The City of Orange Beach Expect Excellence Music Department will present the Summer 2024 edition of "Dream On: A Tribute to Classic Rock" June 27-29 at the Orange Beach Performing Arts Center.

"Dream On" is a classic rock tribute show dedicated to some of the greatest music of all time. There's something for everyone to enjoy. Showtimes are 7 p.m. on Thursday and Friday and at 2 p.m. on Saturday. General admission tickets are \$15. Doors open one hour before show time. The show is two hours long with no intermission. The classic rock tribute has quickly become a wildly popular addition to the Expect Excellence music musical theatre deptartment. Due to the overwhelming audience response to the inaugural summer show last year, the decision was made to add a winter performance that also sold out.

The 21-song, high-energy concert will feature hits from classic rock icons such as AC/DC, Guns n' Roses, Bon Jovi, and the title group, Aerosmith.

"You can't help but have a smile on your face when listening to, or performing these songs," said E.E. Music Director Caleb Pittman

"Performing these all-time classics can end up being terrifying yet thrilling, all at the same time. To have the opportunity to perform these songs live, is just special. These are the most iconic songs of all time; if you mess up, people will notice. And if you are looking to rock out, sing and dance, then look no further. You don't want to miss this experience," he said.

"These shows have been so well received and we are anticipating more of the same. Don't wait too long to get your tickets for this show, because we are expecting to sell out," Langston said.

let, hushpuppies, cole slaw, baked beans, dessert and coffee or tea.





#### Walton County, FL shark attack victims include two Alabama teens

South Walton County, Florida Fire District lifeguards hung red and purple caution flags on Seacrest Beach (about 90 miles east of Orange Beach) on June 6 after two teenage girls from Mountain Brook were victims of a shark attack earlier that day. The girls were in waist deep water with a group of friends when the attack occurred. One teen, Lulu Gribbin, lost her leg and her hand (see her mom's report below). The other teen received flesh wounds to her right foot.

Another shark attack occurred less than two hours earlier at Water Sound Beach, located about four miles to the west of Seacrest Beach. Elisabeth Foley, 45, of Virginia sustained severe injuries to her midsection and pelvic area and lost her left hand. She was swimming with her husband when attacked.

Officials do not know what kind of shark bit the victims, but they stated that a bull shark was the likely culprit. Police spotted numerous bull sharks near the area the morning following the attacks. Officials stressed that shark sightings on Northwest Florida beaches are not uncommon. But shark attacks are rare.

In June 2005, a 14-year-old girl from Louisiana on a boogie board 250 yards from shore was pulled under by a shark and bit in the legs. She died as a result.

In June 2021, a 14-year-old boy was swimming 40

yards from the shore in Grayton Beach when he was bit in the chest area. He survived.

"We want to reiterate that sharks are always present in the Gulf," the Walton County Sheriff's Dept. posted. "Swimmers and beachgoers should be cautious when swimming and stay aware of their surroundings. We know we share the water with sharks. We understand as tragic as this is, they are always in the water."

The International Shark Attack File (ISAF) investigated 120 shark-human interactions in 2023. Of the 69 unprovoked attacks, 16 were in Florida.

There were 14 fatal shark attacks worldwide last year, more than double the five-year average of six. The ISAF noted three of the unprovoked and fatal attacks in Australia were from Great White sharks attacking surfers. There were no shark attacks reported along Alabama's 50 miles of coast in 2023.

Since 1837, Alabama ranks just 11th in the U.S. for unprovoked shark attacks with 10. There were 928 confirmed attacks in Florida during the same time span.

Surfers accounted for 42 percent of all shark bites worldwide. The majority of unprovoked shark attacks are test bites, which occur when a shark misidentifies a human as their normal prey.

"While we've had some of those here along our history, they're highly unusual, extremely unusual for two to happen in the same afternoon and within four miles of each other," said South Walton Fire District Chief Ryan Crawford.

#### "Pray for us to have the right words to lift her up and encourage her."

Ann Blair Gribbin, the mother of Lulu Gribbin, the Mountain Brook teen who lost a hand and leg to a shark attack 90 miles east of Orange Beach on a Walton County shark attack, posted a June 9 update on her daughter's condition on the Caring Bridge website:

I wanted to share Lulu Gribbins story so that everyone can continue to pray for this sweet and beautiful child of ours. Lulu and her twin sister, Ellie, and I headed down from Birmingham to the beach with some of their friends and their moms on Wednesday June 5. It was our first mother daughter beach trip, and we were all incredibly excited. Our first two days were amazing on the beach being with friends and going to dinners.

Friday, we decided to walk down from where we were staying right outside Rosemary Beach for lunch. After lunch we were walking back on the beach to the girls and everyone on the beach was standing looking out into the water. No one was in the water and all we heard was there was a shark and we started to look as well. My friend called both her daughters and they were not answering so she started to panic and said there is something wrong and started running and so we all did.

The beach was packed with people just looking. I came up on a group of people surrounding someone on the ground and looked down and it was Lulu who was there. Ellie found me and said Mom its Lulu. I saw her wounds on her leg and started to scream. She was lifeless her eyes closed mouth white and pale. The wound on her leg or all that was left of her leg was something out of a movie. I finally made it back to her and held her hand and she saw me, and I told her I was there. Her eyes were open.

I had no idea how long she had been there or what had happened. Almost immediately the beach truck was there and the EMT's loaded her onto a board and put her back in the truck and wheeled her off, she was air lifted away. One of my Mom friends immediately got me and Ellie up to house and in the car. We were told she was going one place and then finally got an answer she was going to Sacred Heart in Pensacola. This was an hour and 20-minute drive. We prayed the entire way. My friend who was driving was a God send for me and Ellie and knew exactly what to pray. All I could say over and over was please be alive please breathe. No one we called could give us any information.

We got to Sacred Heart and Lulu was already in surgery, but they answered my prayer that she was alive, and her vitals were good. Joe met me there and we waited for the surgeons to come and talk to us. Once they did we were informed that the shark had bitten off Lulu's left hand and that they had to amputate her right leg halfway up from her knee to her hip. She also had lost 2/3 of the blood in her body. Of course, no one wants that for your child but she is alive. They also told us that Lulu may be intubated for the next week or so and would need 4-5 surgeries to finalize her amputations.

Yesterday, Saturday Lulu did not have surgery like we expected and her vitals were exactly what the team of doctors and nurses wanted. She did so well that they ended up taking the tube out of her throat and she was breathing on her own. This was a first big step. Once she was settled her first words to us were "I made it." And boy she did.

Lulu relived the story of what happened on the beach that day. There were 6 friends all at the first sand bar about waist high looking for sand dollars. Probably like the hundreds of other people in the water that day. I am not sure who noticed the shark first, but Lulu said it bit her hand and then her leg and then went for her other friend and got her foot. Lulu said a man grabbed her other arm and pulled her out and an-

other younger boy helped him carry her to shore. Once on the shore there were two doctors and two other young women one of whom was a nurse who were all surrounding Lulu. These individuals put tourniquets on Lulus wounds. Which I believe was crucial to saving Lulu's life. She was then taken by the beach truck and airlifted to Sacred Heart in Pensacola where we are now.

I am eternally grateful for the 3 surgeons and all the nursing staff and doctors here at this hospital who saved Lulu. I am grateful for the doctors and nurses on the beach that day. I am grateful for the EMT's on the beach and the crew in the air. I am grateful for the individual who pulled her out of the water. At this point we will have multiple surgeries in the days to come and our lives will be forever changed. Lulu is strong, beautiful, brave and so many more things I can't count. God has a plan for her, and we will be there to

support her every way we can.

We appreciate the outpouring of love and support that we have been shown. All the text messages, videos, instagrams, facebook posts, calls etc have lifted us all up. Please continue to pray for Lulu. Pray for her to have strength to get through whatever is coming her way. Pray for her healing to be fast and pain to be as minimal as possible. She is worried about not fitting in and people making fun of her. I need prayers for everyone to be understanding and to show her grace. I also need prayers for Lulu to know that her hand and her leg do not define who she is. Please pray for Joe and I to give her strength and be the rock she needs. Pray for us to have the right words to lift her up and encourage her. I also would like prayers for all the girls that were on the beach with her and the trauma they have endured. Sweet Lulu is more worried for her friends than she is herself, which is a testament to her character. I know this was a terrible accident, but God was there and had the people there who helped save her life. Lulu said she felt God in the back of the beach truck. She is truly a miracle. We have a long road ahead and our journey is just beginning!"

The Bill Hargreaves Fishing Rodeo started on Mother's Day in 1971. There were 18 anglers.

Roberta Kent knows this because she was there. Currently co-chair of the annual event with her husband Kent, Roberta was there in support of the rodeo's founder and namesake, who happens to be her father.

"I didn't live up here then, but I came up every year," Roberta said. "And it has always been about the kids. It's about watching the kids have fun and keeping dad's memory alive.

"That's what makes this so special. If it were not for the kids, there would be no point. It's not about catching big fish," she added.

Hargreaves believed that involving both parents and children in a family fishing event would strengthen the family unit as a whole and that would keep children from turning to drugs.

"I thought if I could get to them before they got involved in that stuff, that would be the thing to do," he said.

The rodeo event was changed to Father's Day weekend in the late 1980's, and planning now starts in early January. It takes about a dozen volunteers working hundreds of hours to make the tourney happen.

"So many people volunteer and are so many others are donors every year, and, of course, we couldn't do it without the tremendous support from the Grande Lagoon Yacht Club," Roberta said. "It really is awesome see a bunch of people come together for each year.'

Hargreaves started the rodeo as a way to fight the war on drugs in this country. Bill thought that a fishing rodeo would be a good family event to promote what was then a Kiwanis Club of Big Lagoon initiative.

The entry fee that first year was 25 cents and the tourney proceeds added up to only \$12.50. From that very humble beginning, the Hargreaves Rodeo continues to grow.

It is now a four-day event, starting with the June 13 captains' meeting. Anglers fish and weigh-in their catch on Friday (5-8 p.m.) and Saturday (4-8 p.m.), and the event ends with a Sun-

day fish-fry from 11:30 - 2 p.m. and the 2 p.m. awards ceremony.

Fish fry ticket holders are eligible for door prize drawings. Fish-fry tickets are \$10 for adults and \$5 for children. All events are held at Grande Lagoon Yacht Club.

Prizes are presented to the King & Queen (largest open division fish by male & female), Prince & Princess (largest junior division fish by male & female), and youngest boy and girl. As is a longstanding tradition, the junior angler catching the larget croaker will win a fishing kayak.

Thanks to its sponsors, the tourney includes cash awards totaling \$7,200 in 12 different open categories. But more important to the tourney's founding theme are the 30 fish categories in the junior division. The Hargreaves Rodeo awards the most prizes to junior anglers of any rodeo on the Gulf Coast.

There is no charge for children to fish in the tourney and that combined with the adult charge of \$30 per angler, rodeo entry is affordable for all.

Robert Turpin, manager of Escambia County's Marine Resources Division, has volunteered as the weigh-in master for the past 30 years and GLYC Commodore Terry Smith will be the awards ceremony MC.

Bill Hargreaves, Jr., who lives in Margate, will also be part of the festivities.

"We used to use the fish from the tourney for the fish-fry, if people wanted to donate them. We spent a lot of time fileting fish," Roberta said.

"Now we actually buy the fish and if anybody wants to leave their fish in the cooler, Robert will take them back to Fish & Wildlife and feed them to the critters down there."

Roberta said her father would be proud that the rodeo he started to give children a special day is still going strong 53 years later.

"Without all the people coming together and helping, we couldn't have this event," she said.

Dierks Bentley, with special guests Chase Rice & Tyler Bradenwill, make a tour stop on June 28 at The Wharf Amphitheater at 7 p.m. Buy tickets online at Ticketmaster.com or at The Wharf Box Office.

Bentley, touring in support of his 2023 Gravel & Gold album, has been pumping out country music hits while having serious fun on stage for the past 20 years.

Expect him to play around 20 songs, half of them no. 1 hits from his 10-album catalog. He has also been covering Garth Brooks' "Callin' Baton Rouge" and Townes Van Zandt's "White

Freight Liner."



The band's encores have included a medley that includes other Garth songs as well as hits by Tim Mc-Graw, Shania Twain, Diamond Rio, Jo Dee Messina and Billy Ray Cyrus.

Bentley, who has won multiple Grammys American Music Awards, and Country Music Awards, burst onto the country music scene in 2003 when his self-titled debut album's toe-tapping first single, "What Was I Thinkin'," climbed to the top of the Billboard country charts. Since then, he's had 20 country No. 1s and a string of platinum albums.

"I moved to Nashville in 1994 – and I was trying to find that seed of truth, that authenticity, that thing "country music" that I had in my head, Bentley said in PBS's Country Music documentary. "I got here and it was definitely different than I expected it to be.

"It's big business, a lot of money. Luckily, for me, I found a little bar called the Station Inn where bluegrass music existed and I found what I was looking for. Just the sound of a fivepiece bluegrass band blew my mind. They're not trying to take meetings and meet producers, and get their foot in the door. It's funny, I moved to Nashville looking for country music, but I found bluegrass."

After a year at the University of Vermont and a transformative trip with his father to Nashville, Bentley transferred to Vanderbilt, graduating in 1997. He got a day job at The Nashville Network, researching old footage of performances,. He played in bars and worked on demo tracks at night.

After five dues-paying years, he was signed to Capitol Records. He has since become a superstar with the awards, album sales and sold-out concerts to support that assertion. But he said he still gets butterflys before going on stage..

"It doesn't matter where we play. It all feels like the ultimate awards show when you're there and your band's there and the crew is in the wings, and the crowd's all fired up. It doesn't get any better than that," he said. "You can't replicate the live experience. Everything else in this business has changed but doing live shows is still how you do things."

#### Tips for saving money on summer electric bills

The Dept. of Energy offers the following strategies to stay cool while keeping utility bills down during hot Gulf Coast summers

 Install window coverings to prevent heat gain through your windows during the day.

 The smaller the difference between the indoor and outdoor temperatures, the lower your overall cooling bill will be.

· Keep your house warmer than normal when you are away, and lower the thermostat setting when you return home.

 Avoid setting your thermostat at a colder setting than normal when you first turn on your air conditioner. It will not cool your home any faster.

• Turn off ceiling fans when you leave the room. Remember that fans cool people, not rooms, by creating a wind chill effect.

 When you shower or take a bath, use the bathroom fan to remove heat and humidity from your home. Make sure bathroom and kitchen fans are vented to the outside (not just to the attic).

• Schedule regular maintenance for your cooling equipment.

 Avoid placing lamps or TV sets near your room air-conditioning thermostat. The thermostat senses heat from these appliances, which can cause the air conditioner to run longer than necessary.

· Vacuum your air intake vents regularly to remove any dust buildup.

 Consider lighting options that operate at cooler temperatures.

 Wash full loads of dishes and clothes for better efficiency.

• Seal cracks and openings to prevent warm air from leaking into your home.

 Add caulk or weatherstripping to seal air leaks around doors and windows.

· Water heating accounts for about 18% of the energy consumed in your home. Set your water heater at 120 degrees.

 Ceiling fans, exhaust fans, and AC unit fans should be turned off in the cooler parts of the day.

· Thermostats should be set at 78 degrees or no more than 20 degrees below the outdoor tem-

• Leave space in between food in the fridge to prevent interior air vent blockages and open fit or short periods.

· Operate dryers and dishwashers at night on hot days and let dishes air dry.

• Wash clothes in cold water using a high spin cycle and use the dishwasher only when it's

#### One of Foley's oldest downtown buildings set to re-open

After being closed since 2007, one of Foley's oldest buildings will reopen this fall as the Colt Grill Barbecue and Spirits restaurant. Renovation work has been going on for more than a year at what was originally the Foley Bakery at the corner of North Alston Street and West Laurel Avenue. The restaurant specializes in smoked meat barbecue and will also offer entrees such as hamburgers, salads and tacos. The building renovation will also include adding several employee apartments and a restaurant office on the second floor.

The building was constructed in 1925 and served as a bakery for many years. It was most recently the site of a restaurant that closed in 2007. Foley acquired the historic building in 2012 to preserve the site and later sold the structure to developers Mark Wright and Jeremy Freidman, who have been working to renovate the building and attract a great tenant for the historic site.

The Colt Grill is one of several businesses that will soon open in downtown Foley. The building that had housed Fortis College is being renovated as the new location of Camellia Dermatology. The law firm of Milam and Milam is moving into a location on East Laurel Ave. and Cheeseburger Randys will be opening on Alston St. The former Jan's Art Studio on East Laurel Ave. will be converted into the South Baldwin Social.

"We have been waiting two years for this and for the last year, we have been trying to keep quiet about who is exactly moving in, so it is my pleasure to let the cat out of the bag," said Mayor Ralph Hellmich at a recent Main Street Foley organized gathering annoucing the opening.

Colt Grill has four locations in Arizona. Clouston said they chose Foley for the newest location after considering many communities in the region.

"We've opened up restaurants in local Arizona cities and we have chosen Foley to put down roots here because it's just an amazing place," said Brenda Marie Clouston, one of the owners.



#### Birmingham's Rickwood Field will be MLB epicenter on June 20

Alabama will be the center of the Major League baseball universe on June 20, even though the Yellowhammer State is not home to any of the league's 30 teams.

Birmingham's Rickwood Field, opened on Aug. 18, 1910, is older than both Fenway Park and Wrigley Field, and it will host its first-ever regular season Major League Baseball game, when the St. Louis Cardinals and San Francisco Giants play in a special tribute to the Negro Leagues.

The three day fest will attract the giants of the game, including Willie Mays, who played with

Birmingham Black Barons in the Negro League before he played for the Gi-

On June 18, America's oldest professional ballpark will host a Double-A game between the Montgomery Biscuits and Birmingham as part of MLB's festivities honoring the Negro League. A celebrity baseball game will be held at the field as part of

MLB's Juneteenth Celebration. The Negro Southern League Museum in Birmingham will

also be part of the celebration.

More than one-quarter of the 8,300 seated tickets being sold for the MLB game were made available to youth-based organizations in Birmingham at no cost. Alabama residents were also given precedence in an April lottery for tickets. As of June 10, tickets were selling for \$250 per on the secondary market.

MLB has dedicated a page on its website promoting the game (MLB.com/rickwood).

"The legacy of the Negro Leagues and its greatest living player, Willie Mays, is one of excellence and perseverance," baseball Commissioner Rob Manfred said in a statement. "We look forward to sharing the stories of the Negro Leagues throughout this event."

Mays, 92, is generally considered baseball's greatest living player. After playing with Birmingham, the Alabama native (Westfield) signed with the New York Giants and was voted the 1951 National League Rookie of the Year while

leading the Giants to the NL pennant.

In addition to Mays, Hank Aaron, Ernie Banks, Cool Papa Bell, Yogi Berra, Roy Campanella, Oscar Charleston, Roberto Clemente, Joe DiMaggio, Larry Doby, Rube Foster, Lou Gehrig, Josh Gibson, Monte Irvin, Reggie Jackson, Buck Leonard, Biz Mackey, Mickey Mantle, Connie Morgan, Stan Musial, Satchel Paige, Frank Robinson, Jackie Robinson, Babe Ruth, Duke Snider and Honus Wagner played on the hallowed grounds of Rickwood Field, which is listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

The Black Barons called Rickwood Field home from 1924 through 1960.

Rickwood Field was the site of the final Negro League World Series game in October 1948. Mays' Black Barons lost to the Homestead Grays in five games.

The Barons have played since 2013 at Regions Field, about three miles away. They play one game annually to Rickwood as a tribute to the team's history.

MLB is paying to install new grass and outfield wall padding, enlarge the dugouts, extend nets around the field and add a big screen to the park.

"This field is special because 182 hall of famers have played here and that include greats of the game from the Negro leagues like Satchel Paige and Jackie Robinson and then Babe Ruth played here and Ty Cobb," said Gerald Watkins, executive director of the Friends of Rickwood. He added that the improvements will have long term benefits for the park.

"We were at the point where there were many

things we couldn't get done and the promise of MLB coming here caused the city to step up in a big way and really put the ballpark back in shape. It is a blessing and it will allow Rickwood Field to be relevant for a long time to come," Watkins said.

St. Louis will be the home team for the game, scheduled to start shortly after 6 p.m. It will be televised on

Fox. Uniforms will be a tribute to the Negro League history of the participating teams.

"The legacy of the Negro Leagues and its greatest living player, Willie Mays, is one of excellence and perseverance," Manfred said. "We look forward to sharing the stories of the Negro Leagues throughout this event next year."

A World Series champion with the Giants in 1954, Mays was a 24-time All-Star, tied with Stan Musial for second-most behind Hank Aaron's 25. Mays won the 1954 major league batting title and was voted NL MVP in 1954 and

"I can't believe it. I never thought I'd see in my lifetime a Major League Baseball game being played on the very field where I played baseball as a teenager," Mays said. "It has been 75 years since I played for the Birmingham Black Barons at Rickwood Field, and to learn that my Giants will play a game there and honor the legacy of the Negro Leagues and all those who came before them is really emotional for me. We can't forget what got us here."

The Negro Leagues were created for black players during Jim Crow's heyday (1920). It was a time when segregation laws did not allow them


to play in the major leagues.

Negro League players will now hold historical MLB records. Because of the added data from more than 2,000 players in the Negro Leagues, Satchel Paige is now the 3rd best of all time for single season pitching. Josh Gibson is now the career leader in batting average, slugging parentage and OPS. Jackie Robinson, of course, was the first to break the MLB color barrier in 1947.

MLB Hall of Fame players Hank Aaron and Satchel Paige played for the Mobile Black Bears in the Negro League. MLB Hall of Famers Willie McCovey, Ozzie Smith and Billy Williams also all grew up playing baseball on the fields of Mobile.

And at one point in 1969, Mobilians Cleon Jones and Tommie Agee were starters in the outfield for the Amazing Mets. Another Mobile native, Amos Otis, was also an outfielder on that World Series Champion Mets' team.

#### Booking agency ranks Pleasure Isle only 2nd best for snapper fishing; We know better Alabama state waters include the country's largest system of artificial reefs

At least according to FishingBooker.com, the red snapper fishing is even better in Mustang Island, Texas than it is on Pleasure Island. The online fishing trip website did list Orange Beach/Gulf Shoes second behind the Texas island located about 30 miles from Corpus Christi in its 2024 rankings for red snapper destinations.

Federal and state waters are currently open for Red Snapper season, and the season will continue Fridays through Mondays until the state's recreational quota is exhausted.

Pensacola and Biloxi also made the website's list. But Orange Beach did not earn the moniker "Red Snapper Capital of the World" by accident.

It is the epicenter for catchi ng that delicious fish because charter captains, private anglers and the state's Dept. of Natural Resources have built 1,000 square miles of artificial reefs in state waters, the largest system of its kind in the U.S.

Most of those artificial reefs are located within nine miles of Perdido Pass, and because of that, Alabama harvests a

third of all recreational red snapper caught in the Gulf of Mexico. The state's Gulf front footprint is less than 53 miles, but Alabama has nearly 1,100 square miles designated for habitat enhancement.

Federal and state waters are currently open for Red Snapper season, and the season will continue Fridays through Mondays until the state's recreational quota is exhausted. In addition, anglers can catch two red snapper per day from July 1-5. All anglers 16 and older catching red snapper must have an Alabama saltwater fishing license, current saltwater angler registration and a Gulf reef fish endorsement. Every red snapper catch must be reported on the state's Snapper Check, portal at outdooralabama.com.

The Gulf states were granted state management of red snapper in 2018, which included using state data collection programs such as Snapper Check to monitor harvests. Along with small increases to the annual catch limit (quota), the red snapper seasons have consistantly increased since implementing state manage-

"Alabama has been in the forefront of reef fish management for the last decade," said Alabama DNR Commissioner Chris Blankenship. "We have shown through Snapper Check that data collection at the state level is much more accurate in the red snapper fishery and can better be trusted for management decisions. As we have said for years, the estimates of effort and catch coming from the federal MRIP program is just not reflective of what we all see in our state. Their own staff has now

admitted their system is potentially flawed. This new state-led survey is what we need to do to take away more of the uncertainty of red snapper harvest as well as the other federally and state-managed species."

A multitude of different materials have been used over the decades to create Alabama's ecologically productive reefs, including decommissioned bridge spans, oil/gas platform jackets, limestone aggregate, pre-fabricated reef modules, army tanks, repurposed concrete culverts, ships, drydocks, barges and other materials of opportunity. Most have been constructed nearshore waters, but some are up to 55 nautical miles offshore.

Hard bottom substrate is very limited along the water bottoms of Coastal Alabama and the addition of artificial reefs along the predominantly featureless landscape of sand and muddy substrates has increased the biomass of reef fish populations including Red Snapper, Gray Triggerfish, Sheepshead and Gray Snapper.

Furthermore, constructing high quality reefs within Alabama's coastal waters increases the connectivity between inshore, nearshore, and offshore habitats.

Red Drum, Sheepshead, Gray Snapper, and Southern/Gulf Flounder utilize inshore and nearshore habitats. Red Drum and Gray Snapper migrate from Alabama's coastal rivers, bayous, and bays as juveniles and early adults to the nearshore sand bars, gas platforms, and artificial reefs as spawning adults.

On the other hand, Sheepshead and flounder migrate

to and from inshore waters and nearshore hard bottom habitats each year during spawning migrations.

Reef construction projects throughout multiple depths offshore of Alabama also increases habitat utilization opportunities of juvenile Gray Triggerfish and Red Snapper before those species migrate further offshore to inhabit reefs in deeper water with more vertical com-

The availability of hard bottom habitat increases foraging opportunities, shelter and spawning potential of numerous fish.

During the first few years of a reef being placed, numerous finfish congregate around it. After several years, the structure becomes covered by epifaunal organisms such as oysters, mussels, barnacles, tunicates, sponges, and corals. The increased structural complexity offered by these bioengineers provides thousands of nooks and crannies for cryptic organisms such as crabs, worms, sea urchins, blennies, and other animals to use.

These organisms then serve as vectors for nutrient transfer and prey items for higher trophic level fish. The structure becomes a true reef complete with ecological activity throughout the trophic pyramid.

Alabama's reefs are split into 14 permit areas. In the general permit areas, reefs can be deployed by individuals after acquiring a permit from the Marine Resources Division. In order for individuals to legally construct artificial reefs outside of the general permit areas, they must request a permit from the Army Corps of Engineers.

Uninspected materials deployed outside the reef zones or general permit areas are considered ocean litter and individuals engaged in those activities are subject to prosecution.

#### Perdido Key, Pleasure Isle record first sea turtle nests

Escambia County Sea Turtle Patrol volunteers (above) recorded Perdido Key's first sea turtle nest of the season early in the morning on May 31.

On the Alabama side of the state line, Share the Beach volunteers have had an amazing first month of the nesting season. the first nest was recorded on May 7, and nine nests were being monitored as of May 31.

June and July are the busiest nesting months along the Gulf Coast, so more nests are expected in the coming weeks.

For nesting females, white lights on the beach may deter them from nesl

lting or cause them to abandon a nesting attempt, also known as a false crawl. Furniture, tents and toys left on the beach overnight create obstacles for nesting turtles and can injure or trap them on the beach. If you encounter a nesting turtle, turn off all lights and retreat a safe distance away.

Bring in all trash and beach items every night, keep white lights (including flash lights and flash photos) off the beach, fill in holes and knock down sand castles, and remember to stay back and stay quiet if you happen upon a sea turtle.

To report a nesting in Alabama, call 1-866-Sea-Turtle or 1-866-732-8878). In Florida, dead or injured sea turtles should be reported to Escambia County Marine Resources at (850) 426-1257 or the FWC Wildlife Alert line at 1-888-404-FWCC (3922).

#### HELP PROTECT NESTING SEA TURTLES & WILDLIFE:

- Lights Out! Female turtles prefer dark, quiet beaches for nesting and hatchlings need dark skies to find the Gulf of Mexico. Leave the flashlights and cell phones at home or use a red flashlight when on the beach at night. Turn off beach-facing lights and close windows and curtains to keep our beaches dark.
- Leave No Trace! Remove all furniture and toys from the beach when you're done for the day, including hammocks, tents, canopies, chairs, toys and sports equipment.
- Look Out Below! Boaters should be on the lookout for sea turtles and manatees resting at the surface or feeding in shallow waters. Use a lookout when operating at high speeds and slow down when approaching docks and marinas.
- If You Dig It, Fill It! Large holes are hazardous to both wildlife and people. Avoid digging large holes and fill in all holes.

### WHAT'S HAPPENING

### PIER & SHORE FISHING OUTLOOK

Our recent weather pattern has certainly assumed a rather summer like feel with high humidities and more than average rainfall. Any fronts that manage to press through the region this time of year lack any real coolness, instead present just two or three mornings of low humidities and clearer skies.

The Gulf water temperature has been quite close



to the low 80s we normally expect to see in early June though, and fishing has been close to par as well. The general scarcity of shoreline and seawall spanish mackerel have been the glaring exception to what has otherwise been a pretty good spring.

Speckled trout in the surf west of Little Lagoon Pass have been consistent hitters each morning, as long

as the wind doesn't kick up the Gulf too much. Anglers have been reporting fairly consistent topwater bites in the early morning, followed by some subsurface activity. Bluefish have been very active in the surf lately hitting spoons, mostly early mornings and late afternoons, with some real jumbos being caught. Pompano have really hung in along the beaches this spring since the May full moon. Numbers of pompano have still been high enough to target them consistently with numerous reports of Alabama limits (3), sprinkled with plenty of short pompano (less than 12 inch total length). That is a good sign for the future for this vibrant and fastgrowing fishery.

Speaking of a vibrant fishery, the surfzone is quickly filling up with hordes of hungry ladyfish (skipjack) and blue runner (hardtail). Those have been giving both pompano rig and lure anglers fits as they pursue speckled trout. It seems these jacks are always hungry and readily strike at just about anything that moves. Even reeling in a pompano rig with empty hooks will sometimes get a bite.

Though maligned by many gamefish anglers, this rapid pace action makes for great opportunities to get youngsters involved in the sport of surf fishing.

Whenever the Gulf is relatively calm, ladyfish may be caught (or at least hooked) rapid fire by repeatedly casting into their large schools milling around in the surf zone. The leaps of these "poor man's tarpon" add a special spark for anglers (young or old) experiencing it for the first time. One trick I learned while beach guiding folks that had never caught ladyfish or blue runner before was to use a Bubble Rig with a single hook lure on a 8 to 9 foot medium heavy action spinning combo with a 4000 series reel and 20 pound braided line. Oh my gosh, this makes the process of catching these fish so much easier on the neophyte anglers, plus they get to see a lot of the surface action. The single hook rig is much easier to remove from the fish and less likely to foul hook the fish or the angler. A pair of needle nose pliers is best for hook removal even though ladyfish do not have any sharp teeth. They do have rather sharp gill plates though and a rough mouth edged

with sandpaper like lips which may quickly abrade your line. So check for nicks and scrapes in your 30# or 40# clear monofilament leader line every now and then to monitor when to retie.

Though this is almost always strictly a catch and release operation, ladyfish actually do make great fresh cut bait for bluefish and sharks, and even a pretty decent meal when treated properly. I like to begin by bleeding any ladyfish bound for the table by slitting the gill rakers and placing the fish headfirst into a 5 -gallon bucket of seawater. After a few minutes the fish stops thrashing and can be transferred to the cooler into or under ice. Later the scales are easily removed with a water jet from a garden hose. Then the fillets are cut off the backbone and set to one side, skin side down. Do not rinse the fillets with water, but dab any residual blood away with a dry paper towel. Next use a serving spoon to scrape the meat from the skin in long motions along the fillet. All the Y bones and red meat remain attached to the skin while just the flesh curls up in the spoon to be placed in a bowl and refrigerated. The meat is lightly opaque with virtually no smell, and a very delicate consistency not flaky (so do not over stir). While the meat is chilling you can make up the binder mix for the fish cakes. This can be made with an egg, mayonnaise, a squirt of Dijon mustard, a dash or two of Worcestershir, and a tablespoon of lemon juice whisked into a large bowl. Also add your favorite herbs like dill, and seasoning like Tony's (if you like Creole flavor), or Cavender's Greek if you prefer a milder garlic flavor. Next add a cup of seasoned bread crumbs or crush up some Ritz crackers to form the base of your binder. Lastly fold in the fish meat to ingrain the seasoning. Ladyfish taste very mild and take on the flavors you introduce it to in the mix. Mold your fishcakes into 3 inch discs about 1 inch thick and place on wax paper. Results will be best if you refrigerate these for 30 minutes or so to set, and they may even be frozen between layers of wax-paper. I like to deep fry mine in a ½ inch of peanut oil at 350 to near 400 degrees. Cook about 3 to 4 minutes per side to give the cakes a nice golden brown slightly crispy outer shell. You can even top them with a Hollandaise or Bearnaise to reflect whatever flavors you like.

Besides the occasional influx of Sargassum Grass onto area beaches, the biggest news in the suds has been the return of the adult jack crevelle and bull redfish along the western Fort Morgan peninsula. Jacks have been the main game in the morning using surface poppers and swimbaits, and bull reds have been most active in the evening with cut mullet on the bottom with the falling tide. You definitely want some stout tackle to deal with these brutes, especially the big jacks. A lot of these fish exceed 20 pounds, so the angler would be best served to pursue them with 40 pound class tackle. Since most of these fish are intended for release, the best way to keep it healthy is to subdue it as quickly as possible, and returned to the Gulf.

Repair activity continues at a noticeable pace on the Gulf State Park Pier, with much of the work on the piling completed and new railing being placed along the replaced section of pier as well as the damaged section approaching it. Still a good amount of work remains to be done (like putting up new light poles) before the pier can reopen. But the last estimate was still around late summer.



### MaxPreps names OBHS the top softball team in the nation

Ava Hodo and K.G. Favors earn AHSAA Player of the Year awards

Orange Beach High School's Amazing Makos softball team, which capped off a 46-1 season by winning the school's fourth consecutive Alabama State Softball Championship, more recently was named the top high school softball team in the nation by MaxPreps. The Makos have won state championships in each of the four years the school has existed.

They could be a favorite for preseason No. 1 next spring."

In addition, team members Hodo and Favors were named best in state on the recently released Alabama Sports Writers Association 2024 All-State softball team. Hodo was named the Class 4A Player of the Year and Favors earned the Class 4A Pitcher of the

Year award.

Gulf Shores High School's Tia Titi, a senior infielder, also earned first team honors, and Dolphin pitcher Anna Leigh Price, a sophomore, and catcher Anayia McCutcheon, a freshsman, earned second team honors. The Dolphins' K.K. Jacks was honorable mention All-State.



### Champagne Fruit Compote

3/4 cup unsweetened white grape juice

- 1 Tbsp. honey
- 1 tsp. grated orange rind
- 4 (3-inch) sticks cinnamon
- 2 cups fresh strawberries, halved and divided
- 3 medium-size nectarines, sliced
- 1 cup seedless green grapes
- 1 cup seedless red grapes
- 3 kiwifruit, peeled and thinly sliced

1/2 cup champagne, chilled

Combine first 4 ingredients in a small saucepan. Bring to a boil; reduce heat, and simmer 5 minutes. Remove and discard cinnamon sticks. Cover and chill thoroughly. Place 1 cup strawberries in a large glass bowl. Layer nectarines and grapes over strawberries; top with remaining 1 cup strawberries and kiwifruit. Cover and chill thoroughly. To serve, stir champagne into chilled grape juice mixture; pour over fruit. Yield: 12 (1/2 cup) servings. Enjoy! Note: For a nonalcoholic version, substitute chilled sparkling white grape juice for the champagne.

### Foley receives FEMA grant for first responders' shelter

The city of Foley has received a grant from the Federal Emergency Management Agency that will pay 90% of the costs of building a safe room, a shelter for emergency personnel. The \$5.58-million facility will be used as a shelter and command post during hurricanes and other emergencies and be constructed on North Poplar Street. )

David Wilson, Foley executive director of public safety, said city officials have been developing plans for the facility, but were awaiting approval and funding from FEMA.

"I'm very pleased to announce that our long-awaited green light for the safe room has been given by FEMA," Wilson said. "This is a safe or secure facility that first responders can operate from during hurricanes and other emergencies. It's nearly 10,000 square feet in total size."

The shelter will house more than 200 people during a hurricane and will be constructed to withstand winds of up to 200 miles an hour. The facility will also be equipped with a 400 kilowatt generator that can run on either natural gas or diesel fuel.

The building will also include kitchen facilities and everything needed to house personnel during an emergency.

The facility will be built on city property on North Poplar Street north of the site where the Public Works campus is under construction and south of East Berry Avenue.

The location is a convenient site for city operations, Mayor Ralph Hellmich said.

"It's very close to City Hall," Hellmich said. "It also has a lot of main facilities for electrical and gas and water. We looked at about 10 different sites. That one made the most sense."

The building can also be used as a command post if other city facilities are damaged during a storm or other event.

The facility is expected to cost about \$5.58 million. The city's share of the cost will be 10% of the total. Wilson said the facility can also be used as a training center.



### Gulf Shores City Schools will add three electric buses

Gulf Shores City Schools was awarded \$600,000 for three electric buses as part of a \$16.9 million grant from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency that will fund 51 new all-electric buses for 10 school districts across Alabama.

The new clean school buses will reduce greenhouse gas emissions, save schools money, and better protect children's health from air pollution, according to al.com.

The buses and batteries purchased with these funds will be made in the United States, boosting domestic EV and battery production.

Hunstivlle City Schools received \$8,625,000 for 25 electric school buses. School districts in Lanett, Selma, Fort Payne, Clay County, Montgomery County, Jasper and the Alabama Aerospace and Aviation High School also received funding for electric buses.

The \$16.9 million in funding this year is in addition to \$11.5 million in funds that allowed Alb ersville to purchse 19 buses, Fairfield nine buises and Tuscumbia one bus. The awards are part of a \$5 billion Clean School Bus initiative by the EPA to advance the transition to electric or low-emissions school buses across the country. Funding for the program runs through 2026. The next round of applications closes on July 25, according to al.com.


