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Alabama buys Beach Express Bridge; Toll booths will come down before Memorial Day Weekend

We used the word hopefully in our cover headline because we were not sure if an agreement is the same as a contract, and this tale of Pleasure Island bridges has been a winding one, full of unexpected twists, turns and detours.

Alabama Governor Kay Ivey recently announced that the state, The City of Orange Beach and the Baldwin County Bridge Company have signed an agreement for the state to purchase the Foley Beach Express Bridge in Orange Beach.

The bridge will become toll free immediately upon change of ownership, which is expected to happen by at least noon on the Friday before Memorial Day (May

24), according to the release.

"Alabama's Gulf Coast continues to experience record growth and success, and I am proud we are making needed infrastructure improvements in the area that will help alleviate traffic congestion for Alabamians and those visiting our beaches," said Governor Ivey. "I appreciate all those involved in this agreement that will lead to significant progress for our Coastal communities."

ALDOT will pay \$57 million to Baldwin County Bridge Company and \$3 million to the City of Orange Beach for local road

improvements.

In addition, ALDOT will pay to widen Canal Road between the Foley Beach Express and the Waterways Bridge ALDOT is currently building about one mile to the west. The new bridge will be completed in the spring or early summer of 2026.

The state will also make improvements in the way of a bypass to the beach at the Hwy. 161 intersection with Canal Rd. in Orange Beach. Those projects are already included in ALDOT's State Transportation Improvement Program.

"This agreement was made possible by the city's willingness to forego annual financial benefits in order to achieve improved traffic flow for Orange Beach and Gulf Shores citizens and visitors," said Orange Beach Mayor Tony Kennon.

"We have an annual revenue of \$1.5 million from the bridge and that was for another 30 years or so. We've given up well over \$50 million, but we've always said in the right situation, elimination of the toll and moving traffic was most important," Kennon added.

Orange Beach has been receiving a flat rate of 30 cents per toll from BCBC.

According to the governor's office, the Beach Express Bridge will be converted to carry northbound traffic while the Waterways Bridge will carry southbound traffic when that bridge is completed.

Orange Beach City Council will vote on a resolution approving the agreement at its regular meeting on May 7.

The bridge sale brings to an end the suit

filed in 2022 against the state and ALDOT Secretary John Cooper by the Baldwin County Bridge Company.

Cooper backed the Waterways Bridge from the time ALDOT first announced it was funding the project back in 2018.

BCBC argued that Cooper acted in "bad faith" during later negotiations to instead widen the Foley Beach Express. Those negotiations were brokered by Mayor Kennon.

"For years, ALDOT Director John Cooper has been on a personal mission to destroy our company. As a result of Director Cooper's actions, BCBC has been forced to increase its tolls," BCBC stated in the release announcing the law suit.

"BCBC had proposed to build a new span and provide a 4-lane bridge for the citizens of Baldwin County to use for free," the release stated.

The bridge company would have been contractually obligated to build a second span anyway if the traffic totals reached two million in June, July and August of any year and the annual total of tolls surpassed six million.

More than 5.6 million vehicles passed over the toll bridge in 2023 and its popularity has increased every year since it opened in 2000, except for COVID year 2020

Bridge company President and CEO Neal Belitsky said the decision to increase the toll from \$2.75 to \$5 had nothing to do with trying to slow the volume so it doesn't reach the threshold to trigger construction of a second span.

"I refer you to my statement of Aug. 30, 2023, which explains in detail why BCBC was forced to increase rates," Belitsky said.

"With regard to BCBC's choice to increase their tolls, the new bridge being constructed will operate toll-free for everyone forever. This is a much better deal for the people of Alabama than granting BCBC a 50-year monopoly with the ability to raise tolls on non-Baldwin County residents without limit," ALDOT stated in response.

"We respect the Alabama Supreme Court's ruling that the bad faith claim made by BCBC has failed. We look forward to restarting construction of the new, free bridge as soon as possible to help reduce traffic congestion and provide an additional evacuation route," the ALDOT release stated.

Orange Beach officials have stated that, unlike Hwy. 59, the new bridge will have only two lanes and does not take motorists directly to the beaches. The bridge branches off at Canal Road, giving motorists the options to veer west toward Gulf Shores or east into Orange Beach.

The Foley Beach Express was built by James/McInnis Group and included

seven miles of new four lane highway that was dedicated to Baldwin County when the bridge opened for business in 2000.

Certainly, the most important infrastructure improvement on the island this century, the BCBC was privately funded.

Orange Beach would later loan the company \$12 million, which was paid back with interest before the James/McInnis Group sold the company in 2006.

The Battle of the Bridges started in 2021 when Alabama pulled the plug on the Waterways Bridge the day before the construction bid was let and one month after Gulf Shores agreed to donate more than 26 acres to use as a right of way for a new spur road that would eventually link the Foley Beach Express to the emerging Waterway Blvd.

Permitting and funding were already in place. A roadway from County Road 4 to Canal Road, the bridge and a round-about on Canal Road at the south landing point was to be included as part of the project's phase one.

The decision to pull the plug the day before the project was to start came at the request of Orange Beach Mayor Kennon, who was able to open a dialogue with the new BCBC ownership group.

ALDOT said in a statement that the new developments Kennon brokered with the Foley Beach Express Toll Bridge owners were worth investigating.

Amazingly, Gulf Shores found out about it through a press release from the City of Orange Beach.

The initial request was for a three month delay to allow negotiations with Baldwin County Bridge Company that would allow ALDOT to avoid the expense of building an additional bridge.

"I am extremely disappointed to learn through a statement released by Orange Beach Mayor Tony Kennon that this project has been delayed, once again, after three years of fruitless negotiations with these new owners," Gulf Shores Mayor Robert Craft said at the time. "The transportation issues we are working to solve impact Gulf Shores as much as any community and it is totally unacceptable that we are not directly involved when decisions like this are made.

Montgomery Circuit Judge Jimmie Pool ordered the bridge project halted following a seven-day bench trial that included 13 witnesses and over 200 exhibits in May of 2022.

In August, the Alabama State Supreme Court reversed the preliminary injunction, stating that states and its agencies are immune from being sued.

Four days after the Supreme Court ruling, BCBC increased its toll from \$2.75 to \$5 with an explanation that Cooper's actions "forced" the increase.

ALDOT spokesman Tony Harris, said

that ALDOT's aim was always about relieving traffic congestion on Highway 59, and making the Foley Beach Express toll free will certainly lead more local traffic in that direction.

The traffic count on the Hwy. 59 bridge is almost five times that of the Foley Beach Express,

"We want to safely reduce the traffic congestion that is a threat to residents' quality of life and the area's economy," Harris said.

Traffic engineers still have two years to determine if opening each bridge to one way traffic only is the best way to move the most cars towards their destination.

But there is no doubt that making the Foley Beach Express a free road will alleviate congestion on Hwy. 59. And making each bridge one way may end up being the answer.

Mayor Kennon had a point back in 2021 when he told his citizens in an address that Orange Beach was always willing to go along with a new bridge, as long as it was open to one way traffic only.

"It's an absurdity to think that two competing north-south bridges and roadways with three additional intersection conflict points that don't flow as much traffic as singular, free-flowing bridge and toll booth," he said.

"We need to come up with a solution that moves traffic, because if we do that the City of Orange Beach wins, the City of Gulf Shores wins, because now you reduce your congestion on Hw. 59," Kennon added.

But State Senator Chris Elliott said that there are other options to consider.


"That final decision will be made later on," said the Josephine based senator. "We'll have to have conversations on whether that is the best plan. There are those of us that still live and work and play in that area. And we still have to get around on a daily basis.

"While the press release today said it's going to be this way, we need to continue to have those discussions to make sure that it works well for the people that work and live there, and not just the folks that play there."

The Wharf has already announced plans for the former Bama Bayou property on the north side of the Intracoastal Waterway, and two-day traffic on the Beach Express Bridge will be a consideration, as will traffic going to and from the new Gulf Shores High School and the subdivisions that seem to come out of the ground like kudzu in the southeast quarter of Foley.

Traffic engineers have two full years to determine if dual one way bridges are the answer, and not having concrete decisions made now should not prevent this deal from going through. Hopefully.

Annual commemoration of Pvt. Johnson May 4 at his namesake beach Memorial illustrates inequities of public beach access to people of color

The annual Rosamond Johnson Beach Day ceremony will take place on Saturday, May 4 at 10 a.m. on Perdido Key at Johnson Beach, the part of the Gulf Islands National Seashore named for Private Johnson. Co-sponsored by the Perdido Key Chamber of Commerce, the commemoration and wreath laying ceremony at the Johnson monument will honor and remember the life of the first Escambia County resident killed in action during the Korean War.

The event is open to the public and will include the NATTC Color Guard, a bugler and members of the Johnson family. Capt. Pat Everly, USN (Ret.), will be the keynote speaker. There is an entrance fee waiver to Johnson Beach from 8 a.m. until noon.

The ceremony, co-sponsored by the Johnson Beach Society and the Florida Black Chamber of Commerce, will conclude with a wreath lying ceremony at the Johnson monument.

Rosamond Johnson enlisted in the U.S. Army at 15, and died in combat two years later on the Korean Peninsula. While engaged with the enemy, on July 26, 1950, Private Johnson carried two wounded soldiers to safety. He was fatally wounded while attempting to save a third wounded man. On August 21, 1950, Rosamond was posthumously awarded the Purple Heart for the wounds he sustained while saving his fellow soldiers.

When Private Johnson died in 1950, Pensacola beaches were racially segregated, with areas of Perdido Key regulated for African-Americans. The Sunset Riding Club, which leased the land, declared the beach Rosamond Johnson Beach.

The area became protected as part of Gulf Islands National Seashore in 1971. The name was eventually retained and a monument and wayside honor to Private Johnson and his service to the United States of America was placed near the Johnson Beach Pavilion

Johnson Beach is located within the Perdido Key Area of Gulf Islands National Seashore. It is open daily from dawn 'til dusk.

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Fort Morganers overwhelmingly oppose proposed G.S. annexation

Fort Morgan residents made it clear that they oppose a bill proposed by State Rep. Frances Holk-Jones in the Alabama Legislature to annex 16 properties into Gulf Shores during a weekday afternoon meeting on April 26 at Shell Banks Church presented by the Fort Morgan Civic Assn. (FMCA).

Approximately 200 Fort Morgan residents, stake holders, property owners and business owners spilled out of the church and more than 800 others watched on Facebook, according to FMCA.

A petition against the proposed annexation of the Fort Morgan properties garnered around 1,200 signatures, according

to FMCA.

State Senator Chris Elliot, and Gulf Shores Mayor Robert Craft also attended the two hour meeting, and by the meeting's end agreed with Holk-Jones to support adding an amendment to the bill to keep the annexed properties' zoning with Baldwin County Planning District 25.

Senator Elliott said he would send a proposed amendment to FMCA President Joe Emerson within days, and Rep. Holk-Jones said she would not carry the bill over to 2025 session. All members of the Baldwin County Legislative Delegation need to agree for the legislation to move forward.

"Fort Morgan and the rest of Baldwin County are all watching and paying attention to what happens next," said FMCA's Jamie Strategier, a member of the Baldwin County Planning and Zoning Commission.

"An amendment of this magnitude takes careful preparation. HB473 has been rushed, yielding numerous errors and law violations up to this point.

"Fort Morganers worry this will also be rushed," she added, "and our legislators will be pressured to support an amendment that they have not had time to review and vet. Why the rush?"

"It is my regret that we didn't have this conversation much, much, much earlier," Senator Elliott said. "It would have kept a lot of this misunderstanding from happening."

Fort Morgan resident Mike Wilson proposed adding the amendment to keep the zoning designation the same for all Fort Mogan properties annexed in the future.

"The city will benefit from additional property and rental tax revenue, and the fears of high-rise condos, high-density development and increased traffic of those opposed to this effort will be satisfied," Wilson said. "Everybody wins."

Fort Morgan residents fiercely oppose high-density developments on their peninsula, and many are still leery of Gulf Shores officials' motives after the city annexed Fort Morgan Road right-of-way in 2003. That annexation was voided by the Alabama Supreme Court in 2014, according to all com

Mayor Craft said the 16 property owners requested annexation so they could take advantage of city services in a statement issued before the

meeting

"This proposed legislative annexation includes only sixteen parcels of land owned by seven families or entities who have voluntarily requested the legislature annex them into Gulf Shores, including one parcel owned by the City of Gulf Shores," according to the released statement. "We fully support the right of individual property owners to request such annexation and support the legislature in passing this bill at the request of these property owners. The passage of this legislation would give these property owners the ability to access the City services they desire, including education, without impacting anyone else or any other properties."

Most of the 16 properties in the proposed annexation (including the beautiful new restaurant Jessie's) are adjacent to Bon Secour Bay and include approximately 43 acres owned by Gulf Shores. The city purchased 23 of its 43-acre parcel about 10 miles west of Hwy. 59 on Fort Morgan Rd. in May of

2022 for \$850,000 in partnership with Gulf Shores City Schools and the Gulf Coast Center for Ecotourism and Sustainability.

Funding for the Center for Ecotourism came from a \$12.4 million BP oil spill settlement grant. The main Center For Ecotourism campus is located adjacent to the Gulf Shores City Schools campus.

"One important component of environmental education programs focused on coastal ecology is access to the many diverse estuarine environments in the region," city documents stated at the time of the purchase. "These include riparian marshes, pine savannah flatwoods, freshwater and brackish wetlands, maritime forests, and beach/bay dune ecosystems."

The parcel is surrounded by the preserved areas of the Weeks Bay National Estuarine Research Reserve to the north and the Bon Secour National Wildlife Refuge to the south. The property includes more the half of the shoreline in Ewing Bayou as well as 800 feet of shoreline on Bon Secour Bay and creates a uniquely protected watershed in a rapidly growing county.

"We have no desire to take over all of Fort Morgan," Mayor Craft said. "Highway 59 at Fort Morgan Road is one of the worst intersections in Baldwin County. Whatever you build down there, we have to deal with up here.

"It's definitely the worst in the city, and we don't have the capacity to allow or encourage growth in Fort Morgan to have more people on that road," he added. "You have to be able to get out of here."

Joe Emerson, president of the Fort Morgan Civic Association, told Al.com the Fort Morgan Planning and Zoning Advisory Committee, established by lawmakers in 2015, needed to be notified about the annexation.

"I'm not trying to tell people what they can or can't do with private property," Emerson told Al.com. "But I am wanting to make sure this is in accordance with the law."



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NCAA Beach Volleyball Championship May 3-5 at Gulf Shores Public Beach

Tourney will move to Huntington Beach for two years before hopefully returning for good

The three-time defending NCAA champion USC beach volleyball team (33-5) earned the top seed among 17 teams competing in the NCAA Championship at Gulf Shores Public Beach May 3-5. USC will face either Atlantic Sun champion North Florida (24-11) or Ohio Valley champion Chattanooga (19-9) in the round of 16 at 11 a.m. on May 3. The two bottom seeds play at 8 a.m. that same day.

All opening- and first-round matches are scheduled to be shown live on ESPNU. Quarterfinals and semifinals (May 4) will be carried live by ESPN2. The championship dual is scheduled for 10 a.m. on Sunday and will also be shown live on ESPN2.

A record six Pac-12 teams earned berths in the national tournament. Conference runner-up UCLA (32-6) was assigned the No. 2 seed and was followed by No. 3 Stanford (31-5). California (19-13) will make its third appearance. The four California Pac-12 schools are joined by a pair of first-time participants in 12th-seeded Arizona State (21-9) and 13th-seeded Washington (20-15).

The Trojans—fresh off winning their fifth conference title—received the Pac-12's automatic berth into the tournament field. It is the fourth time USC has been assigned the top seed in the national tournament. The Trojans were also seeded No. 1 in 2017 and 2022 when they won championships and in 2019 when they lost to UCLA in the final. USC has played in every NCAA tournament and has also held the No. 2 seed (2016, 2021), the No. 3 seed (2023), and the No. 5 seed (2018).

USC has won five NCAA titles including the first-ever championship awarded in 2016. The Trojans also won in 2017 to become the first-ever back-to-back NCAA champion and have won the last three (2021-23) to become first team ever to win three in a row.

The team is 27-4 all-time in NCAA duals with a 13-0 mark under fifth-year head coach Dain Blanton. Including Pac-12 tournament and AVCA championship duals, USC is 62-15 in all postseason duals with a 26-5 record under Blanton.

USC also won the final AVCA Collegiate Beach Championship in 2015 with a 28-0 record.

The Trojans are 2-0 against North Florida and played the Ospreys on the same date (May 3) in 2013 at the AVCA championship in Gulf Shores. USC also met UNF for a dual in Miami in 2023 (March 18). A meeting between USC and Chattanooga would be the first for the Trojans and the Mocs.

On the Trojans' side of the bracket, a win in the round of 16 would pit them

against either eighth-seeded West Coast Conference champion Loyola Marymount (27-13) or Big West champion Hawai'i (24-11) in the quarterfinals.

The Trojans claimed the final Pac-12 championship with USC set to depart for the Big Ten Conference in August. USC beach volleyball will move to the Mountain Pacific Sports Federation at that time.

This is also the final year that the beach volleyball national championship is scheduled to be contested in Gulf Shores. The championship will move to Huntington Beach, Calif., in 2025 (May 2-4) and 2026 (May 1-3) with Long Beach State and the Orange Beach Sports Commission set to serve as hosts.

Gulf Shores has already submitted a comprehensive bid to host the tourney in 2026 and 2027 and included language in that bid to include the following two years as well, said city spokesperson Grant Brown.

This is the eighth time the city will host the tourney, and UCLA with consecutive wins in is the only other team besides USC to claim a national title here.

"For so many years, Alabama's Beaches have provided a perfect home to showcase this amazing championship and have welcomed student-athletes, fans and staff so warmly," said Kristin Fasbender, director of championships and alliances for the NCAA.

Next to the NCAA site, more than 375 junior beach volleyball teams will compete in the 2024 Gulf Coast Region BeachFest, the largest national qualifier for USA Volleyball in the country.

Gulf Shores has reaped the rewards from jumping on board the emerging popularity of beach volleyball by hosting national championship contests at the Public Beach since 2012, four years before the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) sanctioned it as a championship sport.

Over 10,000 spectators – a record for the beach volleyball tournament – showed up to watch last year's championships, and countless more viewed the contests on ESPN.

Gulf Shores & Orange Beach Tourism estimates the championships last year brought in over \$1.5 million in economic impact, and a boost to its brand reputation from the national broadcasts. The fast-growing sport is the only collegiate national championship held in Alabama that is broadcast each year on national TV.

"Hosting a championship is a huge deal," said Shawn Weaver, director of the Pleasure Island Volleyball Club (PIVC),

which has played a role in growing beach volleyball in coastal Alabama. "I don't think (state officials) see that. This thing has been held here since 2012, and it represents our state hugely."

The American Volleyball Coaches Association hosted its sand volleyball national championships from 2012-2015, helping establish Gulf Shores as the nation's home collegiate beach volleyball. A year later, the NCAA sanctioned beach volleyball as its 90th championship sport.

"It was the perfect marriage of timing, vision and resources," recalled Kathy De-Boer, executive director of the American Volleyball Coaches Association who is retiring in June after 17 years.WQuarter final matches

CBS Sports broadcast the initial contests, before the games moved to the ESPN networks.

When the NCAA sanctioned beach volleyball in 2016, 868 student-athletes were participating in the sport. Close to 1,500 women are now participating, representing a 72% increase in seven years. Almost 100 NCAA schools sanction the sport, up from a mere 15 when the first tournaments were held in Gulf Shores.

Automatic bids went out to nine conferences this year, and the single-elimination format will add a March Madness type atmosphere.

"There are no more second chances," said DeBoer. "This raises the stakes considerably and makes the tournament much less predictable."

The City of Gulf Shores, and Gulf Shores & Orange Beach Tourism both support the tourney financially. And they are holding out hope that the city can before the permanent host for the NCAA beach volleyball championships like Oklahoma City has for softbal and Omaha for the College World Series.

"It would help us with the planning we do," said Brown. "If we know we will have the beach volleyball championships for the foreseeable future, instead of borrowing things to put on the fields (like the bleachers), we can make larger capital investments. We don't feel there are any deficiencies to having it here permanently at all.

"It would help if the SEC had a program," said Brown. "We are not sure why Alabama and Auburn haven't jumped on board yet," Brown said.

DeBoer foresees the SEC adding beach volleyball as a conference sport within the next five years, noting that South

Carolina, LSU, and Texas have teams already. Arizona, Florida, Louisiana and California have high school championships for beach volleyball.

The fun will start with a vip welcome banquet at the Orange Beach Event Center on May 9. Doors open at 5 p.m. and the program is from 6 – 9 p.m. Alabama Coastal Catering will provide food, and the banquet includes a silent auction and a concert by the Michael B-Reddy Band. A full slate of 150 vets from 30 different states and every military branch will be here to bond and share their special challenges during the weekend. The itiniary includes a deep sea fishing trip on 19 charter boats leaving Hudson Marina, Zeke's Marina and Caribe Marina at 7 a.m. on May 10. The event concludes with a BBQ hosted by Travis Hudson of Hudson Marina featuring live music following the fishing trip. Volunteers will clean the fish caught that day and distribute it among the vets.

Ironmen Outdoor Ministries was founded in Montgomery in 2007 by Rick Murphy and Greg Godwin, who were ushers at the same church. Their first event was a catfish roundup for 10 wheelchair bound children at Lagoon Park in Montgomery.

"We felt so blessed to see the children catch those fish and have a good time," said Murphy. "We still do that event.

"We do this to honor the Lord first and foremost," he added. "And we make sure we let the veterans know we have their backs just like they had our backs."

When Godwin and his wife Rachel moved to Gulf Shores in 2004, he brought the idea for this event with him. With help from the Mobile Big Game Fishing Club, American Heroes On The Gulf hosted 25 veterans in 2016. It is now capped at 150 veterans organized by Festus Potee.

Upon arrival, each vet receives a welcome bucket that includes everything from towels to gift certificates to commemorative coins and t-shirts with the American Heros on the Gulf motto: "As iron sharpens iron, so one man sharpens another."

Greg Godwin saw his dream come to fruition before he died of kidney failure in January of last year. His wife Rachel was somehow able to push through and carry on his work just a couple months later. The event is now officially named in Greg Godwin's honor. "Rachel does a fantastic job, and it was unbelieveable so courageous and bold that she was able to do this even with what she was going through last year," Murphy said.

The charters will be sent off with water cannons in Perdido Pass from local marine patrols and a flyover from a Cessna carrying a "Welcome Warriors" sign. The families of the veterans will enjoy a dolphin cruise organized by Rachel Godwin while the vets are fishing.

"I am so blessed that I get to help carry on my sweetheart's legacy. This event was Greg's vision. He talked about it for years and then it became a reality," Rachel said in 2023.

"What is amazing is they talk mostly about the good things in their life," Greg Godwin told the Mullet Wrapper before the 2022 event.

"The main thing is to make sure we are loving and honoring our veterans and we are giving our disabled veterans who come here something the can hang onto and use to help other veterans," Murphy said.

"It gives them a purpose and allows them to take the focus off of themselves. They paid the price for thier country and now they want to see what they can do to help others," Murphy added.

"Everybody that comes gets that hook in their mouth and then they are hooked for life. It's a feel good kind of thing because we get to help others and you can't beat that. People need hope and people need good things. And that's what this is. It's a good thing."

"All they have to do is get there, and we take over with the rest," Murphy said. "We love on them and tell them the Lord loves then and thank them for what they have done for us."

Murphy said Festus is not his real name, but his contribution is invaluable, as he makes sure the vets are able to get here with a secure billet at Camp Baldwin waiting for them.

Murphy said the City of Orange Beach and its mayor (Tony Kennon) and the Coastal Alabama Chamber, which recently named Ironmen Outdoor Ministries its 2024 designated charity, have been especially supportive of the event.

"They support us because we do what we say we are going to do when we say we are going to do it," Murphy said. "We are all volunteers and pay our own way, but this gives everybody involved such a good feeling to thank them and tell them that they do make a difference and to please have fun, have a good time, and whatever you need, just let us know and we will try our best to accomodate you."



Fly Fishing Fest May 3-4 at Gulf State Park

The Gulf Coast Council of Fly Fishers International will present the 2nd Annual Gulf Coast Classic Fly Fishing Festival May 3-4 at the Learning Campus of Gulf State Park.

"We're well-positioned to build on the success of last year's event and are hopeful that we'll begin to see the transition from a local to a regional event, as we're garnering significant interest from anglers and groups throughout teh Southeast this year," said event coordinator Chris Williams.

"We've also continued to grow our sponsor base and have added a number of accomplished tyers to our ranks for 2024," he added.

Entry to the exhibitors hall at the fest is \$10 per person or \$15 per family per day. Kids under 16 are admitted free. Tickets are on sale at ffigulfcoastclassic.com or at the door.

This year's Classic will include free seminars on a variety of topics including Fly Fishing the Surf, Fly Fishing Mobile Bay, and Fly Fishing for Tripletail. Six paid workshops will include - "Building Better Baitfish" and "Intermediate Deer Hair Techniques." Paid Intermediate & Advanced Casting Classes will also be available

A multi-species, catch-photo-release fly fishing tournament will be returning for a second year as a way to promote the diversity of local fisheries. Running from sunrise on Thursday, May 2, until noon on Saturday, May 4, the tournament is free to all Classic participants (must purchase a ticket to the event) and features adult and youth divisions. Prizes will include fly fishing gear, sunglasses from Bajio and subscriptions to On the Fly Magazine. Raffles & auctions will be hosted each day.

Friday's festivities will close with a keynote presentation from Tony Friedrich from the American Saltwater Guides Assn. Tony is also executive director for CCA Maryland & founder of the Lefty Kreh TieFest (the largest non-commercial fly fishing show on the east coast). He has 22-years experience in environmental & fisheries policy, and hosts The Guide Post podcast.

Big Beach Brewery's Surrender Cobra Schwarzbier reigns supreme y'all!

Gulf Shores' own Big Beach Brewery took home a bronze medal at the recent World Beer Cup Awards in Las Vegas for its German-style Schwarzbier, Surrender Cobra. The local brewery was one of 95 entries in the German-Style Schwarzbier division.

Often referred to as the Olympics of beer competitions, the World Beer Cup is the largest and most prestigious beer competition in the world. Gold, silver and bronze medals were awarded across 110 beer styles at the 2024 Cup hosted by the Brewers Assn., the national association representing small and independent breweries. Big Beach took home the Gold Award in the same German-Style Schwarzbier category at the 2022 World Beer

The southernmost microbrewery in Alabama, Big Beach is located in the Waterway Village District at 300 E. 24th Ave. Owned by the local Shamburger family, the brewery opened up to the public in early October of 2016 with about four beers on tap and a whole lot of enthusiasm. Big Beach now keeps a line-up of 12 beers on tap.

"Surrender Cobra Schwarzbier reigns supreme y'all. Next time you see a Big Beach staff member, give them the biggest high five because we are stoked," said general manager Ryan Shamburger.

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

Alabama's Red Snapper season opens May 24

Alabama state waters and federal waters will open to private and state-licensed charter vessel anglers for red snapper harvest on Friday, May 24. The season will consist of four-day weekends, Friday through Monday, beginning Friday, May 24, and continue until the private angler quota is projected to be met. Weekends are defined as 12:01 a.m. Friday through 11:59 p.m. Monday. Additionally, the entire week that includes Independence Day (July 1-5) will be open for red snapper fishing. More info: outdooral-

The season dates listed only apply to anglers fishing from shore, private recreational vessels and state-licensed Alabama commercial party boats that do not hold federal for-hire fishing permits. The season for anglers fishing from federally-permitted for-hire vessels will be announced at a future date.

The Alabama private angler quota for 2024 is set by NOAA Fisheries and is anticipated to be increased over the 2023 private angler quota of 591,185 pounds. An announcement from NOAA Fisheries is expected prior to the start of the 2024 season.

"We anticipate having a great red snapper season in 2024," said Chris Blankenship, ADCNR Commissioner. "I am excited to get back out and catch some big red snapper with family and friends in Alabama's Artificial Reef Zones again this summer. We will continue working to ensure our citizens and visitors have access to the abundant red snapper fishery off the coast of Alabama."

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

In a state known for national championships, an Alabama recreational trail has repeated its national title. Alabama Beaches' Hugh S. Branyon Backcountry Trail in Gulf State Park was named Best Recreational Trail by USA Today's 10Best Readers' Choice Awards for the second consecutive year.

Winning the nationwide competition for two consecutive years, the 28 mile trail – spanning nine ecosystems through Gulf Shores, Gulf State Park, and Orange Beach – beat out a lengthy

list of national competitors.

Vampire Beach Rugby May 11 on 'Bama Beach

The Vampire Beach Rugby Tourney returns to the Flora-Bama Beach on May 11, with a maximum of 12 teams, including men's and women's sides from representing the Pensacola Aviators and Battleship Mobile. Matches beginning at 9 a.m. and spectators are welcome.

Also a fundraiser for the National Leukemia & Lymphoma Society, the tourney will include a blood drive (thus, the name). Each team and most of the teams' followers will donate blood following their last match.

Directors Dale Wood and Dean Wood first organized the tourney to honor Alex Sharland, president of the Deep South Rugby Referees Assn. while Alex was going through treatments cancer treatments in 2019.

The format is a free flowing version of Rugby 7's, which debuted as a medal sport at the 2016 Summer Olympics. Matches will consist of two five minute halves. There will be five players on the pitch from each team and a maximum of eight players on each roster (as per USARFU beach rugby laws).

Typical rugby plays such as rucks, mauls, lineouts and scrums do not exist and there is no kicking allowed. When a player is stopped, the ball must be played within two seconds and if not, the defending team is awarded possession

Scoring a try in the middle onethird of the pitch is awarded three points. Touching the ball down on the outside one-third of the try line is one point

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WHAT'S HAPPENING

PIER & SHORE FISHING OUTLOOK

The weather pattern of late has been mostly clear skies with light winds, cooler than average temperatures, with low humidity, and near calm seas with



clear water. Slightly warmer (highs in the 80s and lows in the 60s) and windier conditions are forecast through this fortnight, about typical for mid spring. Each cycle seems to run about a week or so, but the fronts are becoming progressively weaker.

From shore fishing seems to be about on track too with pompano numbers peaking in the surf zone while blue runner (hard-

tails), ladyfish (skipjack), bluefish, kingfish (whiting and ground mullet), speckled trout and redfish begin to move in to soon dominate the bite on the gulf beaches. Though occasional bouts of spanish mackerel and waves of flounder may move inshore to round out most of the surf fishing experience. We can expect to see more schools of large jack crevelle migrating from east to west just outside the beach sandbar, or chasing schools of mullet or any other small fish that happen in their path in the longshore trough. Schools of bull redfish have been near the point at Fort Morgan, especially on the outgoing tides. With single reds, black drum, or small sharks occasionally surprising pompano fishermen along the gulf beaches. A lot of fish are active during this period, generally considered one of the best times of year to fish in the area!

The Alabama Pomp Stomp was quite successful again this year, and the final results can be seen at Fishing Chaos under APS2. Hopefully the pompano brood collection went well too, and Marine Resources was at least close to their goal of 50 pompano. These fish will enhance the genetic stock of pompano used for breeding by Alabama Marine Resources - Claude Peteet Mariculture Center in Gulf Shores. Several hundred thousand miniature pompano have been raised and released from the hatchery. And some really nice prizes were offered by Sam's and CCA - Al-

abama to anglers who participated.

The month starts out being dominated by a NEAP tide period centered on May 4th. But the week following that will experience much higher tidal variation, maxing out with about two feet of difference May 9th through 11th. This is coincident with the darker moon phases and a New Moon May 7th. Look for pompano and whiting to linger in the surf depending on the synoptic weather condition. Water temperatures will continue to gradually increase from the low 70s through the middle 70s, as is typical for early May. This is due to higher air temperatures, more daylight hours, and a higher solar declination or angle of the sun's path above the horizon which allows more incoming solar radiation.

As all this meteorology plays together, more pelagic fish (mackerel and jacks) migrate into our nearshore waters to feed and spawn. Even resident speckled trout are often found in the surf zone resting and feeding between spawning periods this month. They make use of beach troughs that are at least 4 feet deep at high tide, to hide from prowling predators like jack crevelle, sharks and dolphins. Also, the presence of baitfish, especially mullet milling around in these troughs is a good tip off there could be trout

Anglers often like to start off relatively calm mornings by throwing topwater lures like Heddon Spook, Spook Junior, or Rapala Skitterwalk. Once the sun rises and the topwater bite falls off, try a sinking twitchbait like a MirrOlure MirrOdine MR 17 or sinking MR 18 if the fish are holding a little deeper. Later in the day you may do better by switching over to a bottom bouncing 3 inch grub on a leadhead jig, or a fake shrimp like Voodoo or D.O.A. Specks will strike a variety of lures in different situations, so experiment with the basic patterns in common colors before giving up on a likely looking spot.

There are generally more speckled trout along the beaches closer to Mobile Bay simply because it is by far a larger estuary. But note that Perdido Bay, Little Lagoon, and Big Lagoon in Perdido Key all support viable populations of trout that can be explored and exploited this month. In fact, as waters warm this month there should be more activity in the back

bays around lighted docks and piers.

Even the lighted area of Perdido Pass Seawall Park has produced speckled trout at night and early morning in the past. A variety of lures will work, especially those that mimic any visibly active bait species. Of course live shrimp or small mullet are always angler favorites for garnering attention from more fish. Unfortunately, that means they attract a LOT of bycatch too, so pick your poison. Bluefish, ladyfish, pinfish, pigfish, and undersized mangrove snapper, along with other pesky bait nibblers are coming into seasonal abundance. Great thing about them though is these "sea bream" are pretty tasty too. Just scale, fillet, and fry these saltwater panfish like bluegill. Plus ladyfish make good fishcakes, and bluefish are just downright tasty when properly handled and prepared. The inland piers in Orange Beach, Little Lagoon and at Fort Morgan produce a lot of these non-target fish along with abundant croaker, silver perch, and even some white trout or other more desirable species such as trout, flounder, or slot redfish.

Spanish mackerel should remain the primary target species for a majority of seawall and jetty fishermen during this period. But with the water warming and more baitfish showing up in the pass and around the lighted area more bluefish and ladyfish will appear as bycatch. Blue runners are also frequently caught in large numbers from the west jetty and seawall this time of year. At times they may even be the most common catch. Alternative target species like speckled trout, redfish and flounder can still be found there, but will become more difficult to target using live shrimp or even bull minnows due to all the active bycatch species.

The boardwalk at the south end of Mobile Street public access is still under construction. That will likely continue at least though this month, as a completion date has vet to be announced by the National Wildlife Refuge. The beaches in that area have continued to produce pompano along with other desirable target species, and can be a good area to try for speckled trout when the Gulf is calm enough.

Work continues at the Gulf State Park Pier too, now at a faster pace since it is fully attached again. But so much work remains to do there, it is still too early to announce a reopening date. Though, while in Gulf Shores recently, ADCNR Commissioner Chris Blankenship did sound optimistic about the pier reopening sometime later this summer. That will be well received once it happens, and should greatly lessen the angling pressure other venues have been receiving so far this year.




GSP CELEBRATES NEW CABINS AT LAKE SHELBY, ROMAR BEACH ACCESS OPENING:

Government officials, civic leaders and State Parks personnel recently gathered for a ceremonial ribbon-cutting to officially open the new Lakeside Cabins at Gulf State Park. The event marked the end of a major renovation project after Hurricane Sally severely damaged the cabins in September 2020. At a cost of \$8.8 million, the project replaced 17 damaged structures with 20 modern lakeside cabins. All 20 cabins have direct access to Lake Shelby and are equipped with modern furniture, kitchen appliances, laundry rooms, screened patios and will accommodate up to eight overnight guests. "We're committed to creating a first-class guest experience at every state park, and these gorgeous cabins definitely deliver on that promise," said Alabama Department of Conservation and Natural Resources Commissioner Chris Blankenship. The new Lakeside Cabins increase Gulf State Park's lakeside lodging inventory to a total of 30 cabins. "It's wonderful to have such fantastic partners who make our area better by

improving and expanding offerings for those visiting from near and far," said Gulf Shores Mayor Robert Craft.

In addition, officials celebrated the recent re-opening of Gulf State Park's Romar Beach access, a project which featured construction of a permanent restroom, a beach boardwalk, outdoor showers, an expanded paved parking lot and the addition of electric vehicle charging stations. The \$700,000 project was funded by state bonds and expands beach access for GSP guests and area residents. Romar Beach access is 6.6 miles east of Hwy. 59 and 1.3 miles west of Hwy. 161. 
