fest before he was a teen. "I would still like to learn how to sing," he told our Michelle McCambridge. "I'm more willing to try weird stuff and experiment with the mandolin than my voice." I love what the late Larry T. Wilson, a terrific songwriter and Baldwin County High School grad, said in that story: "When you listen to his guitar playing, you don't realize that he ain't but 19. What's he going to be like when he's 30? I can tell you. He's going to be a certified monster." McCambridge noted that Guthrie, who now has students all over the world, was sharing guitar licks and talking music at school assemblies even then.



New state permit record set for second time this year Rash of rare tropical species being caught on Al. Coast this month

By David "Pierpounder" Thornton For the second time this year, the Alabama state record for Permit has been broken! In of itself this may not be much of an anomaly, but when put in perspective along with other recent rare catches along the Gulf beaches, it possibly offers further evidence supporting a long term shift of some 'new' fish populations into our area.

Juvenile permit along with other more tropical type fish species have occasionally been observed and documented in our waters in the past. However, their frequency of occurrence seems to be increasing in recent years, along with their size.

Besides the scattered permit we have grown accustomed to hearing about, there has been a rash of species catches even rarer for our region this month. Palometa, closely related to permit and pompano, and even bonefish (over a pound) have been landed along the Alabama Coast and Florida Panhandle. These species are more typically indigenous to the warm, shallow coastal waters off southwest Florida and the Keys.

Does the widespread use of social media by an increasing number of beach fishing anglers simply draw more attention to these occasional natural oddities?

Another difficulty in saying for sure the appearance of these fish is further evidence of climate change is clouded by the unusual course and intensity of Hurricane Ian across Florida at the end of September. Post-storm visible satellite images showed an immense plume of discolored water pushed more than a hundred miles offshore from the Florida Peninsula.

Meanwhile, here we experienced a 'gale force' offshore wind followed by several weeks of calm and clear water conditions similar to that typically experienced along the southwestern Florida coastline. Plus, it is not unprecedented for a major hurricane to displace fish.

Even reef fish may be moved hundreds of miles into areas outside their normal range during a major storm. Like in 1985 when Hurricane Elena moved millions of gag grouper from the Big Bend area of Florida to the northern Gulf Coast. They stayed a few months until winter, then returned to their native waters.

In time, based on observations, we may draw better conclusions that establish whether or not these fish have indeed become established and breed in our area.

12 oz. uncooked penne

- 1 pound medium-size peeled, deveined raw shrimp
- 1 c. frozen sweet peas
- 1 (7 oz.) container refrigerated basil pesto
- 1/4 tsp) kosher salt
- 1/4 tsp. black pepper
- 1 oz. Parmesan cheese, shaved (about 1/2 c.)

Prepare pasta according to package directions in a pot of salted boiling water, adding shrimp and peas to water during final 2 minutes of cook time. Drain pasta mixture, reserving 1/2 cup cooking water in a small heatproof bowl. Return pasta mixture to pot. Add pesto, salt, and pepper to pasta mixture; stir to combine. Stir in reserved cooking water as needed, 1/4 cup at a time, until desired consistency is reached. Transfer pasta mixture to a serving bowl; sprinkle with Parmesan. Serve immediately. Note: A better pesto is Bear Pond Farm Premium Basil Pesto. It tastes fresher and more homemade. It is in the refrigerator case.



-WHAT'S HAPPENING-

PIER & SHORE FISHING OUTLOOK By David "The Pierpounder" Thornton

Recent air and water temperatures are just about where we expect them to be in early November. Every few days another front ushers in a day or two of increasing rain chances and rising surf, followed by cooler, drier air from the north



with clearing skies. That's when the water in the back bays and waterways may drop below 70. Meanwhile, the Gulf water temperature has been slipping into the low 70s with the cooler air and shorter length of clays.

These contrasts set up the dynamics for good fall fishing along the

coast. At the top of the list is the bull red bite at the end of the Fort Morgan peninsula. Though there are still some brutish jack crevelle and blacktip sharks in the surfzone along with occasional large black drum, it is the big redfish that take center stage this time of year.

They school up near the south end of Mobile Bay to intercept scores of mullet, menhaden and other smaller finfish that are leaving the bay to seek the relatively warmer waters of the deeper Gulf through the upcoming winter.

It's a long hike to the Point from the parking lots at Fort Morgan, and often a cold one in the early morning. But nothing warms the muscles and flexes the stiff joints of shorebound anglers on a chilly fall day quite like the pull of a big redfish.

These specimens commonly exceed 40 inches in length and weigh over 20 pounds. Surf rods from 7 to 14 feet are utilized by these fishermen intent on 'trophy fishing' for reds. The reels are usually spinning type in the 5000 or larger series capable of holding at least 250 yards of 20 to 40 pound line. Often they need to heave a heavy bait (chunk of cut fish or crab) 50 to 75 yards from shore into the rough surf to find the fish.

Big waves and strong currents, which drive the intensity of the bite often require weights in excess of 6 to 8 ounces just to keep the bait in place on the bottom while waiting for a bite. Sometimes that may be hours apart, but some days the action may be almost non-stop for hours. Yep, that's why they call it fishing.

Fortunately there are plenty of other options available to fishermen that may not require such herculean efforts. Though keep in mind flounder season is closed in Alabama and Florida through November.

Pompano are still on the list of possibilities though, as are whiting, bluefish and sheepshead. As coastal waters cool, sheepshead move out of their warm water haunts in the estuaries and gather up nearer the passes. They orient tightly to 'hard structures' like rock jetties, seawalls and pier pilings, often actively feeding on algae along with occasional invertebrates they find on these structures. Live shrimp in various presentations are often used, but they like fiddler crabs too. Fiddlers are a little less susceptible to being 'nibbled' by overly abundant and aggressive pinfish than shrimp are.

In certain conditions, sheepshead prefer fiddler crabs, though you never know what they might eat. Ghost shrimp and hermit crabs are commonly used as alternative baits for sheepshead. They may also be caught on sand fleas, pieces of crabs, oysters, barnacles, clams and mussels but very rarely on lures. In any case a good presentation is usually key to getting sheepshead to take a bait, especially in calm, clear water. The fun part is they can be caught on tackle as light as the angler wishes to try. Lighter line often garners more bites, as does smaller hooks and lighter weights unless there is a strong current or wind. Don't be afraid to experiment with bait, tackle and other presentation forms to find the bite.

Recently, clear water has been an issue at times around Perdido Pass with the dredging operation. Plus access to the southern half of the west jetty has been closed off to shore-bound fisherman. The good news is this short term project should be wrapping up soon and access restored. Look for NEAP tides to be a factor around November 5, but stronger tides will prevail through the rest of this fortnight. If we have clear skies around the full moon November 8th night fishing will be pretty well illuminated.

As the water in the surf zone cools off, the bite for pompano fishermen should get 'cleaner'. The small jacks and croakers should be just about gone now, so using ghost shrimp becomes an even better option. Seagrass in the surf is still an issue in spots, but anglers willing to move to other venues are often able to find cleaner water to fish in.

Pier fishers at the Gulf State Park and Fort Morgan are going to have fewer options this month with the flounder closure. But hopefully sheepshead will more than take up the slack. Plus there should be a good variety of 'pan fish' on bottom like croakers, white trout and ground mullet. Try fresh dead shrimp on bottom for those. Though much less prevalent, spanish mackerel may still be available at the Gulf State Park Pier and west jetty at Perdido Pass. White jigs, spoons or small diving plugs will work for them.

Flounder population rebounds in Alabama waters

Fingerlings raised in Gulf Shores being released in estuaries

More good news is coming from the coastal waters of Alabama with a rebound in the flounder population, which had suffered a significant downturn in the past decade.

Flounder season will be closed the entire month of November to both commercial and recreational harvest to protect the fall spawning migration. Several years ago, the bag limit was reduced to five per person and the size limit was increased to 14 inches total length.

"We're going to take a look at our landings since we made management changes to look for indications of improvement," Bannon said. "I've talked with local fishermen, and they felt like they had seen an increase in numbers. I use social media as my fishing barometer. You don't take pictures of what you don't catch. I've really seen a lot of great flounder catches.

"Those are good indicators of any of the species. While it's not a scientific method, it helps us know what people are catching and seeing."

MRD is raising flounder fingerlings from broodstock at the Claude Peteet Mariculture Center in Gulf Shores and releasing those fingerlings at various points in coastal estuaries. Bannon said that program continues, and MRD has provided special permits for several inshore tournaments to provide live flounder to be used for broodstock at the mariculture center.

"To exchange our broodstock to keep it genetically diverse, the best way to do that is to provide permits for fishing tournaments to harvest undersized flounder," Bannon said. "Most males don't reach the 14-inch size limit. Most of the legal flounder you catch are females. So, we provide the permits for anglers to bring in undersized and legal-size flounder alive that they would like to turn in. We provide a truck with tanks and members of our staff to collect the flounder. The anglers are extremely excited to participate. They feel like they are part of the process, and it's the most efficient way for us to get broodstock from Alabama wildcaught fish."






