

City considers turning old hospital into new Justice Center

Gulf Shores took up issues on two huge projects planned by the city at the March 4 council work session.

The council discussed a contract with Police Facility Design Group to present a plan to retrofit the former Sacred Heart Hospital south of Cotton Creek Drive and east of State Route 59.

"The City contracted with PFDG for the design of an all-new Justice Center which would combine the police department, jail, and municipal courts under one roof, a memo from Construction Manager Clint Colvin states. "Unfortunately, when the bids were received in December, all bids came in significantly over budget. In an effort to keep the project within budget, the decision was made to retrofit the former Sacred Heart Building with the Justice Center. This will provide the updated facility so desperately needed by the GSPD within the original budget for the project.

The project will also include adding a jail to the rear of the building and the total cost for the design would be \$1.5 million.

Second, the council considered a second amendment to the contract with Goodwyn Mills and Cawood on the design of the new high school, raising the contract amount from \$6.4 million to \$7.8 million. The second amendment will also include a practice pavilion and both will up the price for the school to more than \$138 million.

Gulf Shores also plans to approve a new 95 unit hotel in midtown Gulf Shores on West Second Street north of the Happy Pappy coffee shop.

Townplace Suites at Midtown is the proposed brand for the site at 1550 W. Second St. and staff plans to approve the hotel plan with conditions including getting permission from the FAA to be taller that 50 feet for the elevator and parapet. It will be a four-story building and 298 parking spaces are included.

Another request before the city's planning commission is for a two-building development in the same area as Townplace Suites. Developers are seeking to incorporate residential, office, retail and restaurants uses in the development. It is part of the overall PUD approved by the council in February of 2023.

"The PUD was designed and approved as a nine-lot mixed use, pedestrian-oriented commercial project with professional office, retail, restaurant and residential uses," a staff memo on the Jan. 9 planning commission agenda stated. "The entire infrastructure for the PUD has been constructed, including parking drive aisles, pedestrian sidewalks, stormwater drainage, lighting, dumpster pads and screening, and landscaping."

The request then was to remove one of the buildings on the site and the mobile vendor court to build a 100-room hotel. At its November 2022 meeting, the planning commission gave a 9-0 favorable recommendation for the proposed

There are more than 17,000 vacation rental properties on the Alabama Gulf Coast between condos, beach houses and hotels. There are a total of 2,473 hotel rooms in Gulf Shores and Orange Beach and none in Fort Morgan.

During the work session, the March 4 work session city council also discussed:

- A Restore Act-funded project to help switch residents from septic tanks to city sewer service as part of a \$5.9 million grant to improve water quality, habitat and shorelines on Little Lagoon. The program manager will be Grants and Coordinator Dan Bond.
- Replacing Bobbie Rooker as the Library Advisory Board's bank signatory and adding Mary Allison Bauer as president and signatory. The same resolution will remove Robert Malone as Public Building Authority chairman and bank signatory.

 Adding four new travel cards for the police department for officers to use for training, conferences and other uses permitted by executive staff.

 Hiring Blue Zones to create a blue zones map of safe pathways to the schools for \$19,986 focusing on the Gulf Pines neighborhood which will soon see traffic rerouted from Canal Road because of construction of the pedestrian bridge.

• Giving permission to apply for an Alabama Public Library Service grant to help employees Kelli Day and Shelby Newhouse complete work on a master's degree in library and information studies. The application would be for \$10,500 and if successful would be awarded this summer. This is the second year for the library to apply after successfully securing the grant in 2023.

• Replacing 26-year-old lighting for fields at the Sportsplex with Musco LED equipment for \$1.4 million.

• Granting assembly permits for the 2024 Hangout Music Festival, for S'mores on the Shore events on May 23 and Aug. 1, World Make Music Day on June 21 and the Sunset Music Series at Gulf Place on the town green in Sept.

The City also announced the commencement of the paid parking season at Gulf Place and Lagoon Pass among others at several public beaches from March 1 to Nov. 30. Residents and property owners can enjoy the benefit of free parking at these sites with a valid Hurricane Re-Entry Pass. Residents also have access to the East Gulf Place Resident Only Parking Area.

Larry Bender: Foley's robotics teaching volunteer gem

The Baldwin County Schools District has asked the community to "take a moment to thank and honor the robotics volunteer & mentor Larry Bender, who is a real value to Baldwin County Schools." Larry (**pictured in class**) has been volunteering his time and expertise on STEM and robotics in six Foley area schools for 10 years. Despite dealing with Parkinson's he has organized parts, classrooms, robotic kits, and teams, built example robots, and helped kids day after day, week after week. He completely designed and built a working robotics classroom for teacher Danielle Ludlow, and taught teacher Thomas Thorjusen how to organize tools, inventory and bin parts, and make team kits. Larry also went to all of the competitions, including the Alabama VEX State Championships. He ran scoring and did inspections at all local tournaments.

Larry also owns over \$10,000 in robotics parts and kits that he has let Foley students use to expand their capabilities.

"Unfortunately, Larry has been slowed down by a brain tumor and other complications," said Ludlow. "He is now going back to Indiana to his summer home and be with his family. Thank you Mr. Bender for your dedication to BCBE schools and the Robotics programs."

Papa Rocco's St. Paddy's Walking Parade will roll again

Fun times back for Papa Bill McGinnes & company on March 17

It was way back in 1983 when Bill McGinnes decided to bring his concept of "warm beer & lousy pizza" to downtown Gulf Shores.

One year later, The Island's favorite Scotsman (by way of Michigan) assumed leadership of the annual St. Patrick's Day (March 17) Walking Parade in his new hometown.

The concept is simple: A throng of revelers - young & old, local & snowbird - follow Papa sponsored

bagpipers to most of the bars in downtown Gulf Shores. Grand Marshall McGinnes may not be walking the entire route this year, but he has secured the GSPD to keep paraders safe in their jour-

The procession starts around 9:30 a.m. from Papa Rocco's, located two blocks from the beach on Hwv. 59.

Papa Rocco is paying for the Gulf Shores Police Dept. to help with traffic control and safety concerns, and the GSPD even suggested that McGinnes

talk to the other business owners on the parade route about sharing the cost of providing security.

"I appreciate that. And it's important to me that everybody remains safe. But the whole idea when we started this thing was to go in and help them get a little jump start to the season, not ask for money. So, I would just as soon pay for it myself since it's become part of my legacy at this point."

The March 17 parade of pubs has been a Gulf Shores tradition since the mid-1970's when then Pink Pony Pub owner Vince Murphy recruited the late bagpiper Jocko McLain and a few friends to visit a list of bars that mostly no longer exist.

There was no such thing as a spring break season back then, as many local restaurants and retailers closed up shop between Labor Day and Memorial

"When Vince Murphy started this, there were maybe 30 people," McGinnes said. "No way we ever dreamed it would get this big. I am getting calls from all over the U.S. This has become a really big deal, and all we were trying to do was make it be a good time while giving a little jump start to the local pubs."

Murphy passed the baton to local character John Kelliher, who led the swarm behind Jocko into Papa Rocco's just after McGinnes opened his restaurant in 1984. Kelliher, The Colonel to his friends, deemed McGinnes worthy of the grand marshal's position in 1989.

"We didn't have a spring break tourists back then. It's gotten a lot bigger, obviously. I'm expecting the biggest crowd yet," McGinnes said. "People come from all over Alabama, Mississippi and Louisiana. Our snowbirds love it. And we do get some spring breakers.

"We even have grandkids of some of the originals coming out with us," McGinnes added.

The Green Horde is easy to find, as the crowd takes over the grounds at every stop, and this is just the seventh parade since the passing of the bgeloved McLean, the parade's original bagpiper, who died in August of 2017 at his home in Canada.

But although Jocko is gone in body, his spirit will always be a big part of the festivities and the heart and soul of the parade, according to McGinnes.

"I met Jocko at the American Legion and we immediately sat down and killed off a bottle of Irish whiskey between us,' said. "We McGinnes started talking about Scotland and the Rangers (soccer team) and it was like we had known each other for years. There were a couple of years when we hitched a ride back to Papa Rocco's, but I can't do that anymore."

McGinnes said he loves that the parade is a way for wintering grandparents to spend a fun day with their adult children

and adult grandchildren. He added that a big part of the parade's allure is that it is often a reunion for old friends that know for sure they will see each other on St. Patrick's Day in downtown Gulf

'We want to make sure that people are being safe when crossing public roads. That's paramount. People need to stay safe," he said.

"I'm not even sure we should be calling it a parade," he added. "But we are not sure what we are doing besides having fun," McGinnes said. "I do know that lots of people come up and tell me they look forward to this every year.'

The Gulf Shores Police Dept. has asked all participants to drink from plastic cups (see Papa Rocco's advertisement on page 2), stay on the sidewalks, obey traffic signals and use discretion when

consuming cocktails.

McGinnes will pay to bring bagpiping pied pipers led by his nephew (Neil McGinnes) to signal when it is time to move to the next pub. They will also play songs at most every stop.

"Jocko was the original," McGinnes said. "He was doing it way before my boys came down and played. We were close for many years. Jock gave me my

first kilt."

After leaving Papa Rocco's, the parade will proceeds to The Ice House, Mudbugs, The Steamer, Desoto's, The Hangout, The Pink Pony, Gulf Island Grille and Hooters. The crawl ends around 2 p.m. at Mikee's. But by then most of the crowd will have been left behind to eat a meal at one of the other






Foley cuts down old 80 ft. flagpole near town center

An 80 ft. flagpole that stood near the intersection of Alabama 59 and U.S. 98 for 20 years has been cut down and laid on the parking lot near The Book Exchange. The pole was erected in 2003, replacing a 60-foot wooden pole on the same site. The pole was replaced by a taller structure in 2023. The cost, however, was considered too high to make the move economical.

GSOBT moving forward with new sportsplex north of Intracoastal

Conceptual plan includes 24 youth fields, indoor facility, RV park & retail space

The Gulf Shores & Orange Beach Tourism leadership has chosen an architectural firm to begin the initial conceptual site plan for a sports complex on 111 acres it owns on the north side of Coastal Gateway Blvd. (County Road 8 East) adjacent to the Foley Beach Express in Gulf Shores.

The planned Herbert J. Malone Sportsplex will be named after the agency's longtime director Herb Malone, who 30 years ago helped create Gulf Shores & Orange Beach Tourism along with state representatives Walter Penry and Steve McMillan, local publisher Gary Ellis and others. The sportsplex will icnlude accompanying retail space and 51-spot RV park and it will be built in phases.

Russ said the site for the facility is 111.26 acres located on the north side of Coastal Gateway Blvd. (County Rd 8 East) adjacent to the Foley Beach Express. Plans include 69.37 acres for outdoor fields, 10.79 acres for an indoor facility, and 14.6 acres for retail/commercial space.

Phase 1 of the project will focus on the outdoor complex, which will include six diamond flex fields, six multi-purpose fields, and one championship field.

The total capacity for youth sized fields would be 24, and the design will also include a press box, training room, check-in/ticketing area, kitchen and café seating.

Phase 2 will focus on building an indoor facility with more than 87,000 square feet of indoor court

space for basketball, volleyball, wrestling, and pickleball, along with bleacher seating.

The indoor building would also have areas for a café, sports medicine clinic, and a small family entertainment area such as an arcade and/or boutique bowling alley.

"Because of the location, we also want to make sure there are amenities that benefit this growing neighborhood," said Michelle Russ, Vice-President of Sales, Sports & Events for GSOBT. "The plans also include retail and commercial space for restaurants, coffee shops, and the like."

Russ said the Gulf Shores and Orange Beach recreational facilities are already being heavily used by the cities' school and recreataional teams. So, there is a need to alleviate sports tourism play from those city owned complexes.

The continued growth of the sports tourism industry and increased competition from other youth sports tourism destinations make this growth essential for the Alabama Coast to stay competitive in the booming market.

There is no set timetable for the construction of the new sportsplex. The parcel of land is located to the west and north of the Auburn University satellite facility. The far north end of the property meets the city of Foley line and is close to the Orange Beach city limits.

The project goal is to fill the facility gap to grow sports and event tourism while enhancing residential needs. More info: GSOBsports.com.

Bill Whyte and Brent Burns March 13 at Mile Marker 58

Bill Whyte will join local Trop Rock royalty Brent Burns for a special March 13 concert on the Mile Marker 58 back deck at The Wharf in Orange Beach. The waterfront show will include a 5 p.m. meet 'n greet before the 6-8 p.m. show. Cover charge is \$10.

"Bill will be in the area for a show in Mobile and he is going to come down early so we can work on a few songs," Burns said about his longtime musical collaborator. "We go back and forth with songs all the time over the internet, including three or four we have in the works right now."

Burns first included co-writes with Whyte on his third album, Tropical Nuts, and he estimates that they have written around 50 songs together since then, including eight songs on Burns' latest release, Lots of Beaches to Go.

"We are like brothers from the same mother, and we love to cut up," Burns said. "We get after each other when we talk on the phone just like we do when we are on stage. The guy cracks me up and I think I crack him up, too."

The tongue-in-cheek tone of two Burns/Whyte co-writes from Burns' recent release are evident by the titles: "Dead People's Clothes," and "Things You Shouldn't Do When Drinking."

Whyte has been writing songs and performing at corporate events, casinos, fairs and comedy clubs since he was a teen.

He has a song on the album that won the Grammy in 2017 for Best Contemporary Christian Album and wrote the title track on the Joe Nichols CD "Crickets." His songs have been recorded by Ray Stevens and Cledus T. Judd among many others. In 2016, he landed a #1 Gospel Bluegrass song for "He's A Coming" recorded by Darin and Brooke Aldridge.

Whyte is also an accomplished radio broadcaster and has hosted morning shows in Cincinnati, Milwaukee, Indianapolis and Nashville. He has been nominated three times for the CMA Air Personality of the Year and is in the Nashville Broadcasters Hall of Fame.

Burns has released 12 additional CDs since 1999's Livin' The Life (Jimmy Buffett Only Wrote About) put him among the Trop Rock luminar. His Trop Rock awards have reached double digits. They include Song and CD of the Year for 2012's "Don't Come Knockin' If The Tiki Hut's Rockin." In 2021, Burns was presented the TropRock Music Association Lifetime Achievement award.

At least a part-time resident since he took a summer residency at the Gulf Shores Holiday Inn in 1972, Burns was named Pleasure Island's official music ambassador by the Convention & Visitors Bureau in 2006.

He also has a box full of plaques that thank him for the philanthropy that has continued to be his hallmark for 50 years. A long-time supporter of Habitat For Humanity (\$1 donation for each CD sold), Burns reaches out to many other charities, both local and national. He received a special WAVE award for his humanitarian work through his Brent Burns Charitable Foundation.

Burns' first taste of national attention came when he released Cheaper Crude or No More Food in 1980 in response to the previous year's OPEC oil price hike. Brent spent \$1,800 that he didn't really have to record the single with a DJ friend from Phoenix, and it ended up selling 200,000 copies the first day and 500,000 copies the first month.




GSHS GIRLS' BASKETBALL TEAM ADVANCES TO FIRST EVER FINAL FOUR:





Foley named nation's top cost-effective retirement spot

A national study found that Foley is the most cost-effective retirement location in the United States.

The survey by GOBankingRates looked at the best and worst locations for a practical retirement. As the population ages and more baby boomers retire, many are looking for nice temperate locations where they can get the most for their money. Foley came out on top according to this study.

The study analyzed 100 cities in the country with a large population of adults who are 65 or older. The cities were ranked based on factors such as the average home value, property taxes, home health costs, the price of groceries and utilities and whether the state the community was in taxed Social Security benefits.

The study found that Foley was the best place for a cost-effective retirement as well as being an attractive location. The study was also reported by Travel and Leisure magazine.

GoBankingRates listed factors such as Foley's location just north of the Gulf beaches and the fact that 30.7% of the population is 65

Prices are low compared to other communities. The annual cost of a home health aide is \$46,218 and the annual cost of groceries is \$4,326 and the cost of utilities is \$3,858

Alabama also does not tax Social Security benefits.

Other cities in the top five for retirees were Mountain Home, Arkansas, Hot Springs Village, Arkansas; The Villages, Florida and Bella Vista, Arkansas followed by Pinehurst, North Carolina; Green Valley, Arizona, North Myrtle Beach, South Carolina, Fredericksburg, Texas and Punta Gorda, Florida.

Malibu, California was listed as the worst place to retire economically. The average price of a home in Malibu in 2023 was almost \$3.84 million, compared to \$296,232 in Foley. The property tax rate in Malibu is 0.73%, while the rate in Foley is 0.39%.

WHAT'S HAPPENING

PIER & SHORE FISHING OUTLOOK

It appears that Spring is winning the weather battle along the Baldwin County coastline, with a string of above average temperature days warming the Gulf



and backbay waters into the low to middle 60s, a little above average. 65 is the temperature usually triggering fish to become more active and hungry.

Sheepshead are often the first species to respond to the warm up as they move toward the mouth of bays and inlets, gathering in prespawn schools near most any hard structures. Piers, docks, seawalls and jetties become sheepshead magnets during March,

leading up to the spawn. Most are caught using live shrimp freelined around the structures, though finding live bait can be a real challenge as demand really ramps up, even as supplies are dropping. Sheepshead may also feed directly on the barnacles and small crabs clinging to these structures themselves especially on sunny days. So, that is when fiddler crabs really shine as the best bait. When sheepshead are holding near the bottom, so-called Football and Free-swinging jigs provide an excellent means of presentation to the sheepshead which are notorious bait stealers. Hence the nickname "convict fish", due also to their vertical black and white stripes. But their incisor like teeth which resemble that of a sheep, are where they get their true name. Ghost shrimp are another great bait for sheepshead whenever they are schooling on the bottom, especially on a cloudy day with a moderate current. Try a Carolina rig or single drop rig presentation for best re-

Spanish mackerel are true harbingers of spring in this part of the fishing world. Their migratory pattern brings them back to Alabama coastal waters once the temperature sustains above 65 degrees. Mostly small ones show up first, 10 inch to 14 inch fork length (FL). But quickly, larger specimens 16 to 18 inch FL follow. Traditionally it was not unusual at all for hundreds of spanish mackerel to be caught almost daily from the Gulf State Park Pier during this period. But that will not be an option this spring as the pier remains closed during repairs. Still, good numbers of mackerel can be caught from the west jetty at Alabama Point, and along the seawall or beaches near Perdido Pass where an incoming tide is best for mackerel fishing. Most any small jig (½ ounce), or lures like the Gotcha plug or small hard lures such as Rapala X-Rap (#6 or #8) will garner bites from the ravenous mackerel. Be sure to protect your lure (and inve\$tment) with a foot or two of heavy, clear monofilament (30# to 50# test). That should be thick enough to prevent being cut off by those razor sharp mackerel teeth most of the time. Just check the leader and line periodically for nicks which could lead to loosing your lure and fish.

The newly opened Seawall Park under the west end of the Perdido Pass bridge continues to be a hub of activity for redfish, both slot and over slot-sized. Nights with an incoming tide have been especially productive near the end of the running tide, though action slowed around the previous NEAP tide period. This upcoming fortnight will experience a NEAP tide around March 11th, just after the New Moon, and coincidentally the change to Daylight Savings Time. The fish won't care about that, but the tide times will spring forward as well. The time of high tide progresses forward about an hour later each day following the NEAP. Numbers and sizes of sheepshead have been increasing in that area as well, and the jetties should be holding even more sheepshead as we progress through March.

Activity seems to be picking up along the Gulf beaches as we get these prolonged warm ups especially after a number of bright, sunny days. This helps warm the relatively shallow waters in the surf zone and back bays stimulating the fish to want to feed more. Solitary, large black drum continue to prowl the surf, but a few more pompano are starting to show up too. Though in many places the long shore sandbar is a hundred yards or more from the beach. That means it takes a herculean cast to reach the back slope of the sandbar where the fish are more likely to be traveling or looking for food. Only rarely will much of anything besides hardhead catfish be holding in the wide and deep longshore trough this time of year. So, your best bets for success will be making an extremely long cast out to the sandbar, or in close where the water changes color 30 to 40 yards off the beach.

The water remains too cool for wadefishing without chest waders, so that isn't much of an option open to anglers at this time. Another area that will be open to anglers in Perdido Key is at the Gulf Islands National Seashore east of Johnson's Beach. Several new beach access areas are now open (as of March 1st.) This is traditionally a great stretch of beach for pompano fishing.

Gulf State Park Romar Beach access recently reopened, sporting an enlarged parking lot, bathroom house, and outdoor showers. Meanwhile, work on the Gulf State Park Pier repairs continue intermittently as weather allows. Progress is meticulous and slow due to stormy periods and workers having to remove debris 8 feet or more below the bottom to allow room for replacement piling to be set into precise locations. So far 9 of the 21 pilings have been set, including a couple of piling caps and some spans. In due time, these will form the backbone to bridge the shoreward pier to the free-standing octagon. Then some work will need to done to shore up some of the piling damaged during hurricane Sally in September 2020. But once the water work is completed, the pace should pick up significantly. Still, they have a long way yet to go with new ipe wood rails and floor panels all the way out to and including the end octagon, plus placing the water and electrical lines, lighting, and getting the elevator working.

Access to the beach at Mobile Street off Fort Morgan Road will be restricted over the next few months as the boardwalk is being replaced. Anglers will be able to access the beach by using the Emergency Vehicle sand trail west of the current boardwalk. The Project also includes improvements to the 30 vehicle parking lot to allow better drainage so rainwater will not stand for days as it now does. Currently beach erosion has encroached almost to the dune line near the access point, so there may be a drop off there now. The replacement structure promises to be ADA compliant, meaning it will have a ramp and not just stairs. So it will be easier for anglers to egress once the project is completed.

Maintenance dredging at Little Lagoon Pass continues to make headway by removing much of the sand that nearly choked off the flow of water through the mouth of the channel. Fishing there should improve as more water flow is restored once the channel depth is returned to that required by law. Be vigilant of drop offs and deep holes while wading in the area, especially when the water is dingy. And keep an eye out for the kids! But the pass is a historically good fishing spot, even though you have to pay to fish there now.



Work begins On 73-Room Foley Hotel:

Work is underway for Foley's newest hotel, a four-story facility with 73 rooms next to the Foley Farmers' and Fishermen's Market at the northeast corner of Miflin Road - County Rd/20 - and Koniar Way. Foley Mayor Ralph Hellmich said the hotel, located near the growing commercial area and city recreation complex, will be a benefit for economic growth and sports tourism, and proudly noted that it was being built by local investors using local financing. While the company name is Cobblestone Hotels and Suites, most of the 73 units in the Foley facility will be standard hotel rooms with a few suites. The 40,487 square foot building will also include a breakfast area-bar, an outdoor pool and an outdoor seating area-patio.

Another hotel, the Fairfield Inn with 107 units, is also under construction. When both hotels are open, the combined capacity will increase the number of hotel rooms in Foley by almost 20%. Also planned is a resortstyle hotel to be built at OWA. The OWA hotel is scheduled to open in 2025. The Cobblestone company will work with the city to improve parking, lighting and sidewalks. Cobblestone is based in Wisconsin and has

about 170 hotels in operation or under construction.

Ballyhoo Fest postponed until April 6-7

Poarch Creek Indians are still set to perform

The tribal dancers from the Poarch Creek Indians will still be the major attraction when the postponed (from March 2-3) Ballyhoo Fest returns to the shores of Lake Shelby (20115 State Park Rd.) at Gulf State Park in Gulf Shores April 6-7. Hours are 9 a.m.

- 5 p.m. Saturday and 11 a.m. - 5 p.m. on Sunday.

The fest is a showcase for fine artists from all over the Southeast and includes fiddler and banjo competitions. But at its core, the fest has always taken pride in being a cultural exchange with the Poarch Band of Creek Indians, who will perform traditional dances dressed in spectacular ceremonial regalia at noon and again at 4 p.m. on Saturday.

Each of the dances has a specific meaning. And the audience will be invited to join the tribe for their last dances.

The Poarch Creek Indians are descendants of the original Creek Nation, which once covered almost all of Alabama and Georgia. Unlike many southeastern tribes, the Poarch Creeks were not removed from their tribal lands. They have lived together for over 150 years as the only nationally recognized tribe in Alabama.

The fest's Sunday banjo and fiddle competitions are sponsored by Flora-Bama and the Frank Brown International Songwriters Fest. Both competitions include separate youth and adult divisions and will award cash prizes totaling \$3,000.

The fest includes a children's art tent, live art demonstrations and unique food. Parking is available across from the Lake Shelby fest site at Gulf State Pier for \$5, and limited handicapped parking is available on festival grounds. Attendees can also drop off and pick up at the park entrance, then park across the street and walk over the bridge to the festival. Kenny Chesney returns to stadiums for 2023 tour

After spending the spring and summer of 2023 playing smaller venues in the markets where he launched his enviable touring career, including two memorable sold out shows in Orange Beach, Kenny Chesney is going back to stadiums in the summer of 2024.

The Messina Touring Group-promoted "Sun Goes Down 2024 Tour" begins April 20 at Raymond James Stadium in Tampa and then crisscrosses the country, hitting 18 cities before the traditional tour-closer at Gillette Stadium in Foxborough, Massachusetts, where Chesney will play his astounding 22nd show - a venue

Zac Brown Band, Megan Moroney and Uncle Kracker (Chesney's duet partner on the hit that lent its name to the tour) will support.

"I wanted a name that suggested obviously - when all the good stuff starts to happen. The one thing I've learned about No Shoes Nation and these stadium shows is they start the good times early and they just keep it going," Chesney said in a statement. "But we all know, when the sun goes down, that's when people really get loose and enjoy themselves.

"That was the thing about Kracker and my song. It captured a vibe and a moment so perfectly. No matter how much fun you're having all day long, 'everything gets hotter when the sun goes down...' I know from years of experience that's true.

"So, I can't wait to get back out there, stadium-sized 'cause there's nothing like 60,000 members of No Shoes Nation singing these songs. It's gonna be awesome."

Chesney's 2022 stadium run placed him No. 5 on Pollstar's year-end charts, grossing a hefty \$135,259,115 on 41 shows across 38 cities, selling nearly 1.3 million tickets.

Endangered Long-Eared Bats discovered in Coastal Alabama

Biologists have discovered a breeding population of endangered northern longeared bats in coastal Alabama.

The bats were discovered during the ABWG's annual Bat Blitz - an event held in a different location of the state each year to inventory local bat populations - in Baldwin and Mobile counties in May 2023.

On the last day of the event, one male and two pregnant female northern longeared bats were captured and released on a Forever Wild Land Trust tract within the Perdido River Wildlife Management Area (WMA) in Baldwin County. Prior to the 2023 Bat Blitz, the species had not been documented in southwest Alabama.

"We focused our efforts in coastal Alabama after the discovery of northern longeared bats in coastal North Carolina and South Carolina," said Nick Sharp, WFF Bat Biologist for Alabama. "This discovery is significant as there are no caves in these locations and the bats apparently do not hibernate. Rather, they are active year-round and therefore not exposed to white-nose syndrome."

Northern long-eared bats were once one of the most common bats in eastern North America but the species has been decimated by WNS - a deadly fungal disease that affects hibernating bats. According to the USFWS, WNS has caused declines of 97 to 100 percent in affected northern long-eared bat populations. Due to extreme population declines, the northern long-eared bat was federally listed as endangered under the Endangered Species Act in 2022.

"The Department of Conservation and Natural Resources has been intentional about acquiring land along the Perdido River corridor to add to the land that currently encompasses the Perdido WMA," said Chris Blankenship, ADCNR Commissioner and Chairman of the Forever Wild Land Trust Board of Trustees. "The discovery of this endangered species in the area we are working to protect is further evidence of the importance of this land in eastern Baldwin County."

In June 2023, a second effort was made to catch additional northern long-eared bats at the Perdido River WMA with the goal of locating a maternity colony. This attempt resulted in the capture of another male and a lactating female, indicating the female had given birth in the area.



The late Dr. Bob Shipp left a lasting legacy on Alabama's marine fisheries

When I reflect on my 30-plus years of covering the outdoors in Alabama, several people who influenced and contributed to my writing come to mind. No one on that list is more prominent than Dr. Bob Shipp, who died in January at age 81.

"It's going to take a while to get used to not being able to pick up the phone to ask Bob a question or send him a fish to identify," said Dr. Sean Powers, Director of the Stokes School of Marine and Environmental Sciences at the University of South Alabama (USA). "It is rare that a day goes by when someone doesn't come up to me and ask about Dr. Bob and relay a story of the impact of a class they took from him, his role as a mentor, a conversation they had with him about fish or another accolade. His impact on students, colleagues and the community is truly inspiring."

Like Powers, I've always looked to Dr. Bob as my source for information to simplify the complex fisheries management issues in Alabama waters and the Gulf of Mexico, both during my time as the Outdoors Editor at the Mobile Press-Register newspaper and currently as the outdoor writer with the Alabama Department of Conservation and Nat-

ural Resources (ADCNR).

Shipp hailed from New Orleans and received a Ph.D. in biology from Florida State University before joining the Department of Biology at South Alabama in 1972. He spent 40 years at USA and received Professor Emeritus status soon after he retired in 2013 as chair of the Department of Marine Sciences, which he helped found. Shipp also served 27 years on the Gulf of Mexico Fishery Management Council, five years on the Alabama Conservation Advisory Board and taught at Dauphin Island Sea Lab, where he was part of numerous research projects.

"Bob built the Marine Sciences program from scratch," Powers said. "Obviously he had help from a lot of talented people, but Bob built Marine Sciences at South Alabama. For an awful long time, South Alabama was known for its medical school and Marine Sciences. I would still say those are the two prominent features we're known for. That all traces back to Bob's vision of focusing on marine sciences in 1992. He convinced then President (Fred) Whiddon that we should have a Ph.D. program.

"That has paid tremendous dividends. We have moved from a department to a school of marine and environmental sciences. A lot of that was the legacy I inherited from Bob."

Powers said those contributions by Shipp were on the USA side, and his contributions on fisheries science and management were just as impactful. He said ADČNR Commissioner Chris Blankenship summed it up

"Dr. Shipp was dedicated to fisheries science and how that science could best be used for fisheries management," said Commissioner Blankenship, who also served as the Alabama Marine Resources Division Director during Shipp's tenure. "His almost three decades of service on the Gulf Council was legendary. His common-sense approach to complex management issues set the standard we use today to manage our marine fishery resources."

Powers added, "Bob would get into a meet-

ing with federal scientists, and they would be throwing all these complicated models at you. Bob was able to say, Well, that just doesn't make sense. I don't care what the math says. I don't care what the models say. that just doesn't make sense.' That moved on to management actions. They would propose these crazy management actions. Bob, again, would say, 'That makes no sense. Why are you choosing such a complicated route when you can do something much simpler?"

USA President Jo Bonner said Shipp had the ability to explain complex questions in a way that everyone could understand.

"Dr. Bob literally wrote the book on introducing the importance of marine and environmental science to the people who are fortunate enough to call the Gulf Coast their home," said President Bonner, who represented Alabama in the U.S. House of Representatives from 2003-2013. "He was highly

respected as a scholarly man who could explain his work to members of Congress, the media and the general public in a way that made everyone feel like he was talking to them, not lecturing at them.

"He also commanded universal respect from his students and colleagues, as well as

scientists and peers throughout the country and around the world. He certainly put the University of South Alabama on the map in this important field of study.

Powers said Shipp's extensive research of Alabama's iconic fish species, red snapper, still contributes to the health of the snapper population in Alabama's coastal waters and the nation's largest artificial reef system.

"There are some things with red snapper specifically that Bob figured out before anybody else," Powers said. "He had been telling the feds for a long time that the red snapper stock assessments are wrong, that there are a lot of big red snapper deep that are not being sampled. It's something we call cryptic biomass. They dismissed Bob out of hand and said it was a fairvtale. Fast forward 20 years with \$10 million and the Great Red Snapper Count and guess what? The reason we have more red snapper is because of cryptic biomass in deep waters. They are never sampled and never targeted by fishermen. That means we have this incredible buffer in

"I tried to harp on it, but I don't think Bob gets enough credit for that. Bob had all these anecdotal reports from fishermen, and his contention that stocks would rebuild quickly was absolutely correct. That was just one example of how Bob used a lot of observation and a lot of talk with fishermen. None of the scientists actually talked to the fishermen. Now, it's second nature. We all do that now. As the models got more complex, Bob's message was always to keep it simple because if fishermen didn't understand it, they weren't going to buy into the regulations. I don't think that is a message the National Marine Fisheries Service has gotten yet. To expect fishermen to be compliant, you've got to be able to give them simple explanations.'

Shipp also served as head judge of the Ala-

bama Deep Sea Fishing Rodeo (ADSFR) on Dauphin Island for more than 35 years. Powers, who assumed the role of the rodeo's head judge after Shipp's retirement, said Dr. Bob's interaction with the anglers at the rodeo and the Roy Martin Young Anglers Tournament was something to behold.

"Bob's other legacy is that he really enjoyed speaking with fishermen," Powers said. "That was the best thing about the rodeo, seeing Bob interact with the fishermen. People even wanted to get their kids' picture taken with Bob. That might be the first fish the kid had ever caught, and to get a picture with Dr. Bob made it more special. Bob never turned down a request. He would always make time. And not only would he identify a fish, he would also sometimes tell you the whole life history of the species. It just shows his knowledge and really unique personality.

"The other thing about Bob is that he had no ego, none whatsoever, at least what I saw. It was never about Bob. He had all these accolades, and he shared everything at the university. People don't understand how rare that is, especially in academics.

Powers said every picture taken of Shipp at the ADSFR or

young anglers' tournament is the same. "He's always smiling and always enjoying himself," he said. "As much as the rodeo has done for the university, Bob brought a level of recognition to the rodeo and his idea of partnership in science. That's Bob's legacy too. He brought people (scientists and researchers) to the rodeo from all over the world. We have specimens from the rodeo in the London Natural History Museum and the Smithsonian Natural History Museum. That was all Bob introducing people to the opportunity to sample fish species at the rodeo.

"What was so important for us as scientists at the rodeo is we aren't able to get on the water enough to sample these really big specimens of a wide variety of fish species.

Bob connected that with the rodeo."

Powers said Shipp's knowledge of the fish of the Gulf of Mexico was mind-boggling, especially with the species rarely seen at a fishing tournament.

"Even at this past year's rodeo, we had three fish we had to send to Bob for identification just to make sure," he said. "We can ID most everything but sometimes we have to look through our books. Bob just looked at it. All these graduate students would try to find a fish ID that Bob got wrong. Nope. He never got it wrong."
Shipp even wrote "Dr. Bob Shipp's Guide to

the Fishes of the Gulf of Mexico" to help people identify the myriad fish species in the Gulf. Powers said the book wasn't written with the scientific community in mind; it was written for anglers and the general public to use. CCA Alabama

(www.ccaalabama.org/) has several of

Shipp's books available.

"It is really written for fishermen," Powers said. "It's the go-to book for fishermen to identify a fish. It also has recipes and all kinds of information. Bob wrote it for fishermen to learn more about the fish. And unlike a scientific guide, people sit down and read through Bob's guide as a book."

Although Shipp was recognized for his pioneering work with red snapper, a different species that inhabits the Alabama surf was

special to him.

Bob liked to sit in his lawn chair and fish for his pompano," Powers said. "On the snapper research trips, Bob rarely picked up a pole offshore. He wanted everybody else to experience it, but I think he just loved his pompano fishing."

Dr. Bob has received many tributes since his death, including one from Alabama Marine Resources Director Scott Bannon.

"I had the privilege of working with Dr. Shipp - he preferred to be called Bob - on the Gulf Council and as a member of the Saltwater State Record Fish Committee," Bannon said. "I always appreciated his humble and direct guidance. He was a blessing to the State of Alabama and to the Gulf Coast.'

Powers agreed, "Bob was a tremendous man and deserves all the recognition he can


