Red Hot Chili Peppers will play next year's Hangout Fest on May 19

An hour before the official press release hit my inbox, I wrote a story about The Red Hot Chili Peppers website announcement of their gig at The Hangout Fest on May 19. The band was scheduled to headline in 2020 (along with Billie Elish), the first of two consecutive festivals that fell victim to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Started in 2010 as oil spewed from the Deepwater Horizon oil rig and drifted towards us, the Hangout Fest is described in the release beautifully: "The soundtrack to your quintessential beach vacation on the majestic white sand beaches of Gulf Shores."

This year's fest takes place May 19-21. Other top acts include SZA, Calvin Harris, Paramore and Lil Nas X. Beach vacation packages went on sale last month and ticket pre-sales started on Dec. 9. General admission tickets are priced at \$319 plus fees or \$299 plus fees, if you buy four at a time. Three other ticket upgrades are available. Access tickets at hangoutmusicfest.com.

The fest release also aptly described the fest as "a weekend defined by dancing in the sand with your best friends and listening to your favorite artists in one of North America's most beautiful destinations." That also hits the mark.

To paraphrase the press release issued by Diament Public Relations, this year's line-up includes:

- Rock: The Red Hot Chili Peppers are described as "legendary." That is legit. Before and after the Hangout, the band is slated for stadium gigs in Houston and Dallas, respectively.
- Pop-punk: The genre is alive and well with Paramore leading the way supported by Mayday Parade and The Maine.
- Pop Rock Sub-Genres: Indie-rock and Americana are well-represented with The Backseat Lovers, Rainbow Kitten Surprise, Noah Kahan, COIN and Alabama's own The Vegabonds. True that. Ed Sheeran ain't got nuttin' on Noah Kahan (except for international fame and \$500K guarantees). And Rainbow Kitten Surprise's Dec. 16 show at the Mobile Saenger is sold out.
- Pop, Indie & Singer-Songwriters: SZA plays hypnotic R&B; Calvin Harris and Lil Nas X fans will dance their hearts out: AJR is about brotherly indie harmonies and Tove Lo is iconic.
- **Hyped:** Attendees will find out what all the hype

is about at Ashe, Stephen Sanchez, Jessie Murph and Sabrina Carpenter.

- **Hip-Hop:** The fest is going to roll out its red carpet (or maybe one of those blue beach mats) for A\$AP Mob's FERG and the fiercely independent Russ. The reigning queen of Memphis rap, GloRilla will come proper, and Grammy-winning R&B bassist Thundercat will bring his larger than life live spectacle. The Kid LAROI will rap with an Australian accent, and Baton Rouge's Kevin Gates probably knows my youngest kid's beau, Joseph Swiger, who has been recording most of the rappers from that beautiful river town for about five years.
- Dance Music: Another Aussie act, Flume gets top billing and may trade a few "G'day, mates" with The Kid LAROI. The genre-bending producer Skrillex and his ilk are the main reason the fest will sell out to attendees between 18 and 28. Fans will go mental listening to REZZ and Alison Wonderland, both larger than life dance icons. Gryffin, Said The Sky, Big Wild and Two Feet will provide chiller strains, and house heads will unite (close to the stage, I presume) at John Summit, Dr. Fresch, Aluna and HoneyLuv.
- Country: Fest bookers stated that they wanted to give a nod to their southern roots, so they sprinkled in Priscilla Block, MIKE, and Kidd G to provide southern vibes.

"Nothing tops a dance music throwdown with all of your best friends on the beach, and this year's Hangout lineup is fully loaded," read the fest release. "Prepare to leave reality behind and try paradise on for size. You deserve it."

That the fest ties up the public beach for about a month, is almost the opposite of what was originally pitched and funnels money directly into the fest rather than the community is besides the point.

Gulf Shores City Council has rented its public beach to a private business to the detrement of other area retailers and restaurants and against the wishes of a majority of its citizens in return for a payout that improves the quality of life here. The Hangout contract extends through 2025.

The fest does not draw any more of a bad element than senior week or any other busy beach weekend. The rowdiness is confined to Gulf Place. And every word in the press release about 20-somethings coming here and having their best weekend ever is true.

Alabama's private recreational red snapper quota may be cut

Under a final rule published by NOAA Fisheries on December 1, Alabama's private recreational anglers will see a 51% decrease in the 2023 red snapper quota. The rule, which goes into effect on January 1, 2023, will reduce Alabama's private recreational quota from

1,122,662 pounds in 2022 to 558,200 pounds in 2023.

Scott Bannon, Director of The reason for the the Alabama Department of quota reduction is Conservation and Natural to account for the Resources' Marine Resources Division, said the reason for differences in the the quota reduction is to acred snapper harcount for the differences in the red snapper harvest estivest estimates bemates between the federal tween the federal and Alabama's data collection and Alabama's data programs. The quota was calculated using the federal surcollection proestimates. However, grams. since 2018, Alabama's quota has been monitored using the state's data collection pro-

gram, Snapper Check. The final rule used the average of the annual ratio of Snapper Check to federal landings from 2018 and 2019 which resulted in a 51% reduction in the quota for 2023.

"Each Gulf state is accounting for their recreational harvests using different data programs from what the federal government is using," Bannon said. "Under the other final rule that created state management of red snapper in 2018, there was a requirement to align the landings into the same currency through a calibration method. Alabama and Mississippi have very accurate reporting systems, and we feel the harvest estimates from NOAA are inflated and unreasonable.

"Since before state management of red snapper was initiated, we have pushed the Gulf of Mexico Fishery Management Council (Gulf Council) that we should manage the amount of fish off each state. From Alabama's perspective, this is in part due to the investments made by the state and private individuals in artificial reef building from which a significant number of red snapper and other reef species are produced in Alabama's reef zones."

Alabama has the largest artificial reef zone (out-dooralabama.com/saltwater-fishing/artificial-reefs) in the United States with nearly 1,100 square miles designated for habitat enhancement. Beginning in 2012, the population of red snapper and other popular reef fish have been monitored through research from the University of South Alabama's School of Marine and Environmental Sciences.

"Utilizing the abundance estimates we receive from the University of South Alabama each year, nearly 25% of the red snapper that occur off Alabama live among artificial reefs, and we think our red snapper stock is continuing to replenish itself at a sustainable rate." Bannon said. "We feel very strongly that in the Alabama reef zone the stock is very stable. Recruitment is good as there are enough young fish moving up through the reef system."

Alabama made a motion at the Gulf Council in 2020 that would delay calibration until 2023 to wait until a research assessment could be completed and the latest data incorporated for population estimates for red snapper. An agreement to wait until that assessment was finished was not reached, but calibration was delayed until January 1, 2023.

"We're working with NOAA Fisheries, the Gulf Council and the Scientific and Statistical Committee (SSC) to review the calibration numbers, using more recent data," Bannon said. "We have presented alternative calibration ratios based on a more recent time series of harvest. We are hopeful that in 2023 we will see a change in this published calibration number that is more favorable to the state of Alabama."

Alabama's alternative calibration ratio proposal to NOAA Fisheries will be considered by the SSC and then returned to NOAA Fisheries and the Gulf Council for consideration at a future Gulf Council meeting. Through the Gulf Council process, there is an opportunity to review the calibration ratio from time to time to allow for new data or a new method to determine the ratio

The data used to determine the catch limits came from the Great Red Snapper Count in 2021, which estimated stock biomass of Gulf red snapper was approximately three times the previous estimate, and the NOAA Fisheries' Bottom Longline survey. The SSC discussion determined that the estimates of red snapper from the Great Red Snapper Count and a stock assessment from 2018 were similar for hard bottom and artificial reef habitat where most snapper fishing occurs.

The Great Red Snapper Count indicated that red snapper also inhabit uncharacterized (without structure) bottom, which was largely not considered in previous stock assessments. Because those red snapper do not relate to artificial reefs, the SSC determined that those fish would likely not be targeted by anglers and that basing the harvest levels on the entire population could lead to localized depletions on the reefs.

In that same NOAA Fisheries final rule is an increase in the red snapper allowable catch limit (ACL) from 15.1 million pounds to 15.4 million pounds. However, the new overfishing limit was set at 25.6 million pounds, up 10.1 million pounds from 2022. With the small increase in ACL, Alabama would see a minimal increase in quota to 1,145,026 million pounds prior to the calibration being applied.

"I'm disappointed with the allowable catch limit set so far below the overfishing limit," Bannon said. "I think the ACL could have been set a little higher, which would have given opportunities to all three sectors – commercial, for-hire (charter boats) and private recreational anglers.

"Recently, some anglers have expressed concerns about catching smaller red snapper, and the fish are harder to catch. We recognize that under state management the level of harvest was going to be larger than we saw during the shorter federal seasons. As a result, the average size fish would change, and locating those fish may be more difficult as time goes on."

The amount of private recreational harvest during the 2022 Alabama red snapper season has not been equivalent to recent years for a variety of reasons. The most recent data from Alabama's Snapper Check indicate anglers have harvested less than half of the 2022 quota of 1.12 million pounds. This is primarily the result of less than half of the number of angler trips taken in 2021 have been taken in 2022.

"Normally on opening weekend we see a tremendous

amount of fishing effort, but the weather conditions were not favorable for anglers," Bannon said. "The fish are the largest and most plentiful and everybody has the excitement that the season is open. The weather was terrible on this year's opening weekend, so we had very little effort. The following weekend was better, but it still wasn't safe or comfortable for anglers on smaller vessels. So, we started the season with relatively low numbers."

Other reasons mentioned why fishing effort was much lower than last year were the high fuel prices and COVID-19 restrictions being lifted in many locations so other recreational opportunities were available.

Bannon added, "Fortunately, with the state system, people understand they can wait for a better day and fish when it works well for them. They are not pressured to go the way they did when the seasons were very short.

Bannon said anglers still have the opportunity to catch red snapper for Christmas because the season of Friday-Monday weekend openings will continue until midnight on Saturday. December 31.

"Now that the football regular season is over and the deer aren't moving, you can go fishing," he said. "The rut won't happen until January or February, so go fish a few days."



What's Happening

BCSD Superintendent warns parents that vape devices being used to inhale THC

Narcan kits used to treat fentanyl overdoses are available in all district schools

At a recent press conference and a letter sent out to Baldwin County Public Schools parents, Superintendent Eddie Tyler stated that although there is no drug problem in the schools he oversees, he wanted to alert parents about the dangers of drug-laced vape pens and issue a wake-up

call to our Baldwin County communities to what is happening with vape devices being used to inhale THC and the deadly opioid fentanyl.

"While I don't believe we have a drug problem, I do believe we have a vaping problem amongst the youth in our communities," Tyler stated.

"This is not something exclusive to Baldwin County schools and it is not something exclusive to high schoolers. It is happening all over the country, all over the state and even among our younger children.

"THC is also frequently being injected into vapes. Some of the children using these devices are aware of it and yet some of them are not. I'm sure you can imagine the kid who offers something to someone else to try, with that person unsuspectingly inhaling THC and getting high," he added.

Tyler said vape kits are also being injected with the powerful narcotic fentanyl, a synthetic opioid that even in very, very small amounts is deadly. Fentanyl has been the cause of the vast majority of overdoses in America, Alabama and Baldwin County this year.

"I'm not an expert, but what I understand is the drugs injected into these vape kits don't mix perfectly. So, the first person who inhales may get a little, the second person who inhales may get none and the third or fourth person who inhales may get the vast majority of what was injected. This inequitable distribution of the chemical is what appears to be causing overdoses," Tyler

Tyler said Narcan kits used to treat fentanyl overdoses are available in all district schools.

"That may seem ridiculous to some, and I would have agreed, but then I was reminded about the curiosity of young children. The concern and unfortunately, the real-life example, is the youngest child who finds something their parent or sibling left out and wants to try because they think it's cool and worse, might share it with others," Tyler said.

"It's something at first that you can do firsthand, that you can administer before the ambulance arrives and is a really good thing to have available for our students. We hate to ever have to use it but if we did, at least we have it available," added Ashley Barnhill, Health Services Coordinator for BCSD.

It is against state law for anyone under 21 to

possess or use a vape device regardless of what is inside it. In some cases, school resources officers have issued tickets to students for possessing those devices. Test kits are available on all BCSD campuses to determine what is in vape de-

Students in possession of vape devices are suspended for one day, and if THC is found in the vape, they are suspended for five days.

"We're not looking to discipline our students, we're looking to protect them," said assistant superintendent Marty McRae.

An increase in respiratory illnesses as the result of vaping are also a growing concern at schools, according to Barnhill.

"You don't know what you're inhaling into your body, it could ruin your lungs, but not only that, the different drugs that are in the vapes can lead to major conditions," she said.

Tyler urged parents to talk to their kids about vaping, drinking and drugs by asking them what their friends are doing and sharing concerns about fentanyl.

"I know how uncool we can be as parents but sometimes we don't need to be cool. Sometimes we need to love, be concerned and even be hard when it comes to protecting our children. Even though our kids push back against authority, they want to be loved. Show them that love through your concern," he said.

A Selma High School student died and four others were rushed to the hospital last month from fentanyl overdoses.

Fentanyl was approved by the Food and Drug Administration for use as an analgesic (pain relief) and anesthetic. It is approximately 100 times more potent than morphine and 50 times more potent than heroin.

"In my 30 years teaching, I've buried several students and that's not something you ever want to do. That's why we rang the bell to talk about this today. The device I'm talking about, it's a DAP pen. It's an electronic cigarette and it has the marijuana content on it but what worries me more than anything," said Fairhope High School Principal Jon Cardwell, a former teacher at GSHS.

"We don't know what's in them. Kids are essentially smoking synthetic marijuana while sitting in class. They're passing out and vomiting, and it's a fact that we are having to prepare ourselves for drug overdoses."

An a personal note, an emotional Tyler said he lost his youngest child to a tragic traffic accident when he was a high schooler. "The pain I suffered that day continues," he said. "I do not want any parent to ever have to suffer that tragedy. I don't want any of you to experience what I have experienced myself.

"Please don't take our message today as traditional drug awareness event. It's not," Tyler added. "This is a wakeup call about what is happening with this deadly trend. This is not about a drug problem in Baldwin County schools. Drugs are everywhere. Drugs are in our schools."



WHAT'S HAPPENING

PIER & SHORE FISHING OUTLOOK

It appears our weather roller coaster ride may soon again drop from recent record high temperatures to below average. That would soon be reflected by lowering Gulf water temperatures, which average from the upper to middle 60s by

the end of this month.



In the shallower back bays and surfzone, the water should cool off even faster once cooler air settles in. Such a trend may shut down some fishing opportunities for a few days, if the variation in those nearshore waters is too unsettling for the fish. Any temperature change

of more than 5 degrees is often enough to keep fish from biting for several days, until things settle down and their metabolism adjusts to the new temperature range.

Water near shore will be coolest in the morning hours as relatively colder water from the bays drains out the passes with outgoing tides. Conversely, we can expect a water temperature rise of a few degrees through the afternoon with incoming tides. This will likely be felt most between the 19th and 26th of the month when the tidal range is highest (up to 2.5 feet). That is an extreme tide change in our lil corner of the world, and it could have a profound effect of the fishing prospects all along the coast. Of course the specific weather we experience during that period will be a contributing factor too. Strong high pressure (with clearing skies and strong northerly winds will exaggerate morning low tides. But if we get a moderate to strong southerly wind flow around then, the tide level would be higher than predicted into the evening hours near the time of astronomical high tide. A NEAP tide through the 15th and 16th may dampen the temperature modification of the water for a few days. But that will change as we get increasing tidal flow through the week fol-

Anglers have been finding scattered schools of sheepshead throughout the area. Though most have been running a little below average size, perhaps even under sized as is typical in fall. Keep in mind sheepshead are a regulated species in both Alabama and Florida, with slight differences in both size and creel limits. It pays to know before you go!

Most of the sheepshead have been staging around hard structures in the back bays and canals where at least some tidal current is present. Some have been showing up around the Gulf State Park lately where they were caught on both live shrimp and fiddler crabs. Pinfish have still been a problem for anglers targeting sheepshead at the pier as well as Perdido Pass. But that could change as we approach the Christmas season once the water cools off again.

Pompano have been quite spotty in the surfzone lately. Perhaps because the Gulf has been so calm and clear recently, with the sky so foggy.

Plus the sandbar structure has not been particularly favorable to target pompano either. As you venture eastward, in most locations the longshore sandbar is beyond casting range from shore. At least recent weather and water temperatures have allowed anglers to wade out to cast to deeper holes and drop offs, but with varying results. The sandbars along the Fort Morgan peninsula seem to have been more conducive at times for holding pompano. Though the afternoon rising tide may add a little more depth to the water in the trough. This would encourage more pompano to utilize that beach structure.

We received news the upcoming shoreline dredging project has likely been delayed until next fall. So at least for this winter it will not interfere with surf fishing.

Whiting and ground mullet have been providing the bulk of action for many shorebound anglers. Though their numbers and sizes seem smaller than we have seen the past few years. Again, it may just be a cycle due to odd weather. Or, it could be a sign of localized depletion from overfishing these non-regulated species. Time may

In the meantime, anglers can do their part by being more discreet and releasing whiting under 11 or 12 inches. That way they should be able to reproduce at least once. These kingfish grow only about an inch per year after they reach sexual maturity. So it takes a number of years to obtain those trophy catches, close to two pounds, which we all love so much. And PLEASE refrain/discourage feeding fish discards to herons and pelicans. It exacerbates the situation and greatly increases the likelihood of that bird being involved in a fishing gear entanglement.

Redfish and black drum are still viable options for anglers fishing the passes or Intercoastal Waterway. Cut crab seems to be the best bait, though more slot-sized fish can be caught on live shrimp. Live bait availability has been OK at times, but seasonal weather and holiday interruptions in the live bait supply are not unusual. Plan ahead, or be prepared to catch your own bait as we quickly approach the time of year when ghost shrimp becomes a bait of choice for many fish species.

2023 Zydeco Fest will include April 21 evening concert

Gulf Shores renewed its contract with AirMedCare that covers the out-ofpocket expenses for residents within the corporate limits during a joint council work/regular session on Dec. 12. It was the final meeting of the year.

The contract covers what "residents would normally pay for ground and/or air ambulance transportation and a contract to cover city employees if they are transported by MedStar or AirCare. The service provider will bill the patient's insurance and the patient will not receive a bill for the remaining cost," according to the agenda sum-

Gulf Shores first contracted with AirMedCare in 2020 for the service and this renewal is the fourth at a cost of \$163,798. Citizens would be covered for any ground or air transports anywhere the company provides these services, not just in the city of Gulf Shores.

The citvh also announced that its Zvdeco Crawfish Festival is expanding to two days in 2023 thanks to a \$30,000 grant from Gulf Shores and Orange Beach Tourism's Sports and Events Commission. The dates for 2023 are April 21-22.

"The Waterway Village Merchants Association was awarded a \$30,000 grant including \$20,000 to enhance the event and \$10,000 to market the event," city spokesman Grant Brown said during a Dec. 5 joint work/regular council session. "To take advantage of this we've added a Friday event, a ticketed concert creating this two-day event hoping to attract overnight visitors as well as give local residents and day trippers an opportunity to enjoy the set-up from the evening function on Friday and for the actual Zydeco Crawfish Festival itself."

Brown is also the director of Recreation and Cultural Affairs for the city and his department has been working to put together music for the concert on Friday, April 21, and the regular festival on Saturday, April 22.

"The Friday date which would be a 5-9 p.m. ticketed concert at the location of the fest is a new addition to this event," Brown said. "The main fest will take place Saturday from 10 a.m.-6 p.m."

Brown said the act for the Friday night event will be announced when the contract is finalized.

The event will include food and beverage vendors, merchandise vendors and live music throughout the day and inflatables and bounce houses for the kids. There will be a shuttle service from Erie Meyer Civic Center downtown and from Meyer Park in the Gulf Pines neighborhood.

"One big question that always comes up is how do we handle the parking and transportation," Brown said. "Shuttles will be in service and coordinated parking locations with the churches in the vicinity and businesses that are close to this area. There will be a lot of pedestrian and bicycle access and there is onstreet parking available in the Waterway Village District."

The festival is part of the city's effort to develop a second destination for visitors and residents other than the sugarwhite sand beaches the Alabama Gulf Coast is famous for having. In the past year, at least three new developments in or close to the district have been announced.

Island Villa apartments on East 22nd Avenue and East Third Street were recently renovated and a pool and parking added to cater to vacation rentals. At the corner of East Second Street and East 22nd Avenue an old mattress store is being gutted and renovated to accommodate a wine and cheese shop on the ground floor and four one-bedroom vacation rentals on the top floor.

Angie and David Swiger recently announced their plans to renovate the old Frith's Bait Shop location at the corner of East Second Street and Canal Road into a mobile vendor court, retail space in the bottom floor of the main building and a five-bedroom vacation rental on the upper floors. There is also a cottage on the property that will be used as a one-bedroom vacation rental.

Already in place are Big Beach Brewing, Tacky Jacks, Acme Oyster House, The Sloop, the Gulf Coast Arts Alliance's art studio and Steven Dark's Pottery Central studio. LuLu's at Homeport Marina anchors the northern part of the district.

Permits are in the works to build a pedestrian bridge over the Intracoastal Waterway at East Second Street to make the connection between north and south portions of the district.

"As the continued development of the Waterway Village moves ahead with a pedestrian bridge with a park-type opportunity on the south side and the north side and creating this new opportunity within this district," Brown said. "I feel like this is a good opportunity to begin seeding merchants' association to allow them to continue to promote activities within their location."

During the meeting, the council also: • OK'd a public assembly permit for the Shaka Beach Bash Volleyball Tournament on March 31-April 2 for the adult tournament and April 1 for the junior tournament. The event will be on the beach near the Gulf Shores lifeguard office.

• OK'd a public assembly permit for the Springhill College tournament or the Gulf Shores Open on March 2-4 using eight courts. There will be nine college teams participating and additionally there will be a junior tournament on March 4 using 12 courts. This event will also be on the beach near the lifeguard office.

• OK'd a public assembly permit for the Gulf Shores Mardi Gras parade on Feb. 21 with the staging area on West Beach Boulevard and the route will be from State Route 59 east to traffic light at the Gulf State Park Lodge.

 Confirmed Nora Mandoki to serve a term of three years on the Personnel Board expiring in March of 2025 replacing Randy Kaiser. And, Sherry Hoffman's term on the Library Advisory Board expires on Nov. 1 and she would like to be reappointed to another term lasting through Nov. 1 of 2026.

• Appropriated \$100,000 to the Coastal Alabama Business Chamber in support of "ongoing small business assistance and economic development efforts."

- Updating controlled beach parking including updating the fee schedule to make it \$15 for a whole day and the four-hour permit will remain \$5. Director of Recreation and Cultural Affairs Grant Brown said changes would be coming near Bahama Bob's Café at the West Fifth Street beach access and the Gulf Shores Beach Retreat at the West 10th Street beach access. The city has 442 paid parking spaces in the program, 90 in the free residents-only lot at East Gulf Place and the city is considering adding 108 new paid spaces at those three locations.
- OK'd an annexation request from Fallon and Maureen Young for 1.85 acres at 22171 Cotton Creek Drive located on the south side of the road between Geno Road and Waterplant Road that leads to the Orange Beach Water Authority's treatment plant.

O.B. seeks Restore Act funds for Wildlife Rehab Center expansion

During the renovation of the Orange Beach Medical Arts Building, additional water damage was found in the walls after construction began.

At the Dec. 13 council meeting, the council voted for a a change order to include repairing the damage found during the renovations and causing an increase of \$89,330 to the original project amount of \$549,612.

Council is also seeking to add nearly \$500,000 in Restore Act money to help complete the new center for the Orange Beach Wildlife Rehabilitation and Education Program under construction on Powerline Road. During the joint work/regular session on Dec. 6, the council will consider authorizing staff to seek Restore Act funds to help with the expansion of the facility in the amount of \$424,450. It will be for the build-out of the interior of the center's new building.

During the Dec. 6 session, council discussed:

- Have a second reading on an ordinance change for a planned unit development for Top Tier Watersports to construct a building and docks to run a dolphin cruise and watercraft rental business. It is located on Cotton Bayou north of Cotton's restaurant.
- Approving an events liquor license for the Sassy Bass Sock Hop at The Wharf on Jan. 23 at the Orange Beach Event Center
- Approving a special events liquor license for the JWC New Year's Eve at Heron Pointe at the Wharf on Dec. 31-Jan. 1.
- Awarding the bid for a Cross Lane dune walkover to repair damage from Hurricane Sally to Gulf Coast Dockmasters for \$48,899.
- Authorizing a contract with Sawgrass Consulting for land surveying services to subdivide the Coastal Resources office property on Walker Lane for \$3,500. According to the agenda, "this will include a metes and bounds legal description and exhibit drawing to be part of the Auburn University lease." Auburn is planning on building a re-

search facility and satellite campus on the city-owned property where the current dog park is located.

- Executing a lease renewal with the Bear Point Civic Association to give the city permission to repair the park and rebuild the pier on the south end of Mississippi Avenue on Bayou St. John. This will be funded at 95 percent by FEMA.
- Providing a commitment to develop the Orange Beach Stormwater Master Plan and ensure payment of funds for the plan from the Alabama Department of Conservation and Natural Resources through the Restore Act Water Quality Program. The total project cost is estimated to be \$250,000 with the Restore Act paying 75 percent or \$187,500 with the city paying 25 percent or \$62,500.
- A contract with Anne B. Gajda for golf instruction services for the Expect Excellence program. Gajda will have access to the Orange Beach Golf Center to conduct lessons and classes to give private lessons and in return Gajda will provide 20 hours of golf instruction for the afterschool program and at the city's public schools.
- Authorizing payment to Hillman Legal Strategies for services related to Alabama Ethics Commission Case No. 2021-0166 for \$13,000.
- Adding Caswell Lane to the roadway resurfacing project for \$19,800 paid to Arrington Curb and Excavation.
- Appointing a new member to the Orange Beach Board of Education to replace Tracie Stark who is leaving her position. She was appointed to a two-year term in March as a member of the original board of education in Orange Beach.
- A memorandum of understanding for an opioid settlement related to the McKesson and Janssen lawsuits. Local municipalities will be allocated 10 percent of these two settlements, according to the city agenda.
- Awarding retiring police officer John Simonson his duty weapons and badge as part of his retirement package.
- Authorizing a contract with Sawgrass Consulting for civil engineering and

land surveying services. This is a renewal of a two-year agreement.

- Authorizing a contract with GeoCon Engineering and Materials Test for geotechnical analysis and construction materials testing on city projects.
- Signing a contract with Wetland Services to delineate wetlands south of Cotton Bayou Trail for \$2,200.
- Giving \$1,000 to the Dauphin Island Sea Lab to help defray the cost of bringing a research boat and instructors to Orange Beach for school programs.
- A resolution amending the organizational chart for the city.
- Updating the list of volunteer firefighters and reserve police officers covered under the workers' compensation insurance.
- Extending the entertainment districts at The Wharf and SanRoc Cay Marina and Perdido Beach Resort.
- A contract with Coastal Ballet Academy for ballet instruction services.
- Appropriating \$75,000 to the Gulf Shores Airport Authority for FY 2023.
- Signing a contract for social media consulting and marketing services from Socialize Your Bizness. There is \$20,400 budgeted for 2023 on contract.
- Entering into an agreement with the Baldwin County Economic Development Alliance for \$12,500 "to support the goals and initiatives" of the agency.
- Appointing Spencer E. Davis as the city prosecutor and Paul Woodall of Birmingham "to handle city business with real estate transactions, public finance, economic incentives, and other specialized legal services as may be directed by the City Attorney."
- Executing two contracts with lobbying firms with Bob Riley and Associates handling the state legislature issues for \$10,000 a month and Van Scoyoc Associates for federal legislative issues at \$6,000 a month.
- Authorizing the city to host community events for residents and visitors to Orange Beach in 2023 including the city's Mardi Gras parade, Art Festival, Freedom Fest at The Wharf and the Christmas tree lighting at The Wharf.
- A resolution amending the fiscal year

budget 2023 for the city. Details of what those amendments are were not included in the agenda.

• A resolution amending the employees pay plan/job listing to accommodate the approved 2023 budget. No details of what those amendments are were included in the agenda.
