### 200 Foley residents receive smoke detectors

More than 200 Foley residents are living in safer homes after the start of a program to install smoke detectors in the city. The Foley Fire Department, American Red Cross and members of a local church recently distributed and installed smoke detectors in the Beulah Heights community as part of the Red Cross's Sound the Alarm campaign intended to get smoke detectors into homes.

"Saturday was our first effort," said Foley Fire Chief Joey Darby. "We focused on Beulah Heights, because we've had some fires over there. We had one in particular last year. And there's been some tragedy in Beulah Heights going way back long before my time."

Darby said many residents in the area do not

speak English. Members of the local church, IMP Jesucristo Es El Camino, worked with firefighters and Red Cross members to talk to residents about the program and convince them to have the smoke detectors installed.

"Our Hispanic community continues to grow and there are certain areas in Beulah Heights that are predominantly Hispanic areas that don't speak English at all. They were great partners to really help us get out and educate the public about what we were doing," Darby said.

"We're already talking about other areas of town that we're going to work through," Darby said. "Working smoke alarms save lives. The key word there is working smoke alarms. A lot of places have one, but they don't work. It was quite interesting and, unfortunately, somewhat alarming for us to see the number of residents that didn't have them at all. Educating those folks was extremely important, and we're gonna continue to work on that."

### PK Public Garden Help & Learn March 22

Escambia County will host volunteer workdays at the Perdido Key Coastal Demonstration Garden (15500 Perdido Key Dr.) March 22, April 26 and May 17 from 9-11 a.m. Workdays are great opportunities to become familiar with native species and gardening techniques, including how to care for and maintain coastal species. County staff will provide all necessary tools and equipment. Volunteers should wear comfortable clothing and bring a water bottle. The Perdido Key garden was installed in 2021 to highlight native coastal species and exhibits various landscape techniques suited for the barrier island. ## G.S. places defibrillators at 22 locations

Gulf Shores City Council will place Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs) at 22 strategic locations across the city at a cost of \$34,485.66. To ensure accessibility and prompt intervention during cardiac emergencies, the AEDs have been strategically placed at key locations where community members gather, including Gulf Shores City Hall, Bodenhamer Recreation Center, Erie H. Meyer Civic Center, Gulf Shores Sportsplex, and Gulf Shores Public Library.

"With these devices readily available, we empower our community members to take immediate action in critical situations, potentially saving lives," said EMS Officer Nick Russell. AEDs are portable electronic devices designed to deliver a therapeutic dose of electrical energy to the heart in cases of sudden cardiac arrest. These user-friendly devices analyze the heart rhythm and, if necessary, administer a controlled electric shock to restore normal cardiac function. Rapid access to AEDs significantly increases the chances of survival for individuals experiencing cardiac emergencies. See the full AED list at gulfshoresAL.gov/Fire.




# Foley will buy land to expand Graham Creek Preserve

Foley City Council voted to accept a \$5 million grant through the Gulf of Mexico Energy Security Act to buy land to add to the Graham Creek Nature Preserve. Rhe grant was announced in August, but the funds have now become available.

The GOMESA program shares revenues from offshore oil and gas leases in the Gulf of Mexico with four participating states, Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana and Texas.

The preserve is now about 660 acres in size. The exact size of the expansion has not been determined. The goal of the land use will be conservation with habitat restoration and management as well as some public access in the future for passive recreation. The preserve, located near Wolf Creek Drive in southeast Foley, includes 10 miles of hiking trails, two handicap-accessible boardwalks, a kayak launch and four disc golf courses.



GSHS's Amanda Talantis earns "Best of Green Schools" Award

Gulf Shores High School educator Amanda Talantis has been named a Best of Green Schools Award recipient for the K-12 Educator category by the Center for Green Schools. A highly



respected teacher for 17 years, Talantis teaches in the Sustainability and Hospitality and Tourism Academies at GSHS.

In her courses, she focuses on ecotourism and sustainability to help create a more sustainable and green school system, community, and region. Talantis has been instrumental in transforming Gulf Shores City Schools into a district that prioritizes all tenets of sustainability and she lives by the belief in helping develop responsible young citizens who will promote sustainability for future generations.

Talantis also leads the "Small Town, Big Garden" Project, and the vegetables her students grow are prepped and served in a variety of recipes in the culinary kitchen and in the district's cafeterias. The director of the school's extensive Earth Day program, she also teaches yoga to students and faculty. Her many innovative programs include a farm-to-table community event; a greenhouse with hundreds of hydroponic plants; recycling initiative; raised beds and gardens; fresh student lunches, salad bars, snacks, and smoothies from the studentgrown gardens; the Dolphin Walk program for fitness; yoga classes; sand dune restoration at Gulf State Park; and standing desks for interested teachers.

"Amanda and her students often work after school and on weekends to maintain projects and plan for events, collaborating with other departments to offer sustainability-related projects within our school system," said Jessica Sampley, Academies and CTE Director at GSCS.

"She connects with community partners, including local farms and nonprofits, to provide additional opportunities for students to learn how to live sustainably. She also collaborates with teachers across the school district to vertically align sustainability projects and initiatives."



# Elberta to celebrate sausage on March 30

Combine 8,000 pounds of sausage made from a secret recipe developed by the founding fathers of Elberta with 200 venders selling everything from custom belt buckles to french roasted peanuts. Throw in a few hundred kegs of beer – both domestic and German – served in the festival's own Bier Garten.

Add entertainment, a full fledged carnival and almost years of tradition and you have it – The Bi-Annual Elberta Original German Sausage Festival, scheduled next on Saturday, March 30 from 8 a.m. until 5 p.m. in Elberta Town Park. The park is located just north of Elberta's only traffic light on Hwy. 98 (just follow the crowd or 13052 Main St. on GPS).

Besides Elberta's famous German sausage & sauerkraut, the event will include continuous entertainment for adults and children. Other scrumptious foods will include German style filled cabbage, potato salad, goulash, red beans & rice, hamburgers, hot dogs, BBQ sandwiches, ice cream, popcorn and peanuts.

There will be baked goods as well as arts & crafts for sale, and volunteers will serve plenty of other non-alcoholic beverages in addition to beer. The Bellview Stumpfiddle Band and the North End Stompers traditionally perform. Cloggers. Polka, country and German music are also part of the entertainment line-up.

The festival usually attracts close to 30,000 visitors. Public parking will be available and those with disabilities can get access from the west side of the festival, where volunteers with golf carts will be on hand to help them get into the festival grounds. The sausage festival is a town fund-raiser, first spearheaded by Elberta's Volunteer Fire Department in 1978. Proceeds are used for improving not only the fire department, but the town as well. Although the recipe has changed somewhat over the years, the original secret recipe for Elberta's famous sausage is credited to Alfred Stucki, who managed Elberta's Locker Plant from 1953 until his death in 1973. Local non-profits also benefit from the festival through booth sales and parking lot fees. The city's signature event is held the last Saturdays in March and October.


### Downtown Foley walking tours severy Saturday in April

During the 1950's, aerobatic maneuvers and the six-plane delta formation flown to this day were added in the F9 Cougar and F-11 Tiger. Fat Albert was added as a support aircraft to move personnel and equipment between show sites in 1949.

The audience will be invited to join the tribe for this last dances of this spectacular cultural exchange.

The fest's Sunday banjo and fiddle competitions are sponsored by Flora-Bama and the Frank Brown International Songwriters Fest. Both competitions include separate youth and adult divisions and will award cash prizes totaling \$3,000. Fiddler Gram Rae will get the party started on Sunday at 10 a.m. Other fest attractions include a children's art tent, live art demonstrations and unique food. 

### Orange Beach will dedicate Danny Martin Field at Sportsplex

Opening day for the Orange Beach Sports Assn. baseball and softball programs will be a special one as Field 1 will be dedicated to the late Danny Martin. Martin, who died this past August, served Orange Beach for more than 20 years in the Parks & Recreation Dept. and was the first manager of the Orange Beach Sportsplex. He retired from the City in 2016 but remained active in the sports tourism community in Foley. Martin was instrumental in the growth of the Orange Beach Sportsplex and the City will honor his legacy by dedicating Field 1 in his name, forever to be known as Danny Martin Field.

A native Mobilian, Martin first moved to Orange Beach in 1982 and was also an EMT and a member of the Orange Beach Volunteer Fire Department. In early 1994, he began his career in recreation, helping with the development of the first baseball park in Orange Beach. Giving local children a place to play ball was something that Danny took special pride in. This was the beginning of what would eventually become a youth sports boom for the city.

"In the spring of 2001, the Orange Beach Sportsplex was opened. At that time, there was nothing else like it in the area. This facility would ultimately be where Danny poured all his heart and soul. He wanted it to be the best facility anywhere and a place that all the area children and families could enjoy for generations to come," his obituary states.

"There weren't many days that you would go by the Sportsplex and not find Danny there working to ensure everything was right for everyone, even into the early hours of the next morning. To him, it wasn't just a job; it was his passion to ensure it was the best in the land. His sons often refer to it as being his baby. He loved nothing more than seeing the park full of children playing the games that he himself loved so much growing up, and it also brought in thousands, of teams from across the nation to play in tournaments hosted there."

The relationships with SEC coaches that emerged from those games led to Orange Beach securing a contract to host the SEC Women's Soccer Championship Tourney back in 2003 and then every year from 2005 until 2015.

### Well, Yeah! Southern Living names Flora-Bama best dive bar

"You don't become the Gulf Coast's most hallowed beach bar without a bit of divine intervention," writes Betsy Cribb Watson in her Southern Living story about our beloved lounge-on-theline being voted the best dive bar in Alabama in the magazine's 2024 South's Best issue published this month.

"When you look at where God put the Flora-Bama, it's in the middle of where all kinds of demographics gather—that's what makes it special," said co-owner John McInnis III. "You'd have fishermen and locals mixed with tourists, bikers, and military personnel from the Navy base. All of a sudden, they were hanging out together in this little shack by a liquor store. That's what it looked like in the late seventies and early eighties."

A fixture on the Alabama-Florida line since 1964, the Flora-Bama, like most of Perdido Key, was leveled after absorbing Hurricane Ivan's northeast quadrant on Sept. 16, 2004. For about three years, the bar operated out of a collection of tents and trailers. But the faithful patrons still kept showing up.

"You probably had close to a million people a year going through there and having the times of their lives," said McInnis, who became a majority owner along with Cam Price in 2009. "Our goal was to make it better without changing it, because it's such an iconic establishment."

"You're more a shepherd of the Flora-Bama than you are an owner of it," added Price. "When you look at all the people who have made memories here over the years, that's the magic of this place. Every single person who walks into the Flora-Bama wants to have a good time."

Emcee Steve Powers, the Bama's director of entertainment, was the total pro while running contestants smoothly through rounds sporting a very appropriate (above) costume that looked totally natural on him. On their best day, Barker, Trabek and Sajeck would have been hard pressed to match Steve's on-stage verve.

# Pat Crumby is the Godmother of the South Baldwin dance scene

Pat Crumby was not destined to be the Godmother for those of a certain age that make up the South Baldwin dancing community.

She didn't even dance in her younger years. She was too busy building a business empire and raising a child as a single mom in her native Kansas. She is not even sure how it happened. But it is a fact that she is our dancing queen.

She has her hand in as many as four dances each week. If there is a dance being held in South Baldwin County, Pat is almost always involved.

She dances at the Gulf Shores American Legion on Sundays and the Elks Club on Fridays and Saturdays. She goes to the Foley Senior Center for dances twice a month. On the third Wednesday of each month, she dances at Water's Edge Dance Hall in Robertsdale. She has hosted dances at The Big Red Barn in Foley. She and her friends also take line dancing lessons twice a week.

"I've slowed down a bit," Pat said. "Instead of five times a week, sometimes I only dance three times. But I never get tired of going to dances."

There are even dances named after her held every year in Loxley on Memorial Day, July 4 and Labor Day, and that does not count the hundreds of dance outings she organized in the Perdido Beach Resort Lobby Bar prior to local piano legend John Brust's death.

At PBR, she led a mostly snowbird group of dancers that included as many as 30 couples.

"We would go dance at Perdido Beach Resort four nights a week," she said. "Many of those people have passed or can't dance anymore, and it wasn't the same once John died."

Pat prints up a dance schedule and takes copies with her whenever she goes out. But that is about as technical as she gets. She does not have a computer. She does not have a cell phone. Orange Beach/Gulf Shores Tourism printed 3,000 of the schedules to pass out at its visitor centers and another 5,000 to put in welcome snowbird pack-

ages. Self made, Pat entered the male dominated paper product sales business in 1979. She climbed the sales ladder with several companies before hanging her own shingle by opening a computer form company that occupied two buildings that took up most of a downtown Kansas City block. She built a cedar wood home on top of one of her buildings that was written up in Architecture Digest. For awhile, she also lived in the house.

She and her mate Bob owned several vacation homes on The Lake of the Ozarks before they eventually settled on a large home with 3,100 ft. of shoreline on 17 acres with a 28 ft. cabin cruiser docked behind it.

The couple planned to retire there, but fate intervened during a golfing trip to check out courses along the Gulf Coast.

They found themselves heading south on Hwy 59 and, after a night at the old Holiday Inn on East Beach Blvd., they drove to Glenlakes to golf.

They saw a man working on a house. He said that house was sold, but he could build them another on a lot he owned nearby.

In late fall of 1990, Bob and Pat moved into their new home planning to stay for three months. They stayed for six. The next year, they brought their boat and planned to stay for six months. They stayed for nine. Like so many others, they were hooked on the Alabama Gulf Coast.

When Bob and Pat bought their home in 1990, there were only 71 others in the subdivision. They paid \$72K, including appliances.

"We just fell in love with this place, especially Bob,' Pat said. "We didn't want to leave."

Pat dabbled in real estate when she first moved here. She developed The Villas at Glenlakes and her portfolio at one time included nine condos.

But her main focus was hosting parties. They were not the huge affairs she regularly organized in Kansas City. But it was not unusual for her to lead a group on a bus to the Mississippi casinos or set up the draw for a golf outing for 50 friends.

"Every place I've been I've gotten groups together for socializing," she said.

Pat has a group of good friends that she enjoys car pooling to dances with and she even dances by herself in the living room.

"I think it's the best exercise you can have," she said. "I don't dance as much now, but I still enjoy going around hosting and passing out my dance schedule. If people want to know anything about dances, they can ask me."

Pat's helpful hints even include teaching her girlfriends how to ask men to dance. Just in the past three years, three couples she has introduced have gotten engaged.

"It's a wonderful life and this has really helped me through the past three or four years. I am glad for my friends," Pat said. "God has been good to me and he is still being good to me." ### Little Laggon Preservation Society seeks help at March 25 meeting to stop BCSS sewer plant

The Little Lagoon Preservation Society is urging South Baldwin County residents to attend a public hearing on March 25 at 4 p.m. at the Gulf Shores City Council meeting in which the city will consider approval of and vote on a Conditional Use Permit (CUP) application by Baldwin County Sewer Service (BCSS). At the end of the Public Hearing, the Mayor and City Council will vote on approving or not approving the application.

BCSS is asking for City approval to operate their plant at a higher volume (1.8 MG/D vs current 1.2 MG/D) and keep their sludge lagoon which is currently shut down due to a city cease and desist order.

The city's planning department is recomending the Council not approve the BCSS application. If you want to see their narrative they will present to the Mayor and Council click on this link 12629 (gulfshoresal.gov). There will not be a vote by the Mayor and Council at this meeting, it is informational.

"The LLPS BCSS Evaluation team has provided considerable analysis and detail on our evaluation of the Ft. Morgan Plant, their sludge lagoon, and their proposed increase," said LLPS President Dennis Hatfield. "

Hatfield added that LLPS is recommending denial of the application unless BCSS does several things:

• Finish abandonment of the sludge lagoon and re-establish the buffer they clear cut when they built the lagoon.

• Reduce the amount of Phosphorus in processed effluent which is injected into the surface water table and then flows to Little Lagoon, adequate monitoring and reporting, and include permit discharge limits.

• Change back to a NPDES permit that expired in January 2024.

• Install additional water table monitoring wells.

• Agree to enhanced local oversight by the City of Gulf Shores."

"We really need to let the City know we care about this by having as many people as possible show up for the March 25 hearing," Hatfield said. "People are welcome to comment at the hearing, but that is not as important as just showing up."



## **PIER & SHORE FISHING OUTLOOK** By DAVID "THE PIERPOUNDER" THORNTON

Spring has sprung loose along the lower Baldwin Coast does not just refer to the hordes of Spring Breakers descending upon the beaches and fishing venues. Most of the



time our weather has been seasonably pleasant, especially when we experience several sunny days with light winds. But there are still intermittent cool snaps that put us back in jackets for a couple of mornings. Still that hasn't prevented the Gulf water temperature from flirting with 65 degrees recently. Not quite warm enough

to bring in Spanish mackerel in numbers yet, but plenty comfortable for sheepshead to commence their annual spawning rituals. So far most of that action has been centered around the southern tip of the west jetty at Perdido Pass, but don't be surprised if more show up along the seawall through the coming fortnight too.

The next NEAP tide period centers on March 24th coincidental to the full moon. That usually triggers the spawn to commencing for sheepshead as the days following the NEAP usually have a midday high tide. The water has been mostly clear recently as we have lacked any really severe storms that create extremely rough surf and turbid water as we saw too much of last month. This tends to work in fisher-men's favor and can expect the temperature of shallow waters to rise above 65 and stay there by the end of this month.

Since the Gulf State Park Pier remains closed, most fishing activity seems to have been centering around the recently opened Seawall Park under the Perdido Pass Bridge and north along the curve. A fine place to fish, but catching has not equaled effort. More success has been found near the south end of the west jetty, and on nearby beaches. The sandy area underneath the east end of the bridge in Gulf State Park's Alabama Point East will remain closed through next month to discourage teenage shenanigans there. But the good news is, fishing along the Gulf beach near the east jetty and along the beach all the way east of the Shell Parking lot has been pretty good to surf casters already this month. Some pompano and fair numbers of whiting have been caught there, mostly on pompano rigs and shrimp. The mild weather has allowed some sandbars to develop along that stretch that are inviting places for these fish to feed. A little research along that stretch of beach should reveal the more advantageous spots to set up your surf casting equipment.

Be aware with warmer water more people on the beach during Spring Break will be swimming, and that means they will be packed densest near the beach access points. Anglers are less likely to encounter less interference from swimmers the farther from these access points they decide to travel. The same goes for the beaches in Orange Beach,

Gulf State Park, Gulf Shores, and off Fort Morgan Road. If you have to resort to using public access to get to the Gulf, try to walk a way to find less crowded beaches, with a nice sandbar you can cast to where pompano, whiting, redfish and drum may be waiting.

Progress continues as weather has allowed at the Gulf State Park Pier, with the most notable feature being the number of piling set so far, and remaining to be set in order to reconnect the whole pier. Giant waves from Hurricane Sally in September 2020 tore a 205 foot breach in the just renovated pier north of the octagon at the end. Red tape delayed the start of the repair project until November 2023, and uncooperative winter weather has hampered the pace of repairs. Mainly driving new 90 foot long pilings through the debris now buried beneath 8 feet or so of soft sand on the bottom. Still crews from MD Thomas have now managed to place four of the seven sets of piling. The liftboat RAM XIX joined the effort and has helped the pace of progress. Meanwhile work is ongoing in the parking lot at the pier where crews are preparing hundreds of 6 foot by 6 foot ipe (pronounced ee-pay) wood deck panels to expedite the process once all the piling are set in place. Still plenty of other work remains including placement of new piling caps and span girders. Plus concrete repair work on an undetermined number of damaged pilings, new railing, electric and water lines, and get the elevator on the octagon running. So it is still too early to tell how long it will be before the pier reopens. Hopefully late this summer according to early estimates.

Access to the beach at Mobile Street off Fort Morgan Road is still restricted for the next few months while the boardwalk is being replaced. Though surf anglers may access the beach by using the Emergency Vehicle sand trail west of the current boardwalk. Just be aware beach erosion in that area sometimes leaves a beach scarp (cliff) with a dropoff as much as several feet. And the beach from the toe of the sand dunes may be quite steep, making egress with a beach cart more difficult than usual. The Project also includes improvements to the 30 vehicle parking lot to allow better drainage so rainwater will not stand for days as it now does.

Maintenance dredging at Little Lagoon Pass continues to make headway by deepening the channel closer to it's mandated 6 foot depth. Fishing there should improve as more water flow is restored, but be vigilant of drop offs and deep holes while wading in the area, especially when the water is dingy. And keep an eye out for the kids! But the pass is a historically good fishing spot, even though you have to pay to fish there now. Speckled trout are already active early and late in the day along the drop off from the shallow sandbars. Lures are your best bet to target trout while avoiding bycatch like pinfish, croakers and lizardfish. Topwater lures can be quite effective before sunup and after sundown, or on cloudy days. Twitch baits like the sinking MirrOdine MR 18 the classic 52M or MR series do a great job of imitating the small fish these trout are feeding on. Waders will still be needed and the first or last light of the day id usually best, but if you are not afraid to work at it hard, there are some good fish to be caught.







#### Foley preparing plans for rec center at old armory

Foley City Council voted Monday, March 4, to approve funding that will allow the city to start plans to convert the space into municipal uses, including recreation spaces.

"Our armory design group was approved by the council, Mayor Ralph Hellmich said. "So we'll be moving for the expansion of our rec services.

The appropriation includes fees for the architecture firm working on the project and some funds for additional contingencies. The city already has a general conceptual plan for the building. The new plan will cover final design details in preparation for the start of construction, which will start when designers determine what needs to be done.

The conceptual plan is really a 1,000-foot plan. This is when they get into the weeds so we'll know a little more as they do that," said David Thompson, Foley's executive director of leisure services. "It's just going to depend on how quickly they're able to work through the design process and how much work they need to do.3

The armory opened in 1969. It served as the headquarters for the Foley contingent of the Alabama Army National Guard until the unit moved into a new facility near the Foley Beach Express in 2023. The city donated the land on which the new armory was built. In exchange for the property, the National Guard gave the city the former armory site.

## Parking improvements slated at Foley Event Center

Visitors to the Foley Event Center and the Sports Tourism Complex will have improved parking under plans approved by the Foley City Council.

The projects include paving current parking sites and adding more spaces for vehicles.

The council voted to approve design work for the parking lots at the Event Center. David Thompson, Foley executive director of leisure services, said the first priority will be repaying the existing parking spaces.

"We're trying to do it in phases where we'll do the north parking lot and then the south parking lot," Thompson said. "The north parking lot is in a little worse shape."

He said the design work will also include planning additional parking spaces for the center.

We are asking them to look at potentially adding some spaces as well for when we have large events," Thompson said. "We had people parking on the grass last weekend. So we're looking at potentially adding another 20 spaces on each side as we go through this process. This will actually do the design process for both of them.'

Thompson said that in the current plan, the north parking lot would be improved in the current fiscal year and work would start on the south lot next year.

Mayor Ralph Hellmich said the north lot is more in need of immediate repair.

"The northern one is one that most critically needs to be done," Hellmich said. "They determined that neither one of them are to the point where there's going to have to be additional base work done, but that one's getting a little closer to potentially needing that. So we definitely know that we want to do the north side first and foremost.'

The council also approved paving and drainage improvements for the gravel parking lots at the Foley Sports Tourism Complex. Thompson said the current unpaved parking areas become muddy after heavy rains.

"Our last four soccer events have been met with rain, which created a mess," Thompson said. "I would like to go ahead and do some design work to actually make those asphalt parking lots as we move forward to something for five years.'


